For the last issue of the 10-10 NEWS, I wrote a short paragraph on the increase in the US postal rates. The information for that article was from a Postal Bulletin and the discovery of an article in the Federal Register on International rates. On May 14th when the new rates went into effort a shock awaited me. No where had I read anything about size being a consideration on the amount of postage. When I first read the new rates and realized that the 10-10 NEWS and membership packets were oversized I feared that the postage expenses of $10-10$ would go out of sight. I thought for example that the bulk shipping of the 10-10 NEWS would increase from $\$ .63$ cents to $\$ .97$ instead of going down to $\$ .58$; mailing of the membership packets and individual copies of the 10-10 NEWS would also increase from $\$ .87$ to $\$ 1.14$ instead of going down to $\$ .75$. Well I was partially right and partially wrong. Because the 10-10 NEWS is shipped bulk and meets the criteria for discounted mail the cost should not approach $\$ .97$ but will still increase. However, mailing of the membership packets and single copies of the 1010 NEWS now cost $\$ 1.14$. For the mailing of the Foreign 10-10 NEWS the postage did increase but the number of zones dropped from 5 to 3, Canada, Mexico and the rest of the world. I 'can not' wait to see what the postage bill is after this issue is mailed. Don't worry, I don't see a dues increase as it was just a few years ago but postage expense will be a topic for the August Board meeting.

10-10 is not alone wondering what the effect of this postage increase will be, ARRL, CQ, WorldRadio, QCWA
and a lot of other groups print and mail. Remember, the 10-10 NEWS is available electronically, if interested send me an email and I will sign you up.

Since the April 10-10 NEWS, I visited the New Waterkant Chapter in northern Germany, the Dayton Hamvention, the Hill Country Picnic and HamCom in Plano TX. I can not thank Wolfgang and Marianne Dethlefs DK7LA \#66048 and DJ 3LA \#70617 enough for the time they spent showing me around Hamburg, northern Germany and southern Denmark and for hosting the weekend events. And finally this week, if you are wondering what all those conversations without call signs are on 28.085 MHz , well it appears to be a small invasion of unlicensed truckers and so called Freeband operators of our 10 meter band. We have more in this report:

Originally confined to portions of the mid-West, the pirate trucker and Freeband epidemic appears to be spreading nationwide. This, as more and more of these illegal operators are making their unauthorized home on 28.085 Megahertz and several other 10 meter frequencies.

And what is the Amateur Radio community doing about this invasion? On the surface at least, very little. With the upper High frequency bands not offering very much D-X these days, the majority of hams are sticking to 20, 40 and 80 meters with few stations heard in the 15, 12 and 10 meter spectrum. So the truckers and Freebanders see this is fair game for their unlawful operations and are busy establishing squatters rights in these bands.

What about the FCC? Well its doing what it can. There have been several well publicized violation notices sent to trucking firms. They request owners to instruct their drivers to curtail any operations for which they are not

licensed and threatening punitive action such as fines. But that's about it. With the FCC enforcement folks stretched thin and Freeband operations being among the lowest of priorities on the enforcement agenda, there is no reason to believe that there is going to be any sort of massive sweep by the Federal government to clear these pirate operators out of the ham radio bands.

In the end, it will be the ham radio community that will have to defend these frequencies. And it does that by using them. If hams load up 10 meters or any band with legitimate Amateur Radio operations, there will be no place for the illegals to play and they will go elsewhere.

In the case of 28.085, there have been suggestions that this frequency become a national C-W or RTTY Calling Channel. That's a pretty good approach. Another is for every ham with the capability of operating 10 meters to start holding QSO's on that frequency. As any Morse enthusiast will tell you, C-W can get through even when faced with all sorts of QRM including pirate operators using voice.

The bottom line. if licensed radio amateurs fill up 10 meters even for local chats, the truckers and Frreebanders will soon be looking elsewhere for a new home.

In each issue of the News, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

## No. 56: Some Ideas for Quad Loops in the Field

As the sunspots slowly return to improve 10-meter propagation, some operators begin to think of picnics, accompanied by a rig and a portable antenna. In episode 42, we examined a simple 10-meter dipole that consisted of nesting 3 ' sections of aluminum tubing. With about 20 of mast, the antenna is capable of very good performance, and one can hand-turn it to broadside the desired station. We can do similar things with a simple quad loop with about half the side-to-side spread. As a bonus, we acquire just a little more gain, but not enough normally to make the difference between a go and a no-go contact.

