It is with sadness that I am sitting here writing the President's Column, but that time has come. Things leading up to this all started on February 14th when I received an e-mail from Morrie Goldman's daughter Laura, advising me that Morrie had become an SK on February 12th. Morrie had been our Scholarship Manager for many, many years. He also was our Historian and Trustee of the 10-10 Club Station, W6OI. I had known Morrie for somewhere between 40 and 45 years as we both worked together at North American Aviation during and after World War II. Morrie was instrumental in the beginnings of 10-10 holding a number of volunteer positions from 6th District Manager all the way up to President. He was one of the group of three or four that structured the current Bylaws that made 10-10 a true international organization by allowing Officers and Directors to run for office from anywhere in the world, not just from Southern California as was the early practice. Morrie and his knowledge of the early days of 10-10 will be certainly be missed.

Soon after receiving the message about Morrie, I called President Tom, K4CIH, to inform him that Morrie had become an SK. This was early on Wednesday afternoon, February 14th. Tom took the news about Morrie as hard as I had. We discussed Morrie, the Convention, and a number of other things relating to 10-10. It was with almost disbelief that I received a phone call the next day from Tom's wife Jean, advising that Tom had a major heart attack late Wednesday evening and that he was in a coma in the hospital. During the next couple of weeks, I was in contact with Jean almost daily to keep abreast of Tom's condition. We knew it did not look good from the beginning, but there was always a hope, and we kept hoping to no avail. During the first week, we decided that Jean would send me all of Tom's convention information, as that important 10-10 function would have to keep moving forward. The convention information arrived, and that part of the many responsibilities that Tom had accepted as President was under control.

It was Sunday, March 4th and I was doing one of my shifts working for the Sun City West Sheriffs Posse. It was about 9:45 pm when my cell phone rang. It was

Esther advising me that Jean had just called and Tom had become an SK. Although it was somewhat expected, it still was a shock. Along about 10:30 pm I noticed some chest pains. Not too severe, but noticeable. By the end of the shift at midnight, they were quite severe and I decided to go to the hospital at about 12:30 am Monday morning. After spending some time in the Emergency, I was admitted to a room for observation. On Monday evening it was determined that I had had a heart attack and needed an emergency Cardiac Catheterization during which they inserted two stints. The procedure was deemed a success and I went home on Wednesday afternoon and the rest is history.

Tom had some very strong ideas about how 10-10 should be run and how our volunteers should perform their jobs. He and I would talk regularly and "talk out" many of the problems, none of which were insurmountable. He always found a way. He was a strong supporter of our Scholarship Fund and program. Each year at the Board of Directors meetings, Tom would move that the scholarship program be increased from the previous year to a new level, which is now five (5) \$1000.00 Scholarships per year, from an early beginning of one (1) \$500.00 Scholarship per year. Tom created many new things for 10-10 that we today take for granted. One of his pet projects was the simplification and standardization of the rules for the awards with a common fee for each. Tom had several other ideas in mind, and I will work to implement those.

Jean and Tom had become personal friends of Esther and I, and he will be dearly missed. I know how much 10-10 meant to him, and I hope to carry on in a way that would make him proud.

I have selected Mike Elliott, K7BOI 54625, as our new Vice President. Mike was a Board member for several years and has the qualifications for this important position. He has accepted the position and the Board of Directors have confirmed him as our new VP.

I look forward to meeting those of you that will be at the Convention in Worcester, MA on July 12-14, 2001. Ken Harmon, K1IEQ #31363, and his staff are hosting what is shaping up to be a great convention. Ken and the Battle Road Chapter have some surprises in store for all of us. If you have not sent your reservation, please consider this attending the 2001 convention and enjoying the history around the Boston area. BIO – Vice President

Michael P. Elliott K7BOI #54625

I was born and raised in Kansas. I was first licensed in 1979 as KA7FXD. Ham radio had interested me since the fifth grade when I used to experiment with "Knight" kits. I have also held the calls N7MRH and KF7ZQ. My call now is K7BOI.

Received electronics training in the USAF. In the years with the Air Force served at radar installations in 13 states and served one tour of duty in Viet Nam. After being discharged, attended the College of Idaho and completed an Electrical Engineering degree at New

Mexico State University. Held various jobs during college including working as a miner in underground uranium mines in Wyoming and New Mexico. After college worked as Electrical Engineer in industry for five years. Then spent 20 years as consultant in electrical engineering. Presently employed as Director of Development for a company involved in development high efficiency gas fired electrical generation facilities.

I am a life member of 10-10. I joined 10-10 in 1989 as the result of an on-the-air contact with K0JPW who lives near where I grew up in Kansas. I am currently a member of about fifty 10-10 chapters. Volunteered and have served as 10-10 Information Manager for four years. Elected to the 10-10 Board of Directors and served one term — 1996 through 2000. These 10-10 jobs taught me the importance of getting people involved. The primary purpose of 10-10 is to promote the use of the band. It is important that the organization continues to work to increase involvement. We 10-10ers must work with the new hams and continue to make 10 meters a positive experience. This will promote the use of 10 meters and also help in developing good operating practices and make ham radio a pleasant experience for the everyone.

