NEW EDITOR - The 10-10 Board of Directors reluctantly accepted the resignation of the editor Bob Arnold, N2JEU. Bob was having trouble with graphic support availability in Canastota, NY. He also became extremely busy at his new job at the College. The **10-10 NEWS** is quite time consuming. He asked that we look for a replacement Editor.

I have known W6YLJ for many years, he writes a 10-10 column for **Worldradio** and I am aware of Chucks ability to put together copy and publish it as part of his electronics business. I asked Chuck to volunteer as Editor. As luck would have it, Chuck, W6YLJ, did volunteer after a few days.

The Communications Committee discussed his qualifications and polled the Board. Chuck's volunteer application to be Editor was accepted by the 10-10 Board of Directors. CONTESTS - The winter 10-10 QSO Party is now history. I wish I had more time to be on the air, but I had to be away for most of the hours of the contest. However, for the time I was on it was lots of fun and I think everyone else was also enjoying it. I did get a chance to look at the 10-10 proposed "quiet zone", 28.490 to 28.510 MHz. I found fewer contesters there than on the adjacent frequencies. Maybe we can make it work?? Lets get the word out and try to establish 490-510 as a permanent quiet zone for at least the 10-10 Phone contests, and just maybe it will catch on with some other organized contests.

Maybe it could carry a penalty such as disqualify a score of anyone using the quiet zone while in a contest. **Please** do not get me wrong, I at this time am not advocating any penalties. But if ARRL and CQ as well as some others would go along with the "quiet zone" concept, our friends that are not

interested in contests would have a place to ragchew. I know many can only operate weekends on 10 meters. Many newer hams are restricted below 28.500, 10 is generally a daytime band. In my opinion, these hams deserve to be accommodated.

QSL - Since my return from Belize, (V31RV) I have received a number of QSL cards which were made out wrong. Most troublesome was listing the wrong time. Listing **local** time is always wrong, unless you live in England. I responded to all QSL requests. If you expect to receive a QSL from a DX station, you had better send accurate information. It was a lot of trouble verifying the contacts in my log. Also, be sure you have a stamped envelope on file at the QSL Bureau for your area. The policy is "no envelope, no cards". It is also a good way to find out if someone is using your call and working DX that you can't identify in the log.

ETHICS - There have been lots of complaints regarding operating ethics. I personally do not know how to handle these. How do I talk about ethical operating? Either a person is cool and reasonable or unreasonable and argumentative. Where does 10-10 International fit into this picture? If you have suggestions please send it to me. My address is above.

I value my license since 1946, and I enjoy this hobby. To be discourteous and get mad etc., would only diminish the pleasure I get from operating on the ham bands. I am not on 2 meters here in LA. Who needs the aggravation with the nuts and screwballs.

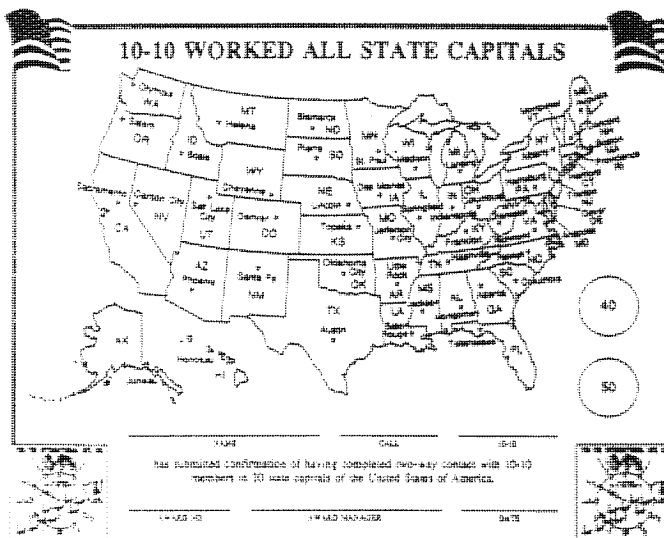

A New Award.....

10-10 Worked all State Capitals

The new **10-10 Worked all State Capitals Award** is ready for the first 10-10 member who can produce 50 QSL cards showing confirmed contacts with State Capitals in the United States. The basic award is for contact with 20 State Capitals. There is a Silver Seal for confirmed contacts with 40 State Capitals and a Gold Seal for contact with all 50 State Capitals. A beautiful two color 8 1/2" x 11" certificate is the reward for achieving the basic requirement of 20 confirmed contacts.



