A Guide to DX QSLingPart 1

Due to the number of new hams that have joined 10-10, the following information is presented which has been gathered by experience of myself and others.

Hear an Unusual Prefix? The first ground rule is to **WFWL** (work first-worry later). A number of times a call will seem to be a bootlegger (also called *slim* or *pirate*) and may come out in *QST*. *CQ*. or *Worldradio* or one of the other sources as a legitimate call.

To find out the country of the station, consult the "Table of Allocation of International Call Signs" in the front of the Callbook. For example, LP2AA would be in the range of LOA-LWZ. This series is assigned to Argentina. 8J5ITU would be Japan.

Want a QSL Card? If you are an ARRL member, and are not interested in a fast reply, send your outgoing QSL cards to the ARRL Outgoing QSL Bureau. They will send your card, and all others going to the same country, in a package to the particular country's QSL Bureau, who will send your card to the addressee. The addressee will return a card to you via his countries QSL Bureau which will send a package back to the ARRL. When the ARRL receives cards back from the various countries, they then send each US call district their cards to the ARRL District QSL Bureau for distribution back to you.

As you can see by the amount of handling, there is considerable time involved. Be patent! It could take up to two years for a card to make the cycle and get back to you.

If you use the ARRL Outgoing QSL Bureau, the process is very simple. Package up all of your DX QSL cards and mail them, along with the addresscontinued on page 15


indicators suggest that sunspot minimum will be in 1996. Cycle number 23 is expected to be a larger cycle than average, and to be somewhat shorter than average, last roughly 10 years. Planning Committee Report







Bob Lindsay, N5XSW #62183, our 10-10 News Honor Station this issue, writes:

I have found your new feature, *Honor Station*, in the *NEWS* to be interesting and informative - it is great to see what equipment other amateurs use and their station set-ups.

So far stations featured lean toward the "mega-buck" stations with high power transceivers, a multitude of enhancement accessories, and antenna systems that might be envied by some commercial stations. One could be left with the impression that the hobby is for those with a lot of money to spend - a discouraging factor for the young, those just starting out, or those with a limited budget.

My station is the "bare bones" type and demonstrates to those with limited budgets, especially our young hams, that amateur radio, working only the 10 meter band and the Ten-Ten organization, can all be enjoyed, as well as awards and recognition received, without a huge expense to experience the fun, fascination, and enjoyment of this hobby.

I became licensed in December, 1991, under the nocode Technician program (I have since upgraded to Advanced Class). I did not purchase my first HF radio until August, 1992. The radio I purchased was a Uniden 2600 (25-watts) that I bought used for \$80.00. The radio is operated from my dining room, powered by a 12 volt motorcycle battery. The antenna is a wire stretched out on the roof as a dipole.

With this set-up, and in less than six months, I have been able to obtain the 10-10 VP Award (#2654) for 500 10-10 contacts, the Counties Award (#288) having worked over 160 different counties, the OM/XYL Award, and have participated in 10-10 Chapter Nets throughout the country. I have contacted over 25 countries including Croatia, Mozambique, Argentina, Japan and several in Europe. This was accomplished without even using a 10-10 Contest as I purchased my radio after the July 1992 contest, and reached the above goals before the February 1993 contest, and when many hams were bemoaning how the 10-meter band was dying with the decline of the eleven-year sunspot cycle.

in addition to amateur radio, as a single parent, I am very active with activities for young people. I also work with young people encouraging interest in amateur radio. To round out my support of those who are interested in becoming involved in amateur radio, I am also a Volunteer Examiner.

Editors Note - Most of us aspire to have the best equipped stations possible, however, Bob has demonstrated that a massive amount of equipment and large expenditure of dollars are not necessary to have a good time in our hobby.

