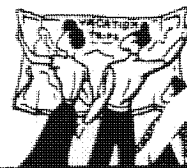

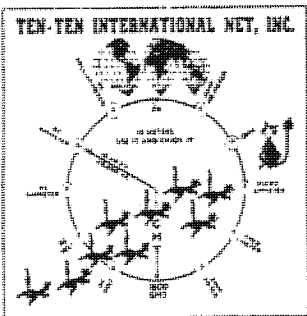

Words from the President

SEVEN OR EIGHT YEARS AGO, EDITH, THE XYL, AND I SPENT a wonderful month in New Zealand. It's a beautiful country, and we met many people --hams and non-hams, New Zealanders and vacationing Aussies. There was an Australian couple with whom we got along wonderfully well. The contact between us has been maintained over the years, and they have stayed with us when in the United States.

For the past months we had been making plans to visit them, and to see some of the wonders Australia has to offer. Our departure date was set for April 9, and we were to be home on May 11. Everything was arranged, paid for in advance, and we had our Australian visas. We had even rearranged our schedule to avoid a conflict with our friends' vacation plans.

On April 1 I went to see my doctor with a minor complaint; on April 2 I was having an angiogram; on April 3 I was acquiring a scar that starts immediately below my breast bone and seems to go on downward much further than I like to contemplate; and on April 9 I was still in the intensive care unit. So much for the trip to Australia. And, as so many others have discovered, the surgery takes only a few hours, but recovering from such a major invasion is something else again. Many of you heard what had happened to me (how you heard, I do not know) and sent cards, and I have been thankful for them. They do serve a purpose! And, before I forget it, thanks to a letter from my doctor, our hard-working travel agent, three different Australian tour agencies, and Qantas, we were refunded virtually all of the prepayment.

WHILE I WAS PUTTERING AROUND HERE AT HOME (Translation: mostly sitting in my easy chair and getting naps three times (or more) each day), I began to receive some disturbing news. May, 1985 was a bad month for 10-10. On April 18 I received a call from John Schmitt, WA1ZLK, who told me that Earle White, W1NC, was in the hospital and that his condition was grave. Earle became a Silent Key on May 23. Also, I had picked up some rumors that Clint Paine, K4EKX, was a Silent Key, and these rumors were verified by Editor Jim Michaels, who had a letter from Ralph Kuhnert, N4GQM, a neighbor of Clint's, written at the request of Clint's widow. Clint became a Silent Key on May 3.

Elsewhere in this issue there is a brief tribute to these two 10-10 stalwarts, but I want to say something personal, which is that I admired and respected both of them. I have had many on-the-air talks with them, have exchanged dozens of letters, and talked on the telephone when we couldn't get in touch by radio. Both made such great contributions to this organization that we simply cannot thank them enough, and cannot thank them now except in our memories.

Several years ago, Earle had suggested to me that John Schmitt would be prepared to replace him in the event he was no longer able to serve, and that replacement has been accomplished. John is now the Manager for the first call area, and information as to his address appears on page 31. A year or so back, Clint decided to yield his post as Manager for the fourth call area, and suggested Dave Buschow, WD4MPG, as his replacement. Clint and Dave worked closely on the change, and everything went most smoothly. The same is true in the first call area, where John now has all of Earle's materials, and had been thoroughly indoctrinated in the procedures over the past several years.

THE SEVENTH CALL AREA MANAGER IS WILLIE MADISON, WB7VZI. He has the distinction of riding herd on an area that extends all the way from the Mexican border to well north of the Arctic Circle. Like most other managers, he sends postal cards to those members whose paid-up status has expired, and a fair proportion of them respond by sending in the dues to continue membership.

Willie sent me a letter from a member who said he did not intend to renew since he lived in Alaska and often did not receive the News issue announcing a contest until after the contest had been held.

A few years ago he would have had a legitimate complaint, but not in recent years. Foreign members used to send letters with the same complaint, so we did something about it. Or rather, Harry Syring did something about it. Harry, WB1FTQ, is the chap listed on page 2 as "Chmn., Rules Comm." That means that Harry is the one who puts together the contest rules and supplies the page copy for the announcements to Editor Jim Michaels. The dates for the CW QSO Party to be held in the spring of 1985 were announced in the News issue for the fall of 1984; the dates for the Phone QSO Party to be held in the summer were announced in the winter issue. That allows about six months for the information to get to everyone. It seems to take about three months for mail to get to our overseas members, and maybe to Alaska and Hawaii, too, although the letter I referred to is the first I've heard about with this particular complaint.

