I also want to thank the three members who did not get elected for their support of $10-10$, and for offering their time and effort to serve $10-10$ as a Director. I will be pleased to work with these newly elected Directors for the next two years (the balance of my term as President). I know three of the elected Directors very well as we have worked together in the past and each of them is a valued asset to the organization. I can count on them for any assignment they are given. I am also anxious to work with the new member of the Board, Rob Ireland VE9KM \#69811. It is an asset to have a member from the DX world on the Board again. Our Vice President, Mike Elliott K7BOI \#54625, ran unopposed for re-election, and Mike has and will continue to be my right hand man.

Our long time Director Ed Redwine K5ERJ \#11843, has found it necessary to resign due to personal and health reasons. We will miss Ed as he has been the manager of our Awards Program for many years. Ed ran a good ship and under his leadership the Awards program ran smoothly and when waters got rough, Ed smoothed them out in short order and good fashion.

As a replacement for Ed, I have named Brad Kimble K0DBK \#55192, as a Director to fill out the balance of Ed's term of office. Brad, a former Director, was also a candidate in the last election, and placed fifth, just 9 votes behind the fourth place winner. Brad is welcomed back to the Board, and as a Director will assume the duties of Awards Manager.

I believe we have a very able and capable Board of Directors to continue the organization in a forward direction for the next two years. The first meeting of the new Board will be at the 2005 Convention in Mesa, AZ in June.

The 2005 Convention Committee has been finalizing the convention details, and has come up with some great

# ALLEGED ILLEGAL "AMATEUR" TRANSCEIVER MARKETING DRAWS HUGE FINE 

ARRL Letter Vol 23 No 47 December 3, 2004

The FCC has proposed fining Pilot Travel Centers LLC $\$ 125,000$ for allegedly marketing unauthorized RF devices--specifically, transceivers labeled as Amateur Radio Service (ARS) equipment but intended for use on both Citizens Band and amateur frequencies. CB transmitters must receive FCC certification-formerly called "type acceptance." Amateur Radio equipment does not require FCC certification. The Notice of Apparent Liability (NAL) released November 22 asserts that Pilot continued to market CB transceivers labeled as amateur gear despite multiple citations and warnings.
"Commission field offices issued a total of nine citations to Pilot's corporate headquarters and its retail outlets warning Pilot that future violations would subject Pilot to penalties including civil monetary forfeitures," the NAL said. The Commission alleges that from October 2002 until last July, Pilot, in 47 separate instances, offered for sale various models of non-certificated Galaxy CB transceivers labeled as "amateur radios" that easily could be modified for CB operation. The FCC says in some instances, Pilot employees referred to the units as "CBs."

The ARRL expressed its full support for the FCC's enforcement action against Pilot. "The marketing as 'Amateur Radio' equipment of transceivers that are intended for other uses causes widespread interference to licensed radio amateurs operating within their allocated frequency bands," ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ said on the League's behalf. "We hope that the Commission's long-awaited action will be followed by additional measures taken against marketers who persist in similar violations."

Following up on complaints received between 2001 and 2003, FCC Enforcement Bureau field agents visited 11 Pilot retail outlets in Texas, Oregon, California and Nevada. "At these locations, the stores displayed and offered for sale various models of noncertified CB transceivers marketed as ARS
transmitters," the NAL said. The FCC's Office of Engineering and Technology (OET) already had determined that the units could be modified easily for CB operation and were subject to FCC certification prior to marketing.

Responding to the citations, Pilot told the FCC that all of the radios in question were "marketed as amateur radios and, as sold, operate on the 10 -meter amateur band." Pilot contended the units fell under Part 97 rules and didn't require FCC certification. In January 2002, the FCC Dallas Field Office advised Pilot that the devices referred to in the Citation had built-in design features to facilitate CB operation and that the FCC considered them CB transmitters that fall under Part 95 rules. The NAL says the Dallas Field Office received no further response from Pilot.

The FCC pointed out that it requires a grant of certification for any Amateur Radio Service transceiver designed to be easily user-modified to extend its operating frequency range into the Citizens Band.

The FCC said that on three days last December, FCC agents purchased Galaxy transceivers from different Pilot retail stores. The OET subsequently determined that all were non-certificated $C B$ transmitters under the FCC's definition. Those sales provided the basis for the proposed fine. Ultimately, the FCC alleged that Pilot offered non-certificated CB transmitters for sale on 13 occasions in 2003 and 2004 "in apparent willful and repeated violation" of the Communications Act of 1934 and FCC rules.