In this episode, we shall look at several configurations of the quad loop, some of which may be more useful to individuals, depending on local materials and construction preferences. Fig. 1 shows square and rectangular quad loops. The top pair use all-wire elements. । have selected AWG \#16 as a compromise size that is quite strong but lighter than house wiring. If you change the wire size, you will have to refigure the loop sizes or experimentally find the length of wire that gives a resonant feedpoint at 28.4 MHz (our design frequency). In general (and unlike the case of dipoles), closed loops require longer wire


Some Possible Configurations for 10 -Meter Field Quad Loops circumferences as the wire gets fatter and smaller circumferences as the wire gets thinner.

The lower pair use a hybrid construction method, with horizontals consisting of $3 / 4$ " aluminum. You may use tubing, but L-stock is easier to manage for field assembly and disassembly. The side wires are AWG \#16. All wires in these antennas are designed to be bare. If you use insulated wire, shorten the wires by $2 \%$ to $5 \%$. Thicker insulation calls for the greater amount of shortening.

Let's start with the all-wire quad loops. A standard square loop, fed at the center of the bottom wire, will have a resonant feedpoint impedance of about $125 \Omega$. To create the simplest match to a $50-\Omega$ feedline, insert a $1 / 4-\lambda$ section of $70-75-\Omega$ coax. The electrical length will be just under 104". However, you must multiply this length by the velocity factor of the line that you use. Most solid dielectric lines have a velocity factor of 0.67 , resulting in a 70 " length. Most foam dielectric lines have a velocity factor of about 0.8 , resulting in a matching section length of 83 ". Both the square and the rectangular loops will cover from 28.0 to about 28.7 MHz with under 2:1 SWR. Since the total feedline length will be short compared to the amount used in a home station installation, you can extend the operating span by using an internal or external antenna tuner--with no significant losses.

One reason some loop users prefer the rectangular shape is that it provides a direct $50-\Omega$ impedance and therefore requires no matching section. As well, if we place the bottom horizontal wire of both antennas at the same height--for example, 10 above ground in the field--we obtain slightly more gain and a slightly lower elevation angle due to the higher top wire. See Fig. 2. In most cases, the variables that field operations inevitably involve will wash out the small differences in the performance numbers. So the main reason for using the rectangular shape is to achieve a direct feed that requires no matching section. However, the resulting tall loop can be somewhat ungainly in the breeze.

Let's consider how to construct both types of allwire quad loops for field use, using Fig. 3 as a rough guide. We can start with a

Unlike the dipole mast that had to reach the ultimate height of the antenna element, the quad loop mast only goes to the level between wires plus a little margin. PVC sections in $5^{\prime}$ lengths (or whatever length fits the trunk or truck-bed) make a good mast, especially when the ends have threaded couplings cemented in place. Be sure to use some rope and long spikes (tent pegs or garden timber spikes) to set up a

guying system. At the top of the uppermost section, we can install a plate with 4 stubs to receive the X-braces or support arms. If we use pressure insert fasteners for the outer pinning devices, we can fold the assembly to reduce its width during transport. The anchor plate can be almost anything from plywood to plastic.

The support arms should be light, flexible, and strong.
CPVC is useful and available at home centers. Fiberglass is perhaps better, but it may require mail order to obtain it. Assemble the entire support structure to string the wire initially. Be sure the wire is equally taut on all four sides of the loop, but not so taut that it stresses the support arms. Stress will likely result in a warping of the frame to one side or the other--and the warp may change in a stiff breeze. For permanent installations, I would normally suggest slip tubes at the corners, but for this antenna, I recommend that you fix the corner in place. Use non-conductive cable ties or similar, and add some epoxy after you are satisfied with the structure. The wire will help prevent the arms from sagging. For the square quad loop, the arms should be a minimum of 77.5 " from the plate center to the tip. The rectangular loop requires arms that are minimally 82 " long. You will have to solder in a coax connector at the center of the bottom wire, and you may wish to use a small plastic plate as a mounting.

