From the office of the **PRESIDENT**

10-10 International

In these times of economic turmoil I thought I would start this column with some good news. Ten-Ten had no money invested with Bernie Madoff! In fact Ten-Ten has no money invested in the Stock Market or any other risky investment. Long ago it became the investment strategy of Ten-Ten that nothing but federally guaranteed Certificate of Deposits, CD's, at various insured Banks and Savings and Loans around the United States was the safest investment for Ten-Ten. I think that during the early days, no one really knew much about stocks, bonds, and mutual funds and didn't want to be the ONE that had to say oops if it turned out to be a bad decision. That investment philosophy is still with us today. Ten-Ten splits its assets into short and long term investments. The long term investments are usually five years and are currently averaging a little less than 5 percent, not bad in today's world. The short term investments can range from Money Market accounts to a six to nine month CD. Ten-Ten also has its checking account and some petty cash to handle the day to day operations. I must point out that while Ten-Ten has sufficient assets the majority of those funds are deferred for Life and multi-years memberships.

Ten-Ten has always encouraged three year membership dues. What is saved on supplies and postage for renewal notices and mailings of membership cards plus the interest earned on the deferred amount is offset by the reduction in dues. Think about it if you don't already take advantage of this benefit.

One last gasp on the economy, today everything is costing more. If you haven't heard, postage in the United States will once again be increased on May 11th. A 1 oz. first-class letter is going up 2 cents to 44 cents, postcards to 28 cents and mailing that 1 oz. letter to a DX location; Mexico - 75 cents; Canada – 75 cents and the rest of the world 98 cents. Mailing the NEWS in the US will go up to 78 cents and to DX it will vary from \$1.15 to \$2.92. Printing and mailing of the NEWS is the single largest expense for Ten-Ten.

TEN-TEN WILL NOT BE RAISING DUES THIS YEAR, NOR IN THE NEAR FUTURE. Eventually, yes, some

time in the future it will have to as expenses will eventually rise above the point we can save. Ten-Ten Officers and Directors are always looking for ways to save. One way is to receive the NEWS electronically, another way is to renew electronically or print your membership card on-line. Today, the 10-10 NEWS is available via electronic delivery, the other two are in the planning and testing phase, and will be announced shortly. The 10-10 NEWS will always be available as a printed copy by post. As we get older we find that they don't make a magnifying glass large enough, or some just like to read the NEWS where a computer is just not practical.

Speaking of the web, last year when it was decided to switch providers it was done because of the lack of functionality and high cost. Ten-Ten lost a function, the list-serve but gained functionality by being able to support a Forum, Chat room and adding a QSL Bureau Inquiry. This past quarter a Ten-Ten Lookup was added, where by call or Ten-Ten number, a search of the database can be made. Also, the 2009 Convention site was added. Mel Sojka, KD5DE, #33513 with the assistance of Floyd Larck, KK3Q, #26039 and the prodding by me has been working on adding a shopping cart to be able to process Convention Registrations, Renewals, New Memberships and eventually a store for Ten-Ten merchandise. This is no easy task. It requires time and a real dedication to get the various tasks completed. By the time this is in the mail the 2009 Convention Registration should be possible via the web. Let's see more use of the Chat Rooms. During a net whether it is a Ten-Ten or a Chapter Net, use the Chat Rooms to see who may be trying to check in and just maybe your antenna needs to be turned or a relay needed.

I am routinely asked why Ten-Ten doesn't use PayPal or any other real time credit processor. Granted it is convenient but there is an inherent problem processing membership that way. During any giving month as Data Manager I receive incomplete New Membership applications, amounts for which I have no idea what service is desired. The best examples that I can remember include the renewal for the ARRL membership included in the request for renewal of Ten-Ten membership; receiving \$33 for membership so as the member could work both US and DX members; and finally, one that occurs quite frequently is a Life member who sends in a renewal. Some of these were charges and other were checks. Using a real-time credit processor would require charge-backs, more

fees and additional hassle.

As poor as band conditions are more than 150 members submitted their results in the Winter Phone QSO Party to Dan Morris, KZ3T, #41015. Some like mine didn't make lots of contacts but others did really well.

If you haven't made your plans yet to come to Orlando, Florida in July, now is the time to do so. It looks like we are going to have a good time meeting and greeting old and new friends. And the way 10 meters continues to display a lack of any meaningful sunspots it could be late 2009 or even early 2010 before propagation finally returns to 10 meters.