I HAVE SAID BEFORE THAT I LIKE TO GET LETTERS FROM MEMBERS, and I recently had one from KC0FT, Al Schoberg, who is CH for the Minn-Dak Sunflower Chapter, which centers around Moorhead, MN. The part I liked best was this paragraph: "I have no complaints about the way 10-X is run. The News comes in a fairly timely manner and has only been lost once by the postal service. A letter to my regional manager brought quick action - a replacement copy in the mail." Al also pointed out that although the chapter net had not had an 'outside' checkin in recent memory, if anyone was hunting North Dakota for WAS, more than half their local stations are on the ND side of the line. As I recall, North Dakota was either the last or next-to-last state for me when I made 10-10 WAS, which was back quite a few years (1976, I think). Incidentally, I subsequently sent the QSL cards to ARRL and applied for their WAS Certificate, noting that all the contacts were on 10 meter single sideband. It came with an endorsement to that effect.

AT THE TIME JIM MICHAELS WAS PUTTING TOGETHER the News for the spring issue, he told me that he had been quite impressed by the way the City of Lights Chapter had gone about making sure that they amassed a large number of points. They did a bang-up job, even managing to outclass the Nutmeg Chapter by nearly 1300 points. I wrote a letter to Jerry Frieders, W9ZGP, who is CH, and asked for details.

One thing they did was to mail out about 100 copies of a special plea for participation and membership renewal. It has the chapter standings for the winter '84 contest, which was won by Nutmeg, with S.H.O.T. second, and Ft. McHenry third, followed by City of Lights. On the back of that page are the contest rules; a third page has a 10-10 membership renewal form on half the page and a contest cover sheet on the other half. The forth page is reserved for addressing. The only thing missing is a dupe sheet, and there was probably a reason for that, since different ops use different kinds of dupe sheets, some preferring the kind that uses call signs, while others like the kind that goes by 10-10 numbers.

Jerry pointed out that what worked for them might not necessarily work for another chapter. City of Lights is centered in Aurora, IL, about 40 miles west of Chicago, and in a densely populated metropolitan area. They advertise and promote 10-10, the chapter, and the contests. And they get results! Jerry also suggested a trophy of some sort for the chapter winning a 'phone QSO Party, to be held until a different chapter won, at which time it would be forwarded to the new winner. I would like reactions and comments and you can send them to me at 5872 W. 77 Place, Los Angeles, CA 90045. Maybe we can work something out!

SOMETIMES VARIOUS STRANGE RUMORS PERCOLATE out this way. One of the strangest I have heard for a long time is said to have provoked quite a discussion at some dinner meeting. It went something like this: suppose you eyeball a 10-10 member whom you have never worked on the air and exchange numbers with him. Can you then count this eyeball meeting as a "contact." The answer is, "No!" Since the memory of man runneth not to the contrary, page 30 of this journal has stated the rules for (1) obtaining membership, and (2) earning Bars and Plaques. In each case, the rules specify that there must be a bona-fide 10 meter contact. How anyone could interpret this otherwise is beyond me. Maybe I have misunderstood the whole matter.

JACK SMOTHERS USED TO LIVE DOWN IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA, is a 'paper chaser' and got interested in the idea of updating the 10-10 Roster between issues. He now lives in Oregon, but his idea hasn't changed. He publishes an update and sells it for \$1.39 to addresses with U. S. Zip Codes, and \$2.76 air mail to DX stations. I think that the amount over \$1 represents postage cost. It runs to 13 pages or so and must be a labor of love, since he won't make any money out of it at that price. I suspect that copies going to Canada and Mexico would also go at the \$1.39 rate, but Jack didn't specifically say so. Anyhow, if you're interested, his name and address are, D. M. Smothers, KD7XI, P. O. Box 425, Turner, OR 97392. Jack's effort may be particularly important this year because there are no immediate plans for a new 10-10 Roster. Maybe next year.