Citing its concern with "the pattern of apparent violations" in the Pilot case, the FCC actually adjusted the base forfeiture amount upward from $\$ 91,000$ to $\$ 125,000$. "We are particularly troubled that Pilot continues to violate these rules despite receiving nine citations for marketing non-certified CB transmitters," the Commission said in the NAL. "Pilot's continuing violations of the equipment authorization requirements evince a pattern of intentional noncompliance with and apparent disregard for these rules."

Pilot was given 30 days to respond by paying or appealing the fine.

## Time to bring back an Old Idea?

Dave, K7PRZ, is trying to get the local hams in the Portland Oregon area to meet in the evenings on 28.400 MHz . In the early 90's Portland had a large number active hams that met on that frequency. Oftentimes there would be up to 20 folks enjoying the nightly ragchew. That is one reason there are so many 10-10 paperchasers in the Portland area even a decade later.

Dave suggests those interested in starting a local group of rag chewers on 10 meters in their area just get on and operate. Calling CQ in the evenings often attracts folks that are spinning through the dead band and come upon a signal. Of course this works best in a large populated area where a dozen or so hams are within a 50 mile ground wave radius. Vertical antennas are great for ground wave contacts with mobiles and signals that come in from varying directions. But even a wire dipole or beam horizontally polarized will get out fine.

People that use 2 meters for local contacts might find sudden band openings after dark on 10 meters which can get very exciting. The Portland group was rag chewing one night and heard some fellows with an English accent---weak signals under them on the same freq. Listening closely revealed not Australia, but South Africa stations coming in long path at about 10pm local time. Most of the locals were novices then and that was a great opportunity to work unexpected DX. The magic of 10 meters is still there but we have to use the band to experience the fun.

> You have to make contacts to get results....


In each issue of the News, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

## No. 46: The Persistent Vee-Beam Myth

In a jigsaw puzzle, many pieces have similar shapes. You can force some pieces into the wrong places and end up with a messy and meaningless picture. The same rule applies to antenna work. Back in the 70 s and 80 s , backyard antenna builders created some interesting antennas and then made all sorts of miraculous claims for them. Since I receive numerous questions from folks reading old issues of ham magazines, a good number of them have focused on these miracle beams. One of the most persistent is the so-called Vee-beam.

Right at the start, we have the seeds for a misunderstanding. There is a very legitimate use of the term Vee-beam that indicates an array with good directivity and high gain. However, this traditional beam uses wire elements many wavelengths long. The Vee-beams of the more recent vintage are Yagi size, that is, with elements about $1 / 2$ wavelength from end to end. However, it appears that the Vee-beam builders wanted to claim long-wire results for their short element antennas. So claims arose that a 2 -element Vee-beam would give performance equal to or better than a 3-element Yagi with straight elements. (I still see such claims on the Internet.)

A second claim is that bending the elements forward will save space. If a standard Yagi is 16 to 17 feet wide, the Vee'd form will only be about 12 feet wide. So we have a seemingly compact antenna.

Let's evaluate these claims by making a series of comparisons among 3 2-element beams. All of the antennas will use $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ diameter elements for our modeling exercise. There is nothing in any of the designs that will even remotely approach the limits of antenna modeling software, so results will be reliable.

1. A standard Yagi: For the Yagi, I have selected a wideband version having a natural feedpoint impedance in the vicinity of 50 Ohms. Hence, you do not need a matching network, such as a beta or gamma match. The reflector is 17.3' long, while the driver is $15.84^{\prime}$ long. The elements are 5.5' apart. You can use closer spacing, but the lengths will change
and the feedpoint impedance will go down. At 4.3' for the spacing, you will get 32 to 35 Ohms for the feedpoint impedance and need a matching network for your 50-Ohm coax cable feedline. The reduced spacing will give numerically detectable improvements in performance in modeling software, but not enough to be detectable in operation.
2. A Moxon Rectangle: The Moxon is a compact 2element beam that uses standard Yagi parasitic coupling plus element end coupling. It gain is almost as good as the Yagi gain. However, the front-to-back ratio is exceptionally better. At 28 and 29 MHz , you can have about 18 dB of Front-to-back ratio, compared to the $10-11-\mathrm{dB}$ figure for a Yagi. More to the point is the size. The Moxon is only $12.5^{\prime}$ side-to-side and $4.6^{\prime}$ front-to-back. Like the wide-band Yagi, it has a natural 50Ohm feedpoint impedance for direct connection to your coax cable.