I am honored to have been selected to serve 10-10 as Vice President, but am very sorry about the circumstances that have made such an appointment necessary. Tom Henderson, K4CIH, was a close personal friend and I miss him greatly. I got to know Tom well during my time as a member of the Board of Directors. I grew to have deep respect for his vision of 10-10 and the abilities he demonstrated during his Presidency. Tom worked very closely with Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, and the Board to insure the health of the organization in the areas of finance, membership services, and educational scholarships. As unfortunate as the loss of Tom was, we are indeed very fortunate to have a person of Chuck Imsande's caliber and dedication to insure the continuance of the 10-10 tradition. I have known Chuck for some years and look forward to working with both he and the Board on the opportunities and challenges that will face the 10-10 Board.

BIO – Countries Manager

Mike Davidson N5MT #24949

Mike N5MT became a 1010 member in 1979 soon after getting his general license. He soon became interested in DX and spent more time chasing countries than anything else on the air. He received his first DXCC award in 1982 about the time when he got his Extra class license and worked up to Number One Honor Roll by working all of the approved countries just before

North Korea was added to the list. North Korea remains his only missing country.

In March 1992, Mike began writing his TenX DX News which is published in the 1010 News. His article has documented the growth of 1010 DX over the past nine years. He has worked extensively with Russ N5EJS in upgrading the quality of the DX record keeping that now exists for the 1010 Countries Award. Mike will be one of the speakers at the July 1010 Convention talking about DX.

BIO – WAS Manager

Cliff Taylor WB4FBS #48461

Clifford A. "Cliff" Taylor, WB4FBS, #48461, VP# 2872, has been appointed to be the new 10-10 Worked All States Manager. Cliff has been licensed as an amateur radio operator since 1967 and has been active in amateur radio organizations since that date. He was actively pursuing counties when, on Christmas Day of 1995, he came up to ten meters looking for them, and has been on ten meters ever since. During three years of this period, however, Cliff also edited "The RoadRunner", the newsletter of the Mobile Amateur Radio Awards Club (a club of county hunters). Even though Cliff obtained his 10-10 number in 1988, he did not participate in 10-10 activities until the above date. Cliff has become an avid paper-chaser, and takes part in most of the QSO parties. His operating techniques earned him the "Operator of the Quarter" Award for the last quarter of 1999 (the first quarter that it was awarded). He was the first operator to complete the 10-10 "2K in 2K Award", the second to complete the "2K 10-10 Members in 2K Award" and had his number used the most times, 139, on the year 2K applications by amateur operators obtaining their own number. Cliff retired from the military, U.S. Army, in February 1976 as a Master Sergeant (E-8). He then went back to college, Eastern Kentucky University, completed the requirements for a BA in Elementary Education, an undergraduate degree in Elementary Reading Education, and a Rank One degree in School Administration. After teaching for 17 years, he retired from the teaching profession in December 1995. Cliff is now thoroughly enjoying retirement and resides with his gracious lady, KB5DPM, # 48628, near San Antonio, Texas.

AMATEUR RADIO AND THE COMMUNITY:

Do We Thank Him or Hang Him?

It's a sunny Sunday in October 2000. I'm sitting on my roof watching the butterflies float by on the soft breeze. All I have left to do is raise my mast and test my new antenna modifications. My old X-beam had served me well and it was high time I repaired it or recreated it. So I recreated it with steel rod, plastic and some aircraft poly-aluminum instead of the wire and string I used 3 years earlier. Progress and technology marches on.

My neighbors run the usual gambit. Those that like me wave to me and tell me not to jump, others do their best to ignore the strange man on the rooftop. This is their story.

My family and I moved into the neighborhood in 1994. I was going overseas for the last time and then retiring and wanted a stable home to return to before then. I thought I'd give the wife and kid a few years without having to move around.

We bought a rancher style home in a very nice area with no antenna restrictions. Being in the Army and working communications for years I was a wiz at portable antennas and quickly had a wire up in the trees and making friends among the amateurs in the area. My radio room was in the basement and while I was gone a tarp covered the station.

Retirement came in 1996 and I returned home to take up life in the communications industry as a systems repair technician. The family had made many friends in the area and all knew I was coming out of the military. And so the story begins.

It's September and I am up on the roof running a wire dipole for work on 10 meters. I haven't decided what I wanted for a permanent antenna. Since all that can be seen from the ground is wire, my neighbor across the street makes the comment: "It's a might early for Christmas lights don't you think." Of course when Christmas came and there were no 'lights' on the roof I was asked and simply said: "Something burned out and I took them down." A knowing look from the neighbor: "Yup, it's hard to find which bulb is bad in a string of 100. I buy new ones every year."

Next came the antennas on the car and soon everyone was asking the wife if I was a CB'er and what channel would be good on a road trip.

December and the cat came out of the bag. I was downstairs on the radio and on the Fort McHenry net when the door opened and the neighbor comes in. They were visiting and heard voices coming from my room. "I thought you were a CB'er." "Ah, no; I'm into amateur radio and right now I have five people on the radio from the Eastern Shore to the Midwest. Would you care to join in?" I asked. What followed was a brief introduction

into QSL cards and contacts. Later in the week the wife reports that they won't be back over because they think you are passing state secrets to the bad guys.