HAVING WRITTEN THAT ABOUT JACK, I AM REMINDED that there is another faithful who makes available a super product for paper chasers, and that is Jim Beswick, W4YHF. Jim publishes a Certificate Guide which lists everything you need to know about chapters that offer certificates. He updates it often and sells his latest version for \$3.39, post-paid. He also has a monthly update for 50¢ plus an SASE. You can get in touch with Jim at Route 5, Box 77B, Ellijay, GA 30540. This also is a labor of love.

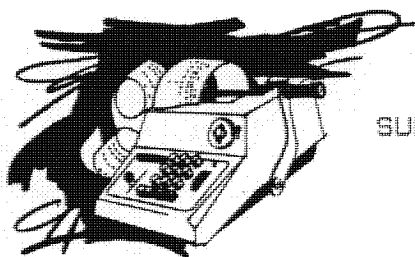
ANOTHER LABOR OF LOVE IS A PUBLICATION OF WHICH I HAVE RECEIVED A COPY of the very first issue. It is called METRO-NET, and it is published to provide news of the six chapters in the metropolitan New York City area. Rich Levy, WB2MAN, is the Editor, and he has done a super job with this first issue. Larry Berger, WA2SUH, who is the Manager for 2-land has an article in which he names the winners of his unannounced contest to find out which 2-land members were shown most frequently to be among the ten contacts cited in new member applications. Larry awarded prizes (or, rather, the LIARS Chapter did), to the 'winners' of this unannounced contest. Moral: get on, solicit new members, and get yourself listed as a sponsoring member. There's also a good article on "The Unsung Heroes of Ten Ten," especially highlighting the work of net control stations. Good stuff!

LISTENING ON THE DAILY NET, I HEARD A NEW MEMBER trying to pick up numbers. On three successive calls, he copied the call sign incorrectly, in spite of the phonetics that were used. I don't know how to account for that, unless there was a hearing problem. I have one myself, so I keep my 'good' ear cocked toward the speaker. However, let me say that using understandable phonetics is a great help. There are dozens (well, half a dozen anyway) of phonetic lists. Find one and use it! There are just too many letters in the English alphabet that sound the same unless accompanied by phonetics. A few years back I wrote more extensively on this subject, and got a lot of letters. Maybe this time, too.

I'VE WORKED A NUMBER OF STATIONS WITH NUMBERS OVER 40,000. Here's how the high number blocks were assigned by Records Manager Lee Pasewalk, WB6MGM: 5th call area, 40,000-40099; 6th, 40,100-40199; VE, 40,200-40,299; 8th, 40,300-40,399. Lee gave me this information a few weeks back, so maybe he's assigned even higher blocks that I don't yet know about. In any event, we're getting up there. Now, if only some of you with lower numbers would renew, we'd be in a lot better shape than we are.

CLINT PAINE, K4EXX, 10-10 No. 2388, was born in Springfield, Vermont in 1904. He was educated in schools located in a number of the New England and Middle Atlantic states, and was first licensed as an amateur in 1953. He was one of the early members of 10-10, and took the responsibility of 4th district manager in 1975. At that time, the 4th call area membership was 800; by operating promotional booths at many hamfests and through untiring efforts, he had increased 4th call area membership to 5000 by the end of 1979. He devised the present plan of separating the 4th call area into four smaller units. Clint relinquished the role of manager in 1984.

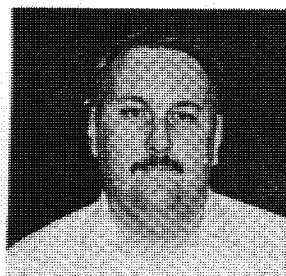
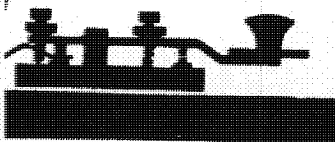


EARLE WHITE, WINC, 10-10 No 329, was also one of the very early members of 10-10. Earle was born in Taunton, Massachusetts in 1907. He attended Tufts University and graduated with a degree in engineering in 1932. In 1938 he became a member of the Cyclotron staff at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and remained there until his retirement in 1973. He had been licensed as an amateur in 1934, and became a member of 10-10 in 1968. He became the first manager for the 1st call area, and remained in that capacity, despite severe health problems until his death in May, 1985.