Using the lower quad configurations involves having thick horizontal element sections and wire vertical sections. 3/4" L-stock makes a good horizontal element section. Note in Fig. 1 that the combination of thick and thin materials raises the impedance of a truly square loop to a very inconvenient value. A $150 \Omega$ impedance is somewhat low for a $4: 1$ balun, but too high for a $75-\Omega$ matching section. Therefore, if you prefer this configuration, try a slightly rectangular shape, as shown in Fig. 1, to obtain $125 \Omega$. Then you can use a $75-\Omega$ matching line to good effect.

Fig. 4 shows why some field operators prefer the thicker horizontal element sections. If we carry the mast up to the top element, we no longer need the 4 X -brace support arms. The horizontal L-stock supports the side wires with ease. Since the loop is over 9 ' tall, the central mast above the lowest element section should be in 2 sections. To each section, we can attach a small plywood or plastic plate to pin down the L-stock. I recommend that you use nuts and bolts near the centerline, but removable fasteners (such as hitch pin clips) near the outer edge.

When not in use, you can fold the bottom elements up and the top elements down for easy transport. Be sure to add a bridge wire at the top to connect the two side of the horizontal element. At the bottom, add a coax connector and mounting plate and fasten it to the element support plate.

For either type of quad, you can likely work out the wire and support structure in a way that allows you to store and transport that part of the system as a unit. The more items in the structure that you can fold, bend, and wrap-around for storage, the more quickly you can assemble and disassemble the unit in the field. As well, you create a smaller unit for transport.

These notes do not aim to give you complete construction details of a portable or field quad loop. Instead, they simply provide some ideas and then rely on your own ingenuity for making a complete unit. Over the years, I have built and used several 10 -meter quad loops. My personal favorite is the modest rectangle that uses $3 / 4$ " L-stock and side wires. My versions allowed me to loosen the L-stock and fold the element sections next to the halfmast section. Without removing the side wires, I laid the two half-mast sections side by aside and then used the side wires to wrap the entire antenna into a loosely secure bundle. The stored antenna was a little over 4' long (not including the mast sections and the guys below the part shown in Fig. 4). The only loose part was the bridge wire across the middle of the upper element, and I kept one end attached to one side of that element. In one version, I mounted the coax connector directly to one of the lower pieces of L-stock, with a bridge wire to the other section.

The number of construction variations that are possible is as endless as the materials that we can find at a home center. In fact, the variations on field quad loops are almost as great as the pleasure of operating 10 meters from a hilltop or open field (on a sunny day with warm temperatures, a fine picnic lunch, and someone special with whom to share the fun).

## Submission of I nformation

This column must be in to the editor of the NEWS no later than the first week of the month of March, June, September, and December. So in order to make the deadline and, if you want your chapter information in the current issue, it needs to be in hand by the last day of February, May, August and November. Keep in mind that sometimes the newsletter is delivered a few days into the month rather than being on the 1st, Therefore, if you have a special or worksheet that is going to be done during the months of January, April, July, or October, then the information needs to be in to the Chapter Manager in the prior issue.


There have been two important DXpeditions this past quarter that many people have been waiting for years. The N8S DXpedition to Swains Islands began on April 3rd and lasted for twelve days. There were seventeen operators: Hrane YT1AD, was a co-organizer with David K3LP \#13394. The other 10-10 member was Doug N6TQS \#72301. The previous Dxpedition KH8SI that was there in July 2006, tried to use the high rate bands and did not go above 18 MHZ . Therefore, there were no 10-10 contacts possible from the July 2006 DXpedition and March 2005 DXpedition did not count for a new DXCC country.

The N8S DXpedition started as expected, but to my surprise, David K3LP \#13394, got on Ten the second day and we swapped numbers. Swains Island will become a new 10-10 country, probably number 314. N8S made a total of 6602 contacts on Ten, about half SSB, the other CW, RTTY and FM. They set a record number of total contacts at 117,132 and made more CW contacts than SSB. The CW ops were excellent and well organized taking calls at more than 120 per hour several different times when I was listening. I managed to get into their logs on six bands mixed modes. When they left Swains, they came back to American Samoa where they operated using call 5W5AA from April17-24th.

The second big event occurred in early May from BS7H Scarborough Reef in the South China Sea just west of the Philippines. This reef has four small rocks that stick up out of the water just enough to build a wooden platform and put a generator and ham station. The ship that brought the team members had to resupply each station about every eight hours, so conditions were tough and roughing it was the general rule for this BS7H DXpedition that made 45,830 contacts. There was no 10-10 member in the group.

