## *Words from the President*

IN TRYING TO KEEP TABS ON WHAT IS HAPPENING WITH 10-10, there are always those days when it seems better to have stayed in bed. Fortunately, there aren't many of them, but there certainly was one shortly after the summer issue of the News had been put in the mail. Along in the morning, Carl Winter, W6OAW, who is our hard-working Supply Manager, called me to ask what had gone wrong with the mailing. Carl had picked up the over-supply at our mailing service, and had a lot of copies he couldn't account for.

Once before, a year or more back, we had such an incident, and discovered that the computer people had inadvertently plugged in the wrong out-off date, with the result that about 20% of our members' copies hadn't been mailed. They did a hurry-up job to remedy the situation, and I don't believe that anyone ever noticed the difference, even with those copies being mailed a few days late.

This time, however, it wasn't so simple. Indeed, we don't know yet why there was such an over-run at our printer's, but the number for whom there were mailing labels was correct, so far as we could determine, and the number mailed agreed so closely that the error percentage was about .04 per cent. At any rate, our members were sent their copies, which is the main concern, so we won't worry about the numbers.

While I was in the process of trying to figure out what had happened with the mailing (and that took several days), I had another call, this one from Larry Wilker, WHORH, who has been WAS Manager for some time. Larry told me that force of circumstances was requiring that he give up the WAS responsibility. At this point I was ready to hang up the telephone and go to bed, but Larry saved the day by going on to tell me that he already had a replacement, with whom he had corresponded and talked on the telephone. He gave me the name and address, and I sent a letter for confirmation, which was answered within a few days. I especially liked the closing sentence in that letter, and am going to take the liberty of quoting it, as follows: "It amounts to this: being aware of the problems, I still would like to take over the job from Larry so that I can do something for 10-10 in exchange for what 10-10 does for me."

I wish more people felt like that.

Larry's replacement, effective November 1, 1982, is Susan I Brackeen, KALCAD, No. 29,600, P. O. Box 7081, Johnston, RI 02919. Susan's OM is Scott, AILM, whose number is 23966. Over the time he has handled WAS, Larry has made some organizational changes which have smoothed things considerably, and our deepest thanks go to him for taking over when we needed someone to relieve Bill Risher of part of his load.

WRITING OF LARRY AND THE WAS reminds me that another question has arisen during the past few weeks, about which I requested clarification from both Larry and Al Sherman, KLAS, who handles the Countries Award. Both awards require the submission of QSL cards for verification, and both require that the 10-10 number be on the card. The question is simply this: Must the 10-10 number have been written on the card by the person who originally sent it, or may it be entered there by the member submitting it for an award?

The answer is equally simple: When you send in cards for an award, make sure that the number is on each card. If it isn't there, put it on. It is required for the con-



venience of the award manager in checking the cards. It is not the verification that the person sending the card had a 10-10 number which he gave you at the time of the contact. The legitimacy of the contact is a matter for your honesty.

When this question came to me, I was reasonably sure I knew the answer. Indeed, one of the things I did was to look over my old cards which I had submitted when I made WAS No. 24. A good many didn't have numbers on them at all, but they were legitimate contacts, as proven by the numbers and dates on the accompanying log. Back in those days (1976), activity was rather limited, and W4JO, who was then manager for all awards, didn't have nearly as much to do. With increasing activity, conditions changed, and WAS awards are nearly up to 600. We had no countries award then, so comparisons aren't possible, but KLAS has issued a substantial number of certificates in the short time that we have had one.

IN THE SUMMER ISSUE OF THE NEWS there was an announcement (pp. 5, 30) which probably was not seen by those most affected by it. It was to the effect that, commencing September 1, 1982, 10-10 awards of any kind are available only to paid-up members. Those of you who receive this issue are paid-up members, so it is no problem for you to comply with the requirement. When you apply for an award, accompany your application with a copy (Xerox or similar) of your current membership card, or of the address label on a current issue of the News. Either has your membership expiration date on it.

