I have been re-reading some of the Ten-Ten newsletters and was struck by your comments regarding the quality of amateur radio in the Winter 2015 edition. My brother has been licensed since the late 60s. Over the years, he has frequently commented on projects he was working on, helping others learn the hobby and how he appreciated the self policing aspect of the amateur community. It was his enthusiasm that attracted me to the hobby and I was finally licensed in 2006. In the past 10 years I have worked with 3 local clubs and found they all have some things in common. All 3 clubs were mostly talk with little action, the clubs advertised themselves as service groups, and all had few members who were truly active but many members complained about other people on the air. If you want things to improve, then you need to take an active role by mentoring, teaching, and correcting those whose work is not up to acceptable standards. As a licensed engineer for 30 years, I have taken an active role to teach new graduates how things are really done and helping all my associates maintain quality in their work. It has made a difference in every office I have worked.

So, I ask you and every other Amateur Radio operator out there When was the last time you took a moment to offer encouragement, advice, or gentle correction to another operator? I am limited to the number of words I can put in my article, but I and others could fill the News with positive comments concerning Cliff. Chapters are a vital component in the structure of 10-10. During the downside of a solar cycle, chapter activity keeps the band alive at the local level. This is our primary purpose, to promote activity on ten meters. Words can't express the gratitude that should be extended to K5FBS for his service. In this case the term Thank You is far too shallow.

Jim Fox, KA0ZPP #43428 has been selected to replace Cliff. Jim and Stephanie are both life members, having retired in Min. have relocated to NM. They enjoy travel as their current vocation. Stephanie KA0ZIA #44303 has been on the volunteer list since 2011 and with their combined paper chasing experience are well qualified for the task at hand.

I have mentioned several times over the past five years the need for younger volunteers and officials in 10-10. Occupations normally make this nearly impossible. A program created to cater to the young may be the answer. The Scouts on Ten program will open the doors to the young and young at heart. By design the program is open ended. Endorsements, activities, and special events will be managed by the award and certificate managers of the program. The award manager will normally be a current scout when they take office. If it is a Boy Scout, they would be an Eagle Scout and in the event of a Girl Scout, they would have earned the Golden Award.

This program is unique in nature; it resembles both a chapter and official award. Endorsements and upgrades can develop as the award matures. The Scout

number is included in the 10-10 database as an official designator not unlike the VP number. Collection of this number is already incorporated in the Win 1010 software. Bar awards for this are only the start. Local nets, qso parties, and diy projects are easily imagined. With nearly 5,000,000 Scouts, the potential is far beyond normal.

2016 is election year for 10-10. In 2014 it was moved that the number of Directors be reduced to 6. The Director with the planning responsibility is no longer necessary with the removal of the convention effort. It was the desire of the BOD to make the Internet Director an official position. Officials are selected by the board and under the authority of the same. The increased importance of social media and the web presence demands the full attention of 10-10. This year's ballot will contain the President, Vice President, Secretary, and 3 Directors. If you have been a current member for the past 4 years and will commit to membership for the full term of your desired office, I encourage you to contact N0TW for the nomination forms. Due to the ages of the majority of the current Officers we do need some younger leadership.

Our editor AJ7B has raised the bar when it comes to newsletters. Randy seeks new content for each issue. Since I continue to build qrp transceivers I may get brave and submit my 10 meter pixie. I just don't know how many of our members would be interested in a rock bound 10-meter cw transceiver with ¼ watt out. With the presence of the \$4 eBay 40 meter kits, one can now with a few mods build a working rig for less than the cost of a good lunch. Yes you can make contacts at that power level and for the big guns there are mods to get the power all the way up to one watt.

The mention of CW brings an issue of controversy. In the spring of this year, a couple of our senior members asked that the definition of a Legal Exchange be modified for CW contacts. This rapidly expanded to the removal of the number exchange during Contests, Dxpeditions, and while mobile. Our trademark is the 10-10 number. Without the on-air exchange, our membership cannot grow and our unique identity will fade into the crowd. In the area of CW, as a CW operator I pride myself in the ability to copy and send. More characters just increases the challenge. It's true that my tone deafness limits me, but that only increases the challenge. While mobile, I use a digital voice recorder which eliminates the need for pencil and paper. These devices are inexpensive and work quite well. On several DX outings I have asked and received numbers from participants. I believe others have had the same success. At least one of our members has worked 300 countries with a 10-10 exchange. One of our officers is making a study on a method to claim the contacts without interfering with the event. We are not the only group that requires membership number exchanges. Removing the 10-10 number exchange requirement would be like asking a local fast food establishment to take down those golden arches.