Well after another quarter has passed, the openings on ten meters have improved, not because of an increase in solar flux but good summer Sporadic E! It looks like we are getting closer to the bottom of Solar Cycle 23, as on Sunday, May 27-28th the solar flux hit a record low for this cycle of 67, which last occurred ten years ago on July 13, 1997.

My prediction in March that we had started the next Solar Cycle was premature. We have to see a bottom and upturn in the solar flux numbers so that the six-month average starts to increase. That has not happened as yet but it is expected to happen later this year, say after the $10-$ 10 convention.

40 Montenegro. Since June 2006, Montenegro has been waiting for the International Telecommunications Union (ITU) to assign an Amateur Radio callsign block to
this new country. They did not want to give Montenegro a new prefix, so it required the states of Montenegro and Serbia to agree upon one or two prefixes from the existing prefixes ( $4 \mathrm{~N}, 4 \mathrm{O}, \mathrm{YT}, \mathrm{YU}$ and YZ ) assigned to the former Serbia-Montenegro. An agreement was reached on May 11th, and Montenegro stations will be using the prefix block 400 through 409. Serbia stations will continue to use YT and YU prefixes. The ITU has taken 4 N and YZ prefixes for future reassignment. However, it now seems that the 40 calls from Serbia will remain active until they expire around December 31, 2007. So please ask the station if you have a doubt.

Countries Award: There is a total of 618 basic certificates issued. I had no upgrades this past quarter. Upgrades cost a Self-Addressed Stamped Envelope (SASE) and you should copy your QSL or eQSL cards instead of sending the originals to save postage. Use the website before you send your application and email any questions to me.

Propagation: Propagation is better due to the Sporadic E openings we have been having in late May and early June. There have been several nighttime openings for3-4 hours and several times during our local net, and we had more than fifty check-ins for the net. Expect the daily solar flux to range from 70-95 the next quarter and the monthly flux will stay below 88 until Solar Cycle 24 is recognized by NOAA.

April 2006 through May 2007 the solar flux monthly averages were April 88.9, 80.9, 76.5, 75.8, 79, 77.8, 74.3, 86.3, 84.4, 83.5, 77.7, 72.2, 72.4 and May 74.4.

Cycle 23 is eleven plus years old. The flux remains in its lowest range with many days of zero sunspots.

On J une 6th the solar flux was 81 the $\mathbf{A}$ index 3 and K index $\mathbf{1}$ which is 8 points higher than last article. X ray emissions from the Sun have dropped to their lowest levels in 15 months. This means solar activity is very low but a chance of flares exists. A large flare on June 2nd raised the flux from 71 to 83.

Expect the best conditions on J une 3-6th, J uly 13rd, July 27-31st, August 23-38th and September 20-24th. In June, the USA stations, expect a $5 \%$ chance of DX to Asia, Europe or Africa and a $20 \%$ chance into South America or Pacific in the afternoon. To tell what DX paths are open, use the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).

There are a few commercial 10 meter only rigs on the market, well, now only one. The MFJ radio, pictured below, is a 20 watt PEP, 10 meter radio and is priced at around $\$ 270.00$. MFJ makes good radios.


For a while, Radio Shack made one, then another nice Ten meter mobile rig. In 1989 they released the HTX-100 which ran about 35 watts on SSB and CW. This was made by Uniden for Radio Shack and was the same as the Uniden HR-2510. This is a really good rig and the only thing lacking was the ability to do FM. These little rigs can be picked up at most Flea markets for less than $\$ 100$.


I installed on one in my car with a Hustler mobile whip (late 80's) and worked a lot of DX driving back and for the to Lincoln every day. (a regular CB 108 inch whip worked great too!)

Then, in the 90's Radio shack phased out the HTX-100 and offered the new HTX-10. This rig did not have CW but did have SSB, AM and FM with built in repeater offset. This replaced the HTX-100 in my car and remains under the dash to this date.


Power is near 25 watts (about 7 on AM) and this is a fun radio to have. The HTX-100 now sits on the shelf in the 'radio room' and runs a 10 meter beacon on 28.2075 MHz . The only issue with this rig was the FM receive was a little fuzzy and that was fixed with a quick adjustment to the rig. This radio is now also out of production and can be found at local flea markets, also for less than $\$ 100.00$ in most cases.

