

If you had told me in 1980 when I came aboard that 10-10 would still exist at 60 years and would have issued 78,000 membership numbers I would have laughed. In that 60-year period many clubs, publications, and sorry to say many members have passed away. It has been my pleasure to serve the membership as President for 10 of those years and it is time for me to step down and allow another member to fill this position of honor. This year, the President and three Directors will be elected. I encourage qualified members to seek these offices. If your membership has been current for the past 4 years and you agree to renew for the term of office, then you meet the requirements for these positions. I encourage you to consider one of these offices. Many of our current officers have been in office for many years and it is sometimes advantageous to have new and younger members step up. With interest and activity increasing on 10 as cycle 25 builds, an active board of directors is necessary to keep pace with changes in both band conditions and new modes of operation. If you desire to seek nomination for one of the available positions, please contact the chair of the nominating committee, Larry Berger WA2SUH. His contact information is on page 2 of this publication.

There are many positions available that are not filled through elections, but by simply volunteering. There are Award Manager positions, and several committees that need members to come forward. If you would like to be considered, please contact me via email; and I will assist you and explain the offices available.

From time to time I am amazed by some of the comments I get concerning operation on the band. Recently a member seeking an award told me that his logging program automatically inserted the 10-10 number for the call sign contacted. I did my best to convince him that that was not a valid contact. Next, he asked that if he had made a legal exchange in another mode, could he use the exchange in FT8. What many apparently do not understand is that the exchange on the air is our primary method of advertising 10-10. Over the past 60 years, that exchange has broadcasted the existence of the organization.

The band is full of surprises. While I was away from September 29 till October 21, I missed two QSO events. I also missed the CQWW event. Apparently,

there was some band openings for these. I tried to operate during the digital QSO Party but there was some type of solar event that killed the band. I check the band daily for the nets at least and watch the solar flux every day. I suspect that the 10-meter event in December will blow the band wide open. That is kind of weird. To open the band you must call CQ. Trust me, if I can copy beacons, I will call CQ on phone, CW, and maybe BPSK 31.

In honor of 10-10's 60th anniversary, some chapters could have a special event during the year. It seems like just a few weeks ago I was working on the 25th anniversary event. Hopefully the pandemic will become a thing of the past and things will return to some semblance of normal. I am looking forward to the Orlando Hamcation. That was the only event in 2020 and until the Huntsville event this year, hamfests were few and far between. There was a Shreveport hamfest the weekend before the Huntsville Alabama event. At that time, I was recovering from a surgery and it prevented me from traveling. I am still in recovery and therapy to regain the full use of my hands. I am making significant progress. Therefore, I am set for Hamcation and hopefully the Hamvention this year.

I consider Chapters and Chapter activities critical to the growth and strength of the organization. Chapters are subject to poor band conditions just like all amateur radio activities. Locally we came up with a plan to create chapter activity no matter what the conditions were on 10 meters. Basically, it involved bonding with another local amateur club. In the case here, we bonded in a sense to the Shreveport Amateur Radio Association. This was accomplished by holding the local 10-meter net immediately after the local 2-meter weekly net. Eventually this led to all of the officers of SARA becoming members of 10-10 and thereby encouraging other local and new amateurs to do the same. Another resource is a monthly gathering at a local café followed by an amateur meet and greet. We have used this event to hold qualifying nets to gain new 10-10 members. As a result, our weekly chapter net has an average of 25 check ins and there is always enough to qualify a visitor that happens by. The only challenge is to get all these members involved with the QSO Parties. Personally, that would be a fantastic result of our local effort.

Looking back over the past two years my greatest desire is to see an end to the world-wide pandemic that has resulted directly or indirectly to the loss of so many lives. Locally we have lost 5-chapter members, including one of the founding members. These losses are indirectly a result of the COVID-19 virus, but probably would not have occurred otherwise. Maybe as a result of this long-term crisis, folks have grown more aware of how fragile life really is. For me, this year has been a challenge medically. It is my prayer that each of you have a very healthy 2022 and hopefully we can meet on the band.