The award was suggested by 10-10 member Paul Johnson, N4JII, 10-10 #37708, who will also be the Certificate Manager.

The rules are quite simple. Work each state capital and obtain a QSL card confirmation. The contact may be made from either a fixed, portable or mobile station. The cost of the Certificate is \$2.00 US funds which includes return postage. QSL cards from any contact date are acceptable, so start going through your QSL card file and find those State Capitals. Remember the 10-10 number must be shown on the card.

New Names for Former Soviet Republics

The changes are as follows:

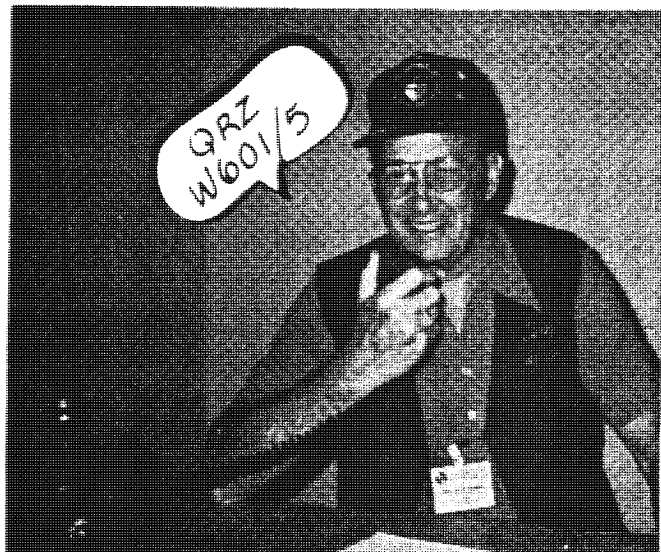

All APO and FPO's have dropped the cities of Miami, New York and San Francisco following the APO and FOS's effective September 1, 1991.

The changes to APO's and FPO's are as follows:

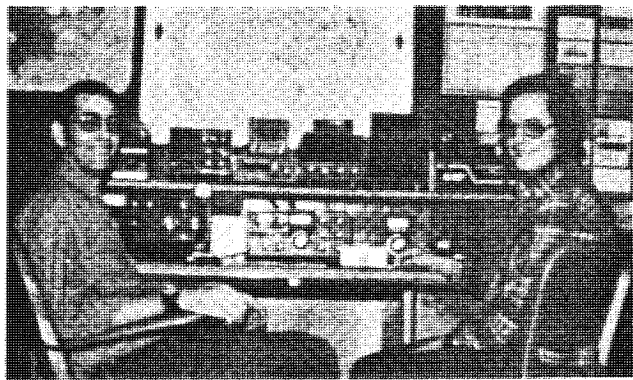
International Reply Coupons (IRC's)

IRC's now will provide air mail stamps for returns replacing surface returns. IRC's are in common use by amateur radio operators as a means for DX stations to recover their cost of postage for the return of much wanted QSL cards.

IRC's are controlled, printed and issued by the Universal Postal Union, a foreign body. They decided to have all IRC's exchangeable for air mail in February 1991, but made a printing error and didn't make the word change on the back side of the form until recently. The back side now reads as follows with the price remaining the same: "This coupon is exchangeable in any country of the Universal Postal Union for one or more postage stamps representing the minimum postage for a priority item or an unregistered letter sent by air to any country".

It is recommended that any 10-10 member buying IRC's check with you local post office and see if the new forms have replaced the older issue.

TenX DX News

My Winter QSO Party log just went into the mail and I hope everyone had as much fun as I had in the contest. Many of you might think that all I do is talk **DX** but I also enjoy the QSO Parties. I use a TenX computer logging program that also keeps track of the counties. It is a great surprise to a calling station when my computer gives me their info from a previous contact. I was able to QSL their info faster, logging numbers, counties and VP's. My total was 1261 contacts, 157 **DX** stations in 39 countries and a great time! The best **DX** activity during the winter was **Brunei**, **Tajikistan**, & **Christmas Isl.** Each was active with numbers and each gave me a new country, more details later.

Thanks to the stations that sent photos, **DX** info and the correction letters. I get my info from working members, from **DX** bulletins and a **DX** Packet Cluster here in Houston. I use Packet to check the **DX** calls that were logged while I am not at home. I just finished analyzing the past 4 months of **DX** data that was saved on Packet and I found 100 **TenX DX countries** and 112 others for a total of 212! Packet is great for **DX**!