There is a company called 'Magnum' that produces a couple of 10 meter rigs, one that looks exactly like the HTX-10 and another cheaper rig that is AM only. See those pictures and go to their web site which is: https://www.rflimited.com then click on the Magnum link. Look for the Model \#257 or the Mini- Magnum.


Magnum \# 257 = About $\$ 150.00$ Check this web site. www. cooper,com and look for the Magnum 257 Mini-Magnum (AM only rig) $=$ Between $\$ 77$ and $\$ 99.00$ depending on supplier; http: / / w w w. thequackshack.com / radios/magnum/magnummini.htm I haven't tested either of these but may get the little AM rig just to play with it. Other options left are mostly the big rigs which now mostly cover all the HF bands from 160 meters to 6 meters. Most of these all do AM, FM SSB and CW but are in the $\$ 900$ to $\$ 1500$ or higher price range. One of these would be a great incentive to UPGRADE ( $\mathrm{Hi}, \mathrm{Hi}$ ) Of course, you can always dig out that old 23 channel CB you have out in the garage and then find a 40 channel with a 10.240 Mhz crystal in it and plug it into the 23 channel rig, do a little tuning and there you have a 10 meter AM (maybe SSB) rig for very little expenditure.

Editors's note: Remember, you must be general class or above to use AM. Technicians are restricted to CW/Digital in the Novice CW band and SSB only from 28.3-28.5.

As a director it is my goal to introduce all of the net controllers (NCO). There are 12 of them. Several of them I have only met over the air so will be asking each of them to send me a Bio to help me, so I will start with myself.

In the summer of 1986 a couple of CB buddies and I went to the Downey ARC to take advantage of their Novice licensing class. While there, I met some great friends. The call sign I received was KB6NMM. My new friends gave me the phonetics, "Notorious Motor Mouth". My wife said she had better phonetics, "No More Money".

In December of 1986, I passed the Tech/General written exam and was issued the new call of N6OPR, which brought a whole new set of phonetics, "Old Peter Rabbit". In 1989, I upgraded to General. Then in 1993, I decided to explore the bands more, so I set out to earn my Advanced class.

When I first became a Ham I was pulled in many directions of the hobby at the same time including Field Day, T-Hunting, HF Contesting, and DXing. I wanted to give back to the hobby that had given me so much enjoyment, so I became a code instructor for four years with the very group that got me into amateur radio. I also became active in the leadership of the Downey ARC. I took on Field Day, Ways \& Means, and a volunteer for the W6 incoming QSL Bureau. I also became an active member of the Los Angeles County Sheriff Disaster Communications Service, and an ARRL Volunteer Examiner.

In 1987, I met Jim, W6PGM who was known for, "My name is J im and my 10-10 is number TEN." J im introduced me to the 10-10 organization, where I soon met the likes of Scotty, WA6TQC, Louise, N6ELK, and Glen, K7OMK, all of who are on my original 10-10 membership application. I soon became 10-10 number 45715, and later, earned VP 2238. I started recording contacts and checking
into the nets regularly until late in 1992 when the band started to die, with about 850 numbers logged. Over the next several years, I shifted my activities to the other bands, and started DXing, and more contesting. I also became very active in UHF/VHF Mountaintop contesting. In 1999 I became active in 10-10 again and started checking in to the alternate net on 28.380 MHz , and attending the 10-10 lunches in the LA area. I had the opportunity of meeting some of the great people I had been working over the past 12 years.

Sometime along the line, Bill, AA7ZW (ex AA6ZW) asked me if I would be interested in filling in as a relief net control operator, and call a net when a regular NCO was not available. I jumped at the chance. I had my chance to take the reigns when Derek, VP2VF was in dire need of a 4-week vacation.

My first net was a disaster. My brain went blank, however, the people who checked in were great and helped me through. That's when I realized just how involved a job it is to call a large net. It's not as simple as picking up the mic and calling CQ 10-10. You just don't jump in there and get the job done. That's when I started studying the other NCO's and slowly started to learn the proper way to call and control a net. It took time and a lot of hard work to match the other net controllers. It's not easy folks, but it is a lot of fun.

When Bill, AA7ZW moved from California to Nevada, he asked me to take over his Thursday net on 28.380 MHz . When I call my net on Thursday, Bill, KB9MJ is the relay for me, and I relay for his net on Friday. Working with Bill has been a great experience. Both nets benefit from working together.