There is a reason for this requirement. This organization has about 30,000 'members' who have been issued 10-10 numbers; however, only about one-third of that number are supporting the organization by paying their dues. When an individual joins 10-10, the Registration Fee he pays is enough to get the information about him into the computer record. However, from that date on, he is a constant and recurring expense to 10-10 by virtue of the fact that the information is in the record.

The problem we expect to have is that those most affected - the free loaders - won't know about the regulation unless members, chapter heads, managers, and so on, tell them. Suggestion: When you talk with someone who is collecting 10-10 numbers for an award, tell him about the requirement.

IN THE SUMMER ISSUE, I MENTIONED that I would list information about those who wrote me about computer programs for 10-10 purposes. Thus far I have four letters. Bill Pomeranz, KB6FB, of 55 Encanto Drive, Rolling Hills Estates, CA 90274, has an Apple with some peripheral equipment, and is willing to correspond about his very effective program. Ed Neal, WA4BQV, 27 Hiawatha, Burkburnett, TX 76354, has a TRS-80 III, and uses a Radio Shack Profile program. "Bud" Johnson, KC4OC, 1420 Tinamou Road, S. Venice, FL 33595 uses a program in standard Basic. It is mentioned in the "On Line" section of QST for December, 1981 and August, 1982. Mark Morris, K0WZX, 1419 Lane 20 1/2, Pueblo, CO 81006 also uses a TRS-80 model 1, level II, with quite a bit of peripheral equipment.

Mark points out that my wild assumption regarding the usefulness of a program designed for one kind of computer with a different make was not far off the marks. He says, "In general the instruction set or language varies. Personal computers use Basic but some of the instructions vary, dependent on the computer. I am not sure of the precise figure, but there at least 20 versions of Basic. One can re-write some differing instructions and get around the problem in that manner, but it must be entered from the keyboard, and one may as well start from scratch." If you want to quarrel with that statement, write Mark, not me!



IN THE SUMMER ISSUE, I gave you some figures on how many 10-10 members there were in foreign lands. Recently, I was going through my back issues to get an idea of what I had written about from time to time, and discovered that I had supplied similar information back in 1980. My sources were not exactly the same on both occasions, but sufficiently similar so that they may be compared.

In Canada, membership has increased by more than four-fold. In Australia and Europe it has more than doubled, and in Japan and New Zealand the increase is about 2½ times. That Canadian increase is good reason why we had to arrange to serve members there by asking Reg Pearson, VE3RG, to handle their affairs, effective September 1.

SOME WEEKS AGO, Dexter Anderson, W4KM, made a couple of proposals which have been bounced off various managers and members of the Board of Directors with both positive and negative reactions. Briefly, Dex based his suggestion on the fact that technicians now have the same 10 meter CW privileges as do novices (28,100 - 28,200). One of the ideas was that 10-10 establish a calling and listening frequency at 28,150 or thereabouts, and that contacts be made on that frequency at 30 minutes after each hour, UTC, first listening, and then, if nothing is heard, calling CQ 10-10. Such a practice would not require any action at the Annual Meeting, but could be done by the Board of Directors at any time.

The other portion of the suggestion was that technicians be placed on the same footing as novices with respect to becoming members - that is, only five contacts with present members required, and no \$1.00 registration fee. Such a suggestion is much more controversial, and there are some decided opinions in both camps. There is even the suggestion that the special considerations now allowed to novices be rescinded, especially the registration fee, since it was instituted on the presumption that most novices were youngsters who could not afford the fee, a presumption which is no longer valid. Likely, it is not in any sense true of technicians.

At the present time (mid-September) I have no idea whether such a proposal to amend the By-Laws will be presented to the Annual Meeting. Opinions are so thoroughly divided that it may well die, but if it does come to a vote, you will hear about it in the winter issue of the News. Meanwhile, I would like to know what you think of the ideas. Write!

