Black and white photographs are preferred, however, color is acceptable, if it is sharp. Include complete information with call signs, complete name, and any other pertinent information.



WORDS FROM THE PRESIDENT

ESSAYESSEE!!

District Managers (and other Managers) who work for 10-10 out of the generosity of their hearts and the goodness of their souls have to take a lot of undeserved guff from members and would-be members.

One of the more troublesome (because it becomes very expensive) is the failure of those who write them seeking membership renewals or maybe just asking for information to enclose an SASE!

I suspect that there are a lot of people out there who just don't know what an SASE is. Those four letters appear in a number of places in each issue of the News, and maybe we expect too much when we think that everyone who reads them will know what they mean.

Let's take a whack at trying to explain what we mean. The letters "S" and "A" mean Self-Addressed. Now, you ask, why would we find it desirable to have something self-addressed. The reason is so obvious that you probably never thought of it: a lot of you have handwriting (and also, at times, printing) that is just downright impossible to read. If we ask you to do the writing (or printing), the monkey is on your back. If the postal people can't read it, that's your fault. Complain to them, not to your Manager.

Those last two letters, "S" and "E" mean stamped envelope. You know what an envelope is. There are two sizes in common use - one is about 3 5/8" x 6" and is commonly called "letter size." The other, often referred to as "business size" is about 4" x 9 1/2". This makes it handy, since the smaller size fits nicely, without folding, in the larger one. Both these items are made of paper, nicely sealed up on three sides, with the fourth a kind of flap with a thin strip of glue, so you can put something inside, and then use your moist tongue to lick the flap and seal up the whole thing, safe from prying eyes.

Now comes the important part: You must put a postage stamp on both the envelopes. The stamp must carry enough value to get the envelope where it is supposed to go. That means that the stamp on the outer envelope has to be able to get it to your Manager, and the stamp on the inner envelope must get that one back to you (assuming your name and address are legible).

All of this is very simple. Let's just do it!

GETTING THINGS TOGETHER

Every time I go to write one of these segments for the News, I have to stop and think about whether it is something I have written about before, and, if so, how recently.

I don't suppose it really matters much, since so many of our members are new in the last few months. Even if I have written about something, they likely will not have read it.

What I want to tell you about is what goes into getting out an issue of the News. There are just quite a few streams that have to come together so that we can dump our few thousand copies into the maw of the postal service.

Every month, Area Managers report membership information to Records Manager Lee Pasewalk. This includes new members, renewals, and all kinds of changes. Lee puts this together and sends me a summary. At the end of each quarter, he assembles everything and gets it to our computer facility.

Meanwhile, I have copies of the invoices from the last issue, so I know how many were printed, how many mailed, and how many sent out in bulk to managers and others. Also, if I'm lucky, I have some information on special needs, such as conventions and hamfests.

Up in Milwaukee, Editor Joe Williams is desperately hoping that everyone will remember the editorial deadlines, which are the 15th of March, June, September, and December. If everyone gets camera-ready copy in on time, Joe has 2 - 3 weeks in which to paste up everything the way it has to go, get photos screened and sized, and do everything else needed to get copy to me in the first week or so of the following month.

About the same time, Lee has taken all the membership information to the computer people, and I have sent them a purchase order to let them know what we need. When Joe's copy gets to me, I review it and confer with him by telephone if there are questions I can't answer myself. Then I take the copy to the printer, along with a purchase order that specifies my best guess as to the number of copies to be printed. Notice I said, "best guess." There is always some uncertainty, since we don't know how many members haven't renewed. Then we sit back, hope we've guessed right, and let the mail people do their little chore of giving it all to the U. S. P. S.

CHANGING THINGS

There seems to be quite a bit of misunderstanding around about the new Bylaws and some of their provisions. Managers are telling me that members are asking about life and family memberships.

Let's get one thing abundantly clear: there are no current provisions for either life or afmily memberships. We (10-10) are currently operating under the old Bylaws, which have no provision for either of these.

Here's how it will work: When the new Bylaws are finally adopted (probably before you read this), there will be provision in them for both the kinds of membership mentioned. But, the actual operating procedures will not yet be in place. Determining them will be the task of the officers and directors to be chosen this fall.

When those procedures in place, ample notice will be given by way of these pages. Then, and not before then, will you be able to apply for a life membership, or you family types will be able to apply for a family membership. Until then, hold your fire, please.

HARSH MEASURES!