Propagation for the summer will be below average conditions for N. America. Solar flux levels will be down 10 points less than last summer. The Solar Flux is 200-253 and the Sun is at major storm levels during the last of Feb. The average flux level is lower. Storm activity will raise the flux but a storm will cause more signals to be absorbed and less **DX**. Usually by May 1 you may have trouble hearing Europe from N.America as the change in summer skip brings fewer signals until next fall.

So lets crank up the tower and see what's new for TenX.

Feature DX Station: VK9XN Bob Winn W5KNE.

Christmas Island is located south of Indonesia and belongs to Australia. **VK9XN** Bob and **VK9XM**,

Lanny (nonmem), said the pileups were awesome as they operated from Feb 11-24th. Lanny did most of the CW and SSB by Bob. Christmas Isl. is small and very few amateur ops are ever on the island. This **DX**pedition was a new country for many and considering the pileups, they did a great job! QSL **VK9XN/W5KNE** Bob Winn, POBox 832205, Richardson, TX 75083, and **VK9XM** to **W5BOS**.

W6QL & W6KG Iris and Lloyd Colvin are on the **DX** trail again traveling in **Brunei** with the call **V85KGP** and **XW1QL Laos**. This is the first activity since **V85AH** Malcolm Arnett got his number in May 89. My sources tell me that **V85AH** has left **Brunei** so I was glad to find Iris with the **V85KGP** call in mid Feb. I did not get any reports of the **XW1QL** on ten. After Laos they moved to **Brunei** and I expect they will now return home to CA. They like to go to the Visalia **DX** convention in California April 10-12. QSL **YASME**.

FR/FD1PYI Reunion Isl reported 1/13 on 28495 at 1430Z by the packet system. I do not have any info on him, anyone work him?

ZA1QA was Gyoza **HA0MM** operating from **Albania** last year. The ARRL **DXCC** desk has just announced that QSL cards for **ZA1QA** and the other two **HA** operators are being accepted for **DXCC** purposes. Licenses for these ops were issued by the MCYS and not by the Albanian PTT. In the future, the ARRL will only accredit those ops approved by the Albanian PTT! This means TenX credit now for Albania. As of February we have NOT issued a number to an Albanian national. Anyone want to help get the first **ZA** their number? 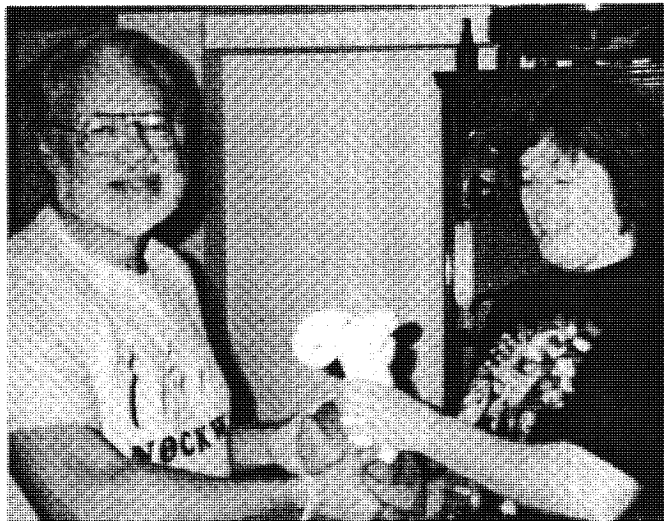

FCC HIGHLIGHTS

The FCC has released amateur licensing figures for the end of September 1991, the end of the federal fiscal year, and the pendulum has swung strongly toward the Technician license being the gateway of choice into Amateur Radio, David Sumner, K1ZZ, #4852, Executive Vice President of ARRL said.

In the 12 months beginning October 1990, there were 38,363 new amateur licenses issued and 30,825 upgrades. Both figures represent an increase over the previous year in which there were 26,134 new licenses issued and 29,699 upgrades.

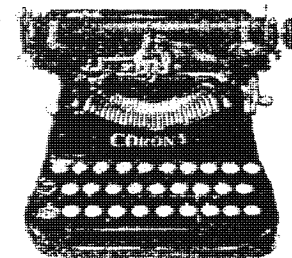

A Look Back..... Spring 1977



It's only a short 15 years ago, Spring 1977, and the **BULLETIN** noted that it was VOL. 15, NR 1. Its page count was

20! (The name change from the **BULLETIN** to the **10--10 International News** came with the Spring 1980 edition). It was stated that the Quarterly Meeting would be held in Van Nuys, CA at the Holiday Inn. The social hour starts at 12:30 pm and the Menu was Beef Stroganoff and all the trimmings for \$5.50 which included tax and tips.

Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, #4189, was President (Morrie is still active today as the Scholarship Manager). The Area Managers were "Vice Presidents" and a review of the list of 12 notes that only one is still active as an Area Manager. None other than Grace Dunlap, K5MRU, #218!

The dues were \$2.00 and Rosters were \$1.00. Although this is Spring 1977, a new roster has not been published since May 1975. The membership was kept up-to-date with new numbers issued by printing a "Roster Supplement" in each quarterly issue of the **bulletin**. The highest number listed was 14513.

The Net Coordinator, George Elliott, W6ENC, (now SK) #1774, reported that there were over 100 10-10 Nets throughout the World. The ten meter band had improved greatly since the last **BULLETIN** and that the West Coast was able to hear all of the East Coast and even stations in South America were now being heard. (This was at a time when the Sun Spot Cycle, #21, was at a low ebb. It was approximately 40 and on the way up - We are in Cycle #22 which is currently running approximately 140 - Ed.).

So much for the Spring of 1977. It is interesting to take **A Look Back** and see the changes that have happened in a few short years. We will take another **Look Back** in the next issue.

Contest Results Delayed

The Suncoast Chapter, scorer of the Winter SSB QSO Party has advised that the results of the contest will not be available until after the deadline for this issue. The results of the contest held on February 1-2, 1992 will be published in the next issue of the **NEWS**.

FCC Steps up Computer Enforcement

According to reports, the FCC is seeing poor compliance with its certification rules by some vendors of personal computers. A survey last year found that more than half of the computers offered for sale did not have FCC certification.

The FCC's Baltimore field office has mailed out 10,000 warning letters to computer builders and resellers in its region. Only three percent of 100 vendors at a Maryland computer show in January were selling equipment with the FCC label -- and two of those vendors were later determined to have put phony information in the label.

The FCC can issue fines of \$25,000. per incident for selling uncertified PCs. The certification program is focused on preventing interference to telecommunications and broadcasting. Certification may be either Class A for computers intended for use only in business locations, or the tighter-tolerance Class B available for use in business or residential environments. In general, the Commission requires portable, laptop and notebook computers to pass Class B standards.

The best antique is an old friend.

On March 17th, the FCC issued Notices of Apparent Liability - a Commission term for a monetary fine - against five computer companies. All, in the \$10,000. to \$15,000. range, went to distributors for marketing Class B personal computers and peripherals which had not been granted equipment authorization.

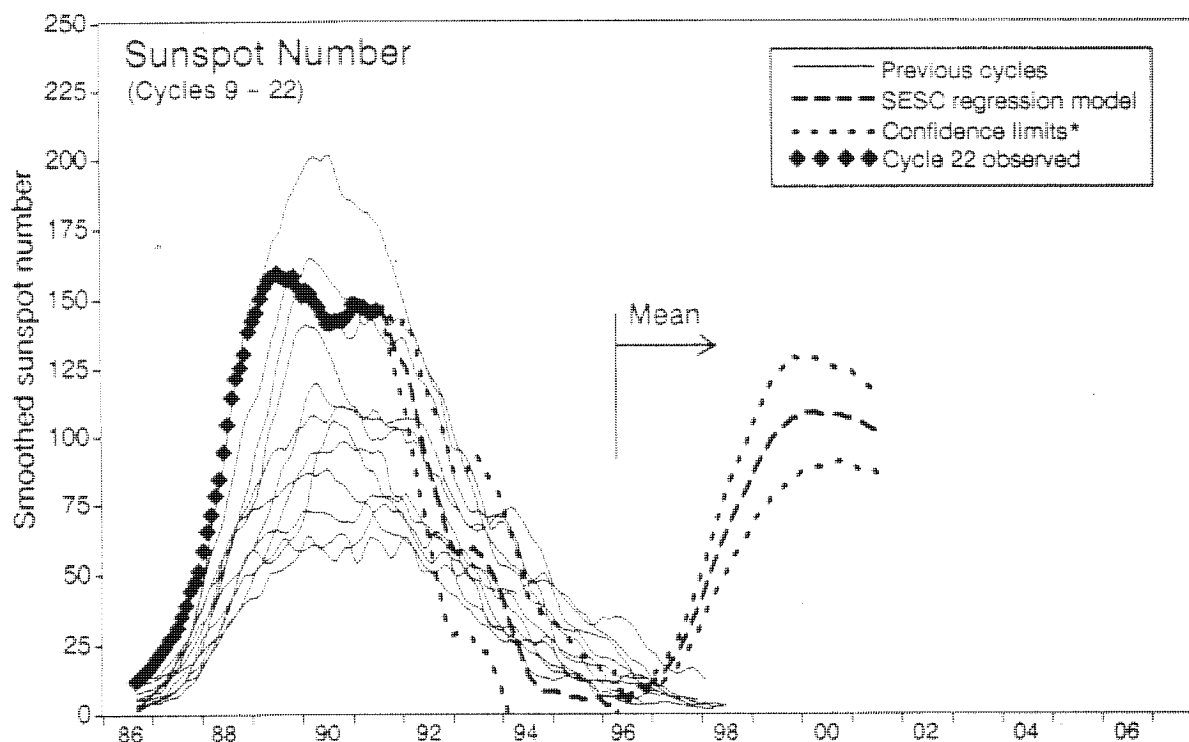
While amateur radio operators may construct personal computers for their own use without going through the FCC's equipment authorization procedure, they may not be offered for sale to others - especially if they have capabilities exceeding those of amateur radio applications.