TenX DX News

Mike Davidson KC5CP, #24949



Has anyone ever thought that Amateur Radio is like fishing? We listen for DX just like looking for fish, using our skills and equipment, maybe not getting a QSO for all your efforts but you still have fun looking. The antenna is like a fishing pole, the radio is the bait which lures that rare DX station out of a quiet band and suddenly results in the catch of the day. After years of DXing, I still get real excited whenever I work a new 10-10 country just like anyone who catches a ten pound bass on light tackle! Sometimes the fight thru the pileup is worth the wait but the catch can slip away. Just like fishing, propagation will determine what you catch. A change of conditions can yield a new one at anytime so keep fishing for more 10-10.

Many of you have asked what DX is available from the US, we will talk about DX heard/worked and future propagation. Here at my station I have not worked a new country since March. There are not as many DX stations on during the summer due to the shift of propagation. This spring only 35 new DX stations joined 10-10, down from last winter.

I have been listening to 28.345 and the Sporadic-E skip stateside is excellent tonight. During the summer we will have short stateside openings that will extend into the evenings with daytime DX skip limited to signals from: Africa, Caribbean, S.America and S.Pacific. These conditions will continue until October for the USA. I expect poor DX conditions this winter, with a continued drop in solar flux levels until the Spring of 1996 when we reach the bottom of this cycle! Expect solar flux levels of 85-120 to yield a below average winter DX season as compared to 1992. Check propagation by using the CW beacons 28.200 to 28.300. A list of beacons with their frequencies are in the callbook. If your radio frequency is accurate, just look up the beacon's callsign and thus location from the chart!

The June 93 edition of the ARRL DXCC Countries List is available for \$2. It contains rules, a list of 327 current countries, bureau info, a prefix list & the ARRL DXCC field checkers listed by area.

Feature DX Station: VP2VF Dirk on Tortola, British Virgin Isl.

VP2VF Dirk received his number Jan 7, 1993 and in a short time, has over 1500 numbers worked. I helped Dirk when he applied for his number. He told me he had sent it in a week before and I wanted him to get his number asap. Since the mail is slow back to his QTH, I asked Carol K8DHK for his new number and then told Dirk on the air he was #63440. Dirk appreciated my help in getting his new 10-10 without having to wait on the mail. By April 18th. Dirk had 13 Bars, VP#2674, won the Winter QSO Party and he has done a super job of reducing the need for VP2V thus his fine effort qualifies Dirk for our feature DX station. If you need his QSL please enclose a green stamp for postage with your QSL to Dirk J.de Jong, POBox 137, Road Town, Tortola, British Virgin Islands Caribbean.

Minutes **Board of Directors** Meeting April 23, 1993

The Board of Directors convened in Dayton, Ohio in a closed meeting on April 23, 1993, at 7:20 PM. A quorum of seven Officers and Directors was present as follows: Officers Vice President Hugh Sullivan - WA4QZU presiding, Secretary Marge Smothers - WA6ZPX, Treasurer Gerny Gross - WA6POZ, Directors Linda Barnes - KJ4FM, Tom Henderson - K4ClH, Jack Miller -W9WYN, and Elaine Nickoloff - N8CBE, Voting proxies were received from Directors Gary Ward - KD7UZ, and Don Zielinski - KOPVI. After the Secretary left the meeting, the minutes were taken by Linda Barnes.

The first order of business was the presentation of a proposal by Gerry Gross to (a) manage the 10-10 data base (b) sub-contract the printing and mailing of the 10-10 International News (c) manage membership renewals and (d) perform the duties of the Supply Manager. The chair requested that the merits of the proposal be judged on the potential to reduce costs and increase efficiency in each area. After approximately one hour of intense questioning, and after a comprehensive computer demonstration of his data base program's capabilities the night before, the Board believes the proposal will result in considerable savings (see NOTE: below) increased efficiency and expanded information potential when compared to the present method. At this time Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, Editor of the 10-10 International News, was asked to appear before the Board to comment on the advisability of changing the printing and mailing of the News. He favored the change as long as the paper quality was maintained and approved the type proposed for use. NOTE: The Board estimates that the savings resulting form these two areas will approximate \$6,000 per year.