A FEW NIGHTS AGO, Treasurer Gerry Gross and I discussed at length a couple of matters which had bothered both of us for some time. One was a rather simplistic proposal for a 10-10 life membership which had been suggested by a member. Both of us rejected the idea because there was just no way in which the approach offered could realistically fund a member's services for life. Nevertheless, something may be possible.

The other matter was the one of family memberships. As we see it, only one copy of the News would be mailed. The first member would pay full dues, and others would pay only a nominal annual fee, thus keeping all involved eligible for 10-10 awards. There are numerous problems involved, but the possibilities of savings to members and to 10-10. Number one problem is, as I have said before, that we don't know who the family members are. If you are one such, and all live at the same address, please write me, telling me whether you like the general idea or not, and don't forget to give me names, addresses, call signs, and 10-10 numbers. That information is vital!

The other problem is a technical one, involving keeping all family members 'active' so far as dues are concerned, but limiting mailing stickers to one name and address. To get a handle on that one, we'll have to talk to our computer people. Again, write me.

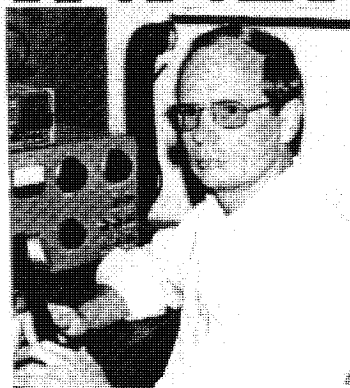

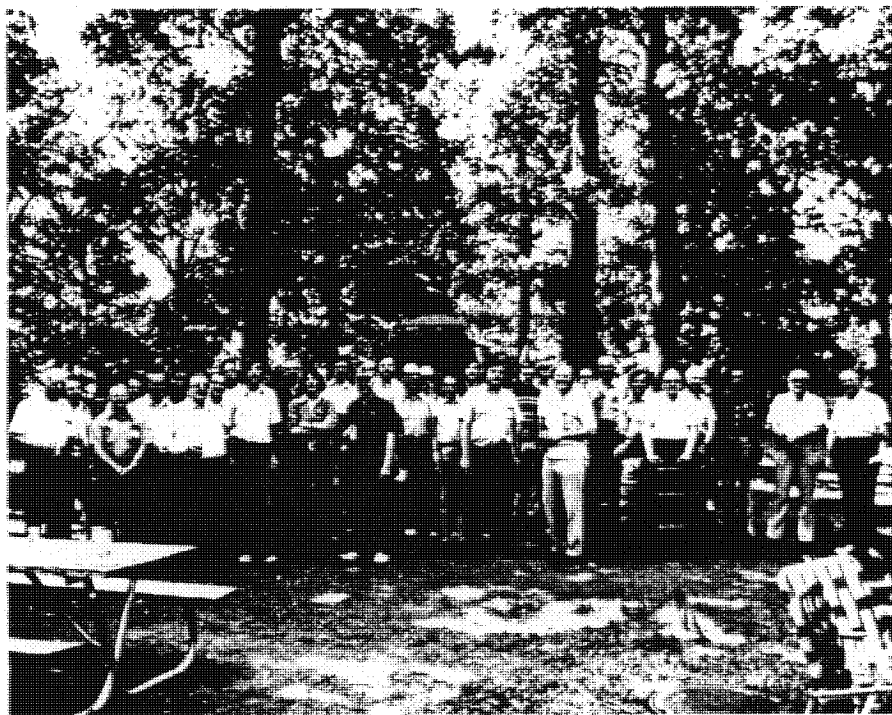
Thanks to all of you who participated in the summer QSO party. The band was not in as good shape as it was for the winter party, but we had logs from 62 chapters and 480 members.

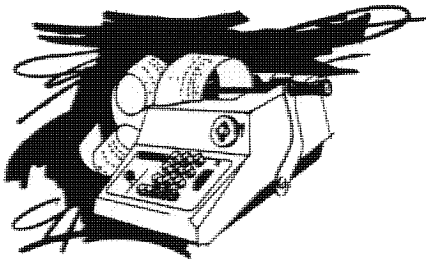
Hi to all! As I closed the books (finally) on fiscal year 1981-82, I thought I would write to all of you who faithfully know me by an address that refills low coffers.