2. Exchanges: Callsign, name, city, state, and 10-10 number.
3. A station may be counted only once.
4. Single operator stations only are acceptable.
5. CW and RTTY modes are acceptable.
6. All Contacts must take place within the 48 hour contest period.
7. QRP class has been discontinued due to low activity.
8. Logs must be kept in UTC (Zulu Time).
9. A Dupe sheet is required of all participants submitting logs.
Indicated computer duping O.K.
10. Chapter assignment of scores may be only by a paid-up member, belonging to that chapter as a local member, and able to work that chapter Net via groundwave from the location of the station working the contest.
11. Illegible or improperly submitted logs will be rejected. See below for log submission requirements.
12. Failure to comply with any of these rules or their intent may result in disqualification.

SCORING

1. Two points for each contact with a 10-10 number exchange.
2. One point for each contact with a 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS

First place certificates to all U.S. Call areas; KL7 included with 7th area. Also Canada, South America, Central America, Caribbean (including Bermuda), Europe, Africa, Asia, and the Pacific, (including KH6, all Pacific Islands, New Zealand and Australia). Individual and chapter scores are published in the NEWS. Paid members only are listed.

LOG SUBMISSION

Logs are accepted from 10-10 members only and must be legible, in UTC, and complete. Each line entry must show Callsign, time, name, QTH, and 10-10 number (if any). A Cover Sheet is required showing your name, callsign, QTH, 10-10 number, membership expiration date, chapter assignment, total contacts and total points claimed. A cover sheet can be found on page 32. A Dupe Sheet must accompany all logs. ARRL Executive Committee Proposes New Novice Privileges

At its May 18 meeting, the ARRL Executive Committee approved a plan for enhanced privileges for Novice class Amateur Radio operators. The plan was developed by the Hq. staff in response to discussions held at the March 23 Executive Committee meeting. The proposal includes data and voice privileges on a portion of the 10 meter band, all data and voice privileges on 220 MHz, and voice and data privileges on a portion of the 1.2 GHz band.

The Executive Committee believes it is important for ARRL to be in the vanguard of efforts to modernize the Novice license. On a matter as important as this it is essential that the action be by the Board of Directors of the ARRL, and not just by the Executive Committee. Accordingly, Board endorsement of the proposal has been solicited by mail ballot.

The Executive Committee endorsed the following package:

1. Development of a plan to replace the existing worldwide network of 28-MHz beacons between 28.2 and 28.3 MHz with a single-frequency time-sharing network similar to the one that is being operated successfully on 14.1 MHz by the Northern California DX Foundation.

2. Expansion of the existing 28-MHz Novice band as follows:

- A. 28.1-28.3 MHz: type A1A, J2A, F1B, and J2B emissions (CW and data, 1200 baud maximum).

- B. 28.3-28.5 MHz: type A1A, J2A, and J3E emissions (CW and SSB).

3. 220-225 MHz, all voice and data modes (including CW), 25 watts output, no repeater operation by Novices (i.e., a Novice can operate through a repeater, but cannot sponsor one).

4. Privileges similar to those requested for 220 MHz, but for a portion of the 1240-MHz band consistent with the newly adopted band plan: e.g., 1246-1260 MHz. The power limit would be 5 watts output, to avoid concerns related to RF energy exposure by inexperienced persons.

The idea behind this plan is as follows:

1. To attract young people who are interested in computers and digital communication into Amateur Radio, we must offer them digital privileges. Adding RTTY and packet radio privileges on 10 meters would accomplish this. A suitable band plan can be developed for the band to keep a segment free for conventional, manual Morse code operation. Expanding the 10 meter Novice band, and permitting limited SSB operation, would have minimal impact on other licensees.

2. FCC has indicated that 220 MHz cannot be made available for Novice operation pending completion of a joint long-range study by FCC and NTIA of the 216-225 MHz spectrum. In the meantime, there should be some way found to give Novices some FM/repeater privileges so their numbers can be put to use in performing public service communications. The 1240 MHz band is suggested as the place where this could be accomplished with a minimum of delay, and a minimal disruption of existing operations.