After attending my first 10-10 convention in 2001, I found paper chasing, and now belong to several chapters, so let's exchange a list Hi, Hi. I have met many friends and a lot of great people through this wonderful organization.

And I'll see you on 10 at 10 and remember the 10-10 nets are called every day except Sunday on 28.800 and 28.380. Both nets are called "SIMULTANEOUSLY"

### 6.2 10-10 QSO PARTI ES

10-10 QSO Parties are contests that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Anniversary and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty contests and do have additional rules.

### 6.2.1 WHO IS ELIGI BLE?

Contests are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the contest. Other logs received will be handled as checklogs. Checklogs are used to validate (check) other logs but do not receive awards.

### 6.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTI ES?

There are currently five QSO Parties held through the calendar year:
Winter Phone Contest - held on the first full weekend in February
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Spring CW Contest - held on the first full weekend in May
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Summer Phone Contest - held on the first full weekend in August
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Sprint - a 24 hour contest held on October 10th (10/10)
0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.
Fall CW Contest - held on the last full weekend in October

## 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

### 6.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP or any other similar types of assisted contacts are NOT allowed.
CW Contests should be operated in the CW portion of the 10 meter band and operated using CW and/or any Digital mode (RTTY, PSK, etc).
Phone contests must be operated in the PHONE portion of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved Phone method (SSB, FM, AM).
The SPRINT utilizes both CW and Phone portions of the 10 meter band.
NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during contests using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for noncontest use of the band.

### 6.2.4 ENTRY CLASSI FICATION

Entrant may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:
INDIVIDUAL: includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.
QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire contest.
CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority. The Club must have active 10-10 membership. Club entries must additionally list the call, name and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

### 6.2.5 TRANSMI TTER INFORMATI ON

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the contest, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from only one call district, province, or DX country. Multitransmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

### 6.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10\# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10\#, then record a zero[0] in the log.

### 6.2.7 QSO POI NTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number.
One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number.
Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero[0] for points.
Any log showing $10 \%$ or more errors may be handled as a checklog.
A station may be counted only once regardless of mode.

### 6.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSI GNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose contest operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that chapter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. Contest scores for a sprint may not be assigned.

### 6.2.9 CONTEST ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the contest. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR MAIL to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a checklog. Any logs received more than 15 days after the contest entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded.

### 6.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log, and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9)
or DX Country, Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10\#, number of contacts and points without 10-10\#, and total contacts and points claimed.
LOG must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 1010\# (zero [0] if none), QTH and Contact Point Value.
DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order, or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

### 6.2.9.3 ENTRY DEADLINE

Entries for all contests listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the contest. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on $10 / 10$ ) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October

## 26th. <br> 6.2.10 CONTEST RESULTS AND AWARDS

Contest results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the contest, and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top Individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9) and each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB and CHAPTER.

### 6.2.11 ANNI VERSARY QSO PARTY

This event runs from January 10001 UTC to December 312359 UTC. Entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have 10-10's anniversary year contained in their membership number.
Example: 2002 is the 40th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "40" in their membership number (i.e., 72040, 69405, $64054,40126,00407)$ would count toward the contest. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the contest and promoting the use of the 10 -meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:
During the calendar year (January 1 though December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH, with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.
Contacts must be made on the 10 -meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.) but all contacts must be made direct and unassisted. NO repeater, satellite, or Internet assisted contacts are permitted. The contact mode must be recorded in the log entry.
All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order.
This contest is for Individual entries as described in section 6.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the Top Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the $10-10$ web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following the anniversary contest year entered. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

### 6.2.12 MOBI LE QSO PARTY

This event is held on the third Saturday in March from 0001 to 2359 UTC. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:
Fixed stations contact mobiles, mobiles contact everyone. Mobile applies to vehicular, marine, aeronautical or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the Contest Manager. A station operating a mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit (moving).
Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation.
The contest exchange shall be Call, Name, State, 10-10 Number (if a member, zero(0) if not), and county (if applicable). Only counties in the USA, Canada and England may be used as a multiplier.
Count one point for each contact whether a member or not. Fixed stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked. Mobile stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked PLUS a bonus of the number of counties worked from.
All stations must submit separate logs for the counties worked from. Log scores will be combined by the contest manager.
Logs shall be forwarded to the Contest Scorer as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the contest. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

### 6.2.13 FOR MORE INFORMATI ON

Contest cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing.