I have enclosed the STATEMENT OF REVENUE AND EXPENSE which has been submitted to the editor for the FALL NEWS. Some interesting stats that can not be found in the year-end statement.

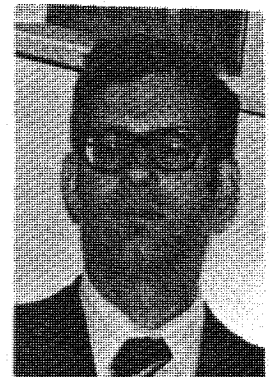
1. The active membership remains in the 9.5 - 10.5 thousand range (increase in dues is the major reason for increased receipts).
2. The largest single increase in expense is postage. ie., for bulletin, rosters, etc. in 1980-81 \$6,702; in 1981-82 \$9,979, an increase of approx. 50%.
3. An unseen increase in mailing services expense was offset by separating the billing of data processing charges from that of the mailing house, saving what is called 'pass-thru' charges.
4. The surplus amounts to 50¢ per member, not very much when you look at the amount of 'volunteer' or 'cost only' services the NET enjoys.

The state of 10-10 is good, our surplus can cover expenses in lean years and our new membership continues to grow, and renewals and reinstatements are high (based upon Aug-Sept receipts).

I am "running" again for another term as treasurer. I think I have the job down to where time is no longer the major problem that it was. I may even be able to get on 10 this winter. 73,