Some weeks after writing the piece on ESSAYESSEE! that appears back in the beginning of this column, I had a long 'phone conversation with Andy Anderson, NSCUQ, who handles Bars above 1000 and plaques,

Andy is being bugged by you types who don't enclose the SASE. If you look on Page 30, which has the award information, you'll see that Rule 5, under "Bars and Plaques" governs this requirement.

Andy has a solution. He says that if an applicant doesn't enclose the SASE there will be no reply. Now, we always encourage all applicants to be patient. After all, managers are volunteers, and they have to live their own lives too. But, if no reply comes after a few weeks, think back. Did you enclose the SASE? If you didn't, that's the reason. Get busy and send the necessary!

I don't know if Bobbie Vaughan, WB7NUU, who handles Bars up to 900 will be this tough, but she should be. The SASE is your responsibility, not Bobbie's or Andy's.

CROUCHING

A lot of people probably think that I am an old grouch, and maybe I am. Was that a voice I just heard from out there somewhere, saying, "You're darned right you are!"

What I am grousing about now is the number of guys I hear, especially down in the 28.3 - 28.5 region who just don't identify. Yes, I know that identification rules are a lot less stringent now than they were in the 'olden days'. But that's no excuse for ten sounding like a two meter repeater.

Let's say that one of the chaps you hear mentions that he has a 10-10 number, and you'd like to add it to your collection, but you don't know his call sign. How do you call him? How do you know his number isn't one you already have? Unless he gives his call sign, you are up a tree. To carry it a bit further, suppose you are working on your WAS and would like to know what state the chap is in. Grouch! Grouch! You don't even know what call area he's in!

Well, that's often - not always, but often - how I hear things on the band. Does the shoe fit you? Give it some thought. Maybe give your call just once in a while - not every transmission, but once in a while!

ELSEWHERE

Some readers may skip certain items, such as the minutes of the quarterly meeting, because they may think them boring. Don't do it! This time they contain information about a dues increase, and family and life memberships. Also, while I'm thinking of things to which you should pay attention, there are many of you who are sending in money for a 1988 Roster. Don't! There is no 1988 Roster, and sending in money just causes problem. The Roster is bought by only a small proportion of our members, and how to cope with that problem will be up to next year's officers.

There's also a story about this year's scholarship winners - the first in 10-10's new program. You can - and should - contribute to the scholarship fund, whether as an individual or as a chapter. Make your checks payable to "10-10 Scholarship Fund" and mail them to Treasurer Gerry Gross, 8145 Cozycroft Ave., Canoga Park, CA 91306. Gerry has set up a separate account specifically to receive such donations. He will welcome yours.

SECRETARY REPORT

Report on Ten-Ten International Net, Inc. Quarterly Meeting

The quarterly Ten-Ten Luncheon meeting was held on Sunday August 14, 1988 at Sir George's Restaurant in Long Beach, CA. The meeting was conducted by Ten-Ten President, Howard Bowman, W6QIR. Following welcoming remarks by Howard, our Treasurer, Gerry Gross, WA6POZ, provided a comprehensive Treasurer's report, including actual expenses by category for the 1987-88 year and budgeted expenses for the 1988-89 year, with actuals by quarter through June 1988. Gerry also provided income estimates by quarter and quarterly expenses for publishing the 10-10 News (including printing costs, postal costs, mailing service, and data-processing service). With the recently increased postal expenses and with increased Ten-Ten membership, the projected cost for the 10-10 News will be \$34,200 for the 1st - 4th quarters of the Fiscal year. (A summary of the Gerry's report is published separately in the 10-10 News.)

There were discussions with regards to the financial status of Ten-Ten International in view of actual and anticipated cost increases for operating expenses. Several very important motions were made and passed, with respect to the topics of Life Memberships, Family Memberships, increasing the cost of annual membership dues, and proration of current dues during 1989 towards Life or Family Memberships.

A motion was made and approved, to institute Life Membership, starting on January 1, 1989. The cost of Life Membership will be 25 times the annual fee for US or International membership, as appropriate.

A motion was made and approved, to institute Family Memberships, starting on January 1, 1989, at an additional fee of \$.50 per family member per year. (One member would pay the normal annual dues and additional members of the family who are licensed and have 10-10 numbers, would pay 50 cents each.) A motion was also made and approved, allowing any member applying for Life or Family Membership during 1989 to prorate their current dues towards the cost of the new class of membership.

A motion was also made and approved to raise the fee for annual 10-10 membership, starting January 1st, 1990. The new fee structure approved is: \$6.00 per year for US membership and \$8.00 per year for International Membership. The motion also provided that the cost of Life Membership would rise accordingly in 1990, to 25 times the increased annual membership fee. (There is clearly a good incentive, if interested in Life Membership, to take action during 1989, before the scheduled 1990 dues increase!)