- 1) **All CH/CM**: Please double check the TEN-TEN Net Guide to be sure your net(s) are listed correctly. If there are changes, be sure to let me know so I can update the list.
- 2) If your chapter is planning a special during the months of April, May or June of 2022, please let me know before February 28th so I can include the details in the April 2022 newsletter.
- 3) Reminder of Quarterly Reports Due: In Extremis (no report in over a year): Colorado Centennial/Frontier Gang (11/2019), Down Under (12/2019), Route 66 (11/2019). If anyone has information about Colorado Centennial, Down Under or Route 66, please contact me. Otherwise, these chapters may be declared QRT. Past Due (no report received during the prior quarters when due): none. Reports received after November 30 (date of this report) are not included here and will be acknowledged in the Chapters section of the 10-10 website.

Chapter Reports **Due during first quarter 2022:** Alii (Mar), Branding Iron (Jan), New Mexico Mud Ducks (Mar). Note that Quarterly Chapter Reports may be sent any time. The months indicated here are the dates in 2021 in which the last report was received.

- 4) I thank **ALL CH/CM** who sent me a **complete report** during 2021 so I have up to date contact and net information. Other chapters, please send me a complete report in 2022. See www.ten-ten.org/index.php/resources/ten-ten-documents/ten-ten-forms for a form to download or www.ten-ten.org/chapters/quarterly-report to fill out and submit electronically. Be sure to notify IT Manager Jeff, N7YG, before using this easy-to-use form so he can add you to the Chapter Management Group. If you do not have internet access, let me know and I will send you a blank form that you can copy and submit.
- 5) Poor propagation in recent years has certainly affected Chapter Net activity. But hang in there conditions are improving. One of the primary purposes of Ten-Ten International is to promote activity on this band, especially in such times as these.

CHAPTER NEWS

- 1) Congratulations to **Castle Craig Chapter** on their 40th anniversary. In the Fall 1982 issue of 10-10 International News, Connie Hauck, K6EXQ, announced the new chapter's formation. AI, WA1NPX (AA1DO SK) was the first Chapter Head and AL, N1API, was the Certificate Manager, a position he still holds. You can celebrate with them as Castle Craig will offer a 40 point free upgrade to anyone who either upgrades their Castle Craig Plus Award for all of 2022, or if you do not have enough points for an upgrade, simply email CM A1API and ask for your Anniversary Upgrade. The 40th Anniversary Upgrade starts January 1, 2022 and ends December 31, 2022. We are pleased to recognize Castle Craig as one of the longest continuing chapters in 10-10.
- 2) Several chapters report still using Zoom in lieu of face-to-face chapter meetings. Hopefully, as Covid restrictions continue to ease, regular meetings may begin to resume.
- 3) No one having come forward to become CH, Cradle of the Confederacy is declared QRT. However, Lew, K1AZE, and Ed, W4EDD are continuing to call the weekly nets on Thursday 0000/0100Z at 28.350 and we urge you to support them. Perhaps someone will step up to reaffiliate the chapter. This continues to point out a continuing problem of losing chapters when the CH and/or CM become unable to continue. All chapters are asked to plan for succession of leadership. To aid in such planning, IT Manager, Jeff, N7YG, is setting up FTP accounts on the 10-10 server where chapters can save their data. All CH: contact Jeff for the details if you wish to take advantage of this opportunity.
- 4) Aloha Chapter reports they have several local radio operators looking for the last few 10-10 numbers in order to qualify for their own. Since propagation seems to be improving, point your antennas west and help them out!
- 5) **Oregon Trail** has suspended point collection, due to lack of interest in points, except for the "Lone Rider" mobile program and "Specials" as announced by the CH. Save your existing points records, though, in case they are reinstated if/when propagation improves.
- 6) Chapters below accept email upgrades as of November 30. All the listed chapters generally need previous, new and total points and seals claimed. Any transaction with the CM that requires that a certificate be issued, and most worksheet specials, should still be handled via US Mail. Also, it is good practice to keep a detailed listing of the upgrade in the event that the CM should require verification. Requirements peculiar to a particular chapter are noted.

DX News

Welcome to the Winter DX season of the 10-10 DX News.

I want all to know we have seven new 10-10 members from Hawaii join the past six months. New DX members get listed at the bottom of this news, so read on for more info.

Well I see several Europeans hams are traveling for DX. I just missed 3A3A from Monaco, the call was used by five ops who were in the CQWW SSB contest at the end of October. The 10-10 member that was in the group was Dmitri UA9USU #54234. Dmitri reports on QRZ.com that he has been to 119 countries and you can see a list of his call signs under his UA9USU callsign details. Dmitri might operate from the south pacific ocean area in Nov/ December. There is only one 10-10 member living in Monaco, he is Claude 3A2LF #36994 who likes to operate low power. We have made several QSOs on the radio, just not on Ten. Claude likes CW over SSB and the large mountain west of his station hampers his weak signal, so good luck in talking to Claude in Monaco.