While in the room, Chuck Imsande presented four other proposals for the Board's consideration: (1) converting the Roster program from a loss to a profit condition by printing the Roster on disks with periodic upgrades printed Rosters would be available only by special order (2) printing 2000 flyers about the Wichita Convention to be mailed to Area Managers in Call Areas contiguous to zero-land for distribution to new and renewal membership applicants (3) development and sale of a 10-10 photo album (4) development of the requirements for a new Prefix Award. The Board approved (2) (3) and (4) without a vote and merged (1) with the vote on the proposal by Gerry Gross.

Dave Prichard, KA5OVO, was called in to report on the activities of Supply Manager. It is his opinion that if the duties of Supply Manager are consolidated with those of the Data Manager this will prove cost effective as well as save time.

Carol and John Hugentober, K8DHK and N8FU. respectively, reported on the duties of Area Manager. They both felt that renewal reminders were a must and

felt that the removal of renewals to the data processor would be cost effective.

At this point the chair suggested that the Board act on all other agenda items and then return to a discussion and vote on the aforementioned proposal by Gerry Gross.

Jack Miller is soliciting proposals for the 1995 convention.

A motion was made by Tom Henderson to have the 1994 board meeting in St. Louis, Missouri. This motion was seconded by Linda Barnes. The vote was unanimous.

> A proxy written by Gary Ward was read as an affirmative vote and Gerry Gross made a motion to disallow the proxy. This motion failed due to the lack of a second.

A motion was made by Elaine Nickoloff to name Teresa Mycko, KA4HOY, Chairman of the Nominating Committee. This is pending upon her acceptance.

> Gary Ward's proxy was read as an affirmative vote with a motion by Gerry Gross to disallow the proxy vote. This motion failed due to the lack of a second.

Tom Henderson was designated to poll those Board members not present via telephone for a final tally of

Tom Henderson made a motion to table discussion concerning a change in the dues structure for life memberships. This motion was seconded by Elaine Nickoloff.

> Gary Ward's proxy was entered as an affirmative vote and a motion was made by Gerry Gross to disallow the proxy. This motion failed due to the lack of a second.

Mel Sojka's "letter proposal" was brought before the Board. No action was taken because a formal proposal was not submitted.

Hugh Sullivan gave a report on his contact with Area 1 Manager concerning Al's refusal to send out new member handbooks. The Membership Committee is directed to inform Al that he has 30 days in which to comply with our policy or a replacement for that position will be sought. The Operations Manual is an ongoing project being carried out by Tom Henderson.

Jack Miller is seeking quotes on liability insurance and the bonding of our treasurer.


Hugh Sullivan will direct the Operations Committee to seek a replacement for the 1000 BAR Manager as soon as possible.

label from the <u>latest</u> issue of QST. The cost is modest, \$2.00 per pound of cards (about 150). If you don't have that many cards, you can send 10 cards or less for \$1.00. You may send cards to the ARRL once a month if you wish.

As an alternate to using the ARRL QSL Bureau, for example if you are not an ARRL member, you can send your card either to the ham direct or to his own countries QSL Bureau.

For the fastest service, but not the least expensive, send direct to the DX ham, if you have his address. Always send return postage with your card along with a SASE. Many DX stations still use a "tall QSL card", one that measures 4" x 6". It is best to send an SASE that measures at least 4 1/2" x 6" so the DX station does not have to bend his card to fit into your envelope. The is a current movement worldwide to standardize on the 3 1/2" x 5 1/2" size as the maximum. There are, and most likely will be, DX stations that continue to use the "tall card" and it would be a shame to have that precious card folded in half because your return envelope was too small.