Both the wide-band Yagi and the Moxon rectangle should use a means of "common-mode current" suppression at the feedpoint. For this purpose, you may use a bulky $1: 1$ balun. However, a simpler bead-type choke, as designed by W2DU and available from numerous vendors, is just as effective. Its advantage is a diameter not much larger than coax cable. Hence, you can tape it to the boom and not add significant weight to the antenna.

Structurally, the Yagi is larger overall. However, the Moxon requires a bit of extra fabrication effort. It needs 4 corners to the elements. So the space saving comes at a price, but one which many folks can pay without strain.
3. The third antenna is a 10 -meter Vee-beam. Each element has a "quadrant" form, that is, a 90-degree overall bend. The open ends point in the desired signal direction on the premise that we shall get added gain from them. The bending results in an overall beam width of about 12.4'. Unfortunately, the foreward bending increases the front-to-back dimension to about 11.4'. So now we have a nearly square array. Fig. 1 shows the relative sizes of our 3 beams.

The next question for our comparison concerns how well the three antennas perform. We can break that question into 2 parts.
a. What kind of pattern do I get from each antenna?
b. What kind of operating bandwidth do I get from each antenna?

The pattern question is relatively easy to answer, if we break it down into parts. The Yagi provides the most gain-about 0.2 dB more than the Moxon and about 0.7 dB more than the Vee-beam.

The Moxon rectangle has the best front-to-back performance, as noted earlier. The Yagi comes next, with a modest 11 dB front-to-back ratio. Which value is better for your operation depends on your needs. For nets, I prefer the Yagi, since I can hear--although more weakly--stations from the rear. For contests, I prefer the Moxon that quells rearward QRM very effectively. The Vee-beam is slightly poorer than the Yagi if the front-to-back performance.

See Fig. 2 for overlaid patterns for the 3 antennas to
confirm these notes.
The patterns reveal something else about what happens when you Vee and element horizontally. The front-to-side ratio goes way down, since each half element radiates some energy to the side.

We have noted that the Yagi and the Moxon have 50-Ohm feedpoint impedances. That number applies to the design frequency ( 28.35 MHz for all three antennas). But what about the band edges. For this performance specification, let's look at the SWR curves in Fig. 3.

The wide-band Yagi 50-Ohm SWR curve may start higher than the other two, but only because the antenna provides coverage of the entire 10 -meter band from 28.0 to 29.7 MHz . You can lengthen the driver slightly to bring the minimum SWR value down in frequency.

In contrast, the Moxon rectangle provides a 50-Ohm SWR of $1.5: 1$ or less for the first full MHz of 10 meters. The rate of increase above the minimum point is slower than below the minimum point, so coverage extends to about 29.2 MHz or so before the SWR value reaches $2: 1$.

The Vee-beam shows an entirely different pattern. First, whenever you change a straight element into a Vee, no matter where the Vee ends point, you lower the single element impedance. Hence, a simple inverted-Vee has an impedance closer to 50 Ohms than to the straight dipole 70 -Ohm value. Second, whenever you add a second element, such as a parasitic reflector, you further lower the feedpoint impedance. Straight element Yagis produce $30-50$-Ohm impedances, compared to a dipole's 70 Ohms. Since a Vee'd dipole is already at a lower feedpoint impedance, adding a reflector lowers the impedance even further. Hence, the Vee-beam has a resonant driver impedance of only 25 Ohms . This value is not fatal, since we can always add a matching network to raise the impedance.

However, notice the overall SWR curve for the Vee-beam. Not only did we lower the impedance, but as well, we narrowed the $2: 1$ operating bandwidth. We have about 800 kHz of operating room, compared to the other beams. Although this value is adequate for most lower-end 10 -meter activities, it does require that you tune the Vee-beam with great care and precision.

So the bottom line is that we do not get anything special from the Vee-beam configuration that we cannot get from simpler, smaller, or wider-band arrangements. My preference is always to keep these antenna notes on the positive side.
 However, the Vee-beam myth has persisted for so long that I felt compelled to provide some legitimate comparisons. May the Vee-Yagi rest in peace beside Vee'd LPDAs and other members of the family. There are better ways to meet your 10 meter small beam needs.

## Submission of Information:

This column must be in to the editor of the NEWS no later than the first week of the month of March, June, September, and December. So in order to make the deadline and, if you want your chapter information in the current issue, it needs to be in hand by the last day of February, May, August and November. The winter DX season started as expected in mid-October 2004 for the USA with the return of skip into Europe just one week before the CQ SSB contest. Conditions were good during that weekend and many countries that had not been heard for six months were worked. A month later during the CQ CW contest, I counted twenty-seven stations on the air that were operated by 10-10 members. To my surprise, I received a report of two stations that would be a first time 1010 country. Falk DK7YY \#23467, was operating 9N7BCC from Nepal with several other German operators. Bruce AA4XR \#11635, was operating XU7ADF from Cambodia. Neither of these stations were ever heard in Texas. I would appreciate any reports if anyone was able to swap a $10-10$ number with either of these stations.