A little bit of background on me:

A boyhood friend and I studied for our novice ticket back in the late 1950s, but in those days, novice was a single year license. Since we lived in mid-state Illinois, even taking the license exam meant a trip to the FCC office in either Chicago or St. Louis. For a number of reasons, neither of us completed a license at that time.

Fast forward three decades. My wife Stephanie, KA0ZIA (#44303), got her novice license when an Extra with whom she worked gave a series of novice classes during lunchtime. Once licensed, she was hesitant to pursue the cost of operating, so I agreed to renew my prior interest and, using her study manual, passed the written exam and was able to get through the 5 wpm CW test. Thus, we were both licensed in 1987.

Once on the air, just after novices were granted phone privileges on 10 meters, we came across a local net in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area, and discovered Ten-Ten. Before long, we had our own 10-10 numbers, and were members of the local Sky Blue Waters Chapter. But what were these things called "lists"? It did not take us long to become dedicated paper chasers.

Eventually, we both upgraded to general class, and I went on to extra, but only after the 20 wpm code requirement was dropped. We attended several of the biannual Ten-Ten conventions, and around 2000, we assumed operation of the Sky Blue Waters and Tin Lizzie chapters that were run out of our area. Several of the past chapter officials had either become SK, or moved, or just wanted out. I became Chapter Head and Stephanie became (and still is) Certificate Manager. Then, when we moved to New Mexico in 2009, I turned over the Chapter Head to Brad, K0DBK, who now runs those chapters along with his Twin Cities chapter.

QSL Bureau News

There are still a large number of unclaimed QSL cards at the QSL Bureau. If you are not certain that you have SASEs on file or if you wonder if you have any QSLs at the bureau, go to the 10-10 website and look for the tab labeled "RESOURCES". Under that is a tab for "QSL BUREAU". On the QSL Bureau page (near the bottom) is a box that if you type in your or any other member's call-sign will tell you the number of cards and envelopes that are on file for that station at the bureau.

Before you go to all the trouble of filling out QSLs to send to the bureau, it is a good idea to check and see if those stations have SASEs at the bureau. Otherwise the cards just sit at the bureau with no way to deliver them to their owners.

You do not have to be a "paid up" member to use the bureau. It is open for any amateur who has a 10-10 number. Also, the ham that you are sending a QSL to must also have a 10-10 member. You can actually make QSOs with other 10-10 members on bands other than 10 meters and still use the bureau.

Welcome to the 2015 Winter DX season for another adventure into the world of 10-10 DX. I hope all of you are ready for the ARRL Ten Meter contest in twelve days. The predicted solar flux for the contest is a flux of 115 with an A index of 8. You can operate both CW and SSB in your search for DX. Band conditions are expected to be below average this year but I do expect more than 135 countries/entities will be spotted on Ten using the packet clusters even with a solar flux of 115. It is always hard to coax a 10-10 number out of some operators in this contest but good luck with your search. I introduced you to a website named www.bandconditions.com in my last article. This website made a major change by removing all Ten Meter info. So, I am now recommending using a site called: https://www.hamqsl.com/solar1.html!

The 10-10 QSO parties this past quarter allowed us to talk into Europe and Africa for the first time in six months. The CW and Digi parties were a busts for me as I had a conflict one weekend, and I had an equipment problem and could not send a Digi signal! I worked the 10-10 Sprint contest on SSB and my club station got a first place certificate. The CQ DX CW contest at the end of November, had some excitement. Propagation: I expect the solar flux to range from 88-117 this next quarter, which is a slight reduction from the past six months. The Winter solstice is on December 23rd and propagation will allow signals to reach farther east for the USA but expect to loose Europe by March 2016.

On December 1st the solar flux was 97, the A index was 19 and K index 2. The high solar flux in October was only 125. In the next four months, look for the best conditions: December 8-13th, 2016 January 4-9th, February 1-5th, 28-29th, March 26-30th. For USA stations, expect a 35% chance of DX to Europe or Asia, for S. America and the S. Pacific, look later in the day or just at sundown. Listen to the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200) so you will know which direction a beacon is coming from and where the DX path is open to.