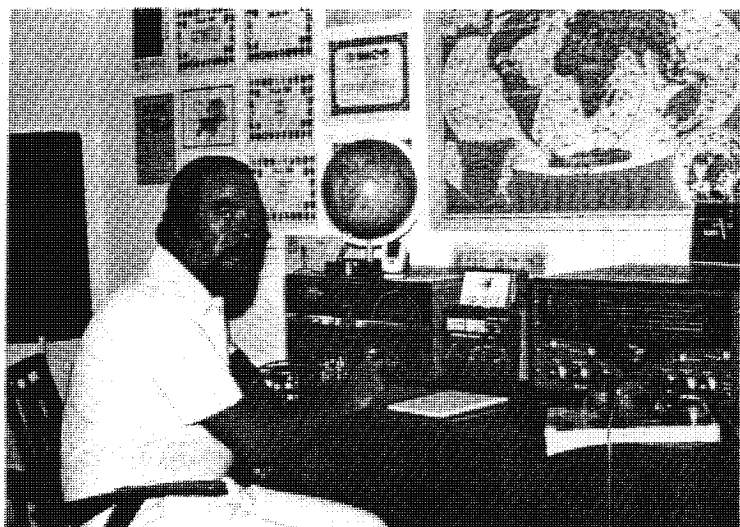

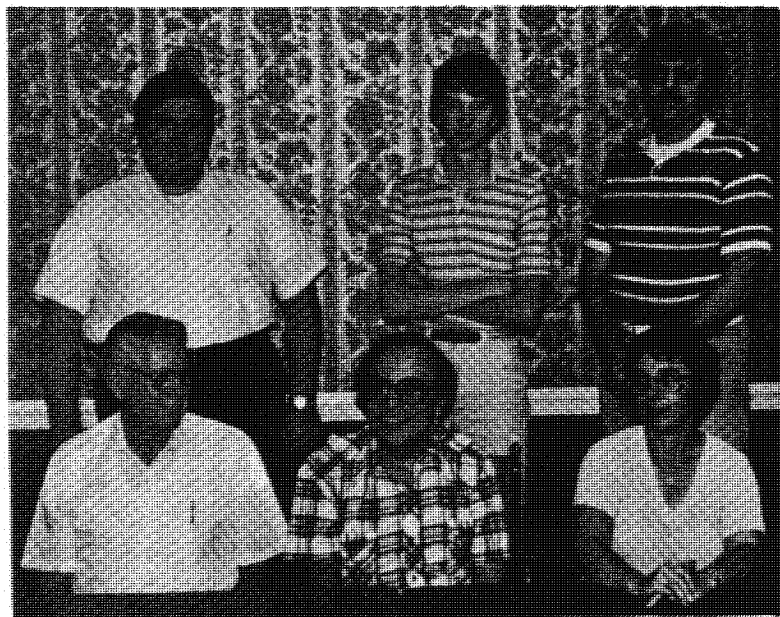

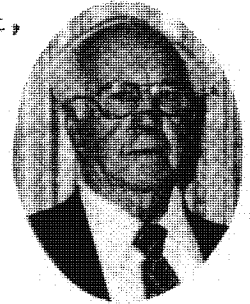

### THE NET CO-ORDINATOR

The Ten Ten Net of So. California was founded by some local amateurs in So. California. When the Net was formed, there was little need for a Net Co-ordinator. There were few members and ten Meters was not very active. The activity was on AM as SSB had not taken over at that time. The band opened up and DX stations were being heard. The NCS asked certain of those amateurs if they wished to be a Chapter Head. Many accepted not knowing what was expected of them. The appointments were made via radio and there was no correspondence between the newly appointed Chapter Heads and the officials in So. Calif. At best, it was a very loose organization. Most of the Chapter Heads would give a prospective member his ten ten number to add to his list of contacts. (To my knowledge there were no Chapter Heads before numbers were issued.) The Prospective member would compile a list of contacts and send them to the secretary with the required fee and receive his own 10-10 number and certificate. Chapter Heads were appointed all over the world as the band opened. No one, at that time, thought it necessary to write to the various Chapter Heads and find out if they were still active, lived in the same place or was, possibly a silent key. No mention was made in the early bulletins about Chapter Heads or Chapters. In fact the bulletin was often a single sheet of paper. It was my understanding that there was to be a Chapter Head in each state and country. This goal was never achieved. Ten meters became more active, SSB rapidly became the popular mode and it was necessary to have two Net Control Stations on different frequencies but at the same time. The SSB stations used 28.800 Mhz, the AM 28.775 and for a time CW was on 28.770 Mhz. Later everyone checked in on 28.800 Mhz. The Chapter Heads also made their report at the time they checked into the Net.

The job of being President and Net Co-ordinator became such a large job that a Net Co-ordinator was appointed. New officers were elected and the Ten Ten Net became International in scope and it was necessary to have representatives or active Chapter Heads to promote the Ten Ten Net. It was then that a decision was made to write to the Chapter Heads and explain what was expected of them. The letters revealed that many had moved, others were no longer active on ten meters and some had become silent keys. Those who were still active and willing to form groups, in the area in which they lived, became the start of the growing list of Chapters which offer 10-10 certificates. It was also decided to write to each of the Chapter Heads and let them know that their efforts were appreciated and worth-while. The certificate idea seemed to be an incentive and the list of Chapters grew. It became necessary to suggest that the Chapters use different frequencies and times to avoid any conflicts on the band. The idea of writing to the Chapter Heads was a good one and resulted in many letters from the Chapter Heads. It was thought that if the Chapter Head could take time to send in a report the Net should likewise take time to reply. The Net Co-ordinator sent an article to the Editor to be published in the Bulletin and the various Chapter members looked for their news. Chapters sent pictures and reports of the activities of the Chapter. In time a list of the chapters, frequencies and the Chapter Head was compiled and published in the Bulletin. The reports listed the number of members checking in and the total number of members in the chapter.