An-Ten-Ten-nas

INFORMATION To help you decide On the best Antenna for you

In each issue of the News, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

10-Meter LUV in the Attic


As the sunspots continue to improve band conditions in the new cycle, communications with simple antennas becomes easier. However, modern houses, condominiums, and apartments—and all of the restrictions that go along with them—continue to make the ten-meter operator's job more challenging. In many cases, outdoor antennas are not feasible. In the days of standard construction that goes under names like the ranch, the colonial, or simply the box, the attic was a relatively large usable space for 10-meter (and sometimes larger) wire antennas. However, townhouses and even 1-family residences now have small attic spaces. Evan a large house may have many small attic spaces rather than a single large one. Nevertheless, an attic antenna is possible with a little ingenuity.

Step 1: Analyze Your Space. To see if you can create an attic antenna, you need to take stock of the highest attic or attic-like spaces in your home. Measure the floor space and also measure the maximum available height. We shall look at those dimensions shortly.

Analyzing your space also requires that you take stock of the contents and the construction. The ideal attic is empty except for wood framing and sheathing. Nails and small truss brackets tend to have no effect on 10-meter antennas. However, there are a number of construction techniques—mostly dating from 1970 to the present—that might make a space unusable. For example, metal foil backed insulation between the roofing-framing members above or around where the antenna will go generally marks an unusable are. Some attic spaces are filled with air handlers and metal ductwork. Even foil-wrapped ducts or ducts with a spiral wire support are problems when it comes to attics.

Step 2: Create an Antenna to Fit Your Space. Now let's go back to the dimensions that you carefully recorded. In an attic, we expect a simple antenna, and the simplest of the all is the basic dipole, shown at the top of Fig. 1. A 10-meter dipole is about 200" long or 16-2/3 feet. Allow a foot or so at each end for supports. If the attic space is not 20' long, we have to call on the alphabet for help.

Fig. 1 shows several common simple antennas that we can use out of doors. We can also adapt them to the attic. All of them involve a bit of folding. The total wire lengths will not change much, but the required space to install them will change. Consider the L and inverted-L. In most cases, the inverted-L is better for lower heights such as attic spaces, Either version of the L will lower the feedpoint impedance relative to a dipole, but the results should be usable with coxial cable.




In each sketch, the big dot represents the feedpoint. The Ls only need about 8-9 feet of floor space, but they do require about 9' of vertical space. If the inverted-L is the best choice for the space, bring the feedline down to the ceiling joists at an angle that bisects the angle formed by the wires.

If you have a bit more floor space by not quite as much space to the roof peak, consider the inverted-V. It requires about 12' of floor space, but only a little over 6' of vertical space. Alternatively, you can create an inverted-U. This antenna is simply a dipole with the ends drooped downward to fit the space. The advantage of the inverted-U is that you can keep the wire at the maximum usable height in the attic, and the drooping ends do not come down as far as the legs of the inverted-V. In most attics, you will be able to find room for an L, a U, or a V antenna.

If the attic height will not support even an inverted-V or an inverted-L, then set both legs horizontally. This requires about 9' of floor space and each direction, but lift the antenna as far above the attic floor as possible. The antenna you have created by this move is sometimes called a quadrant antenna.

I have not given precise dimensions for the antenna for a very good reason. Even though non-metallic roofing structures are fairly transparent to RF at 10 meters, the close proximity of the structure will alter the exact length required for a low SWR. So start with an extra 5-10 inches of wire (beyond the general idea that a dipole is about 200" long) and prune to resonance.

Suppose that the insulation above the living-space ceiling has a foil backing. Or perhaps the space between ceiling joists is filled with metal ductwork. Then you may wish to consider a rather standard ground-plane monopole, such as shown in **Fig. 2**. The ground-plane wires will form an effective shield from the metal below the antenna.




The monopole is actually a type of dipole. The lower half is divided into 4 wires arranged symmetrically and horizontally. Hence, the radiation from these legs self-cancels. The effective radiation comes from the upper vertical leg. Normally, this leg is about half the length of a dipole. In an at6tic, you can use wire and hang it from the peak of the roof.

If you roof height will not support a full vertical leg for the monopole, you have two main choices. First, you can bend over the top of the vertical without harming performance by any detectable amount. Alternatively, you can shorten the vertical section and elongate the radials. Like the earlier antennas we have discussed, the presence of the wood structure and other attic "stuff" will require that you start long and prune to resonance or minimum SWR. If you have the space, droop the radials for a better match to your coaxial cable. If you end up just a bit shy on the floor space, bend the ends of the radials. It is useful to maintain symmetry by bending each radial end by the same amount and in the same direction.