3. At the time these new privileges are added, the Element 2 examination syllabus would be expanded to include basic digital and voice operating techniques. The Novice written examination would be expanded to 30 questions, and the question pool to 300, to accommodate the additional questions.

With these additional privileges, the Novice license would become most attractive to our target audience, without eliminating or even significantly reducing the incentives to upgrade to the higher classes of license and without disrupting the present activities of higher-class licensees. Technicians would also gain the 10 meter privileges granted to Novices.

So as not to reduce the privileges of General, Advanced and Extra Class licensees, the Executive Committee recommended that other licensees be permitted to use the higher power levels permitted by their class of license, even when operating in the Novice bands.

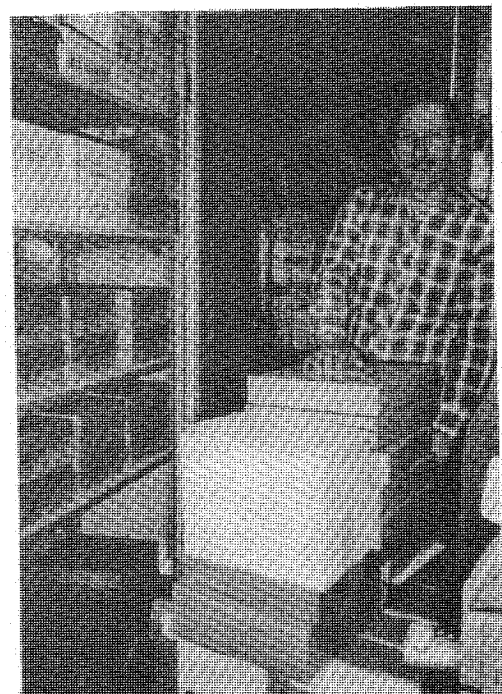

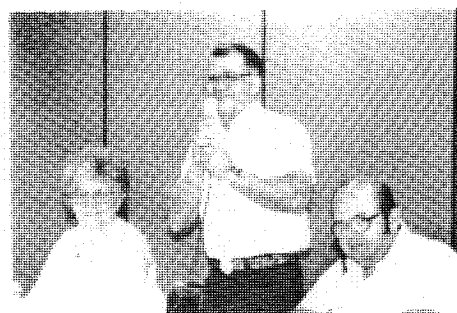

THE UNSUNG HEROS OF TEN TEN

from Chapter Head K2HLC, John:

As you probably know, the services provided by 10-10 and it's affiliated Chapters are provided on a purely voluntary basis. This article will highlight just one of these groups... the Net Control Stations.

When checking in to a net you may not fully appreciate the myriad of activities taking place at the operating position of the NCS. Recording a accurate list of check-ins is only the beginning. At the same time he/she is diligently recording as much data from each check-in as possible. This is to ensure that all stations may accurately receive all information exchanged during each contact. This requires careful monitoring during each check in, and also, during each exchange during the course of the net.

Your net control station appreciates all checkins and your recording of the data of others checking in, especially the information of those stations with whom you may wish to contact during the net. So... record as much as you can.

Net control stations will endeavor to make the net as enjoyable as possible, giving everyone equal opportunity to complete as many contacts as possible. I have yet to meet a NCS that does not adhere to this precept.

Generally NCS's adhere to a rather conventional manner of "running the list". Occasionally there are times when this will vary. This is especially true when 'skip' stations are heard or other traffic may be of primary importance. At these times net control may deviate from conventional procedures so listen for instructions. This will usually happen so that all stations will have an equal opportunity to work the skip.

Should you have marginal copy on a 'skip' station, or do not require the contact tell net control to pass to the next station. If conditions remain reliable through the check-in list you will be given ample opportunity to make the contact should you so desire.

At times net control will not hear all stations for varying reasons (marginal signals, beam in wrong direction, QRM, etc.). This is when net control will ASK for relays, generally by a specific station. Please do not relay unless requested. This only causes "doubling", QRM and slows down net activities. 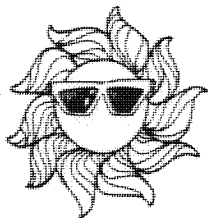

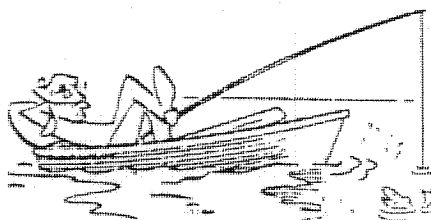
I am pleased to have had so much from the chapters that I had to limit this to one page. Ten is open some almost everyday so do check as often as possible.