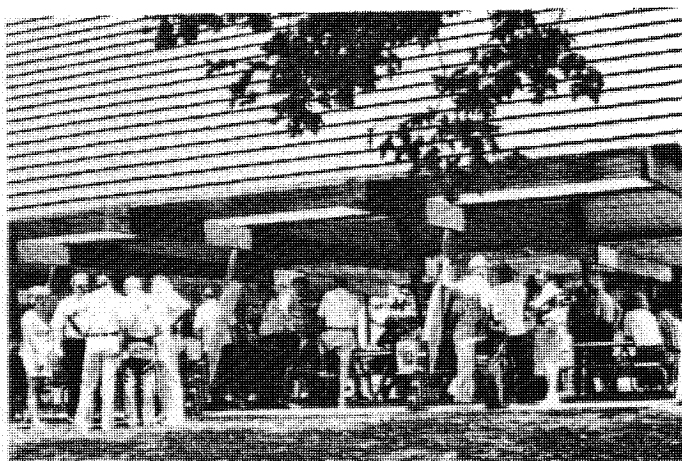
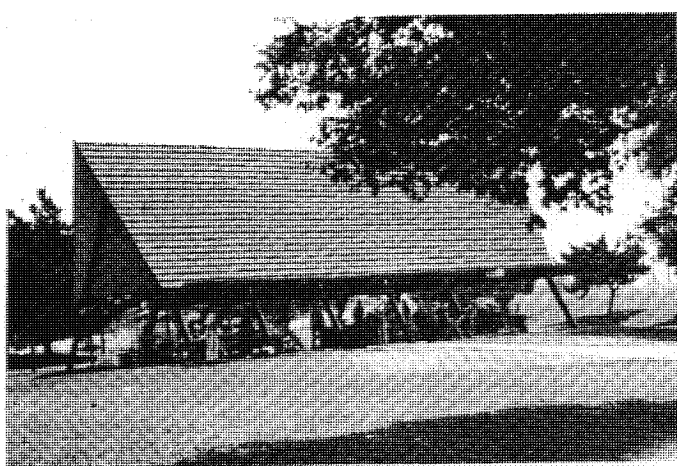
The chapters began issuing certificates which could be earned by contacting a certain number of the chapter members plus other members who held the certificate. There was a small fee required along with the required number



of contacts. The YODAR KRITCH was one of the earliest certificates. Several thousand were issued. A question usually asked of a new contact by a member was "what is your 10-10 number and also do you have a YODAR KRITCH?" That same Baltimore Chapter also issued the SweetHart certificate and that required several YODAR KRITCH contacts. The certificate idea was a means of promoting 10-10 and making the ten meter band one of the most popular. The number of Chapters offering certificates increased as the number of Chapters increased. The certificate idea took hold in the DX countries as well. The "Down Under" area offers the most DX certificates.

The number of chapters increased to a point where it was impossible to reply to each one so the Bulletin was used as the medium to recognize their efforts.

There came a time when things had to change. It was necessary to recruit a new Net Co-ordinator to assume the duties. The new Co-ordinator was in the State of New York. The change of location did not present any problems. The list of chapters increased and those chapters with certificates sent their information to the East Coast Net Co-ordinator and it was "business as usual".



## 10-10 PICNIC

Fast becoming "traditional", 10-10's summer meeting in the Southern California area was a picnic, held in Lakewood, CA at the Mae Boyar Park. Easily accessible, the park is a fine place for such an event. There's playground equipment for youngsters, and lots of shade for oldsters, plus spacious lawns. Like many such events, it attracted families that arrived at varying times, so that many were there for at least part of the time. Arrangements for use of the facilities were made in his usual capable manner by George Joy, WB6SYJ, whose brightly-painted "Small Yellow Jalopy" was a beacon for late arrivals.

If you are starting a new certificate, please be clear as what is expected of each class of applicants. If one has been honored with a special number and is expected to pay for the certificate, please make it clear if he/she is to qualify for the certificate please let it be known. We are all happy to comply if only we know what is expected of us.

Remember the coordination net each Sunday 1800Z or 28.967. All 10-10 officials, chapter heads or their representative are encouraged to check in.