I just looked at the NOAA website at the solar flux numbers for the past year and the average solar flux has stayed in a tight range around 100. They are predicting that the end of Solar Cycle 23 will be in December 2006.

The count of 10-10 countries worked remains the same at $\mathbf{3 1 3}$ confirmed and 26 countries that have never had any 10-10 activity. For a complete list of these 26 countries, look at my June 2004 DX article.

There has been little activity for the DX award this quarter. In the past year, only 10 basic certificates and 19 upgrades were issued. 10-10 DX Net on 28555 at 1400 UTC on Sunday has started. It will run until mid-March 2005 when we lose propagation into Europe.

VP9 Bermuda. Two 10-10 members Bruce W4OV \#12345 and Fred K9VV \#8707, along with Julio WD4R and

Esteban W4DTA, used callsign W4OV/VP9 in the CQ SSB contest.

VQ9 Chagos Archipelago. RogerW9ROG \#67454, is on the air signing VQ90G from Diego Garcia until the end of the year. A good chance to hear him on SSB is on 28390 about 11-1200 UTC. QSL via W9ROG.

YA Afghanistan. Rene DL2JRM \#69623, has the call YA7X. He has been in Kabul for the past two months.

YA Afghanistan. John KE6GFF \#73749, is on the air as T6EE from Kabul. QSL to home call.

ZK1 South Cook Island. Dave W6AQ \#13883, was expected to renew his ZK1AQT license when he returned to Rarotonga for the CQ SSB contest. It is possible he may use ZK1SSB from October 26th to November 4th.

## Upcoming DX \& New 10-10 Activity:

3Y0 Peter I Island. 3Y0X, the third DXpedition to Peter I Island, should be on the air by a large team of operators in January 2005. There are five 10-10 members: Gerard F2JD \#63443, Ralph K0IR \#2609, Gary K9SG \#62951, George N4GRN \#73941, and Andy UA3AB \#23433. They plan to operate for two full weeks with nine stations 24 hours a day. The voyage to Peter I will start from Chile on January 14th and depending on the weather, could take seven days to get to the island.

5T Mauritania. A low power DXpedition by Eric F5SSM \#63420, will take place from December 26th to January 9th. Eric will be using callsign 5T5DY along with Yves F6GDC and Pierre F6CQX. They will operate the first week from Nouakchott, Atar and Tergit and then for three days on Banc d'Arguin Island. The station will be a TS-50 rig with vertical and dipoles. QSL via F6GDC.

6W Senegal. Dany F5CW \#49137, advises of a new DX QTH available for guest operations in 6W Senegal. The owner is 6W7RV, Jan Francois, who has an under- construction web site at http://www.le-calao.com/ . Dany said he'll be there in late November to set up a V80 Titanex vertical for the low bands. They are looking for an amplifier and other amenities since the station is still low power.

D2 Angola. Ed 4L4FN/D2PFN \#72722, is off the air until mid-January 2005 as his radio burned out. Ed will be on holiday until early next year. QSL via KK5DO.

KH7K Kure Island. The October DXpedition to this South Pacific Island is delayed until next year. Look for two members Ed AA7A \#11185 and Joe KO4RR \#46176.

KP2 US Virgin Islands. John KL7JR \#43374, has been active on several bands as KP2/KL7JR from St.Croix and will stay there until the end of April 2005.

KP2 US Virgin Islands. Ann W2AZK \#70464, and Brian, KF2HC will sign homecall/KP2 from St. Croix from January 7-14th, 2005. QSL to their home calls.

KP4 Puerto Rico \& P40 Aruba. Roger AB0YW \#74091, will be operating from Puerto Rico as AB0YW/KP4 on December 5-6th, then as P40YW from December 7-10th from Aruba. He likes to operate after 2100 UTC on 28410. QSL via AB0YW.

T5/60 Somalia. Team leader Silvano I2YSB is planning
a DXpedition to Somalia for February 2005. Andrea IK1PMR \#62272, will be the only 10-10 member along with non-members: Marcello IK2DIA; Adriano IK2GNW; Beppe IK2WXV; Riccardo IZ5BRW, and Silvano, will activate 600 G on SSB and 600 CW on CW and RTTY. They plan to operate two stations from February 3rd to the 17th. They will be using amplifiers and yagi antennas. The QSL manager for 600 CW is I2YSB, and the manager for 600G is IK2GNW. Web page: http://www.i2ysb.com/6o/.