MOZAMBIQUE DXHOLIDAY 2015

Mozambique sounded so exotic to my wife Joan and me, we decided to pursue going there for our next DxHoliday. We have had such a good time on other DxHolidays. Palau was our first, followed annually for a week two years in a row in Swaziland, Lesotho and Botswana.

I contacted Andre VanWyn, NJ0F, who had organized my past DxHolidays in Africa. Andre is originally from South Africa and has traveled extensively throughout the continent. He had not operated from Mozambique for many years so he thought it would be a good idea. We started to work on the project in 2013. We were originally to go to Mozambique in 2014 buy my aortic valve needed an emergency replacement. That was followed by a ruptured diverticulum, two abdominal surgeries and a colostomy for 4 months.

Andre contacted the Mozambique equivalent of our FCC and obtained my license, C81AK, in 2013. So that was not a problem. Moving forward he then contacted the lodge where we were scheduled to stay, Tenda Tora, in Beline, Mozambique. They were kind enough to credit what we had paid in 2014 (with a little extra, HiHi).

Next we contacted our travel agent at Travelstore, Karen Goodrich, and Karen arranged our flights to Mozambique and our stay in Leopard Hills, South Africa. Leopard Hills Game reserve is right outside the boundaries of Kruger National Park and has been our safari destination for 12 years.

We left for San Francisco on Wednesday August 19th. After a short layover we flew to Frankfurt, which is my favorite stopping point in Europe. After an 8-hour layover we were off to Johannesburg South Africa. Total time getting from Los Angeles to Jo'burg is 36 hours.

We've stayed at the Intercontinental Hotel in the airport for many years. It is a 5-star hotel with an excellent dining room. The next morning we were off to Maputo, Mozambique. Andre and his XYL, Magda, met us at the airport and after clearing immigration (which always is a lengthy process in Africa) we were on our way to the lodge, a 4-hour ride through the worst traffic I have ever seen..

The coaxial cables were lost in transit but did arrive at the same time we did. Andre, Magda (a ham's daughter), their son AJ (N0CDX) and 6 or 7 locals put up the antennae that evening while I sat on the porch and "supervised." The equipment consisted of an ICOM 7410 transceiver with a Acom 600S amplifier. The antenna was a K4KIO 5-band Hex beam at about 25 feet. I used a Heil headset with foot pedal.

The lodge didn't look much like the internet web site but it was more than adequate for the radio.

Over the next 7 and a half days I had 1,239 contacts from every continent except the Antarctic. Propagation was mostly poor and it seemed like every QSO was like pulling teeth. Most signals were 5/5 and the pile ups were a steady drone. I called CQ North America several times each day and had few contacts until the final night when conditions improved and I worked about 50 US and Canadian stations. I was able to contact Danny, W4DAN for a short QSO.

While I was on the radio Andre, Magda, AJ, and Joani would explore the surroundings. We had internet most of the time and Andre would spot me on the DX summit, which was a big help. I was usually on the air from 8 A.M. to about 9:30 P.M. when the bands closed down. I did take a break for breakfast but the rest of my meals were in our lodge.

We pulled the antennae down early the morning of August 29th and Andre packed everything away in the car. Then back to Maputo and our flight to Jo'burg. Despite the poor propagation I feel that the DxHoliday was a huge success and as of now, we're planning a return trip in 2016. However, Andre has mentioned Madagascar. We'll see.

Members not selected by the committee may petition for candidacy by having a petition signed by 50 full members and presented to the Secretary by July 1, 2016. A nomination information form is required and is available from the Nominations Committee Chairperson. QUALIFICATION FOR NOMINATION TO BE AN OFFICER OR DIRECTOR OF 10-10

In accord with the bylaws, no member of 10-10 may qualify for nomination to be an Officer or Director of 10-10 unless he or she has been a full member for more than four (4) years immediately preceding his/her Nomination, and that he/she can show that their membership will remain current during the period of the office they are seeking. The Nominating Committee or Petition for Candidacy are the only methods to be used by members who wish to be nominated.

SELECTION BY THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee is charged with the task of selecting from those who indicate a desire or willingness to serve as an Officer or Director and to form a slate of candidates who the committee believes represent the best qualified candidates from information submitted to the Committee.