We can alter the structure of the vertical monopole within limits but with relative impunity. In fact, we can do the same for the inverted-L, as suggested by **Fig. 3**. The normal version has the feedpoint in the corner, which is also the center of the total length of wire. Since the inverted-L is simply a modified dipole, we can move the feedpoint up to plus or minus 10% from center and still obtain just about the same feedpoint impedance and performance. So we may use either of the two indicated feedpoint position (corner or wire-length center) shown in the sketch on the right.

The modified inverted-L may allow you to fit the antenna into the available space. In fact, that is the main message of these notes. Do not be afraid to modify the basic dipole to fit the space. An inverted-V should have an included angle of at least 90 degreesmore if possible. The inverted-U should be 70% of the length of a full size dipole or more, if fessible. At 10 meters, you should be able to fit at least one of these antennas in your attic space.

Step 3: Guard Against Common-Mode Currents. All of the attic



All of the antennas are in close proximity to materials that may be slightly conductive. Even wood is a semiconductor unless very dry. One result of the combination of antenna designs and environmental factors is the strong potential for the braid of the coax to carry common-mode currents down to the station and into other wiring in the house.

The best protection is a choke installed at the feedpoint.

Other antennas involve routing the cable at angle between wires.

The best protection is a choke installed at the feedpoint. Perhaps the best device to attenuate common-mode currents is the ferrite bead choke, some referred to as the W2DU choke or balun. We do not need balun (balanced-to-unbalance) effects as much as we need the protection from common mode currents, so the choking effect is most important. For any of these (and other) attic installations, installing a ferrite bead choke is normally very effective. You can find inexpensive kits or finished chokes through the Wireman of South Carolina at perhaps the lowest prices—even though the units use the materials originally specified by Walt Maxwell, W2DU. The same design is available from other sources as well.

Step 4: Begin with Available Materials. An attic antenna is free of nearly all of the weather conditions that tend to ruin antennas out of doors. About the only weathering experienced by an attic antenna is a wide range of temperatures. As a result, you can use almost any material for the antenna legs, so long as it is highly conductive, non-magnetic, and able to support its own weight in the attic.

Among the good materials is house wiring. House wiring uses AWG #12 wires in an insulating sheath. A 10' section of scrap house wiring—when pulled apart, gives you two insulated legs for a dipole or one of the lettered variation. AWG #14 will work as well. If you have a bunch of stranded wire, it will also work. You can also use old section of TV lead-in. Cut the sections and simple solder or twist the ends together to simulate a fatter wire than the AWG #20 conductors typical of TV twin-lead.

Equally usable are sections of aluminum stock, whatever its profile. L-stock, channel-stock, square stock, and strapping will all work for attic antennas. Because these materials are usually self-supporting, the installation may be simpler, since you may not need insulators and rope as a wire element might require.

Holding the antenna in place will require that you analyze your own attic and the best means of support. In all cases, use non-conductive materials for the support work. For this wire, a simple set of loops from the dipole ends to the rope that goes to a rafter may work well. For a rigid element, you can run ropes from the roof peak down to the element. You can support a vertical monopole with a short rope and a pair of loops—one on the monopole and one on the rope.

I shall not try to give any guidance on routing the feedline to from the antenna down to the station. There are too many variations in their relative positions to be able to say anything useful.

An attic antenna may not be as good as an outdoor antenna, but it can be quite effective if the attic is not enclosed with metal. In most cases, it will outperform a mobile antenna and allow indoor 10-meter operation in all kinds of weather. When the sunspots are favorable, it will do a very good job.

The best attic antenna is one that combines careful analysis of the available attic space, careful installation, and not much money at all.



This issue is dedicated to **Jim Smith VK9NS** #47404 who was my DX friend and a first class gentleman. Jim held the ARRL Number One Honor Roll for DXCC having worked all countries on SSB. Jim got into amateur radio at age 18 in 1947 and he was on the air until he passed away on February 10, 2009 after a short illness at the age of 80.

I invited Jim to join 10-10 and he accepted my offer just before he went on one of his South Pacific trips in late 1988. I heard him work his ten needed 10-10 members and I sent in his application for membership. A few days later, I passed his newly assigned number 47404, to him over the air to be the first to exchange numbers with him.

