However, as conditions improve. more fellows who normally operate 20 meters where 2 KW linears are a way of life, seem to think they have to do the same on it. Basically, I'd hate to see 10 go the way of 20 meters. I've collected certificates since June, & have more due in the mail, using only 75 watte & a dipole. Why use 2 KW if someone can hear you barefoot? They are considering frequency allocations on 10 meters, how about some power limitation ...

I have been an active anateur for over 21 years, and an avid Di'er - certificate hunter for almost it years. I am thoroughly convinced that the 10-X International has well achieved it's goal of the preservation of the 10 meter band. I am also convinced that the separate Chapters of 10-X International have enhanced this goal by using certificates & awards as an incentive. I personally have a mini-fortune invested in these certificates; counting the initial fees, postage & framing (about 1 the cost of my TS 520). These awards do require some skill & patience in obtaining, but, they are well worth it. Most Certificate Managers are quite fast & efficient in processing their awards, but, unfortunately there are some that are not. Some awards have taken as long as 10 to 12 weeks. One award in particular took seven months & four days for me to receive. When it finally arrived, my callsign was imporrect I returned the award along with a request to correct my call. That has been over two months ago & I still have received no corrected award! I think that if individual chapters put an award in the offing, they should have the common courtesy to process it without unusual delay.



Editor

Here my open letter to the Southern California AM/SSB QRP Co-Ordinating Council ... "I have read, recently, with great interest & little enthusiasm the various 10 meter plans endorsed by writers for ARRL, 73 Mag, S.Calif AM/SSB QRF BBC and others. I feel that the right opinion (mine of course) needs to be aimed. Those who have been through one or more sunspot peaks know that 10 meters is full from 28.5 to 29.7 mhz, at least during the daylight hours. I even suspect that many operators originaly appeared on 10 meters to get away from the catfight between Ali & SSB on other bands. I do know that quite a few old timers just threw in the towel & quit. A natural phase-out of AK is resulting, with no big bassle. My first 10-X contacts were withsome of the S California group who ran converted Navy five watt rigs. Of course we enjoyed it. I ran 60 watts AM. But, man, times have changed. I run 100 watts SSB now! Please, please! Let us not encourage a problem of AN versus SSB again by use of converted CE AK rigs. You know very well that the so called gentleman's agreement made up by the ARRL to sub-band AM & SSB never did work. In fact it is to this day unrevoked! Thats how much thought it was given. No need to change it, SSB just pushed we AM operators out. Flease, please! Lets us also not create a sub-band for crystal control, it inevitably creates an illusion of ownership of a frequency (or for ex-CB'ers) a channel. I along with a group have operated around 29.4 mhz for many years. After launch of CECAR VI I was told by some operators to get off the frequency. This was 12 hours before the next pass & OSCAR VI did not come close to output on 29.4. I see this attitude becoming more prevelant. You have all been witness to the net wars & the repeator wars all caused by the syndrome of bought & owned frequencies. I find it very defficult to beleive that anyone interested in amateur radio will settle solely for operating a QRF or crystal controlled CB conversion. If we want to help those who really can't even afford payments on an Eico or early Swan, etc. Why not file for a rule change to permit operation where the prevailing MUF does not give a built-in dissadvantage. This seems to me to be a more logical energy expenditure or cause. The CW sub-band of 10 could well stand more occupation. There is room for QRP there where the MUF favors. Why not move all contests up above 29.0 where the challenge is greater? How there is really a cause to father, evidently it needs one! 73 & tnx for your





TEN-TENING IN MONTSERRAT

If you're interested in creating a lot of activity on a seemingly deserted frequency, just call CQ from VP2MJE. You'll really be surprised how many people are actually on ten meters. W6MJE-Stu and I did just that during the week of September 24 - October 2, 1977. We set up on the Island of Montserrat in the Carribean for a week of fun and activity. During one short period alone on ten meters we worked over 300 stations in the U.S. The amount of activity on the band was overwhelming and gratifying.

The Hams we talked to on the band were courteous and handled the pileups quite well. During our brief stay on the Island, we worked hundreds of stations on ten meters, 3,300 stations on all bands, 50 states and 143 countries.