Return postage can be included by enclosing a "green stamp" (\$1.00), by including the necessary IRC's (International Postage Coupon) or by including an Air Mail stamp of the DX country. IRC's are available from your local Post Office at about \$.95 each. Be sure your IRC's are the new type, the one that says "Return by Airmail" on the reverse. Be sure the postal employee date stamps (called "red eye" by postal people) the circle of the left side of the IRC. By not stamping the left side could make it invalid in the other country, and by stamping it on the right side voids the IRC as far as the DX Country is concerned. Look in the front of your Callbook to determine how many IRC's are required for each county. If your IRC says "Return by Airmail", you will need only one of this new IRC.

Stamps from various countries are available from people advertising in the various ham publications selling DX Country Stamps. They will send you their price list with information about postage rates in various countries for a SASE.

When sending your card direct to the DX station. always include an SASE for the DX ham to his card to you. When placing a folded SASE inside the outer envelope, always place the fold down so a letter opener does not cut your SASE in half.

If you decide to send your card direct to the DX

country QSL Bureau, there is a list in the front of the Callbook for each country.

If you really want that DX QSL card back <u>fast</u>, and you have the address of the DX station, then by all means, bite the bullet, spend the money, and send it direct.

One last word about sending "green stamps". Some countries have a problem with Postal Theft. It is suggested that your "green stamp" be placed inside your return envelope, or even placed between carbon paper, so as to prevent someone from "candling" (holding it up to a light to see what is in it).



and in the monthly Certificate Updates. We do not want to have our members waste their time and or money to support a chapter that is no longer active.


I hope all of you can make the 10-10 Convention in September. There will be many chapters represented in Wichita and lots of specials given out there.

The Amateur Radio News Service (ARNS) has judged the *News* "EXCELLENT" in their annual Publication Award Contest for 1992.




The three judges awarded the *News* a total of 261 points out of a total of 300 possible points. There were 90 amateur radio club publications entered in the ARNS contest in 1992.

Paper Chasing

in prior columns I have been discussing 10-10 Awards Lists and related items. This time lets take a look at the areas of the 10 meter band that most of the paper



chasers hang out in. There are two main frequencies used. They are 28.345 and 28.825 MHz.

As the frequency 28.345 MHz is a gathering point, it would stand to reason that it can be very crowded at times when the band is open. When contact is made with another station, it might be wise for those two stations to QSY 5 or 10 MHz up or down so as to leave the main frequency clear for the next stations to come along. At different times there are some of the 10-10 Chapters holding their nets on the frequency also.

There is nothing worse than two stations holding the frequency talking about <u>non-10-10</u> subjects when many other paper chasers are monitoring and hoping to work other paper chasers to gather their numbers and points. The other day there was a station in Seattle who stayed on the frequency for a long time and stated that he did not have a 10-10 number and he had nothing to do with 10-10. Then he proceeded to tell all about his operations on the CB Band. I broke in and asked the question of why he would tie-up the 10-10 monitoring frequency when he disliked 10-10 and his response was to QSY.

When stations are exchanging award numbers, please don't break until the exchange is completed. There is no point having stations talking over other stations.....the chaos will result. I have heard times when there have been as many as three or four pairs of stations talking at once. Remember to QSY after making contact to leave the frequency clear for others.

Besides using the paper chasers calling frequency, another idea is to check the net listings in the 10-10 Certificate Guide and check into a chapter's net so as to be able to get a lot of award numbers for that chapter. The 10-10 Net and Certificate Guide is published by 10-10 and is distributed by Dave, KA5OVO, for \$6.00. You will find Dave's address on

page 2 of the NEVS.

I am looking forward to the up-coming 10-10 Convention in Wichita, Kansas this coming September. I will be there at the Colorado Chapter's table and look forward to meeting everyone. Be sure to bring a good supply of copies of your list to pass out to other paper chasers that you meet. This will be a great chance to join up with many chapters of 10-10.