PETITION FOR CANDIDACY

Members and nominees not selected by the nominating committee may petition for candidacy. Such petitions shall be signed by 50 full members and submitted to the Secretary by July 1, 2016.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

All Candidates, whether selected by the Nominating Committee or by Petition, must submit a biographical information form and biographical sketch. The Nominating Committee will use this information in the process of selecting a slate of Candidates. Those who petition for nomination must submit a biographical information form to be provided by and returned to the Secretary. This biographical outline, not to exceed 200 words of narrative, shall be printed in the July 2016 issue of the 10-10 News.

NOTIFICATION OF POTENTIAL NOMINEES

The chair of the Nominating Committee shall notify members selected by the Nominating Committee to be candidates in writing. The chair of the Nominating Committee shall also notify, in writing on or before June 1, 2016, members who are not selected by the nominating committee, and inform them of the proper method of placing their names in nomination by petition.

WHAT YOU CAN DO WITH YOUR 10-10 NUMBER

Hello, I'm WM2W Marilyn and have talked to many 10-10ers on Wednesdays on the 10-10 International Net on 28.380 MHz at 18:00 UTC. Some of you with 10-10# may be wondering, what's next? When you have made 100 contacts on the 10 meter band you can submit an application for the 100 bar award. The daily net is a great place to start making those contacts, but you can also check-in to any of the chapter nets listed on the www.10-10.org website under Chapters, Chapter Nets. Chapters are always glad to have new check-ins and stations will be especially happy to make contacts with someone with a new 10-10#. They will treat you like rare DX!. You can also just get on 10meters and call CQ CQ 10-10. Keep a log of your 10-10 contacts with their 10-10# and you will soon have 100 for a bar award. If you have already started collecting 10-10#, please dig out the new ones and send them in for additional bar awards. Recently a French station sent in over 2000 contacts for bars 2700-4800. It had been over 20 years since his last award, but we have great records and were able to verify his prior awards. Please don't wait years though. It's easier for everybody if you send in 100 at a time. If you are working for bars 100-900 send your contacts to Dan Morris KZ3T. If you are working on bars 1000+ send your contacts to Marilyn Webb WM2W (KK4HHL.). Again this information is on the 10-10 website under Activity, Awards. We keep all records electronically now so please make your submissions by e-mail.

Another question you may have from listening to the 10-10 nets is, What is the VP number some of the stations give during check-in? The VP is another award you can earn through 10-10 by collecting 500 contacts. Once you have a VP number you start collecting the 10-10#s that have a VP# again. Increments of 100 will earn a VP bar award. There are lots of other 10-10 awards, e.g. Worked All Continents, and OM/XYL. Old Man/Young Lady is an award for working both members of a married team where both have 10-10#. Check out Activity,

Awards for a list of all award requirements.

All this number collecting brings up to a very important tip. You can buy excellent 10-10 logging software from jim@hds.net. His website is www. win1010 where you can download the win1010 3.5b suite which includes a logging program for bar awards, other 10-10 awards and contesting. You may use any logging program you like, but this program is easy to use for keeping track of 10-10# and for submitting them for awards. A side benefit is that many 10-10ers use the software and are willing to help you learn to use it efficiently.

Ah Contesting. It's another great way to earn awards and collect 10-10 numbers. Did you know that the software mentioned above will easily keep a contest log and import it into the awards part of the software to add all those 10-10#s you got during the contest to your list of contacts for bar awards?

Contesting is fun. You don't have to win (it's hard to beat some of the excellent, experienced contest stations,) but if you make 100 or 50 or 25 contacts you are bound to pick up some new 10-10 numbers.

Chapter Nets is another whole area of 10-10 activity. Maybe there will be an article on them soon.

One more tip I'd like to pass along. The www.10-10.org website is excellent. You can read important information by going there. If you log in, however, more information becomes available. Under Members, Member Lookup you can look up any call sign and learn his 10-10#, name, address, e-mail, etc. Under Members, Individual Awards you can look up your own records of awards earned. There is information from the past 20 years approximately on the site. If your records go farther back than that, contact me and I'll help you if I can

TEN-TEN INTERNATIONAL VP PROGRAM

What is the VP program and how do you become a VP? These are two popular questions that are asked by most all new members. First, I will cover how to become a VP. There are many 10-10 awards that a new member can pursue and one of them is the VP Certificate. Bar Awards are issued for every 100 contacts collected and sent in to the Bar Manager. Once a member obtains his/her 500 Bar Award they are automatically assigned an honorary VP number and become a member of the "International 500 of the world club." Once a member obtains his/her VP number they are then eligible to start collecting VP numbers toward a VP Bar Award Program. It works similar to the basic bar award program in that one must collect 100 at a time and submit to the VP Manager for VP bar awards. That really is all there is to it! Very easy to do as long as the 10 meter band cooperates with us.