Soon followed my monopole antenna mast, which boasted a 10 meter X-beam, the VHF yagi I used in Europe and a dipole. At 25 feet it didn't stand out too much but the antennas couldn't hide the fact that it wasn't for TV. I kept the TV antenna on the end of the house and used it for other antenna platforms. Soon followed interference issues; we got cable (I would come across channel 2 at times) and of course the telephone problems.

My next-door neighbors, Maryann and Ross are great. But my hobby has had an impact on their lives. One day the cable in their house was malfunctioning and certain channels weren't working. She was a little put out and told the wife not to say anything to me but she really didn't know what to do and the cable wasn't getting any better.

No, I wasn't the cause. It seems that the cable would go out at odd times. I would be at work, or away and the cable would go out. I would be on the radio operating and the cable would be fine. She called the cable company and their most senior technician came to tell her he had found the cause and it only took him the time to step out of the truck and look next door. He only had maybe two months on the job out of high school and he saw the antennas and told her: "I don't need to check the cable. He's the problem. He has to get rid of the antennas." He didn't even go into the house and the fact that no one was home didn't seem to register in his mind.

She hated to say anything to me but the cable wasn't getting any better. So when the wife finally told me, I felt bad that someone could take advantage of good neighbors like that. I dove into the ARRL books and hit the website and also checked our cable which had no problems on those channels. I gave her the FCC regulation numbers, page and paragraphs as applied to CATV and they called the service manager and then the general manager before the cable company came back and found the loose connections on the pole and fixed them. It also turned out the cable company had some problems at the substation on those channels too.

Next came the phone lines. When the line went dead I got a knock on the door: "Did you do something?" I checked theirs and told them the problem wasn't in the house. The lines were put in back during the 50's and the main lines had several cuts and repairs in them with the remaining individual runs patched together. I had found this out when I had a second line run to the house and helped the phone guy string the new wiring. He found

this out once he got on the pole to connect it in. When I asked if he was going to replace the other peoples lines he said: "No, the company would only do that if the people complained enough. No complaints-no repairs needed." They got a new line after several phone calls for lousy line quality. They then passed the information on to other neighbors. Now everyone has a clear line.

Later, my neighbor's cable line comes down and the cable people can't come out for a week. Let's see. I still have 30 feet of CATV line and a few connectors and my neighbor has his cable back. When the cable people came to rehang the cable I didn't even get my connectors back. They didn't even offer my neighbor a break cause their lines snapped. It seems the cable company as a rule doesn't use standoffs or anything to secure the lines, only the connectors themselves. Rude. Not to mention a poor maintenance practice.

One April, the boss stopped by to drop off some things while I was off one day and got the grand tour. "Boy, I thought you were only kidding about the antennas and stuff." Now whenever there is an interference issue I am called in to fix it. Since then I have worked with several companies on interference to and by each other's equipment.

My co-workers joked about planes mistaking my house for the landing zone and me contacting Mars. A police car rolls into the shop with the antenna missing and we don't have one to replace it with. Their plan of action was to replace the system, about two hours. "Let's see, his frequency is 150 MC. A quarter wavelength is X inches...I need 18 inches of rod..." A cut here and a screw there and the VSWR is good and I finish in 15 minutes. Now there are no more jokes. I get asked to consult on all antenna problems and have taught the people how to use wattmeters and dummy loads to check out the radio systems.

My brother's community lost power and the electric company said it would be a few days before they could get in to do anything about it; they have a baby. "Hey bro, what can we do?" I still have my DC to AC converter I used to power my rigs when contesting portable. "Here, this will run your fridge and a few light bulbs."

"Dave, I hate to say this but..." Yes, it makes me cringe a little when the conversation starts like this. "I can hear noise when you are on the radio and I am on the phone." Several days and a few nights spent rereading the RFI and TVI handbooks and a weekend project and the lines are clear again. It also served to get me thinking about redoing my X-beam. This is how I came to be on the roof.

"Hey neighbor! Can I get your opinion? I want to move the cable to that wall and want some options for when the cable guys come to tell me what they can't do." Turns out it didn't really matter. I helped him move the cable anyway. After an hour on the phone with the cable company they were told it would be at least three weeks,

maybe longer before the cable people could even look at the request. The last time the cable people moved their cable eight feet, they took up the wall-to-wall carpet and the job took several hours. I managed it in a little less than 30 minutes without removing the carpet and the job looked more professional. I also serviced the grounds, which were loose, and only put on with a cheap metal tie wrap.

How do I do it? I maintain a library of electronics and several books on RFI issues. Over the years my library and knowledge has expanded to include computer issues, cable and cell phones. A lot of answers come from that library. I have helped several amateurs with radio problems or antenna issues and an ongoing restoration project involving the USS Torsk and of course my neighbors. I also try to keep a positive attitude. I like to think I have made a positive difference in my community. Some I'm sure would agree, others still think of me as that strange man with all the gadgets.

Amateurs have a wealth of information and some businesses are waking up to that fact. Recently, one public service communications magazine ran an article about hams using an MFJ-249 to test antenna lines; maybe we could use the same. They acted like it was a new idea. It must have been, they called for the readers to seek out and query a ham for advice on how to use it. In our communities amateurs can and do a lot of good things on a daily basis. Not everyone has to have a disaster hit his or her neighborhood to shine. Everyone can contribute, even if all they do is to help a neighbor clean his rainspouts.