Sunspot Cycle 22

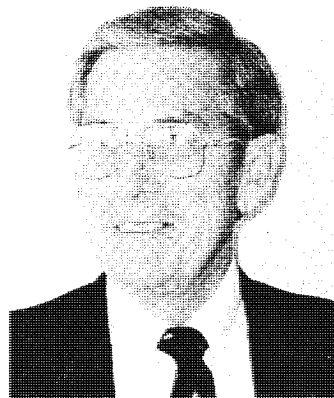
Sunspot cycle 22, although maybe not as good as some previous cycles, is providing us with some good propagation. The chart shows the "smoothed sunspot cycle numbers" comparing cycle 22 to the previous cycles. The heavy diamond curve indicates the current cycle, #22. The higher the number (on the left side of the chart, the better the propagation. We on 10 meters are looking for the highest number, which indicates the best propagation.

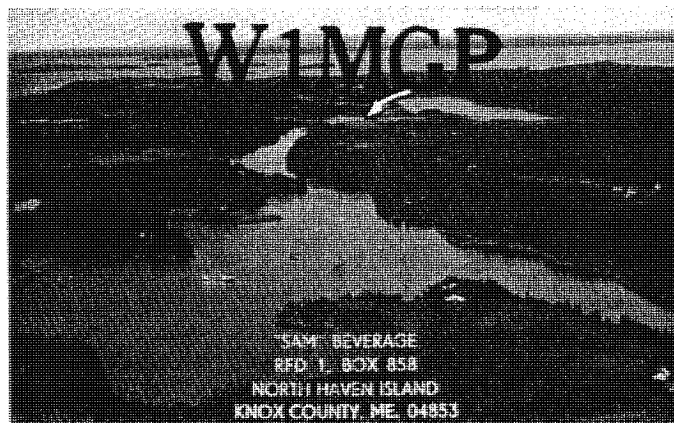

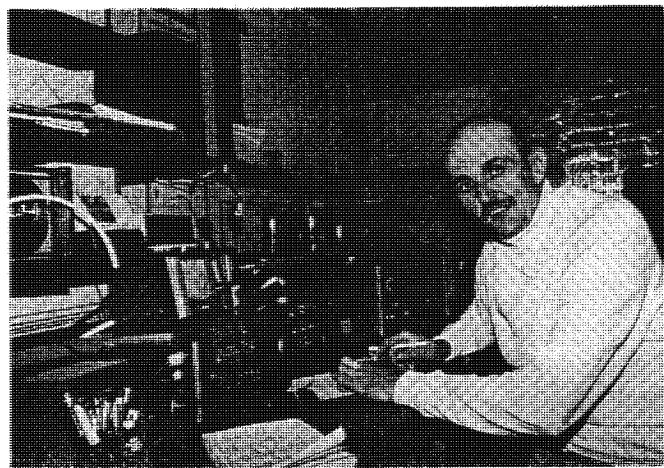


Arrow Indicates QTH of Sam Beverage, W1MPG, #273, MAINE-iac's Chapter CH on North Haven Island, ME

10-10 QSO Parties

Some Courtesies and Customary Practices from One 10-10 Contester

After just completing the Spring 10-10 QSO Party, I felt it was time to hopefully pass on to the membership, particularly our newly licensed members, some of the courtesies and customary practices of contesting.