How did the VP Program get started? Now, this is a bit tougher to answer. I took the Bar Awards/VP/Lucky 13 program over in 1998. A number of changes have occurred since then. Most of those changes have been cosmetic by implementing an E-Bar Award which replaced the printed one and from 99.9% of the members, they like it much better. The VP Certificate has remained pretty much the same as when I took over. I also implemented the E-VP Certificate and the E-Lucky 13 Certificate. All are sent via email in PDF format. When I assumed these duties there was virtually no information about the VP program other than how to become a VP. No historical data at all! I guess with the progression of passing the responsibilities from one person to another over many years the historical data either was not kept up or lost along the way. I checked the Newsletter/Bulletin archives that were issued and tried to find as much information I could about the program and how it got started. From what I can decipher Frank Orcutt, W4JO, 10-10# 386 was the Founder of the VP program and it started May 5, 1971. What you may find interesting is, it started out as a 100% AM group eventually changing over to SSB. The main frequency was 28.800 later changed to 28.600 using SSB. It was known over the air as the 'VP Club.' Evidently they held annual VP contests starting in 1971. In a 1975 VP bulletin put out by W4JO, he mentioned that the annual VP contests were so popular they were going to continue them indefinitely. It was also mentioned for VP-100 applications that each VP contact listed in the application was made in a "VP Region" of the band between 28.500 and 28.550. I could not find when this started nor could I find when it ended and/or changed. Neither could I find when the VP annual contests terminated. The VP Program back then was separate, financially from the 10-10 organization, although it was a part of 10-10. Back then, each call area had their own Bar/VP Managers. Frank Orcutt passed away in January 1979 and I think the VP contests may have ended somewhere around that time frame. Nothing more mentioned about them that I could find. I do know that at least up until 1986 or 1987 time frame the Bar/VP Managers were still separated. So, each call area assigned the 10-10/VP numbers. If I'm not mistaken a group of numbers was given to each of those managers from someone who kept up with the main database.

So, there you have it. A brief explanation as to how to obtain a VP number and a short but somewhat limited explanation as to how the VP Program got started. If there is anyone out there that may have any additional information, please send me an email. Also, I have the Master VP Database and I have been trying to fill in many dates of issue that are missing. If anyone has a VP number less than VP#2000 and knows your date of issue, please let me know. Thank you.



THE WIN10-10 STORY

I saw the CT and NA Contest programs demonstrated by K1EA and K8CC at the 1990 Dayton HamVention. These contest programs cover many different contests, but not the 10-10 QSO Parties. After purchasing and using these programs – being an avid 10-10 contester also – I knew that I had to use a similar contest program for the 10-10 contests. Writing to the authors of these programs inquiring about the possible 10-10 addition revealed that they had no intentions of including the 10-10 contests. Since I could find no other program to satisfy my needs, I began to write the DOS-based K4HAV 10-10 Contest Program and first used the program during the 10-10 1990 Summer QSO Party Contest. After the beta test in the contest, it was put on the market.

When 10-10 International announced the new County Hunters Award, the K4HAV 10-10 County Hunter Program was introduced at the 1991 10-10 National Convention in Arlington, Texas. To aid county hunters a new program was introduced in 1992 -- the Zip Code/County Add-On Package. In 1993, the 10-10 Contest Program was modified to use a Sound Blaster card as a voice kever and the 1010SB Contest Program was born. Most of the features in the DOS-based Zip Code/County program were included in the Windows FCC Search Program developed later.

Later in 1998, the Contest and County Hunter programs were rewritten to be a Windows program. Then in 1999, the Daily Log and Certificate Chaser programs were added. All four programs are in a single package called the Win1010 Suite. Since some users were only interested in the Contest Program, the Win1010 program is sold in two parts or if both parts are purchased at the same time, a \$10 discount applies.

The Daily Log program was written to satisfy many requests for a general purpose logging program. There are various options that can be used with the Daily Log. One that is popular is that when a call is entered into the Daily Log, the program will check the County Hunter and if it is a new 10X, VP, County, DX Country, etc., it will automatically be exported and added into the County Hunter data file. Several users did not use this at first and later wished they had. To solve that situation, a routine triggered by hitting the Daily Log F8 key will compare the Daily Log with the County Hunter and find all the "new ones" that need to be imported into the County Hunter. An option exists to make a test run first without anything being transferred.