I met Jim for the first time in 1983 at Dayton where he was taking in one of the DX forums. He was a popular guy since he was going places that people needed for DXCC. He had a great Scottish accent so I had to listen closely to pick up everything but he knew his facts and had first hand knowledge about the DX world that I was interested in learning.

Most times when I needed to talk with Jim he was on the 14.222 MHZ Heard Island DX net and over the years we got to recognize each other's voice. Jim and his wife Kirsti VK9NL, were the first om/yl team to go to Heard Island and operate from this rare place in 1983. They barely made it back home because their boat had engine trouble in the Indian Ocean on the return trip home.

In April 1986 Jim was inducted into the CQ DX Hall of Fame. Jim's last project was writing an autobiography, "The Old Timer" http://www.jimkirsti.com/books.html . Propagation: Propagation continues to be poor as the Cycle 24 strains to begin in 2009. The lowest solar flux reading was in August 2008 but it has been many months since solar conditions have hit bottom.

Expect the daily solar flux to range from **71-85** the next quarter. **On March 9**th **the solar flux was 69 the A index 1 and K index 0** which is the same as the last nine months. X-ray emissions from the sun have not improved and the flux remains flat with a small chance of a storm or flare which will increase the flux when active.

Expect the best conditions on April 20-22th, May 17-19th and June 20-23th. Over the next three months, for USA stations, expect a 15% chance of DX in the mornings to Asia, Europe or Africa and a 20% chance into South America or the Pacific in the afternoon. To tell what DX paths are open, use the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).

10 Meter Apartment Portable in San Francisco

I spent a week in San Francisco during mid-July 2008 in a training class. I was fortunate to stay on the 5th floor of a coop apartment just one block from Aquatic Park with a beautiful view looking north at the San Francisco Bay. Since the apartment's owners were not home that week, I was able (and had permission) to set up a portable amateur radio station. I brought my aging but still operable Midland 13-510A, a 2 meter synthesized transceiver (the rig's label listed its year of manufacture as 1977, the same year I was first licensed as WB3GYL) and my Radio Shack HTX-10 SSB/AM/FM (but not CW) 10 meter transceiver. Both rigs boast 25 watts as their maximum RF output but I hoped to work much farther than the San Francisco bay area with the HTX-10 on SSB.

For a 10 meter antenna, I used a K-40 mobile whip on its factory magnetic mount outside on the balcony railing. This did not provide much of a ground plane but it would have to

do. I had bought the antenna new in 1984 and it has performed well during my infrequent but productive 10 meter mobile operations.

I found the "calling frequency" on 28.400 as quite useful when the band was open. When I was issued my 10-10 number 22509 in January 1979 (as WB3GYL and later N3APS in my native state of Maryland), there was no specific calling frequency and no voice operations were permitted below 28.500 until March 21, 1987 when 28.300 to 28.500 was opened as part of the expansion of novice (and technician) license privileges. I had neglected to bring a list of 10 meter CW beacons which would have provided good intelligence on where the band was (or wasn't) open to.

I was usually back in the apartment by 6pm and lucked out on July 8 and July 11 where I enjoyed band openings to the north and east. I worked stations in Oregon, Washington, British Columbia, Arizona and Utah. I heard stations in Michigan and Mexico but they couldn't hear me. My own makeshift antenna was outdone by W7SWC in Seattle, Washington. Byron QSO'd me with his Icom IC-756 Pro II connected to an INDOOR doublet antenna.

One of my favorite QSOs during this portable operation was with W7GQE of Legrande, Oregon. I enjoyed hearing John talk about the treasure trove of 10 meter transceivers he has in his shack. W7GQE QSO'd me with a Spartan-Courier 11 meter transceiver which he had converted to 10 meters. Another station I worked which had a collection of "single band" rigs was N7MZ. He worked me on his lcom IC-765 but also had a Uniden HR-2600. The 10 meter-only Uniden transceivers (and their Radio Shack cousins) appeared on the market shortly after novices and technicians were authorized SSB on a portion of 10 meters in early 1987. As single band rigs, they eventually lost their popularity when propagation subsided. Several of these rigs became popular with outlaw radio operators who figured out how to re-tune them for operation on frequencies below the 10 meter amateur band. The HTX-10, though, has a PLL chip which makes the rig immune to such electronic lawlessness.