I had a lot of fun in the contest, over 1100 Q's, worked one new country, ZB2CF in Gibraltar, and completed my 5000 BAR. I am Chapter Head and Certificate Manager for the Kangaroo Kourt Chapter and have over 100 10-X chapter certificates. All this preface to establish my activity on 10 and in 10-10.

While I am certainly no know-it-all of contesting, I have participated in numerous contests, both 10-10 and others. Contesters as a group are not the most courteous animals on the air. We have one driving intent; to make as many contacts possible in the allotted time. Some like to stop for a chat with old friends, some do not. Many contacts are "courtesy calls", those who are not working the contest competitively, but just want to see who they can work, maybe only for collecting new 10-10 numbers for their collection. These contacts are important to the contestor, as every contact is valuable, even those without a 10-10 number. Less contacts = lower scores = less fun = less participation. So a big THANKS to you courtesy callers.

Now for some **do's** and **do not's**. If you hear as station "20 over 9", you don't have to spell out your name twice, and for 10-10 contests it is not necessary to spell out your home town in phonetics. The contest only requires your QTH, that is State or Country. With the new **10-10 County Award**, some may want your county, and if they do, they will ask, and give you theirs in return. When you use phonetics, use the official ARRL-ICAO list. It is in many publications, including the **10-10 Information Manual**.

Now for the problem for which there is no good answer. **Frequency use**. Most of my time contesting is spent on what is called "runs". That is where you set up on a frequency and call CQ, as opposed to chasing up and down the band looking for contacts. With the Novice Enhancement, most of the 10 meter activity is between .3 and .5, so everyone concentrates in that portion. During a 10-10 contest, the .3-.5 portion of the band is total QRM. So you ask, why don't we contestors move up above .5 to a less crowded portion of the band. Totally defeats the contestors purpose. Contestors have to be where the action is!

We all know that 10 meters is a band with continuing changing conditions. When you were only hearing the East coast and suddenly Europe or the West coast is 5-9, it is not uncommon to hear someone else calling CQ on "your frequency". At this point it is very hard not to get hostile with the new QRM. Most cases end up with the stronger station winning out. At this time it is probably a good time to look for another frequency.

There are a multitude of amateurs who don't give a flip about contests. And in the fairness to those, 10-10's Contest Manager, Harry Syring, WB1FTQ, has suggested that a contest "**quiet zone**" be observed between 28.490 and 28.510. It was noted that during the last 10-10 contest there was much contest activity within the suggested "quiet zone".

The "do's and do not's" listed are but my suggestions in an attempt to give some insight of contesting to those new kids on the block and also to some of us old salts who get a little too set in our ways and who don't respond as efficiently as we could. Please keep the contest QSO short, pass along only the necessary information, and remember that there is always tomorrow when we can chew the rag.





My Other Hobby.....

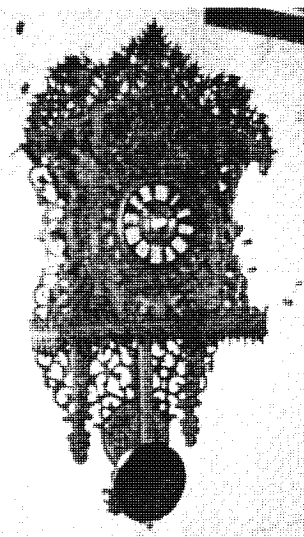
My hobbies are Amateur Radio and believe it or not building **Clocks**. I spend all of my time on 10 meters, except when I am building one of my clocks.

Free Speech and Ham Radio

The Supreme Court has turned down FCC efforts to reinstate regulations barring "indecent" transmissions from the airwaves around the clock. The FCC said it wanted to protect youngsters from adult material.

The controversial legislation backed by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) was ruled unconstitutional by a Washington federal appeals court last year. The U.S. Supreme Court has refused to review the appellate court's decision.

Now the FCC once again must come up with new rules permitting off-color transmissions at least during certain parts of the day. In the meantime, the FCC said they would continue banning "indecenties" between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m.

It also appears that the "safe harbor" rules applies to amateur as well as commercial radio. At least the FCC's General Counsel has elected not to pursue obscene and sexually explicit language on the amateur airwaves.