Our equipment consisted of a FT-101B, external VFO, SB-200 and a two element quad. Both Stu and I worked all bands, averaging about 18 hours of operation per day. The Island was a perfect spot to stage a DX-pedition with the weather very warm at 80 to 90 degrees at all times. Usually after a grueling round of pileups, I would collapse into our sedan chair on the porch overlooking the ocean, whilst our housekeeper revived me with a cold 807. The life of a DX operator is very hard indeed:

I think the hardest part about the whole operation comes when one must cut the pileup short and you know that there are a lot more stations waiting for that crucial contact. That was hard, letting them down. After we got home, Stu and I were greeted by the heartwarming sight of hundreds of QSL cards awaiting an answer. We know that there are many stations that need Montserrat for a new country, so we are dillgently trying to keep up with all the cards. By not putting the time of contact in UTC (GMT-Zulu), you are seriously cutting down your chances of receiving a confirmation. All of our log entries are in UTC, and we cannot spend the time to convert your local time to UTC. Most DX stations also keep their logs in UTC and do not answer any QSL's with only local times. It may sound mean, but try converting two or three hundred cards into UTC and you will understand. Also please include a SASE or you may not get your confirmation, and all that effort in the pileips will be wasted. My QSL Manager is W6EL. Thanks for all the contacts and I'll be looking for you from my home QTH.






NEW REVISED EDITION OF 10-10 CHAPTER CERTIFICATE/NET GUIDE DUE IN 1978:






Words from the President

My special thanks to Rich WB2MAN and Ed WA7DCO, the first resident managers of their call areas and to Mary WA6MOF for outstanding service to the 10-10 Net. My congratulations to the newly elected Treasurer Joe K6CQN #7999 (past president 1964) and to our two Call Area Vice Presidents Marvin WA2PZS #12111 and Ronald WB7ADO #13335. All our officers have established high standards of performance and have been dedicated to the proposition that our members deserve the best service that the 10-10 Net can offer. I am confident that the officers for 1978 will follow this fine tradition.

As cycle 21 takes an upswing, the 10-10 Net will encounter even greater challenges in the coming years. Your continued support is now more essential than ever. My services will be available in any capacity designated by our president for 1978 to assist in the successful operation of the 10-10 Net.

Our Editor Chuck WAØYNQ, deserves special recognition for his enthusiam and initiative in making his recent trip to meet with the local chapters and Call Area VP's in call area 9 & Ø. As our 10-10 representative, I certainly appreciate the warm reception he received. I'm sure you all share my pride in the excellent publications he has created-first as Editor of the Chapter News in March 1976 and then as Editor of the combined Quarterly Bulletin and Chapter News, and in addition the 10-X Guide to Chapter Certificates and Nets is most impressive.

The Chapter Heads and members of the active chapters also deserve a special tribute. By coincidence, cycle 20 went flat in 1974, but cycle 21 has been on an upswing for several months. During this period George W6ENC succeeded in forming over 100 new chapters and we doubled our membership issuing over 9000 "Black Cat" certificates. The amazing growth of the 10-10 Net these past four years is due to the activities of our local chapters who operate on a regular schedule and issue distinctive chapter certificates.

In the Fall Bulletin, I announced that we had invited Sylvio Faurez F6EEM and Le Groupe 10m du R.E.F. to join our organization as a special chapter. Both S. Faurez F6EEM and M. Coussi F9FF President of the R.E.F. have graciously accepted because such collaboration should be profitable to all radio amateurs with WARC 79 forthcoming. We have already received two newsletters from this very active 10 meter group and have permission to reprint in our Quarterly Bulletins. I would like to share my letter to Le Groupe 10m requesting information regarding our activities ... "The news of the formation of Le Groupe 10m early in 1977 is most welcome and stimulating. May you enjoy every success in all your endeavors to encourage the French presence in the 10 meter band.



About 15 years sgo, the 10-10 Net was a regular traffic net operated by a few dedicated amateurs in Southern California. Late in 1966, the first 10-10 number was issued and they have been issued in sequence to new members throughout the world as they became members of the 10-10 Net. Over 100 local chapters were formed and our Net Coordinator receives many inquiries concerning the formation of new chapters. I qualified as a member in April 1972 and was assigned 10-10 #4189. We expect to issue #19189 soon. All our members have a common purpose-to promote amateur radio activity on the 10 meter band. The amazing growth of the 10-10 Net in spite of the poor band conditions that prevailed is most gratifying. I believe these are the significant factors contributing to the success of the 10-10 Net:

- 1. The individual awards program conducted by our Awards Manager Frank Orcutt W4JO. This program provides an incentive to our members to use the 10 meter band. Frank W4JO also operates the International 500 Club and publishes a monthly newsletter. To qualify as a V.P. a member must log contacts with 500 unique 10-10 members. I am proud to be VP-193; the 193rd member to join this exclusive group.
- 2. Perhaps even more significant is the organization of over 100 local chapters in the U.S.A. and many foreign countries. Many of our chapters operate on a regular schedule and issue their own distinctive certificates.