I survived hurricane Ida with one tree blown down and no damage to the house or antennas. We were without power for 70 hours but I had a generator that kept my food cold during the power outage. I cut up the tree and stacked the limbs out at the street for pickup so the yard is now clean.

Ida was a Cat 4 storm when it went through my hometown in Terrebonne parish which is 70 miles from where I now live. Ida slowed down its path and reduced its winds to a Cat 1 storm when it reached the Baton Rouge area. The hurricane eye came about 20 miles east of my house and we had a big gust of wind, estimated at 80 mph, bring down trees. The higher winds for this hurricane were much worse this year, as compared to weaker storms last year! Ida's winds easily brought down trees, and damaged roofs and power lines. I read that an estimated million trees were blown down by Ida. New Orleans lost all power when their main power line feed going across the Mississippi river came down and it took ten days to hook up a temporary replacement. Ida was not a flooding hurricane like 2005 Katrina but the damage was bad.

OK now for better ham propagation news.

We are seeing increased sun spots appearing on the Sun. This is increasing the solar flux that is available and the new flux has helped cycle 25 to give us better skip conditions on Ten. The 10-10 Day Sprint is over for my station and I was able to talk into Europe about six times during the Sprint. I was having trouble with my vertical antenna due to a lightning strike. My backup antenna was a dipole mounted about 12 ft off the ground for most of the Sprint on Oct 10th. The east coast of the USA and South America have been talking into Europe the past three months, so good luck.

I continue to hope all who are reading this can feel safer from the Covid virus by having been vaccinated. At the end of November 2021, we are seeing good relief with hospital admissions and critical equipment usage. We also see people that avoided vaccination earlier or now waiting in line to get covered and there is now another recently discovered mutation. Even some of us that were vaccinated have come down with mild cases so its still a problem and no one knows how Covid will react this winter for us and in 2022.

Remember, its also Flu season so get your Flu shot as well and Covid mutated just like the Flu has, so we probably have not seen the end of Covid mutations. The Covid virus is not going to be gone until 80-90 percent of us get vaccinated. Please listen to the medical science instead of the rumors so get protected and stay safe.

The 15-17-20-30 meter bands were the best DX bands this fall so keep looking for winter DX, when Ten is not open.

Stay on the radio and call CQ to see where you can talk. When propagation is poor on Ten, use FT8 and you might find stations to work when you think the band is closed. Here in Louisiana, the FT8 QSO's were better than SSB and a lot of QSO's were put in the log.

I see more reports of an increase in DX traveling this winter season as less travel restrictions have allowed air travel to increase. I do not expect a new 10-10 country to show up on Ten for a few years. Because of the pandemic, weak propagation, and many DX ops staying home, the amount of news reporting is still reduced. Keep using your station to find DX that may be calling CQ on a band besides Ten.

Use our 10-10 website for all award rules and if you are a paid up dues member, you qualify for all 10-10 awards, you can print out the 10-10 award form on the website and send it to the 10-10 awards person as listed on the form at no cost. And no QSL cards are required for all of our awards.

As the 10-10 Countries Award Manager, I follow most all of the ARRL DXCC award rules. But you must have exchanged your Callsign, Name, State and 10-10 number over the air only on Ten, and record that members information on your award application. The honor system does apply for all contacts on 10-10 awards. I keep the 10-10 DX records with my job as the DX Countries Award

manager. As of December 2021, there remains 22 countries that have not been worked for 10-10 country credit as published in the March 10-10 News.

Congratulations to VE3XN Garry #10120, has been inducted into the Canadian Amateur Radio Hall of Fame by Radio Canada. Garry has been a ham for 55 years and was a geography teacher when he got into DXing and his love of collecting QSL's.

Countries Award: There were no Countries Award application submitted this past quarter.

NOTE: There has been no legitimate EZ Turkmenistan radio activity since August 2006 for DXCC. The rumors of 8P Barbados being a new DXCC entity are just rumors. Nothing has changed in its DXCC status.

Propagation: I expect the solar flux to range from 78-114 during the Winter which means the flux continues to rise as we get more spots on the sun for cycle 25.