David Boyd, K9MX, 10-10 #16920, an ARRL Official Observer, has been trying for over six months to get an answer on FCC's position on the use of obscene, indecent and profane language on the ham bands. He has written two letters to the Chairman of the FCC without a response.

Boyd wants to know:

1) Is the FCC going to enforce its Part 97.113(d) prohibition against obscene, indecent or profane language or meaning?

2) Is the Amateur Service subject to the same standards, with regard to indecency or obscenity, as the broadcast media (and)

3) Will similarly indecent material (or worse) transmitted on the ham bands be subject to penalties?

It appears that the FCC has been placed in a "no win" position. They are sandwiched between the whims and laws of Congress and the Constitution as interpreted by the Court. Will the FCC come up with some new effort to regulate over-the-air language content? Stay tuned.

5H3CC, 10-10 #62214 from Tanzania

Father Camillo Calliari, 5H3CC, of Kipengere, Njombe Province, Tanzania, has just received his 10-10 # 62214. Father Calliari is 52 years old and is a Priest of the Order of La Consolana Missions of Torino, Italy. He has been a ham for many years with the Italian call of IN35BN. He has been a Priest for about 25 years and was stationed at the Makambako Mission prior to being sent to Kipengere near the Liwigston Mountains, at an altitude of 2400 meters.

Kipengere is 900 km from Dar-Es-Salam Airport. It is a two day trip to travel 70 km to Njombe where the nearest telephone and post office are located. The Kipengere Mission has a territory of about 140 square km with approximately 35,000 people of which about 13,000 are Catholic. Father Camillo says that before each time they wish to speak to God, it is necessary to fill the stomachs of the African People. In order for the Mission to obtain day-to-day operating expenses, Father Camillo has established a school for woodworker's and a secondary school for the breeding of cows to produce milk and cheese. A special factory was opened to experiment with grain cultivation and a baker's oven was implanted last year to produce the same bread as they have in Italy.

All machines, cars and trucks necessary for the mission operations are delivered from Italy with the help of Italian hams. To date Italian friends and hams have sent 4 Spinner, 3 Trucks, 4 Outroad Cars, 1 Buss, 1 Moto and 1 Greener for earth movement. All replacement parts have also been sent.

During the month of August 1992, three of our 10-10 members will visit Kipengere and will operate 5H3CC especially for 10-10 members with the antenna set for the U.S. direction. Activity will be from 30 July the 31 August 1992. CW will be at or near 28.020 calling "CQ TEN-TEN" and SSB at or near 28.495 and some activity at or near 28.850. The antenna will be a TH5 5 element beam for 10 meters. The 10-10 DX group will be on the air every day about 1700Z with the beam in the direction of the USA.

10-10 Member to be Dayton HamVention Keynote Speaker

Roy Neal, K6DUE, #50959

It has been announced that the gala HamVention Banquet keynote speaker will be **Roy Neal, K6DEU, 10-10 #50959**. Roy has been a 10-10 member for a number of years and is an ex-NBC newscaster and science editor.

Roy joined NBC News in 1952 and is recognized as one of the leading news experts on aerospace. He has participated in the coverage American space flights including the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo and the Space Shuttle. In addition to reporting the manned flights, he covered other aspects of the space age, including Ranger, Lunar Orbiter, and Surveyor flights to the moon, Mars and Venus, as well as the Voyager flights to Jupiter and Saturn.

As a 35 year news veteran, Roy reported a wide range of stories and events on the network's "Nightly News", "Today" and hosted special programs. He also was in charge of NBC's Radio Operations for the West Coast and frequently reported for the radio networks.

His news career started as an announcer and sportscaster for radio station WIBG in Philadelphia in 1940. He served in the US Army during World War II as an Infantryman and then as a Program Manager of the Armed Forces Radio Network in Europe. After discharge in 1946, he returned to Philadelphia where he joined the news staff of WPTZ in the early days of television. Roy's career with NBC began in 1952 when the NBC Television Network sent him to California to establish the West Coast news bureau. He pioneered many radio and television techniques -- wearing the twin hats of producer and correspondent.

Amateur radio operator Roy Neal began hamming in 1934 when he was first licensed as W3GIB in the Philadelphia suburb of Wayne, Pennsylvania. From home brew equipment he migrated into early experimental work including aeronautical mobile transceivers on 5 meters - a band long gone from the amateur frequency allocation.