We have also been successful in decentralizing the administration of the 10-10 Net. We have a resident Vice President in each U.S. call area and VK/ZL. As cycle 21 takes an upswing , we certainly will need more DX Vice Presidents and our Call Area Vice Presidents will need assistance from their local chapters.

All factors contributing to our success depend on the income derived from membership dues. The 10-10 Net is a non-profit organization and these dues are used primarily to cover the cost of publication and distribution of the Quarterly Bulletins and the incidental expense of processing new members and renewals. All officers serve on a voluntary basis without remuneration dedicated completely to serving the members of the 10-10 Net.

The 10-10 number 11111 was issued to 4U1ITU, the International Amateur Radio Club. The 10-10 Net may not have the resources to send a representative to WARC79. Perhaps through our collaboration and with the support of 4U1ITU we may convince the delegates that we have served to stimulate activity on the entire 10 meter band. The current frequency allocation for the radio amateur service should remain unaltered-not one cycle to another service! Greetings to all the members of Le Groupe 10m."

Now that we have received a favorable response from Sylvio Faurez F6EEM, we must now determine the extent of our collaboration, not only with Le Groupe 10m but with all our DX chapters. It is more important than ever to encourage the formation of local chapters in as many foreign countries as possible in 1978 in preparation for WARC 79. We can expect these chapters to exert a favorable influence on their delegates. The ground rule that will prevail at WARC 79-one country/one vote. In any event the message is loud and clear-all amateur radio frequency allocations will be up for grabs. There is an urgency to activate the 10 meter band. We should log all our 10 meter contacts and apply for the awards. The Bar Awards issued by Frank W4JO since 1974 represents millions of contacts in the 10 meter band and it appears 1977 will set a new record for bar in the 10 meter band and it appears 1977 will set a new record for bar awards. Our Chapter Heads should maintain their active status by sending con't on page 21



Happy New Year Fellow Ten-Ten Members,

This 78th year of the 20th Century brings major changes in the Ten-Ten organization, and I represent one of them. Another one is the new job my predecessor now holds, and with that in mind, I would like to extend my congratulations to George/W6ENC, not only on his becoming the new President of our organization, but also on the fine record he leaves behind from his years as Net Co-Ordinator. I know that all of us, officers and members alike, will support George in his effort to keep our organization as active and as healthy as it is.

Much of this activity and growth over the past few years is due in large measure to the work of our former President, Morrie/WoEHM. During his term of Presidency, he made the necessary decisions required to keep the tremendous (and unexpected) growth explosion under control. He also supplied the vitality and leadership we needed in order to deep ten active during the low point in Sun Spot cycle 20.

As cycle 21 now seems to be on a very rapid rise, it is time for us to reevaluate the position the Ten-Ten International Net should represent to ten meter operators. With the improved band conditions, it is not very difficult to motivate hams to move to ten meters. The DX hunters and WAS chasers are all over the band.

My job as Net Co-Ordinator is, as the name implies, to co-ordinate the activities of the numerous chapters we have operating all over the world, and to encourage the formation of new ones.

Therefore, I will use this space in each issue of the bulletin as a soap box for YOU!! I urge the Chapter Heads to consult with the chapters and report to me on a quarterly basis.

What do I want to hear about? Well, for one thing, I'd like to know what procedure you use on your local nets. Does you net control run down a 'roster' of members to check them in. or does the NCS simply stand-by for any check-ins? How do you go about the acknowledgement of Ten-Ten information on a crowded net? What do you do to keep the locals active and interested in you net(s)? Have you thought about CW operation in the Novice band to encourage this kind of activity? Is your net more than just a Ten-Ten organization? If so, what other activities are you engaged in? Most importantly, are you satisfied with the way the Ten-Ten organization is conducted, and what would you suggest to improve and strengthen our organiration?