A motion was made and approved, to send \$1,000.00 to the Milwaukee Convention Chairman for expenses for the 1989 Ten-Ten Convention to be held in Milwaukee. This amount is within the budget.

A motion was made and approved, that the new By-Laws be accepted as written.

Jim Michaels, W6PGM, who is serving effectively as Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made a brief report on the activities of the Nominating Committee to date. President Howard Bowman, W6QIR, announced that the Foundation For Amateur Radio had named the winners of the 10-10 International Net scholarships for 1988. (Please see Howard's column for a complete page of details and several pictures.)

FIRST SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS ANNOUNCED


In a recent announcement, the Foundation For Amateur Radio revealed that the first two scholarship winners are Stephanie Ann Dougherty, N8FIT and Nathan S. Willingham, KAOIFO.

Stephanie is from an all-ham family. Her father is KN8I, her mother is KD8LI, and a sister is N8ERH. Stephanie was first licensed as a Novice (KA8QJQ) in 1982, and attained General Class a year later as N8FIT. She has been a member of the Eastern Michigan Amateur Radio Club for five years, has taken part in a number of Field Days and SET's and has assisted in providing communications for a number of major events.

A licensed private pilot, Stephanie also enjoys riflery, motorcycle riding, racquetball, and bowling. Chosen Michigan YL of the year in 1986, Stephanie also won an ARRL Scholarship in 1987. She works at the Vet Clinic as a secretary at the Michigan State University, where she will enter her sophomore year as a student in Electrical Engineering.

At age 19, Stephanie is fully occupied with her school work, her job, and her many other activities, with the result that her ham activities are mainly confined to two meters.

Nathan is 18, and is entering his sophomore year at Oral Roberts University with a major in Electrical Engineering. His father is James, KOARS.



He obtained his general, advance, and extra class license the same year, in the period March to September, and elected to keep his same call sign, KAOUFO. He enjoys hunting and fishing, slow-pitch baseball, and working on his old truck. 
Bill started in ham radio back in 1949. We wonders if his father had something to do with that. Though not a ham, his father used to build radios during Bill's early childhood.

As ten meters opens more, be sure to look for the Polish Fire Department. He Will Be There.





With the approval of the By-Laws, Life and Family memberships became reality. The Board approved the following fees for these membership classes: Life membership is equal to 25 times the annual dues, (\$100 US and \$125 International), and Family membership equal to \$.50 per year per family member. The Board also approved two other resolutions: during 1989, applicants for Life and Family memberships will have previous paid dues prorated and credited towards their new membership class. Effective Jan 1, 1990, annual dues will be \$6 and \$8, (US and International, respectively).

To apply for Life or Family Life membership, (family member where the primary member is a life member), mail a copy of your current membership card and the appropriate funds to the Treasurer. Send the full amount; the Treasurer will calculate any proration.

To apply for Family membership, send a copy of your and the primary member's membership cards, and the appropriate funds to your Area Manager.

For the first time since August 1987, I find myself with some free time at work and at home. The project that I had been working on is completed, allowing me to leave work a little early, and check into a few weekday nets. However, by the time this gets to you, I will have completed a two week vacation to Washington, Oregon and Western Canada, and will be back at work on a new assignment.

Remember the 2nd 10-10 International Convention in Milwaukee in August of 1989, and the Dayton Hamvention during April. See you there.

CHAPTER COORDINATOR'S DESK..... By Hugh WA4OZU

Perhaps one of the major frustrations for paperchasers is to apply for a cert upgrade and wait . . . and wait . . . for a reply which may never come. So, in August, a questionnaire in lieu of the regular quarterly report was sent to 202 Chapters which are believed to be active in 10-10. The responses (about 35 returned in 8 days) - or lack of - will enable a revival of the Endangered Species and Extinct Lists. If your Chapter is active and you did not receive a questionnaire, let me know.

It is imperative that I have an accurate frequency guide for Chapter nets so I asked the Editor to publish my current listing in this bulletin. Please review to see if your Chapter is listed on the proper (and only the proper) day(s) and that the data is correct. Also, when requesting multiple or new frequencies, remember that 28.3 - 28.5 (and maybe 28.5 - 28.6) will probably be QRM City by next fall if not this fall. But we still need to help the novices and techs regardless of QRM.

The requirements for establishing a 10-10 Chapter, plus an application, are mailed to any person requesting them. The requirements are minimal and contain no hints about effective Chapter or net operation. I plan to prepare a guideline of good practices to observe - and pitfalls to avoid - to be included in the mailing. I am accumulating notes and will review all comments. Try KIICP for your excellent notes. You may have covered all the bases. Now if I can reduce them to one page!