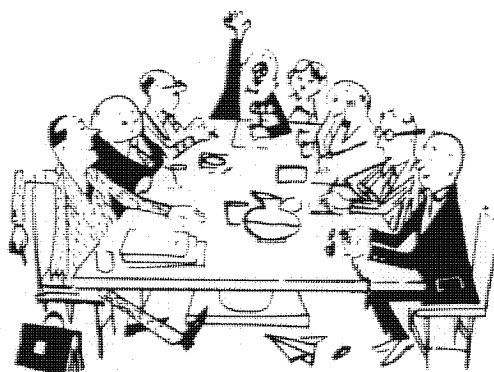

10-10 INFORMATION

How to become a Ten-Ten Member

Work 10 present members on 10 meters. Log each 10-10 number, call sign, date worked, op's name, location. Send list to your Call Sign Area Manager, with \$1 Registration Fee, \$4 for first years dues (foreign \$5, U.S.). Novices, foreign applicants need work only 5 present members; novices pay no Registration Fee. You will receive a Certificate, and be assigned a permanent 10-10 Number. You must pay annual dues to remain in good standing, receive the News, and participate fully in all activities.

How to earn Bars and Plaques

Log the 10-10 numbers of stations you work on 10 meters, all bona-fide number exchanges on the air. Then list 100, no more, no less, no duplicates, thus:

1. List in serial order of 10-10 numbers. Show call, handle and location.
2. Submit only one list of 100 at a time.
3. Log books or copies of log book pages are not acceptable.
4. Give your name, address, call sign, 10-10 number, and state which Bar you are requesting (i.e., 100 Bar, 200 Bar etc.)
5. Enclose a #10 (4x9 1/2) envelope. (22¢ first oz. 17¢ ea. add'l oz.) (DX stations require 3 IRC's at 30¢ each)
6. Mail as follows: 100-900 Bars, Willie Madison, WB7VZI, 10512 W. Butler Dr., Peoria, AZ 85345. 1000 Bar and up, Charles L. Busby, KC5FX, 4621 catchin Drive, Fort Worth, TX 76118.

With your 500 Bar comes an honorary V.P. number and other activities. A 500 certificate costs \$1. Plaques are awarded for 1000, 2500 and 5000 contacts, and cost \$3.75 plus 39¢ postage (USA). DX requires \$4.95 total Int'l M.O. Make any checks payable to 10-10 Int'l. Net, Inc. DO NOT SEND CASH.

How to earn WAS

After working and getting QSL card confirmation on one 10-10 member in each of 50 states, prepare an alphabetical list by states with full data on each contact. Mail cards and list to Susan Brackeen, KALCAD, P.O. Box 7081, Johnston, RI 02919. U. S., Canadian, Mexican members send \$2.42, U.S. funds, for certificate cost and return postage. Overseas members may save about half the postage cost by sending non-returnable copies of QSL cards (Fax, Xerox, etc.). More than one card per sheet is OK, but all required information must appear, including 10-10 number. Show both sides of card only if necessary for complete information. Also include alphabetic list of states with full information on each contact, your own complete information, including 10-10 number, and \$2.60 U.S. funds for cost of certificate and return postage. Address application to KALCAD, as shown above. Please do not send cash.

Countries Award

The Countries Award is given for confirmation (QSL's) of QSO's exchanging 10-10 numbers with members in 25 or more countries. Cost is \$5.00, U.S. funds. For complete rules and application form, send business size (#10) SASE to Alan Sherman, KIAS, RR4, Box 422, Danielson, CT 06239, U.S.A.

Make any checks payable to 10-10 International Net, Inc. DO NOT SEND CASH. Canadian, Australian and New Zealand applicants are reminded that dollar amounts quoted are U. S. dollars. Your bank can tell you how much to send in your own currency to make up the required amount in U. S. funds.

Award applicants must show proof of paid-up 10-10 membership by enclosing Xerox or similar copy of current membership card or address label from a recent issue of the 10-10 News.