When Roy moved to California in 1952, he picked up his current call of K6DUE. A high point of his amateur career was in 1986, when he was Ham of

the Year at the Dayton Hamvention. Roy retired from NBC in 1986 and moved from Southern California to High Point, NC.

He was the Executive Producer and anchor of the ARRL publicity video tape, "The New World of Amateur Radio". He also was involved in the production of the ARRL documentaries "Moving Up to Amateur Radio", "Amateur Radio's Newest Frontier" and "SAREX - Shuttle Amateur Radio Equipment".

Clarification on Requesting BAR Awards.....

There seems to be some confusion in the understanding the instructions for the BAR Awards. To clarify the **BAR Awards** as noted on page 30 the following may be helpful:

1) List 10-10 numbers in numerical order, Call sign of Station worked, Operators name and Location (QTH). QTH need be only the State or Country. It is no longer necessary to list the City. Be sure to include your Call, 10-10 number and proof of paid-up dues. Also indicate which **BAR** you are requesting.

2) With the 500 BAR you are issued a **VP** number. For a **VP Certificate** there is a cost of \$1.00 plus 2 first class stamps. No SASE as the certificate will be shipped flat in a large envelope. Also include an address label for the return of the certificate to you.

10-10 QSO Parties are open to all amateurs, but only paid-up 10-10 members are eligible for awards and chapter assignment of scores. They are conducted to encourage 10 meter operation and interest in the Net. Non-members may use numbers collected to qualify for membership; members may use them for awards.

RULES

- 1) **PHONE** contacts must be in the 10-meter phone band on SSB, AM or FM. **CW** contacts must be in the 10-meter band on CW or RTTY.
- 2) Exchange Callsign, Name, State or Country and 10-10 number. Some stations may also request your County.
- 3) A station may be counted only once.
- 4) Single operator stations only are acceptable.
- 5) All contacts must take place within the 48-hour contest period.
- 6) Logs must be kept in UTC (Universal Coordinated Time).
- 7) A DUPE sheet is required of all participants. Computer duping is OK. SASE to the Contest Manager for a sample DUPE sheet.
- 8) Chapter assignment of scores may be made only by a paid-up member belonging to that chapter as a local member and be able to work its Net via ground wave from the contest station.
- 9) Illegible or improperly submitted logs will be rejected.
- 10) Failure to comply with these rules or their intent may result in disqualification.
- 11) **SCORING:** Two (2) points per contact with 10-10 number exchange. One (1) point per contact without a 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS

First place certificate to each U.S. Call Area (Area 7 includes Alaska), Canada, South America, Caribbean (including Bermuda), Europe, Africa, Asia and the Pacific (which includes Australia, New Zealand, Hawaii and all Pacific Islands).

The TOP TEN finishers in the contest overall will receive a certificate. ACTIVE (paid-up) members and Chapter scores will be listed in the NEWS.

LOGS

Logs are accepted from 10-10 members only, and must be complete, legible, and in UTC. Each line entry must show Callsign, Time, QTH (State or Country), Name and 10-10 Number, if any. A cover sheet is required showing your name, callsign, QTH, 10-10 number, membership expiration date, and the chapter assignment, if any, total contacts and total points. The address cover of the NEWS satisfies this requirement. A DUPE sheet must accompany all logs.

QUIET ZONE

It is requested that 10-10 members have the courtesy to observe a "quiet zone" between 28.490 and 28.510 Mhz for non-contesters to use.

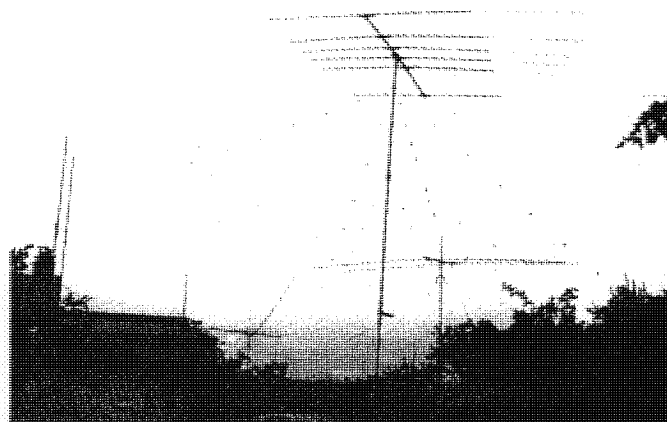