I received a card from Alan, N7ZVK #63747 indicating that he was confused as to what paper chasing is all about and I gave him a reply explaining the whys and wherefore. Remember that your input to this column is important and welcome. Propagation

Mike Hawk NOOST, #58788

As you've seen so far, sun spots are extremely important for propagation on 10 meters. You're probably wondering if there is a way for us to be able to keep up to date with the ISN.



or other similar sunspot counts. Luckily, there isl The 10.7 cm Solar Flux is the answer. Not only is it a good indication of current sunspot numbers, but it can also be valuable for short term predictions.

Solar flux is measured on the 23 cm band (2800 Mhz) in Penticton, BC, in Canada every 24 hours at 1700 UTC.* Solar flux has a nearly direct (linear) relationship with sunspot numbers, so the higher the solar flux reading, the more sunspots there will be. During solar maximums, solar flux can reach over 300, while during solar minimums, it is generally below 100. It never reaches much lower than 65 or 70. A good guideline for us here in North America is that 10 meters will be open a little if the solar flux is above 120, and the band will be in real good shape if it's above 180. Of course, this is assuming that there is no auroral activity, and it varies from winter to summer.

As mentioned above, solar flux can be used to predict band conditions. Many times, sunspots are grouped together in a small area on the sun. As the sun rotates, these active regions will rotate to the other side of the sun for short periods. The rotation of the sun takes 27.27 days, so it stands to reason that every 27 days, the sun will be in the same position, and thus, close to the same propagation will exist. Because of the 27 day pattern, keeping track of solar flux can help you predict when propagation will be best. This is a fairly accurate way to predict for a few months, but the region of most activity on the sun is always slowly changing since sunspots may cease to exist, and new sunspot groups form, and thus, the time of the month when the most active area faces earth will also change.

What does the future hold? Originally, Cycle 22 was only predicted to peak at about 110 ISN, but reached about 155. Because of that, the predicted ISN of Cycle 23 was increased a little. Just 5 years ago, Cycle 23 was predicted to peak at only 65-85 ISN. As of now, most knowledgeable sources believe Solar Cycle 23 will begin around May or June 1997, end in 2008, and peak in February or

March 2000. It is predicted to be slightly lower than average, peaking at a sunspot count of 95 to 115. Solar flux values should lag the sunspot count by a few months, so expect the highest solar flux in mid and late 2000.

You can find updated solar flux levels on WWV in Ft. Collins, CO at 18 minutes after the hour. They broadcast on 2.5, 5, 10 and 15 MHz. Broadcasting on the same frequencies is WWVH in Hawaii. They give the same information at 45 minutes after the hour. These Geophysical Alert broadcasts last about 45 seconds. Besides solar flux, other important solar-terrestrial (sun-earth) information is given. These include the A and K indices, solar activity and geomagnetic activity for the past 24 hours, and the forecast for the next 24 hours. All of these are very important for us on 10 meters. Do to space restrictions, I cannot go into this subject as much as I'd like, but will talk about the A & K indices and the other information when we cover solar flares and auroral scatter. I recommend that you write to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Research Environmental Laboratories. Broadway, Bolder, CO 80303-3328. Request Technical Memorandum ERL SEL-80. It is an informative guide to these geophysical alert broadcasts, and will be sent free.

Also, be aware that there can be temporary increases in sunspots almost anytime throughout a cycle, as well as unexpected lulls. Be sure to keep up with the latest solar flux levels, and these won't catch you off guard.

On a different note, by now the sporadic-E (E-skip) season should be half over. E-skip should still occur through early September. This is a very important mode of propagation, especially with the declining solar cycle. Sporadic-E develops most often during the day, from a few hours after sunrise to a few hours before sunset. Many times there is a lull in the early afternoon. However, sporadic-E can occur anytime, so don't be surprised to hear it at 2:00 am, or in off months like October.

"Dear Chuck:

I have some comments to make not only on Rod Peterson's N9AKE letter, but also on the reply by Harry Syring WB1FTQ.

I agree with Rod. If he did not give the information to the caller then there was no exchange in accordance with the Contest Rules and that contact would not be legal and valid.