Well, I'll finish up here by raising the mast and give the pole and lines a quality check to make sure all bolts are tight and fasteners in place. Then before I put the ladder away, I'll ask the neighbors if they want to use it to clean their rainspouts. I saw some debris clogging the drains.

A closing note: While writing this a neighbor stopped by to inquire: "I got a cell phone and it doesn't work in the neighborhood. I thought since you worked with them you could tell me why." I was in my radio room and the wife showed him downstairs. As he expresses his question he looks from me to my rigs and tuners and nods the unspoken question..."You don't think the radios are interfering with the new cell phone??"

An-Ten-Ten-nas



Information to help you
decide on the best
antenna for you

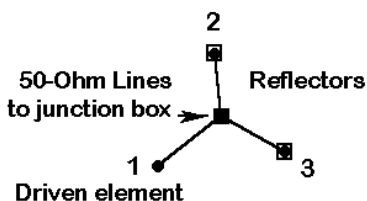
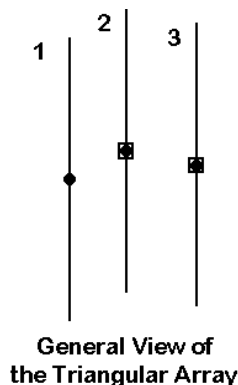
In each issue of the *News*, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

No. 31: A Triangular Vertical Array

Most beams we have discussed have been horizontal. I have not wanted to neglect fans of vertical antennas, but good designs that are not just horizontal antennas flipped 90 degrees are not easy to find.

In some areas, the local gang use vertical whips and mobile antennas. Skip contacts do not care what polarization your antenna uses, since the ionosphere skews the polarization of the original signal. So the question is whether we can find a decent vertical antenna that will serve both local and distant needs.

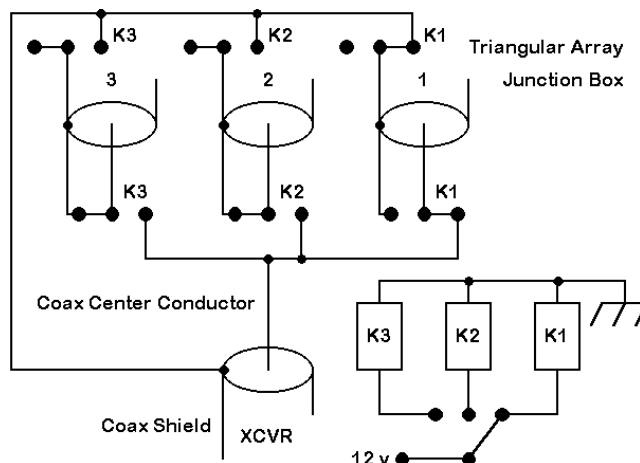
Well, . . . how about a set of 3 vertical dipoles that require no rotator and only a simple weather sealed box with some relays inside. With a flip of a switch, you can cover the entire horizon in three broad lobes with little if any gap in coverage. The gain will not rival a long-boom Yagi, but the antenna array will give some gain and very decent a front-to-back ratio, with a direct coax feedline connection.



Let's start with three vertical dipoles, each 15.6' long made of 3/4" hardware store aluminum tubing. We shall set these up in an equilateral triangle 8.6' on a side (1/4 wavelength). If we run a mast up the middle of the array,

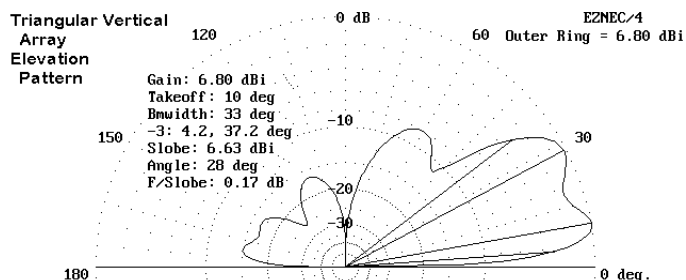
we can use PVC or other means of supporting the vertical at just about their center points, leaving the feedpoint separation free for connections. The arms for such a system would have to be just about 5' long from the center mast.

Next, we shall cut 4.97' (yes, 5.0' is OK) lengths of RG-8 foam or RG-58 foam coax. We must use the foam type to get the right velocity factor (0.78) so that the lengths are electrically correct. Each line goes from one feedpoint to a central waterproof junction box. The coax from the shack and a 12-volt DC line also enter the junction box.



The schematic diagram shows the hook-up for 3 DPDT 12-volt relays in the box. (The switch is shown in the box, but it will be in the shack.) As we change positions on the switch, we activate one relay, moving the connectors so that the center of the coax from one antenna goes to the RF cable and the shield goes to the shack coax shield. The inactive relays let the coax from the other two antennas simply be shorted out.