The 2021 Winter Solstice is on December 21st. Winter starts in the northern hemisphere and the Sun is below the equator giving the US its longest night times and shortest day of the year. In the southern hemisphere, summer starts on this day. Cycle 25, started on November 17, 2019. The Sun was really active a year ago in December 2020 but now has quieted down with a slow rising flux. A solar flux maximum of 125 has been forecast by NOAA for the winter of 2024.

Sunspots are counted by looking at the Sun but Solar flux is measured by radio at 2.8 GHz.

The 2021 monthly maximum flux was: Jan 79, Feb 79, March 79, April 85, May 81, June 94, July 95, Aug 90, Sept 102, October 112 and November 100. Average 90.5.

The 2021 monthly minimum flux was: Jan 70, Feb 67, March 72, April 71, May 70, June 69, July 73, Aug 71, Sept 75, October 76 and November 78. Average 72.0.

On December 1st, the solar flux was 89, the A index was 11 and K index was 4. There were several good sunspot regions on the Sun the past month and this helped increase the solar flux the past months. The USAF solar flux forecast for December 1st to January 15th is from a high of 94 to a low of 78 with most days ranging from 79 to 85.

My Prediction: Over the next three months, the best conditions on Ten could

be: Christmas - December 25-29th, January 2022: 19-24th, February 15-19th and March 13-16th. For the USA, expect a 40% chance of DX to Europe or Asia with a 75% chance of DX to South America or into the Pacific. Listen for the CW beacons from 28.175-28.300 to see if Ten Meters is open and always use WSJT-X FT8 for all weak/low propagation QSO's.

Here on the North East coast of the USA, mornings have yielded South America, Europe, Africa, Middle-East, Pacific area, Asia, and the USA. Afternoons have yielded South America, Africa, and the Middle-East. Although not always you will find these stations, but they have been coming through. FT8 has allowed hams to make QSOs that other modes would not have. It has been said, "when 10-meters is OPEN "you can work DX with 1 watt and a wet string antenna". We have not reached the height of this Solar Cycle yet, but propagation is improving. During this last "1010 Sprint"; I called CQ on a quiet frequency, HZ1SK Samir in Saudi Arabia answered. Although 10-meter propagation is still spotty, and not "hot" yet. Drop by 28.074 MHz (FT8), if it appears quiet, try a CQ. You might be surprised at who may respond. It might be me... Check out the Video on the 10-10 Web-site Home page, for how to make 10-10 QSOs with FT8.

A 10 METER MARITIME ADVENTURE

In March 1992, I was employed by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs at their medical center in Palo Alto, California. Inside a small room at the Western Blind Rehabilitation Center (Building 48) was an amateur radio station generously donated by the local American Legion Amateur Radio Post. It featured a Kenwood TS-440SAT connected to a Butternut HF vertical on the roof of the two-story building. The FCC did not issue new club station licenses from 1978 until 1996 so there was no club callsign.

Ten meters has always been my favorite HF band. On March 9, 1992, during my lunch break, KD6FND maritime mobile answered my CQ on 28.337 MHz. His signal was 59, and with his 6th district callsign, I thought he was sailing on the nearby San Francisco Bay. Imagine my surprise when KD6FND replied, no, he was sailing southwest on the Pacific Ocean en route from Ventura in Southern California to the Marquesas Islands in French Polynesia! Don, who was aboard the 35-foot sailboat Rhiannon, said he had just received his Novice class license but that meant his only HF voice privileges were on 10 meters.

During our first contact, Don provided his coordinates and then gave me his home telephone number in Ventura. He asked me to pass a message to his wife that he and his brother (the yacht's skipper) were okay, the boat was fine and they were making good progress. I dutifully wrote his message up in ARRL Radiogram format and, that evening, called his wife Carol from my home phone. She was delighted to receive the Radiogram and dictated a message to me to send back to Don during our next QSO.

Thus began daily 30 minute or so QSOs at 12 noon California time with KD6FND. Propagation was excellent and we both had strong signals during each contact. However, a few days after our first QSO, KD6FND reported the yacht's satellite navigation system had failed. As a result, they resorted to using their nautical charts and a sextant. Fortunately, other amateur stations soon joined my QSOs with KD6FND. They were glad to help Don with weather reports, navigation assistance and even phone patches.

Unfortunately, my VA superiors had no interest in my lunchtime radio activity, despite the positive publicity it could have brought to the medical center. They actively discouraged me from using the amateur radio station and eventually ordered me off the air, even though my operations were during authorized break times. With KD6FND in range of other hams who had much more sailing and maritime radio experience than me (as well as phone patch equipment), I wished Don the best of luck and signed off with him for the last time in late March, a few days before he arrived in Hiva Oa.