My HTX-10 repeatedly received excellent audio reports. N7MZ remarked that is "sounded like a \$10,000 Icom rig." Its stock Radio Shack microphone is not much larger than an Oreo® cookie and doesn't have the look or feel of something much more expensive...but its performance belies its appearance. I have not modified this rig and don't plan to...I had thought about adding a tone encoder for repeater operation but a new multi-band FM mobile rig in my personal vehicle eliminated this need. There is a modification available to add the CW mode (the absence of this mode leads me to conclude the HTX-10 was made for "no-code" licensees) and I may consider "codifying" my rig in the future...especially when (and if) propagation improves.

One minor disappointment during my operation was the lack of 10-10 members on the air. When I first signed on 10 meter SSB as a new general class licensee in December 1978, it seemed like every station I worked had a 10-10 number and as a result I was in a hurry to get mine. During my portable operation, I made 17 QSOs outside California but only 3 of them were with 10-10 members. When propagation hopefully improves, I expect more 10-10 members will get 10 meters and also encourage non-members on the band to join 10-10.



TEN-TEN QSO **PARTY RULES**

6.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties The Anniversary, Meet the Volunteers, and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules.

6.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event. Other logs received will be handled as checklogs. Checklogs are used to validate (check) other logs but do not receive awards.

6.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently seven QSO Parties held through the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring - held on the first full weekend in May.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday

Spring Digital - held on the first full weekend in May.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10).

0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the last full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the last full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

6.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRPL or any other similar types of assisted contacts are NOT allowed.

Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW, QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM).

The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band.

NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band

6.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrant may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:

INDIVIDUAL: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority. The club must have active 10-10 membership. Club entries must additionally list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators entering under a club entry an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

6.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

6.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10 # and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number.

One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number.

Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points.

Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a checklog.

A station may be counted only once regardless of mode.

6.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

6.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a checklog. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded.

6.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log, and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country, Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points

LOG must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value.

DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order, or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

6.2.9.3 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, than the postmark deadline shall be October 26th. 6.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event, and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top Individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9) and each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB and CHAPTER.

6.2.11 ANNIVERSARY QSO PARTY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC.

In the Anniversary QSO Party, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have 10-10's anniversary year contained in their membership number.

Example: 2008 is the 46th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "46" in their membership number (i.e., 72046, 69465, 64654, 46126, 00467) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.

In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact.

In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.).

All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contracted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order.

These events are for Individual entries as described in section 6.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs shall be forward to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked ne later than January 15th of the year following the Anniversary QSO Party year entered. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

6.2.12 MOBILE QSO PARTY

This event is held on the third Saturday in March from 0001 to 2359 UTC. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

Fixed station contact mobiles, mobiles contact everyone. Mobile applies to vehicular, marine, aeronautical or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the QSO Party Manager. A station operating a mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit (moving).

Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation

The on-the-air exchange shall be Call, Name, State, 10-10 Number (if member, zero (0) if not), and county (if applicable). Only counties in the USA, Canada and England may be used as a multiplier.

Count one point for each contact whether a member or not. Fixed stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked. Fixed Score equal number of contacts times number of counties worked. Mobile stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked PLUS a bonus of the number of counties worked from. Score equal (number of contacts) times (counties worked plus counties worked from).

All stations must submit separate logs for the counties worked from. Log scores will be combined by the QSO Party Manager. Here is an example of how scoring is done for each country worked from using the following numbers

Contacts made: 7 Counties worked: 5 Counties worked from: 3 Multiplier-Add counties worked and counties worked from (5+3=8) Score for county: 7X8=56.

Do this computation for each county worked from. If scores from the other two counties

worked from were 64 an 90 then the total score would be (56+94+90)=210. Logs shall be forward to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the event. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license **MUST** authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 on ten meters and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 below.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 below.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club Membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Club members have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except clubs do not vote in elections.

WinIQ

WinIQ is a Windows based program that is updated monthly and is a cross reference between the call and 10-10 number. It can be found on the 10-10 web.

XXIP

XXIP is a DOS based program that is updated monthly and is a roster of 10-10 membership through 10-10 #75001. It is available free at www.lingerinc.com.

AN-TEN-TEN-NAS

AN-TEN-TEN-NAS is a book by L. B. Cebik containing 30 articles and designs for 10 meter antennas from the pages of the 10-10 NEWS. The price has been drastically reduced to \$5.00 USD or free if you renew for 3 years. You must also include the additional \$5.00 US or \$8.00 DX for shipping.