The only information along these lines which I can relate to you at the moment (because it's the only one I'm familiar with) concerns the local chapter I am involved in. The Long Island Amateur Radio Service (LIARS to you) holds two weekly meetings. The phone meeting is conducted by a net control station assigned to that particular week of the month (one station takes it the first Thursday each month, one the second Thursday, etc.) He opens the net by announcing the function of the organization and invites any and all check-ins to call him. Each NCS is free to run the net however he sees fit. While one NCS may run down the list of check-ins permitting each station to make up to two calls, another might ask each station to QRZ the frequency and pick up those stations he can copy. We find this variation of procedure adds a little spice to the nets. (Con't on page 17)

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NET CO-ORDINATOR (Con't)

We operate a CW net in the Novice band, but have had a difficult time maintaining any decent amount of activity, and we have had very few novices participations. We've tried all sorts of ways to increase activity, but havn't found the right one yet. Any Chapters out there running successful CW nets? We'd like to know how you do it.

Aside from our other certificates, the LIARS issue the only (?) Ten-Ten DX award available. To earn it a station must have confirmed confirmed contacts with fifteen different ARRL Countries with Ten-Ten numbers, or, have a total of fifty DX Ten-Ten QSO's. Interested in more information? An SASE to K9EGA/2 will get you a copy of the rules.*

Other activities the LIARS employ to keep locals interested are newsletters (about six a year) containing information contributed by the members, and occasional "eye-balls."

Now let's hear about YOUR Chapter. Not only might this information be beneficial to the new chapters just coming into being, but even old established chapters might find just the right idea to rekindle the spirit and excitement that was there in the early days.

One other thought I'd like to speak about is this. We are now an <u>International</u> organization, with officers in each call area and others around the world. Should we now have official nets operating in other areas besides California? And if so, how do we go about it? Should we assign three days per month to each call area, find a station in that area willing to act as Net Control and take check-ins? Feedback on this would be appreciated.

Those of you who have never visited with the official net might be interested in how it operates. The net now operates every day except Sunday at 1800 2. on 28.8 (28.775 on Monday and Wednesday.) The NCS that day stands-by for check-ins, noting the stations name, QTH and Ten-Ten number. At the end of the month the NCS sends a <ppy of these check-ins to the Net Co-Ordinator. From now on, I will list the check-in leaders in each call area in this column.

Remember, the Chapters are the life-blood of the Ten-Ten organization. Help us keep it pumping!



We can make this document available not only to Sylvio Faurez F6EEM but to all our DX Chapter Heads who in turn can present it to their WARC 79 delegation. This document may also be useful should the FCC consider a reduction in our present 10 meter band frequency allocation. I have recommended to our president elect for 1978, George Elliott W6ENC, appoint a working committee as soon as feasible, to compile all available records covering our activities and to prepare a report that will serve as convincing evidence that we deserve to retain the full 10 meter band allocation.



CB traffic from 11 meters and the fact that the FCC cannot possibly cope..
we must find a solution that will benefit the majority of amateurs. Jack

that CBer's can muster. I recommend that both novice and techs be permitted
to use 28 to 28.4mhz Fone with limited power perhaps 100 watts. The constant
use of the lower 10 meter band would deter illegal use of ham freq's and
encourage serious CBer's to take the amateur tests and make it legal.
Tomorrow Linear Amps may be taken away-what next? Ham gear is built to
be easily serviced and converted. How then keep it out of the hands of
CBer's unless you enforce it at the place of sale?"





Ten Meters: Dead or Alive?

- - a user's report

Juring the month of June, 1974, after twenty years of hamming, I was mighty close to pulling the big switch on all low band operations and contemplating 2 meter FM. Exchanging signal reports and the usual trivia no longer interested me. Nor was I going to continue the bothersome task of trying to pry QSL cards from Lower Outer Magnolia. No siree, 2 meter FM here I come!

By chance, I decided to go on ten meters, before selling all of my low band gear. It was sixteen years since I had been active on my old favorite band, during the peak of one of the highest sunspot cycles on record. Those were the days, my friend.

A strange thing happened that fateful evening. The band was open on a North-South path and the 4 call area was coming through loud and clear. Who said ten was dead? I heard multitudes of stations calling CO ten-ten. It sounded like a group of newly licensed hams with cases of nervous litters. Hence, the stuttering. Using my old Heath HR20. HX20 receiver and transmitter along with an inverted vee cut for 20 meters, I loaded up on ten with an swr of umpteen to one. I answered a CO from a station in Birmingham, Alabama who had his friend on frequency with him.

We exchanged the usual trivia and then it happened. "What's your Ten-Ten

number? Do you have the Yodar Kritch?" he asked. I offered him my Social Security number instead, if he was interested, but I did not know what a Ten-Ten number was. As for the Yodar Itch or something, I told him I did not have it and asked if it was catching.