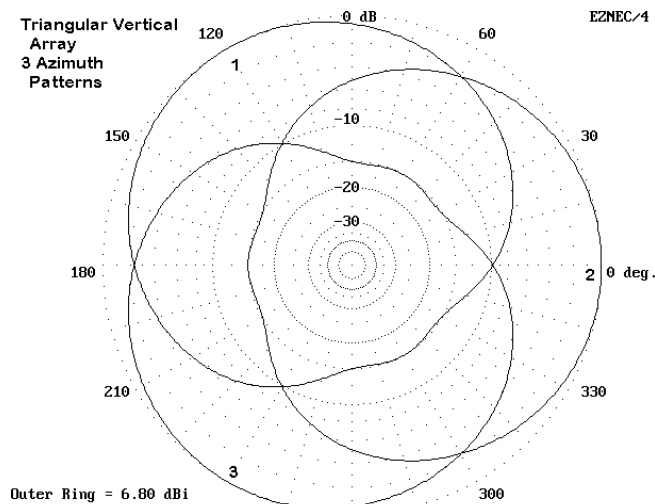
The shorted lengths of coax are stubs that electrically lengthen the other two antenna elements so that they work better as reflectors. Now we have 2 reflectors and one driven element in a vertical array.



The elevation pattern created by this system gives us a low angle pattern, good for both local and dx contacts. The front-to-back ratio varies between 12.5 and 15 dB across the first MHz of 10 meters. The gain is very usable, but not world beating. However, remember that we saved

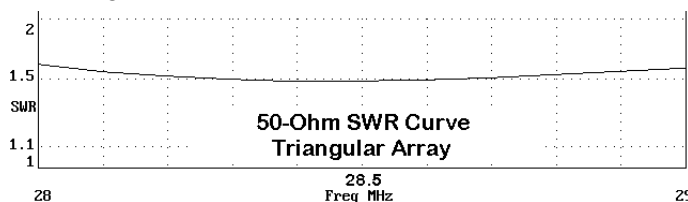
the cost of a rotator with this array, and we can work the vertical locals with ease.

In addition to all having gain and appreciable front-to-back ratio, we can cover the entire horizon just by changing the switch position. The switch simply converts one element from a reflector into a driven element, changing the overall heading of the array. The beamwidth of a vertical antenna is very large--well over 120 degrees between -3 dB points. Hence, three headings are enough to cover the world.



The composite azimuth patterns give you a good idea of how large the beam width is and how good the overall coverage is. If you construct the basic support system well enough, you will have an antenna with no moving parts other than the relays in the box. Servicing a relay at the top of the tower is easier than servicing a rotator.

The array can be fed directly with coaxial cable, as the following SWR curve shows.



All of the figures shown are modeled with the antenna at 35' at its center. The higher, the better, but the antenna will still work quite well with its lowest point at least 20' off the ground.

Verticals acquit themselves very well on 10 meters, and this vertical array will add some directional gain and some QRM nulling. Relative to a beam, the cost will be low, and the maintenance should be easy. Possibly, it is time to think vertical.



HOLLINGSWORTH SAYS "RADIO RAGE" HAZARDOUS TO HAM RADIO

Entering his third year spearheading the FCC's Amateur Radio enforcement effort, Special Counsel for Amateur Radio Enforcement Riley Hollingsworth says "radio rage" could become a bigger danger to the future of Amateur Radio than rulebreaking.

"It's the infighting and arguments and juvenile spats," Hollingsworth said this week. "That's going to come back to haunt us if we don't just grow up. It will do the service in, if the ham community doesn't put a stop to it."

Hollingsworth said that he's encouraged that the FCC's enforcement program has the support of "99.9%" of the amateur community and that the vast majority of hams follow the rules. But, he said that radio rage in the form of such things as on-air squabbles or frequency fights can degrade the bands just as quickly as outright rulebreaking. "The FCC can't do anything about that," he said. "It's up to the amateur community."

Hollingsworth said that while much radio rage technically is not illegal, it reflects poorly on Amateur Radio and can balloon into an enforcement issue. More important, he said, rude or intemperate on-air behavior might provide just the sort of ammunition that an entity seeking additional spectrum will use against Amateur Radio.

Hollingsworth predicted that the departure January 19 of FCC Chairman William Kennard (see "FCC CHAIRMAN WILLIAM KENNARD RESIGNS" below) and the changing of the guard the White House the next day will not alter the course of the current amateur enforcement effort. He said he sees nothing but positive changes ahead.

"I'm willing to bet my SX-115 that we won't miss a beat," he said, referring to one of his latest acquisitions of vintage ham gear, "as long as the amateur community lets it be known it still wants enforcement."

Hollingsworth said it was pressure from the ARRL and individual amateurs that prompted the resumption of amateur enforcement in 1998 during Kennard's tenure, "and it's the type of program that needs that continual pressure to keep it going," he added. Overall complaints are down, Hollingsworth said, "but no one can be complacent."

This article is dedicated to our deceased President Tom Henderson **K4CIH** who did much to improve the tracking of our Countries award. Tom took over this award twice when a manager had to give up their job. When this happened the first time, a computer program was written by Jim **K4HAV** to help track the award and country details. Tom started entering many of the paper records to get this program started. Russ **N5EJS** took over the job and soon completed entering all the data. When Russ recently gave up the job last fall, Tom stepped in again to take over, until another qualified manager was found. During the upcoming July convention, a new Countries manager will be voted on by the board of directors.