However, I disagree with Harry who confessed in his OPEN REPLY that 'there is no way to enforce this exchange requirement if individuals choose to circumvent the rules.'

In my opinion, there is a very simple way to defeat any such improper contact as described by Ron. It should be reported to the Contest Coordinator with the callsign, date and time of the alleged contact. The Contest Coordinator should then check the log of the offending operator, and if he finds the alleged contact was indeed logged, then that entry should be disallowed in accordance with the Rules.

There are many people, myself included, who enter a contest not only for fun and to provide activity on the 10-meter band, but also with the hope of being placed in the 'TOP TEN' list, the 'USA DISTRICT LEADERS' list or in the 'DX DISTRICT LEADERS' list.

The Contest Coordinator owes it as a duty to those of us who play by the rules, to ensure that all logs are scored in accordance with the Contest Rules."

Your Open Letter of the April issue touches upon a far greater issue than simply itemizing the negative commentaries from the readership.

Licensed in 1932, I have watched and participated in the active growth of Ham Radio over time. From the days when building your own was mandatory for operation, to the present wonder-boxes chumed out from the Asian Rim; I have melded my techniques and skills from project bench to contesting. And yes, its infinitely easier to punch a button on today's exotic rigs, moving from band to band, to my choice of modes; than it ever was with even some of the more sophisticated home brewed tube rigs I have built.

As these super-rigs have become more reachablethere was always that nagging question of just when the fraternity would stop kidding itself over what a Contest REALLY was, and then what would, or could be; the best way to achieve present goals for high number contesting. Actually, Contesting as we know it-is obsolete; entirely due to the increasingly sophisticated automation being made available.

The day is not far off when a Contest-assuming we still want them merely to accumulate contest points-will be reduced to FULLY AUTOMATIC, non-personal operation. Yes, the computer interfaced with a rig; will carry out all the necessary functions which are now required for an official log.

The operator will set up his coffee jug, put on slippers, have his snacks at hand, and merely kick on AC power switches to begin a contest. Like an aircraft autopilot, the Ham will become no more than a human monitor checking for a malfunction. From start to finish, one rig will 'talk' with another; while the computers are busy setting up the contact data for final printout.

Like it or not--the day of automation is moving more rapidly than we may chose to acknowledge. Its the Ham Radio of the 21st century. And rather than quibble over present day techniques; its time to move, literally into that exotic Ham future."



I was also encouraged during the contest, sharing the same frequency for a couple of hours with a great ham, now SK, Jim Michaels, W6PGM #10. My 430S and home brew inverted "V" did a great job for me. I have my award on the wall to prove it!

In the 1992 contest, I was in the upper 10 in 6 land. Tried using a voice keyer, didn't like it at all, so after an hours use, packed it up and sent it back.

This year in the February 1993 SSB contest, I was very surprised, as I took 2nd World Wide, and the best part was I truly had a ball. Had 910 contacts with 1630 points, with .70 dupes, and logged it by hand. It filled a full new legal pad. Talk about work, it took another 5+ days to dupe and computer log the contacts. I received 366 new numbers, 53 new

VP's, including VP#1, Grace, K5MRU #218. It also got me my 3600 BAR. Exchanged 46 10X Chapter information with: Springbok, Suncoast, Tinlizzy, Steel City, Peach State, High Rollers, City of Melborne, and Speedway to name just a few. Worked 9 OM/XYL Teams, worked 13 Countries and just missed another WAS.

But, the real fun was working 15 youngsters, the future of ham radio. When I worked Cody, KB5WYJ (9 years old), he asked me if I wanted to work his younger brother, and Casey KB5UEO #62168 (age 7) came back. And there were 13 more, all under the age of 15.

The best way to win a contest is to have fun doing it, and make new friends along the way. My thanks to 10-10 for the opportunity to participate, and especially to my XYL for putting up with it all!