I have never won a 10-10 QSO Contest while using the 1010 Contest Program, but looking at the top scores from previous years will indicate that 3 or 4 of the top scorers are normally Win10-10 users. Back in the early 1990's when propagation was really good, one of the early DOS 1010 Contest users (N7TT) scored two of the all-time high scores with 2003 and 1817 QSO's during the SSB QSO Parties.

However, I did manage a world-wide top score in the early 1980's in one of the Phone QSO Parties. That was back in the days when I really went out for the contests. I ran maximum power to a 5 element monobander up 72 feet. That was before the contest software, but I did have a 'helper'. I had converted an eight-track tape player to have a choice of four audio messages to call CQ, give exchanges, etc. That was a real voice saver This led to using a Sound Blaster card as a voice keyer with the DOS version 1010 Contest Program as was mentioned above.

The Contest Program was designed to make operating more fun and to take the pain out of manually filling out the log and dupesheet. The Contest program contains a 'Contest Database' which is a collection of various user's old contest logs. At present there are almost 16,000 calls in the database. When a call or 10-10 number is entered into the Call field, the Contest Database is searched and the info is automatically entered to allow the user to confirm the info. This saves time entering each record and greatly speeds up the flow of the contest. I always get a thrill replying to a calling contester and calling him by his name. I often got comments on my remembering many of the names.

Not being a Certificate Chaser myself, I had to depend on some existing paperchasers for suggestions and testing, who made up my Beta testers. There were many that contributed, but Dick, NC6V and Paul, WB6SNW (both are SK now) went the extra mile with their help. I also had help from Don. KB0ON. (also now SK) the author of the DOS DBTEN paperchaser program, which was widely used, but had limitations due to the DOS programming. The K4HAV Certificate Chaser has import routines to bring in the DBTEN data and keep from having to re-enter.

In 2002, an addition to the Certificate Chaser program was the ML-List routine. ML stands for "My List". When users swapped a paper list, it was a chore to manually update each record. So, why not let the computer do it for you? The Certificate Chaser has a ML routine that would create a computer list called the ML-List that could be emailed between paperchasers and could be imported into the Certificate Chaser in a second or two. If a Certificate Chaser user had a friend not using a computer and had his 'list' in his computer, he could also generate a ML-List for his friend to exchange. There was also a small standalone MLList program written which could be used if you were not a Win1010 user.

As new contests were added, support for these new contests was added to the Contest Program. In the early days of 10-10 Contesting, it was always a chore to copy your paper log and to create a dupesheet. Now after the contest, the Contest Program will create a Cabrillo ASCII log and dupesheet for submission via email. When new Awards were created, they were also added to the County Hunter Program.

Also used in the various Win1010 modules is the large FCC Amateur Radio Database that I convert and update on my web page every Sunday. This FCC database can be searched and the results displayed within each of the Win1010 modules. This is basically the same info you can get on the QRZ.Com web page, but is available within the Win1010 programs. This info includes the distance and the beam heading to the station, the name, address, county, and Grid Square. A basic stand-alone FCC call search program is included in the Win1010 package, but for a small registration fee, advanced features are unlocked. One interesting 'Search' is the 'Name' search. I found that there are 237 hams with my last name — HARDY — in the U.S. and Canadian FCC Amateur database. Another interesting search is to list all the hams that reside in a certain county. There are 56 hams in my Tift County, GA. Other searches are available in the registered version.

At the end of the month, the 1010 database is updated with vanity calls issued during the past month. Also the 10-10 database is updated with Silent Key info received from Ruth, N0KDB, the SK Manager. During the month, Paul, WN4AMO, updates the 10-10 database with the new members and also enters the Silent Keys. Many thanks to these hams who help keep the databases updated and the Beta testers who check each update and new features. Most new features are a result of requests from existing Win1010 users. Users are always encouraged to make suggestions and comments.

All the Win1010 databases are updated and posted on the Win1010 download web page at http://hds.net/win1010dl.htm They are in zipped format and up until recently had to be manually downloaded and manually unzipped into the Win1010 folder. Now there is an "Update Databases" routine that with a single click of the mouse, will compare the dates of the various databases on your computer to those on the web page and point out the ones you need to download to update your databases. Clicking the "Download" button, will download the databases needed and automatically unzip them in a short time. This feature proved to be very popular with the Win1010 users and was added in 2009.