The **1010 Winter QSO Party** in February was better this year than last with all the DX stations that gave out wanted contacts. Good propagation as a result of high solar flux numbers have peaked and we are now on the downside of Cycle 23, but I expect good propagation during the next winter DX seasons. **The 10-10 country count will soon increase by two as Syria and Egypt were worked recently for the first time!**

Syria YK9A provides a few of us with a new Country during February. Carl **K9LA** #41258 was in my log on February 7th and my records show that this was the first time any 10-10 activity has come from Syria! My contact was a bitter sweet situation. Carl had not used his number and had forget it. I reminded Carl what his 10-10 number was and we exchanged numbers for a new one. Egypt by Frosty **SU1ER/K5LBU** #51322 was a guest operator at non-member **SU1ER** station. I told my good friend Frosty before he went on his trip, that he would be the first to ever operate 10-10 from Egypt and to be sure to not come back to Houston until that happened. On December 28th about 9am local time, I heard he was looking for me on ten meters and I found him on 28491 with a 4 by 1 signal. It took a minute to copy his 10-10 number while he tried to quiet the Europeans that kept calling him while working me. He then moved to 12

meters for another weak contact but I am in the log twice. Please QSL to Frosty's call book address with an SASE.

A New World Record was set from the Comoros by D68C DXpedition when 26 operators logged a total of **168,722 QSOs** during three weeks in February. Four of the operators were 10-10 members: Nigel **G4KIU**, Justin **G4TSH**, Hawk **SM5AQD** and Victor **UT8LL**. A total of 37,197 contacts were made on ten, that's really a bunch! **3V Tunisia**. Antonio, **IK7YZG**, was active from **3V8BB** #70613 in January. QSL to his home call.

Upcoming DX & New 10-10 Activity:

3W Vietnam. Claude **F5PBL** #71724 will be active from Saigon on ten and fifteen meters from March 22 to 31st. Claude is new to 10-10 and this will be his first DX trip. No callsign available yet, but it will be like 3W2xx. He will be using a 3 element yagi and amplifier, so try to get his number in the log for a new 10-10 country. QSL to F5PBL. Another operator, Hans **WA1LWS** #7119, was on in March as 3W2LWS but no reports of 10-10 activity.

J3 Grenada. A two-week mini-DXpedition is planned for Grenada by Dee **W1HEO** and Paul **W5PF** #5921 from March 30th through April 11th. Listen on 28440 and 28030 for CW. They will have two 100 watt radios, a beam for 10/15/20 meters and inverted Vees for 12/17/40 meters.

CE0X, San Felix Island DXpedition was canceled due to a major transportation problem. This is the last S. American island that has NOT had any 10-10 activity.

Propagation: A very little know fact occurs after the peak of each cycle. The Sun reverses the North and South poles. This event was recorded by scientists in late 2000 so Cycle 23 has peaked!

I saw better propagation this winter than the previous. Last month, propagation was very good for the QSO Party and several DX contests. My prediction is for the Solar flux to range from **110-190** during the second quarter and decreasing during each quarter of 2001.

On March 10th, the **Solar flux was 161 the A index 5 and K index 1**, which is above the flux numbers three months ago but the average flux is really coming down from the August 2000 high! I foresee a smaller 70-80 point swing in the flux during the next year and by December 2001, I expect a Solar flux range of 90-160.

Cycle 23 is now 3.2 years old. The flux continues to stay high as this phase of the cycle turns down for two more years of the good propagation. USA begins to lose some of the multi-hop F layer skip during the spring months. The daily Europeans which we heard in Texas this winter, will return in the next fall DX season.

Expect the best conditions on March 13-14, April 9-10, May 6-7 and June 2-3. For stations in the Eastern USA, expect an 50% chance of DX to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. For stations in the Western USA, expect 20% chance of DX into Europe and an 50% chance into Asia. All of the USA will get a 50% chance into S. America in the mid afternoon. Expect a 2% chance of Long Path into Asia or Europe starting at 0030 UTC for central USA. The beacons from **28.175-28.300** will tell you what is open, especially 28.200. Good luck.

The Win1010 Suite

The Win1010 Suite is actually four programs in one EXE Program File and is sold as two packages: Package One is the Contest Program and Package Two is the County Hunter and Certificate Chaser Program. A Daily Log Program is also available in the Win1010 Suite and works with both packages. Normally the Contest Program is referred to as Win1010 and the County Hunter Package as Win1010CH. The programs are sold in two packages because many of the County Hunters, Certificate Chasers and Awards chasers do not work contests. And likewise, many of the contest people do not collect awards. So you don't have to pay for a module that you won't be using. However, if you only purchase one package, the other package is still present in the Win1010 Suite and works in the Demo mode with a 25 record limit. Each package is \$37.50 and if both are purchased at the same time there is a \$10 discount making the price for the entire Win1010 Suite \$65.00 postpaid (DX Stations add \$2.00 for Air Mail).

The FCC Amateur Radio database is included on the Win1010 CD and is accessible from within the Win1010 program. The FCC database can be downloaded weekly from the LeHigh server. Other updated databases and program updates can be freely downloaded from the HDS web site or updates can be ordered on a floppy disk or CD for a nominal charge.