VP2M Montserrat. Pete N0FW/VP2MW \#30703, and three other friends will operate during the ARRL 10-meter contest as VP2MW. QSL all calls via W8QID.

Propagation: In the USA, the winter months provide us with the best DX season into Europe and Asia until mid March 2005. We continue to see a decline in the solar flux as we approach the end of solar cycle 23 in late 2006. The monthly averages of solar flux for October 2003 through October 2004 were $155,141,116,114,107,112,101,100,97,119,110,113$ and 106. These numbers indicate a steady decline in solar flux for the past year. Therefore, my three-month prediction is for the solar flux to range from $\mathbf{8 5 - 1 0 7}$ for the first quarter of 2005.

Cycle 23 is about 8.3 years old. The flux has now moved into its lowest range resulting in fewer DX openings. On December 5th, the solar flux was 96 the $A$ index 7 and $K$ index 1, which is three points lower than three months ago. The solar flux continues to stay near the 100 mark. I expect from May 2005, the average solar flux will stay below 100 until the next solar cycle 24 begins. With the solar flux already low, when the $\mathrm{A} \& \mathrm{~K}$ indices go up, the result is even poorer DX skip conditions.

Expect the best conditions on December 4-6, January $\mathbf{1 - 3}, \mathbf{2 8}-\mathbf{3 1}$ and February 26-28. USA stations, expect a $25 \%$ chance of DX to Asia, Europe or Africa and a $50 \%$ chance of working into South America or Pacific in the afternoon. The beacons from 28.175-28.300 will tell you what is open, especially 28.200 . Good luck.

# ARE THEY THROWING AWAY YOUR CARDS?

I have recently been in correspondence with Don W7WLL \#71666 and he sent me a letter that was sent to some of the Northwest 7th call area amateur clubs a couple months ago. Some passed it on, some didn't. The important things to emphasize is that he is talking about thousands, several thousands of QSL cards amongst the bureaus that are literally being dumped if not claimed. The 7th call area does what they can to contact the call owners, but many do not. Also please note that each call area may have slightly different rules of operation. Here is Don's letter:

## USI NG THE ARRL I NCOMI NG QSL BUREAU?

Are you a US amateur radio operator who occasionally makes contacts with stations outside the US but are not a current user of the ARRL Incoming QSL Bureau for your call area?

The ARRL Incoming QSL bureaus are open to all amateurs regardless of operator class. You do not have to be an ARRL member to use one.

Due to the high costs of mailing, most foreign amateurs (or their amateur organization) who work a US station accumulate and forward their cards in bulk to the ARRL HQ for redistribution or they send the cards in bulk direct to the various US ARRL Incoming QSL bureaus. If you are not a current ARRL Incoming Bureau user, but have had contacts with amateurs outside the US, you may have cards in one of the ARRL call area Bureau deadfiles.

In the 7th call area (e.g. W7, K7, KD7, etc.) there are currently thousands of cards for hundreds of 7th area calls in the deadfiles because no SASE'S [selfaddressed stamped envelopes] are on file or there is no established credit with the bureau. While reasonable contact attempts are made using email addresses from QRZ and Buckmaster (and in some cases through postcards), many of the listed email addresses are not current and bounce and it is also amazing how many amateurs move and never inform the FCC of their new address (the FCC is where QRZ and other databases get their information. IMPORTANT --- each call area bureau
has their own rules so it is important to read the rules of the ARRL QSL Bureau for your call area. Alas, when we are unable to make contact these deadfile cards are eventually disposed of.

To claim foreign QSL cards (including Canada) see the instructions at the ARRL website (http://www.arrl.org/qsl/qslin.html). Please pay particular attention to the instructions of the bureau for the call area you are in. And again, ARRL QSL Bureau rules allow for the disposal of deadfile cards 90 days after reasonable efforts have been made to contact the affected amateur. Each bureau only has limited space for storing deadfile cards.

No one wants to dispose of cards that might be yours, so please, always keep yourself current with the ARRL Incoming QSL Bureau requirements applicable to your area.

It was also very interesting that I also received an email from Franz DL9SEP \#70815 very nearly the same time. Here is what he wrote:

## Dear Steve

After a QSO I issue a QSL card for the worked station and every 4 weeks I bring them to the club meeting for sending to QSL Bureau.

I have sent many QSL Cards to USA. Unfortunately the return of QSL Cards from USA is very very low.