Another interesting database, which can be edited by the user, is the CTY_AZ.TXT file. Mike, N5MT, the DX Editor helps to keep this database current. When you enter a DX station into the call field, this database is checked for the DX prefix and the name of the country is found and automatically added into the QTH field.

The XXIP 10-10 database is also supported by Win1010, but only goes to 10-10 number 75000. Win1010 has a built-in 10-10 database which is updated monthly. SK's are listed in lower case in this database. Although the XXIP database is no longer supported, WA6POZ supplies me with a monthly XXIP update which is posted on the Win1010DL web page.

It would take much more room to describe all the features and chores that the Win1010 Suite does, but if it is related to 10-10, chances are that Win1010 will have it covered. An example of a feature that is probably not used that often are the graphs available for use with the Contest Program. After a contest, one graph will display a bar graph showing the number of contacts in each state. Another graph will show the contacts per hour for a two day contest for analysis after the contest is over.

There is a Win1010 Users Yahoo eMail Group that can be joined. This is good for asking questions that other users can answer or make comments. Also this Yahoo Group is used to make announcements directly to Win1010 users.

This year marks the 25th Anniversary of my 10-10 software and I have prepared a web page with special pricing good for a limited time after this Newsletter is published. 10-10 SCHOLARSHIP APPLICANT INFORMATION

K0HWE Albert Hammond

Each year the 10-10 International Net, through our nonprofit corporation, the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation, funds five \$2000 scholarships, which are administered on our behalf by the Foundation for Amateur Radio (FAR). It is suggested that every 10-10 member encourage qualified college-bound amateur radio operators to take advantage of this opportunity. The four most recent winners are featured in this issue of the 10-10 News. Over the past 28 years, 10-10 has funded 103 scholarships valued at \$117,000.

Applicants must be licensed amateurs. There is no restriction on the course of study, but applicants must intend to seek at least an Associate Degree from a

college or university. Non-U.S. Amateurs and those seeking graduate degrees are also eligible, as well as students who study outside the United States. Completed applications must be received by FAR prior to April 15th of each year. Download an application from FAR's website:

RF SAFETY

RF Hazards come in two varieties. One is radiation. Current FCC regulations provide standards for safe amounts. Use the worksheets and analyze your station, even if you think you may be exempt by virtue of power levels and spacing. Be sure.

A second hazard comes from direct contact with antenna elements carrying RF currents. Ground-mounted verticals and inverted Vee ends provide the greatest hazards, since both children and adults can come into contact with them – either directly or with some implement having a long metal handle.

Isolate ground-mounted verticals with fencing or other barriers which are effective especially in preventing children from touching a potentially active antenna. A vertical in or adjacent to a children's play area may mean station silence during periods when children are present: if contact is not a danger, radiation may be.

Elevate and insulate horizontal antenna ends above the level where anyone can touch them with a metal rod. Never underestimate the ingenuity of a child with a small mean streak or a large curiosity.

STATION GROUNDING

Everyone is familiar with the need for a common ground bus for all station equipment with as short a lead as possible to a ground rod outdoors. If you have a tower, it should also be ground rodded. All ground rods (including the house ground at the electrical service entry) should be connected together by the largest copper wire you can obtain. Some folks use copper flashing cut into long strips. These days, braid is not recommended because its very large surface area open to weather deteriorates it quickly. Use solid mechanical connections, not solder (which melts in the presence of lightning like a teenager in the presence of a rock start: (instantly).

If ground rods are widely separated, add ground rods in a row from end to end, spaced about the length of each ground rod apart. This is not over-kill—just the opposite. It is over-safe by holding the resistance between everything in your house and shack at the absolute minimum. Even a slight resistance may give a lightning surge an alternative path to ground through your "stuff."

THE AMATEURS CODE by Paul M. Segal, W9EEA (1928)

The Radio Amateur is:

CONSIDERATE..... never knowingly operating in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.

LOYAL..... offering loyalty, encouragement and support to other amateurs, local clubs and the American Radio Relay League, through which Amateur Radio in the United States is represented nationally and internationally.

PROGRESSIVE..... with knowledge abreast of science, a well built and efficient station, and operation beyond reproach.

FRIENDLY..... with slow and patient operation when requested, friendly advice and counsel to the beginner, kindly assistance, co-operation and consideration for the interests of others. These are the hallmarks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED..... Radio is an avocation, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

PATRIOTIC..... with station and skill always ready for service to country and community.