If you have a new net or any changes in your present net, be sure to notify Mickey Principe/KB5UP. If you have a new certificate or any changes including deletions please advise Jim Beswick / W4YHF. Jim publishes a certificate guide and it a must for paper chasers. The cost is \$3.60 stateside and \$4.50 DX air mail. Let us all support Jim in this because it is a labor of love and not for profit.

Finally, my apology to those good people who assist Clint in the fourth call area. In the rules for the closed 10-10 party I neglected to include them as being the same point value as other area managers. This was pointed out to me and I did send each of them a card explaining my goof.

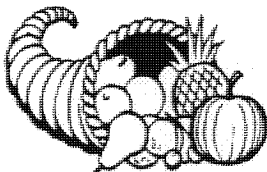
My appreciation to Bud/W4WHM for allowing me to call the Saturday net from Nashville.

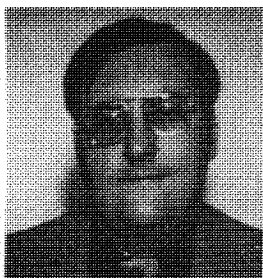

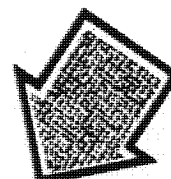

# 10-10 INFORMATION

## REMINDER



Effective 1 Sept. 1982, award applicants must show proof of paid-up 10-10 membership by enclosing Xerox or similar copy of current membership card or address label from a recent issue of the 10-10 News.

### How to become a Ten-Ten Member

Work 10 present members on 10 meters. Log each 10-10 number, call sign, date worked, op's name, location. Send list to your Call Sign Area Manager, with \$1 Registration Fee, \$4 for first year's dues (foreign: \$5). Novices, foreign applicants need work only 5 present members; novices pay no Registration Fee. You will receive a Certificate, and be assigned a permanent 10-10 Number. You must pay annual dues to remain in good standing, receive the News, and participate fully.

### How to earn Bars and Plaques

Log the 10-10 numbers of stations you work on 10 meters, all bona-fide number exchanges on the air. Then list 100 only, no more, no less, no duplicates, thus:

1. List in serial order of 10-10 numbers. Show call, handle, location.
2. Submit only one list of 100 at a time.
3. Log books or copies of log book pages are not acceptable.
4. Give your name, address, call sign, 10-10 number, and state which Bar you are requesting (i.e., 100 Bar, 200 Bar, etc.)
5. Enclose a large size SASE.
6. Mail as follows: 100-900 Bars, Willie E. Madison, WB7VZI, 10512 W. Butler Dr., Peoria, AZ 85345. 1,000 Bar and up, Bill Risher, WB6OMH, P. O. Box 277, Twin Peaks, CA 92391.

With your 500 Bar comes an honorary V. P. Number, and other activities. A 500 Certificate costs \$1. Plaques are awarded for 1,000, 2,500, 5,000 contacts, and cost \$3 each. Make checks payable to 10-10 Int'l Net, Inc. Please do not send cash.

### How to earn WAS

After working and getting QSL card confirmation on one 10-10 member in each of 50 states, prepare an alphabetic list by states with full data on each contact. Mail cards and list to Susan Brackeen, P.O. Box 7081, Johnston, RI 02919. U. S., Canadian, Mexican members send \$2.42, U. S. funds, for certificate cost and return postage. Overseas members may save about half the postage cost by sending non-returnable copies of QSL cards (Fax, Xerox, etc.). More than one card per sheet is OK, but all required information must appear, including 10-10 number. Show both sides of card only if necessary for complete information. Also include alphabetic list of states with full information on each contact, your own complete information, including 10-10 number, and \$2.60 U. S. funds for cost of certificate and return postage. Address application to KALCAD, as shown above. Please do not send cash.

### Countries Award

The Countries Award is given for confirmations (QSL's) of QSO's exchanging 10-10 numbers with members in 25 or more countries. Cost is \$5.00, U. S. funds. For complete rules and application form, send SASE to Alan Sherman, KLAS, RR#2, Box 662, Danielson, CT 06239, U. S. A.