I am working since several years for several US Awards, but I think I never get an US Award, because I have not the necessary QSL Cards, even not from 10/10 members.

Would you please so kind and print a reminder in your 10/10 news, that stations outside the USA needs also QSL Cards

Many thanks for your understanding and 73 de Franz DL9SEP 10/10 nbr 70815.

Not only does DX need our cards for awards, we need theirs. The Bureaus, all of them - DX, ARRL and $10-10$, save us a lot of money and we should support that. If you haven't done so, send in your envelopes today! Some Bureaus have a website so you can check and see if you have cards waiting for you. 10-10 has one at:

# CONTEST PRIMER THE ELECTRONIC LOG

I converse often with Ward NOAX regarding the $10-10$ contests and schedules. Ward is the editor of the ARRL Rate Sheet and back on November 17 he wrote an article that hit very close to home. My home. Since I have taken over scoring the $10-10$ Contests, I have seen so-o-o-o-o many different kinds of logs...well, read on and then I will explain after. Here is Ward's article:

## Read The ... Rules!

Man, oh, man, it sure is contest season, isn't it? (All the sufferin' spouses nod their heads vigorously in the up and down direction.) Beginning in September, the fall weekends pile up with "majors," peaking in the seven-week period between CQ WW SSB and ARRL 10-Meter. Like a miniature baby boom, thirty days later the log submissions peak in the sponsor's post and email. Then it's time for the log checking to begin. Or is it?

Well, not really, because first they have to process all of the logs that were submitted. Piece of cake, right? Let's listen in as the contest manager gets started..."I'll just open up this email attachment and...what format is this in? The subject just says 'Contest Log,' so whose log is this? Sheesh. Maybe I'll start with the paper logs. R-r-r-r-i-i-p-p-p-p-p! Oh, no - they didn't include a summary sheet. I'll have to count the mults by hand. Oops, the abbreviations are non-standard. Sigh. Honey, where's the aspirin?"

Speaking as one who handles some of a state QSO party's logs and who occasionally transgresses in his own submissions, I can tell you that many of us - prepare yourself - do not read or follow the log submission instructions. Until you actually work on a contest committee, you won't understand the magnitude of the problem, but I can assure you that handling the log submissions is a major drain on time, energy, and enthusiasm. Ever wonder why it takes so long to get results and certificates done? It starts with the excessive amount of time it takes to get the discrepant log data into a checkable format.

Some of the big contest sponsors have robot software that only accepts logs that have the correct format and all of the necessary identification data. Before a standard log format (Cabrillo) was developed a few years ago, the really big contests were drowning in log format problems. Sweepstakes logs were submitted in over 80 different formats. Yes, 80, and that's only the electronic logs! How much time do you think it took to get all of those handled correctly and ready for the log checkers? If any QSOs were
lost (or heaven forbid, a whole log) you can bet that angry phone calls and emails started flying, as well. While there was a lot of squawking about Cabrillo at first, the robot log submission process has done away with a lot of eror-prone drudgery.

But what of the so-called "minors?" The state QSO parties, smaller DX contests, specialty mode or band contests, etc. most likely don't have the resources for robot log submission. They may not have the tools to process Cabrillo format logs. They depend on the entrants providing logs in a format they can process manually and generally spell this out in their rules. Yet many logs are submitted in wildly varying formats, without summaries or other supporting documentation, and occasionally very poorly identified. If contesters want the smaller contests to prosper, then they're going to have to minimize the burden on the sponsors.

First - you, the contester, need to pay attention to what the sponsor asks for in the rules for log submission. If they say "ASCII text", then send them a text-only file. Don't send your CT BIN file or an XLS spreadsheet. If they require a summary sheet, be sure to fill one out and send it. If you've written your own logging software, bully for you, but be sure its output is usable by the contest sponsors and includes all of the required information.

Identify your submissions. If you send the log by email, and most do, be sure the subject line of the email message includes the contest name and your call. If the contest covers more than one mode (such as Sweepstakes), include the mode in the message. For example, "NOAX CW Sweepstakes Log". It is depressing to look at an Inbox full of messages titled "Contest Log."

Should you send Cabrillo? Unless the sponsors request Cabrillo or say that they accept it, don't send your $\log$ in Cabrillo format. Why not? Because Cabrillo does not identify new multipliers, manually scoring logs becomes a royal pain. Most logging software has the option of generating logs in several different common formats and one will surely indicate each new multiplier.