"Do you have a sweetheart," he replied?

"No!" I said. "I am happily married."

His friend broke in and asked if I was a liar. "It's all the truth," I said. 2 meters here I come, the quicker the better, I thought. Let me see what 2 FM holds forth. "To each his own," I mumbled.

I was getting ready to sign off when he said, "Wait, old man, and let me explain. To promote activity on ten during the full of the current sunspot cycle, a group in California organized a net with chapters in many of the larger cities. Some foreign countries are also forming chapters and appointing their own chapter heads. The main body is called The Ten-Ten International Net of Southern California. All you have to do is collect 10 different Ten-Ten numbers if you are in the USA and 5 if you are out of the USA. You send the log information only, no QSLs needed, to the manager in charge of your call area along with a nominal fee," he went on to explain, "You will get vour own Ten-Ten number along with a certificate, suitable for framing, plus quarterly newsletters. We are all having a ball and at the same time keeping ten alive and saving our band from being taken over by the CBers," he raved.

He explained that many of the chapters issue their own certificates for working a certain amount of their certificate holders. The Yodar Kritch is the name of a certificate issued by the Maryland, Washington D. C. chapter. In fact, its chapter head is Jim Hart WA3NCQ, so they also issue The SweetHART certificate for working five members. The LIARS stands for the Long Island Amateur Radio Service, a chapter serving the New York City, New Jersey metropolitan area. You can get more information by signing into their Thursday evening net on 28.620 MHz at 8 pm local

I applogized for my ignorance and asked just how many are now involved in this new aspect of amateur radio and isn't it pretty expensive? "We are well over the 9000 mark," he replied, "and the certificates are no more than one dollar. In fact, some are free. You don't have to go certificate-hunting if you're not interested, just collect Ten-Ten numbers. Bars, plagues and awards are issued for reaching different plateaus of achievements. Worked All States Ten-Ten awards are even issued. For this one you do need QSL confirmations. You can become a VIP in the Ten-Ten organization by collecting 500 numbers. 1000 different contacts qualify you for a plaque award. You can work up to these levels by submitting a list of each 100 you work, for which you receive a bar."

"Sounds mighty complicated," I said. "Did you hire a private secretary to do your paperwork?"

"On the contrary," he shot back, "it's pretty simple if you can keep an up-to-date card file and use a separate log for ten. It's like an eternal contest, worked on at your own pace. You will find us to be a group of very friendly chaps, all willing to help. None of the hanky-panky that you hear on some of the other bands."

"To each his own," I replied. "2m FM here I come! What is your Ten-Ten number? Just for my log, you understand."

As you have probably guessed, over two years have passed and I never did get on 2m FM. Two months after that fateful evening, I was already hooked with my own Ten-Ten number of 9732. I have collected many numbers since and have had the most enjoyable contacts in my twenty-two years of hamming. Over 13,000 numbers have been issued and it shows no sign of stopping. For twenty years I could have been considered a certificate haters club member. Today, I am the holder of many unique certificates issued by the Ten-Ten chapters. They would have to be seen to be appreciated. One of the certificates, The Raggedy Ann and Andy, is issued by Worth Gruelle K4VM. Worth. a renowned artist, the son of Johnny Gruelle who invented and originated the characters. issues the certificate in memoriam to his father. The different certificates issued now number over 50. They are too numerous to mention and many hold interesting stories behind their origination.

Propagationwise, ten meters appears to be the twilight zone of HF and VHF characteristics. It's fascinating to observe the effects of backscatter and tropospheric bending. Sporadic E propagation found on ten seldom appears on fifteen meters. It is a rarity on six and will reach a maximum of maybe 70 MHz. Freak conditions, at times, will cause it to appear higher.

Ten meter beacons are

being transmitted from almost all continents of the globe as a guide to conditions. This is evidence enough to show the increasingly wide interest being shown on this

It is ironical to hear so many newcomers to this band comment that they haven't been on ten for years. They thought it was dead. Many skip contacts are being made and at times when fifteen and twenty are dead. True enough, if no one went on, it

would appear to be dead. How surprised many would be if they tuned their receivers to ten.

Antennas need not be cumbersome. When conditions permit, many long haul contacts can be made much easier on this band with simpler antennas and lower power then is needed on the other lower frequency bands. QRM problems appear less frequently due to the huge frequency spread.