The Contest Program provides real-time logging and prepares your log and dupe sheet after the contest and uses a built-in database of the active testers and enters the data for you to confirm. The County Hunter Program provides record keeping for most of the 10-10 Awards, such as 10X, VP, DX, Prefix, County, Mobile, and CW. In addition to making the necessary applications, many other useful printouts and displays are available. The entire Win1010 Suite has 88 different printouts. The Certificate Chaser provides record-keeping for the various Chapter and Seals. The Daily Log is a general purpose daily log dedicated to 10 meters. If a new 10X, VP, Prefix, etc is entered into the Daily Log, it will be automatically transferred to the County Hunter file provided that option is activated in the Options Menu.

Space is not available to list all the features, but the Win1010 software is fully described on the <http://hds.net> web site. Windows 95/98 or 2000 is required and 32MB (or more) RAM is recommended. Win1010 was written by Jim Hardy, K4HAV and is sold by Hardy Data Systems, P.O. Box 7304, Tifton, GA 31793. 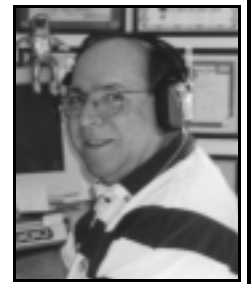

10-10? What's that?

Hello all fellow hams, My name is Gudlaugur Jonsson (Gulli) and my callsign is TF8GX. I'd like to tell you little about myself.

I'm 45 years old and I have been interested in ham radio since I was a young boy.

I was born in the west fjords of Iceland, in a little village with 500 people, and the priest in the village was very interested in radio waves, and he did put up a 12m mast about 50m away from his house and strung a wire between his house and the tower. His son was a friend of mine, and I asked him what his father was doing. He told me that his father had to be in good contact with GOD, he is the priest !

One day i visited my friend and his father was sitting in the radio room, and when he saw my eyes in the doorway (nearly dropping out) he asked me in to look at the equipment. I had never seen so many fine things in my life, shining boxes with beautiful buttons, (this is something I'd like to do when I grow

up, did I say in my thoughts, and prayed to GOD every night, that someday I had equipment like that, and be on a direct line to GOD!) Later i did find out, he did not use the equipment to contact GOD, but he had very much fun with this hobby.

I got my HF ticket in August 1997, that was a big day in my life.

In the first 6 months I had over 1000 qso's all on CW and 120 countrys, (here in TF, we have to stay 6 months on CW before we go on phone) and in the spring of 1998 I got a letter from K1WY, who asked to be my qsl manager! That was one of the best things that happened to me, because then I did not have to sneak around the bands anymore. Here is most of the time pileups when TF is heard, so the cost with qsl'ing can be high for us, but with the help of my manager I can be on the bands as much as I like! Here in TF are only about 10 active hams on HF .

Last year I had about 15,000 qso's and over 5000 of them were on the 10m band. Sometimes I was asked if I had a 10-10 number, and I did not know anything about 10-10 club then (but getting interested) and in January 2001 N5MT Mike did send me an e-mail and invited me to be a member of the 10-10 club, which I was happy to accept. And I'm sure I will have much fun with it in the future. I have already met many 10-10 members who have welcomed me to the club.

I am the president for the Radio Club of Reykjanes (TF8RX), and we try to have as much fun with the hobby as possible, like the IOTA contest, TF7RX from Westmann Islands, TF2000 last summer collecting money for blind people, and lighthouse activity every year.

My equipment to day is a Kenwood TS-950S and AL811H, and antennas are TH6DXX, TH3Mk4 for the winter WX, they are on a 40ft tower. Antennas for the lower bands are all wire antennas. Soon I will be with DX-88 vertical, and in the coming summer much on the WARC bands also.

I wish you all the best from TF land , and hope to hear you on the 10m in the future.

End date: 2400Z 31 December 2001

4) Deadline for log submittal is January 15, 2002

Note that logs must be in the order noted in 2) above, no exceptions. The location for log submittal will be announced later in the year. For those using WIN1010 to log their 10-10 contacts, Jim Hardy, K4HAV #17605, has added a feature to the WIN1010 program to track and print out the "Work the Numbers" contacts you make during the year 2001. To apply for any 10-10 Award, **Proof of paid-up membership is mandatory.** A copy of your membership card or address label from the latest copy of the *10-10 International News* must be sent with your application.

An application listing the rules for each award is available from the appropriate Award Manager listed below. Please send your request with a #10 (business size) envelope, self-addressed and stamped with one unit of first class postage, to the Award Manager for the Award you are interested in obtaining. *Please* no phone calls to Award Managers for an application or list of rules.

BAR AWARDS

A 10-10 Bar represents a legal contact with one hundred (100) 10-10 members. A Bar award may be applied for and awarded for each group of 100 10-10 members that you work. Additional certificates are available for the Bar levels of 1000, 2500, 5000, 7500, 10,000 and every 2500 contacts above.