When Don returned stateside, he mailed all the stations he contacted a thank you letter, along with photos of him aboard the Rhiannon, a voyage map and a QSL card. An excerpt from his letter follows:

"During March of [1992], I worked you while aboard the yacht Rhiannon en route from Ventura, California to Hiva Oa in the Marquesas Islands. It was a really exciting time for me as I was newly licensed and the many contacts I made with friendly and helpful hams provided a fabulous introduction to the hobby. I am

particularly appreciative of the camaraderie and assistance of the members of what came to be known as the 'Rhiannon Net' on 28.337 MHz: Bob, N6NUY [10-X 46353, SK 2001] who served as net control, passed messages and ran phone patches; and Mal, KC6VDR [SK 2019, himself a sailor] who assisted with

navigation problems." (Author's note: Bill, KB6LFM [10-X 62070], a U.S. Navy veteran who served in Vietnam, was also very helpful and is still active in the maritime mobile amateur radio community today).

Don's transpacific journey aboard the Rhiannon easily fit the category of "the trip of a lifetime." His lifeline to the world was 10 meters, which produced many memorable QSOs with the stations he contacted. A report authored by N6NUY about how amateur radio helped KD6FND's voyage appears in the Public Service column (page 100) in the January 1993 QST magazine.

Epilogue: Don later upgraded to Advanced class, was issued a new callsign (KO6WZ) and joined 10-X as member 64982. In 1998, I promoted out of VA to a much different federal agency where I remained for the next 20 years until retirement, although I never again had access to a workplace HF amateur radio station.

THE AMATEURS CODE by Paul M. Segal, W9EEA (1928)

CONSIDERATE..... never knowingly operating in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.

PROGRESSIVE..... with knowledge abreast of science, a well built and efficient station, and operation beyond reproach.

FRIENDLY..... with slow and patient operation when requested, friendly advice and counsel to the beginner, kindly assistance, co-operation and consideration for the interests of others. These are the hallmarks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED..... Radio is an avocation, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

PATRIOTIC..... with station and skill always ready for service to country and community.

ELECTION 2022 CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

Members not selected by the committee may petition for candidacy by having a petition signed by 50 full members and presented to the Secretary by June 15, 2022. A nomination information form is required and is available from the Nominations Committee Chairperson. QUALIFICATION FOR NOMINATION TO BE AN OFFICER OR DIRECTOR OF 10-10

In accord with the bylaws, no member of 10-10 may qualify for nomination to be an Officer or Director of 10-10 unless he or she has been a full member for more than four (4) years immediately preceding his/her Nomination, and that he/she can show that their membership will remain current during the period of the office they are seeking. The Nominating Committee or Petition for Candidacy are the only methods to be used by members who wish to be nominated.

SELECTION BY THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee is charged with the task of selecting from those who indicate a desire or willingness to serve as an Officer or Director and to form a slate of candidates who the committee believes represent the best qualified candidates from information submitted to the Committee.

PETITION FOR CANDIDACY

Members and nominees not selected by the nominating committee may petition for candidacy. Such petitions shall be signed by 50 current members and submitted to the Secretary by June 15, 2022.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

All Candidates, whether selected by the Nominating Committee or by Petition, must submit a biographical information form and biographical sketch. The Nominating Committee will use this information in the process of selecting a slate of Candidates. Those who petition for nomination must submit a biographical information form to be provided by and returned to the Secretary. This biographical outline, not to exceed 200 words of narrative, shall be printed in the July 2022 issue of the 10-10 News.

NOTIFICATION OF POTENTIAL NOMINEES

The chair of the Nominating Committee shall notify members selected by the Nominating Committee to be candidates in writing. The chair of the Nominating Committee shall also notify, in writing on or before May 15, 2022, members who are not selected by the nominating committee, and inform them of the proper method of placing their names in nomination by petition.


10-10 SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION SUPPORTERS

A 3-element 10-Meter Beam on an 8' Boom

Editor's note: This article is a reprint of an article done by L.B. Cebik, W4RNL (SK), #41159 in a previous issue of this newsletter.