Be extra sure that your log includes all of the required information with each QSO, including your complete exchange. If standard abbreviations are offered for counties or regions, use them! If the sponsor has a standard summary sheet form, use it! If there is an on-line log submission form or Web page, use it! If there are different types of multipliers or bonus points, be sure they're tallied separately as the scoring rules require.

Now sponsors, you also have an obligation to make your log submission rules and requirements crystal clear. If you don't tell entrants what you want, you surely can't complain when you get a heap of logs in wildly divergent formats. Your rules don't have to be full of legalese, but they need to be clear. Have someone relatively unfamiliar with your contest read them and tell you what they think would be an acceptable log. You might be surprised! Ask yourself how different kinds of logs should be submitted -

paper, diskette, email. Have someone go through the process and see if it works. Save the committee hours and hours of unnecessary labor by spending a little time up front on the log submission rules.

There's another guy or gal just like you handling those precious logs. They'd rather be on the air, just like you! You'll make the sponsor's job easier (which leads to quicker reporting) and reduce the effort required to check your log (which leads to fewer missed mults or bonuses and to higher scores). Needless to say, all this time saving leads to more time for contesting! Just put yourself in the "sponsor's moccasins" for a mile or two before clicking the "Send" button.

Pay attention to the requirements of the contest. $10-10$ is pretty easy as all the general contests we have require the same information. We need YOUR information as described on the 10-10 Cover Sheet. It's pretty easy.

I have been asked many times "what is Cabrillo?" and the answer is very simple - it is an ASCII file in a specified columnar text format with a specialized information header.

A few years ago a Cabrillo-style format for 10-10 contests was designed. There are several contest software designers out there that have the design built into their programs already. Some do a pretty good job of it. For those that e-mail these logs, we thank you! We do not use an e-mail robot to process the data, but we do import all of it into an Access database that makes sure all contacts are counted correctly. We also do not have multipliers in our general contests, so that does not preclude us from using the Cabrillo-style output.

We are currently able to download most logs, but we do get an occasional one that needs to be handled by hand then we just print it out and add it to our stack of mailed logs. Mailed logs account for about $50 \%$ of all received.

For speed of handling, the electronic format is by far the fastest to process. It takes about 1 minute from beginning to end. The average time for hand-written logs is from 5-10 minutes each. When you can get upwards of 200-300 logs in a contest, well, you can understand why it takes so much time.

### 6.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are contests that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Anniversary and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty contests and do have additional rules.

### 6.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Contests are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the contest. Other logs received will be handled as checklogs. Checklogs are used to validate (check) other logs but do not receive awards.

### 6.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently five QSO Parties held through the calendar year:
Winter Phone Contest - held on the first full weekend in February
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Spring CW Contest - held on the first full weekend in May
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Summer Phone Contest - held on the first full weekend in August
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Sprint - a 24 hour contest held on October 10th (10/10)
0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.
Fall CW Contest - held on the last full weekend in October
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

### 6.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP or any other similar types of assisted contacts are NOT allowed.

CW Contests should be operated in the CW portion of the 10 meter band and operated using CW and/or any Digital mode (RTTY, PSK, etc).

Phone contests must be operated in the PHONE portion of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved Phone method (SSB, FM, AM).

The SPRINT utilizes both CW and Phone portions of the 10 meter band.
NOTE: A OUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during contests using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for non-contest use of the band. 6.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrant may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:
INDIVIDUAL: includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.
QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire contest.
CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority. The Club must have active $10-10$ membership. The Club call must be operated by a minimum of one active member of $10-10$ who is also a member of the club submitting the entry. Club entries must additionally list the call, name and 10-10 number for all operators. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual $\log$ for contacts made using their own call sign. (Club entry updated effective 7/1/2004)

### 6.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the contest, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from only one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

### 6.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10\# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a $10-10 \#$, then record a zero[ 0$]$ in the log.

### 6.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number.
One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number.
Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero[0] for points.
Any $\log$ showing $10 \%$ or more errors may be handled as a checklog.
A station may be counted only once regardless of mode.

### 6.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Except for the Sprint, any active member may assign his/her score to any single affiliated $10-10$ chapter of which he/she is a member.

### 6.2.9 CONTEST ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the $10-10$ web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the contest. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR MAIL to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a checklog. Any logs received more than 15 days after the contest entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded.