INTERNATIONAL 500 OF THE WORLD (VP)

When you attain the 500 Bar from the 100-900 bar manager, you automatically become a member of the International 500 Club and will be assigned an honorary VP number to be used in conjunction with your 10-10 number. With the issuance of the number you are eligible to participate in the VP award program. The VP award recognizes those 10-10 members that work other members with VP numbers. A 10-10 member may apply for VP award endorsements when completing 100 contacts with VP members. A VP award may be applied for and awarded for each group of 100 that

you work. Also available to VP members are the VP Worked All States award and the Lucky 13 Certificate. The Lucky 13 award is intended to demonstrate the operator's ability to work the entire 10-meter band. The 10-meter amateur band extends from 28.0 to 29.7 MHz. The Lucky 13 award is awarded for completing a legal 10-10 contact with 13 different VP's on 13 different days on 13 different 100 kHz (plus or minus 10 kHz) segments of the band. These contacts must occur between 28.3 MHz and 29.7 MHz. There are 15 possible 100 kHz segments possible within this band section. For purposes of the Lucky 13 award, mobile, portable, or fixed operation may be used. Contacts can be made using any legal mode of operation. QSL conformation is not required.

WORKED ALL CONTINENTS AWARD

The 10-10 Worked All Continents award is issued for successfully working a 10-10 member in each of the six (6) radio continents (Africa, Asia, Europe, North America, Oceania, and South America)

COUNTIES AWARD

10-10 offers an award for working all 3076 U.S. Counties. The basic certificate is issued for the first 100 counties contacted. Endorsement seals are available for each 500 level. A plaque is awarded for working all 3076 10-10 Counties.

COUNTRIES AWARD

The Countries award certificate is awarded for confirmed contacts with 10-10 members in other countries. Applications require confirmations in the form of QSL cards (or non-returnable photocopies). A legal 10-10 contact within the applicant's country may be counted as one contact for this award. A basic 10-10 Countries certificate is awarded for contact with 25 countries.

Thereafter, endorsement seals may be applied for in groups of 10 through the 75-country level. Beyond the 75-country level, endorsement seals are awarded in groups of five (5)

CW AWARD

The basic certificate for this award is earned with a minimum of 25 legal contracts with other 10-10 members

MOBILE AWARD

The basic Mobile Contact award is issued for 25 mobile contacts. Each contact must consist of the 10-10 number, call sign, name, QTH (state or country) of both parties and the date. Endorsement seals are available for the 50, 75, and 100 contact levels.

OM/XYL AWARD

Within 10-10's membership there are many husband and wife teams. These are referred to as OM/XYL teams. 10-10 offers the OM/XYL award for contact with as many of these teams as an operator can find. The basic OM/XYL Award is for contact with ten (10) teams.

WORKED ALL STATES AWARD

Make a contact with another 10-10 member in each of the 50 United States and you are eligible for the 10-10 WAS award

WPX (PREFIX) AWARD

The basic certificate is awarded for working 100 different prefixes

GREAT BRITAIN COUNTIES & REGIONS CERTIFICATE

A basic certificate is awarded for completion of a legal 10-meter contact with another 10-10 station in five (5) of the numbered Counties/Regions/Unitary Authorities of Great Britain.

Also necessary is a DUPE Sheet *IF* you make more than 50 contacts. If you don't have one of the many logging programs that create their own dupe sheets, then you must make your own or download it from the 10-10 web site.

One example of a dupe sheet is basically a grid of 100 squares (10x10) that have a number (00-99) placed in the corner of each block. Into those squares you will put the received 10-10 number that corresponds to the last two digits of the number as shown below:

68684 686 goes in the 84 block
2549 25 goes in the 49 block
236 2 goes in the 36 block
94 0 goes in the 94 block
1 0 goes in the 01 block



When you are done with the contest and your log and dupe sheet is completed, then take the back page of your News with your address label showing. If you don't have an address label, place your membership card in that spot and make a photocopy. **You must be a member in good standing (dues paid) in order to enter a 10-10 QSO Party.**

Fill out all necessary information on the page as listed:

Event Box – which event?

Scoring Box – 2 points for each contact with a ten-ten member and 1 point for each contact with someone who does not have a ten-ten number.

Entry Box – type of entry, Chapter Assignment (if any), and your Call Area or ARRL Country operated from. (DON'T forget this last one!!!).

Check List – go over carefully to make sure you have an acceptable log!!!

Mail to the Contest Scoring Chapter as listed in the QSO Party Calendar *prior to the postmark date*. Please do NOT send an SASE or any monies as logs will not be returned and all scores counted will be posted on both the Web page and in the 10-10 International News.

MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION AND SERVICES

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
2. Your valid amateur operator license **MUST** authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, city, and state or country. A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 on page 31 of this publication.
4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 on page 31 of this publication.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$3 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the *10-10 News*.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three years. If you wish information on the extended payment plan, please contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Extended payment plan is not offered with senior life membership.

Family Life Membership

Family life membership consists of a primary life member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family life memberships run concurrently with that of the primary life member. Family life membership ends when the primary life member becomes an SK. Add \$75 for each additional family life. Only the primary life member will receive a copy of the *10-10 News*.

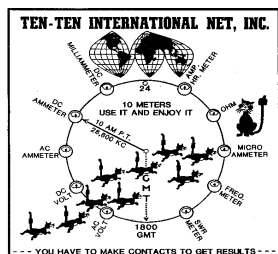