As the sunspots return, the search for an inexpensive beam antenna continues. We have looked in past columns at 2-element Yagis and a wide-band 50-Ohm feed 3-element Yagi on a 12' boom. We can shrink the boom length down to 8' if we are willing to accept almost a half dB more gain, a good front-to-back ratio, and a matching network at the feedpoint to transform an impedance of around 25 ohms.

The design is adapted for hardware store aluminum tubing from a design by Dean Straw (N6BV) in the YA collection that comes with the *ARRL Antenna Book*. The original design called for smaller tubing that is often hard to find. The revision calls for 7/8" and 3/4" diameter tubing, which may be found at outlets like Lowes or Home Depot.




Figure 1. Dimensions for 3-element Yagi

Figure 1 shows the dimensions of the antenna. The inner 8' of tubing for each element is 7/8" diameter, with the remaining length consisting of 3/4" diameter stock. Three 8' lengths of 7/8" tubing and six 6' lengths of 3/4" tubing are all you need. You can fasten the tubing lengths with sheet metal screws, stainless steel hose clamps (with stainless steel screws), or "pop" rivets. Do not waste weight by using too much overlap in the tubing sections: 2-4" will do nicely. The reflector and the director are continuous elements, but the driven element is split in the middle for the matching system. I use small well-varnished (spar

varnish) plywood plates to hold the elements to the boom – you can see the details in almost any of the other Yagi columns.

My favorite 2-element boom – Schedule 40 PVC – gets a bit heavy by the time the boom reaches 8' long. So you might want to use 1.25" or larger diameter aluminum. A light-weight section of TV masting (the kind so light that I would never recommend that it be used as a mast) would also work if you are sure that it will stand the weather and not rust out in the first season.

The key to the antenna is the matching system. My favorite for small antennas is the beta match, but a gamma or Tee match would do as well. The driven element length is set for a beta match, with a resistance of about 25 ohms and a reactance between 20 and 25 ohms. The reactance is the virtual series reactance needed be an L-circuit to transform the 50-Ohm coax cable impedance down to the 25-Ohm resistive antenna impedance.




Figure 2. "Hairpin" and Inductor Beta Matches

However, an L-circuit also needs an inductive reactance across the line, as shown in Figure 2. The inductive reactance can be a coil, as shown in the lower view. For 28.5 MHz and the 2:1 transformation needed here, the coil needs to be about 0.28 micro-H. A coil about 0.5" in diameter and wound with #12 copper house wire will have 6 turns spread over about 3/4" of length with half-inch leads to meet this need.

The inductive reactance can also be a shorted transmission line stub or "hairpin." The hairpin can have many dimensions, depending on the wire thickness and the spacing. With a spacing (S) or 2" between wires, a hair pin of 1/8" wire will be about 7.7" long (L), while a similarly spaced hairpin of #12 wire will be about 6.8" long.

In real life, not everything is exact, and the hairpin or coil may need adjusting to achieve a 1:1 SWR at the target frequency (28.5 MHz in this case). You can adjust the length and/or spacing of the hairpin. Likewise, you can squeeze or spread the coil turns. If neither trick works, adjust the length of the driven element and try again.




Figure 3. Free Space Azimuth Patterns for the 3-element 8' Boom Yagi

How well does the antenna work? Across the first MHz of 10 meters, the gain ranges from about 7.3 dBi to 7.7dBi (free space gain. In comparative terms, this is about halfway between the gain of the wide-band 50-Ohm beam and a highly optimized 3-element bean with a boom length of about 12' or so. The gain is high enough to compete favorably with most 3-element tri-banders on 10 meters. Figure 3 shows the pattern at 3 points across the band.

The front-to back ratio is about 18 dB at the band edges, but for most of the span between it is well over 20 dB, peaking about 27 dB near center band. Not too bad for an 8' boom.

The entire beam will weigh between 8 and 10 pounds, including the boom, depending on the materials used. An old TV rotator will turn it, and a guyed push-up mast or roof-top "tower" will put it at a good height. Remember that the fairly high front-to-back ratio is not only a QRM killer, but also a closed back door. In a local net or similar operations, you may also want to have a simple vertical or dipole around to tell when there are signals off the rear waiting for you to turn the beam in their direction.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name (as received on the air), date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go on-line to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Clubs have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except the right to vote in elections.

Electronic Membership

Electronic Membership is available to anyone who qualifies for any of the types of membership listed previously. Electronic membership means that all communications, including the 10-10 NEWS, from 10-10 to the qualifying member will be conducted via email distribution. The exception to this policy is when a member qualifies for a certificate from either one of the various QSO Parties or from one of the Awards programs.

TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Spirit of 76 and Open Season QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules. The Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers are year long contact events.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards. A QSO Party contact log submitted by an Amateur that intentionally submits erroneous contact information to cause errors on membership applications and awards will be considered an invalid log. Ten-Ten will not accept any log of contacts from an Amateur who had his or her membership/1010 number revoked.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Weak Signal - held on the second full weekend in July - 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10).

0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

5.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10-meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10-meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10-meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10-meter band.

5.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:

QRP: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers. CW/Digital/RTTY operations max 5 watts and Phone operations max 10 watts during the entire event.

LOW POWER: Same as QRP listed above except that output power for CW/Phone/ Digital/RTTY operations is max 150 watts during the entire event.

HIGH POWER: Same as QRP listed above except that output power for CW/Phone/ Digital/RTTY operations is greater than 150 watts during the event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

MOBILE: A mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. Use of a base station antenna, amplifier or commercial power is not permitted. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. In addition to the normal log information provided the County Worked from and County worked must also be included. Mobile stations will receive awards within their own category and will not be included in the individual sections or Top Ten in the World. **Mobile entries will only be accepted for Winter & Summer Phone and 10-10 Sprint QSO Parties.**

5.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. No matter your physical location, your QTH is the location of the transmitting antenna.

5.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero (0) in the log.

5.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member may assign his/her score to that chapter. QSO Party chapter scores for the Sprint and Open Season may not be assigned.

5.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a check log. Any logs received more than 8 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. LOGS MAY BE SENT VIA Email to tentencontest@ten-ten.org. Q95 files are not a proper format nor are they readable, therefore, they will not be accepted.

5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value. A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

5.2.9.2 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 8 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 18th, unless that day falls on a Sunday or holiday, than the postmark deadline shall be October 19th.

5.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, LOW POWER, HIGH POWER, CLUB, MOBILE and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

5.2.11 ANNIVERSARY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS EVENTS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC. In the Anniversary event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have the anniversary year contained in their membership number. Example: 2022 is the 60th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "60" in their membership number (i.e., 72060, 69605,66054, 60126, 00607) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions: During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.

In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact. In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.). All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order. These events are for Individual entries as described in section 5.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS.

Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 8th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers events. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

5.2.12 WEAK SIGNAL QSO PARTY (WSQP)

This event was added to help promote digital activity on the ten-meter band. The event in no way affects or modifies the policies for other scheduled Ten-Ten events. All weak signal modes for this event include: FT/JT/JS8/JS8CALL and any future weak signal mode. No repeater, cross-mode or cross-band contacts allowed.

FT4 (28.180) FT8 (28.074) JT65 (28.076) JS8/JS8CALL (28.078)

Entry categories: QRP – Maximum 10 watts output. Low Power – Maximum 150 watts output.

Exchange: 10-10 members should send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (ST/Prov/Country). Received exchange should include normal exchange for FT/JT/JS8/JS8CALL modes and for extra points name, QTH and 10-10#. Scoring will be 1 point for contacts without a 10-10 number and three (3) points for contacts with a valid 10-10# exchange. NO MULTIPLIERS! All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager..

5.2.13 10-10 SPRINT (October 10) QSO PARTY

An award will be issued for working all 10 USA Call Districts.

5.2.14 W60I SPECIAL EVENT

This event has been postponed until further notice.

This special event operation is where volunteers operate the 10-10 official club stations (W6OI/VE9TEN/DL0X) seeking to work anyone anywhere. Any mode of operation is permitted. Many operators will be authorized to operate W6OI from most US states and VE9TEN from various Provinces/Territories simultaneously. DL0X is operated by Henry, DL8YBM. The purpose is to have fun promoting 10-meter activity making contacts with 10-10 members and of course, non-members. This is a great way to increase membership! Exchange is similar to any 10-10 QSO Party event - name, call, QTH, and 10-10 number if one is available. As contacts are made, provide info on the 10-10 organization and where to find our website - www.ten-ten.org. If anyone wants to volunteer to operate W6OI during this event contact Jerry, N9AC. Members in Canada should contact Rob, VE9KM for permission to operate VE9TEN.

5.2.15 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Current information about 10-10 and upcoming 10-10 QSO Parties and events are always available on the 10-10 web site. Cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing at http://www.ten-ten.org.