DX CODE OF CONDUCT

I will listen, and listen, and then listen again before calling.

I will only call if I can copy the DX station properly.

I will not trust the DX cluster and will be sure of the DX station's call before calling.

I will not interfere with the DX station nor anyone calling and will never tune up on the DX frequency or in the QSX slot.

I will wait for the DX station to end a contact before I call.

I will always send my full call sign.

I will call and then listen for a reasonable interval. I will not call continuously.

I will not transmit when the DX operator calls another call sign, not mine.

I will not transmit when the DX operator queries a call sign not like mine.

I will not transmit when the DX station requests geographic areas other than mine.

When the DX operator calls me, I will not repeat my call sign unless I think he has copied it incorrectly.

I will be thankful if and when I do make a contact.

I will respect my fellow hams and conduct myself so as to earn their respect.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name (as received off the air), date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go on-line to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Clubs have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except the right to vote in elections.

Electronic Membership

Electronic Membership is available to anyone who qualifies for any of the types of membership listed previously. Electronic membership means that all communications, including the 10-10 NEWS, from 10-10 to the qualifying member will be conducted via email distribution. The exception to this policy is when a member qualifies for a certificate from either one of the various QSO Parties or from one of the Awards programs.

TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Spirit of 76 and Open Season QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules. The Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers are year long contact events.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards. A QSO party contact log submitted by an Amateur that intentionally submits erroneous contact information to cause errors on membership applications and awards, will be considered an invalid log. Ten-Ten will not accept any log of contacts from an Amateur who had his or her membership/1010 number revoked.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spirit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event around 4 July each year

0001 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10).

0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

5.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band. NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:

INDIVIDUAL: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

MOBILE: A mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. Use of a base station antenna, amplifier or commercial power is not permitted. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. In addition to the normal log information provided the County Worked from and County worked must also be included. Mobile stations will receive awards within their own category and will not be included in the individual sections or Top Ten in the World. Mobile entries will only be accepted for Winter & Summer Phone and 10-10 Sprint QSO Parties.

5.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

5.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

5.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

5.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter.

QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

5.2.9 **QSO PARTY ENTRIES**

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a check log. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Logs (if cabrillo, adif, or text) may also be uploaded at www.hamclubs.info/scorer/ . Please no .Q95 files.

5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value, A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

5.2.9.2 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

5.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top individual scorer in each Us Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB, MOBILE and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

5.2.11 ANNIVERSARY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS EVENTS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC. In the Anniversary event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have the anniversary year contained in their membership number. Example: 2010 is the 48th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "48" in their membership number (i.e.,72048, 69485,64854, 48126, 00487) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions: During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above. In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact. In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.). All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order. These events are for Individual entries as described in section 5.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten. however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers events. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

5.2.12 SPIRIT OF 76 (7 Days, 6 Modes) QSO PARTY

This event will run for 7 days and be around July 4th of each year. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. The modes that will be used are as follows as well as the suggested frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345) 2. RTTY (28.086) 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120) 6. AM (29.000)

Scoring will be as normal for QSO Parties, 2 points for members and 1 point for nonmembers. Dupes will be allowed once for each mode. It will be possible to work the same call 6 times in each of the various modes for a maximum total of 12 points per call. All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

5.2.13 10-10 SPRINT (October 10) QSO PARTY

An award will be issued for working all 10 USA Call Districts.

5.2.14 W6OI/VE9TEN/DL0X SPECIAL EVENT

This event is held during the 3rd weekend of November each year from 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. This special event operation is where volunteers operate the 10-10 official club stations (W6OI/VE9TEN/DL0X) seeking to work anyone anywhere. Any mode of operation is permitted. Many operators will be authorized to operate W6OI from most US states and VE9TEN from various Provinces/Territories simultaneously. DL0X is operated by Henry, DL8YBM. The purpose is to have fun promoting 10-meter activity making contacts with 10-10 members and of course, non-members. This is a great way to increase membership! Exchange is similar to any 10-10 party event - name, call, QTH, 10-10 number if one is available. As contacts are made, provide info on 10-10 organization and where to find our website - www.ten-ten.org. If anyone wants to volunteer to operate W6OI during this event contact Jerry, N9AC. Members in Canada should contact Rob, VE9KM for permission to operate VE9TEN.