### 6.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log, and Dupe Sheet as described here:

COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9) or DX Country, Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with $10-10 \#$, number of contacts and points without $10-10 \#$, and total contacts and points claimed.
LOG must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10\# (zero [0] if none), QTH and Contact Point Value.
DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order, or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

### 6.2.9.3 ENTRY DEADLINE

Entries for all contests listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the contest. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25 th , unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

### 6.2.10 CONTEST RESULTS AND AWARDS

Contest results will be posted on the $10-10$ web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the contest, and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top Individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9) and each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB and CHAPTER.
6.2.11 ANNIVERSARY QSO PARTY

This event runs from January 10001 UTC to December 312359 UTC. Entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have 10-10's anniversary year contained in their membership number.

Example: 2002 is the 40th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a " 40 " in their membership number (i.e., $72040,69405,64054$, 40126,00407 ) would count toward the contest. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the contest and promoting the use of the 10 -meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

During the calendar year (January 1 though December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH, with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.

Contacts must be made on the 10 -meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.) but all contacts must be made direct and unassisted. NO repeater, satellite, or Internet assisted contacts are permitted. The contact mode must be recorded in the log entry.

All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the $10-10$ Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order.

This contest is for Individual entries as described in section 6.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the Top Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS.

Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following the anniversary contest year entered. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

### 6.2.12 MOBILE QSO PARTY

This event is held on the third Saturday in March from 0001 to 2359 UTC. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

Fixed stations contact mobiles, mobiles contact everyone. Mobile applies to vehicular, marine, aeronautical or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the Contest Manager. A station operating a mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit (moving).

Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation.

The contest exchange shall be Call, Name, State, 10-10 Number (if a member, zero(0) if not), and county (if applicable). Only counties in the USA, Canada and England may be used as a multiplier.

Count one point for each contact whether a member or not. Fixed stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked. Mobile stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked PLUS a bonus of the number of counties worked from.

All stations must submit separate logs for the counties worked from. Log scores will be combined by the contest manager.

Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the contest. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs. 6.2.13 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Unfortunately, due to illness, I have not been able to participate in the nets on a regular basis. However, as you can see in my net report, conditions have started to improve, and we are seeing more stations checking in on the nets.

One thing I have been seeing lately is an increased amount of stations becoming impatient when they don't get checked in immediately after calling. Remember that as conditions start to improve, there will be situations when the net controller cannot hear you, but a relay station will. Put your call out ONLY when net control or their relay station asks for stations to check in. Continually calling during check in time only causes interference, and delays the check in process. Also, please don't make derogatory comments like "it's about time", etc when you do get into the net. This is a hobby, and we need to remember that our net controllers are all volunteering their time and don't need to hear those types of comments. Patience is a virtue, and we all need to
remember that.
The 10-10 Special Event was a great success. The numbers look very good, and I have talked to several of the stations that operated W6OI in their districts. They have reported giving out their numbers to many prospective new members, as well as making numerous contacts. Congratulations to all whom worked this event, and I look forward to having you all participate in the 2005 Special Event.

Beginning January 1, and lasting through March 31, voting for the Net Controller of the Year for 2004 will be accepted. With conditions improving, now is the time to check into as many nets as you can. Take the time to evaluate the operation on each net controller that you can hear, and then cast your vote for the one that you feel has done the best job for 10-10. Your opinion does matter, and each net control station is doing their best to provide you with the best service possible. When you vote, no explanation is necessary as to which net controller you are voting for. Simply send an e-mail to me at aa7zw@cox.net, and in the subject line put NCS 2004. I do not open any mail from unknown sources, so be sure to place that in the subject line. Then simply put the name of the person that you are voting for in the main message area. If you don't have e-mail, please just send me your QSL card with your vote. I am looking for a great turn out in the voting this year, so please take the time to participate. ## 10-10 BUREAU UPDATE

A counter has been placed on the 10-10 QSL Bureau website to monitor activity and to determine whether it is worthwhile maintaining the web list of unclaimed QSLs.

The web site has been provided as a courtesy service, but if its use by members is insufficient, it will be discontinued. For now, the site will be maintained and monitored until March 1st. A decision will then be made with regard to retention or deletion. That decision will be posted in the 10-10 NEWS in April.

Currently there are 1,491 cards in the Unclaimed QSL file for 954 members. 1029 cards have been mailed out to the 319 members who have envelopes on file with the $10-$ 10 QSL Bureau.

The web site list is updated about once per week. It contains the calls of stations with unclaimed cards; the calls of stations with envelopes on file; and the calls of stations who do not wish to participate and prefer not to receive any QSL cards through the 10-10 QSL Bureau service.

If you do not wish to participate, please advise the QSL Bureau manager so your call can be added to the list.

3. You must make contact with ten members of $10-10$ and submit a log listing all contacts, their $10-10$ number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 on page 31 of this publication.
4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 on page 31 of this publication.