Special Chapter Events are not new and they usually create a flurry of activity on 10 meters at a most opportune time. However, if advance notice of the event is not timed to coincide with the publication of this bulletin or WAYNE's Supplements, the word may not get around to all possible participants. Plan ahead!!

How 'bout some statistics? Fifty Chapters have never filed a quarterly report; thirty-five have not filed since 1986; forty-three have not filed since 1987 and only seventy-four have filed in 1988. I don't believe we have only 74 active Chapters so keep those cards and letters (and reports) comin' folks.

GRIST FOR YOUR MILL.....

By-Laws of 10-10 Int. state that the Board will establish requirements for Chapters. The current requirements, which the Board has never seen I am told, specify that a prospective Chapter have 7 (5 for DX) members within ground wave distance and hold weekly nets. Some very active Chapters issue certificates and hold weekly nets but do not have the local members to become "authorized". We have the opportunity to fine-tune the Chapter program if we wish. Should net info and records be kept for these Chapters? (Probably). Should we amend the reqs to grant full (or associate) status to Chapters like Paper Doll, Queens & Kings, Bluebird, Doll Chasers, etc.? Or, if we don't amend, should any information about "unauthorized" Chapters appear in a 10-10 pub? Have I opened Pandora's Box? What do you think?

PHILOSOPHER'S STOOL.....

Each 10-10 Official is ultimately responsible, in my opinion, to the "full" members of 10-10. In this column I have requested comment on several items. If only two or three members respond, they may "run the show". Though yours may not be the majority opinion, it will be considered. And please, if you relate a problem, suggest a possible solution.

HELPING HANDS.....

While KA1CAD was expressing the idea to me at Dayton, KB5AN and KA4UEM were already writing OM/YL (don't like X-YL) teams to request that each adopt a DX Chapter and Air Mail the extra copy of the Bulletin to the CH. This alleviates

a sometime two-month overseas mail delay. All DX Chapter CMs should be receiving an early copy and I am told that the Board is working on a permanent solution.

F6EAK and F3CY held meetings in France to coordinate activity and promote 10-10 Int. during the REF French National meeting.

Although the Cert Guide published by W4YHF is not considered an official 10-10 pub. I, and a lot of others, thank him every day for his "unofficial" efforts.

Remember - and join if you haven't - the PAPER CHASERS MEMORIAL FUNN. SKs, and we recently lost a couple of fine ones, are listed elsewhere in the bulletin.



A MAJOR MILESTONE

On August 28, 1988, Al Kaiser, N1API, 10-10's 1st District Manager, issued 10-10 # 50000 to Scott Carey, KA1RMS, of Storrs, CT. This major milestone of attaining 50000 members has been accomplished since the inception of 10-10 back in 1962. Growth of 10-10 was slow at first, with only about 90 members from 1962 to 1964. About another 90 new members came aboard in 1965. Rapid growth followed 1965 and by 1971, 2700 numbers had been issued. Number 10000 was achieved by 1974, and by 1978, there were 18500! In 1981, number 33000 was issued and another major milestone was achieved in early 1985 when number 40000 was issued. And now, in 1988, just three short years, another 10000 members have been added to the 10-10 roster with the assignment of 50000.



Scott lives in Storrs, CT., a small town just 1 1/2 miles north of the University of Connecticut, with XYL Casi, and their three children, Amy 12, Jerry 9, and Elizabeth 7. Scott is 34 years old, and has worked for a building contractor as a job superintendent for the past 10 years. He has been interested in ham radio since a teenager in high school, and originally took

the test for his license back in 1982. After failing the test, he gave up ham radio until last year when he joined a class sponsored by the Natchaug Amateur Radio Association. He passed his Novice test and received his ticket on January 19, 1988. By the time you read this, Scott should have up-graded and intends to go "all-the-way".

The station at KA1RMS is located in the basement and uses a Heathkit 101 into various home made antennas. Scott likes to experiment with home made antennas and has a 10 meter vertical, an inverted "V", and a random length wire.

We welcome our 50000th 10-10 member, and wish him well in his new hobby.


**GEORGE ELLIOTT SR.







1. All contacts must take place on the Ten-Meter Phone band.
2. Exchange: Callsign, Name, State, and Ten-Ten Number.
3. A Station may be counted only once.
4. Single operator stations only are acceptable.
5. SSB, AM, or FM modes are acceptable.
6. All contacts must take place during the 48 hour contest period.
7. Logs must be kept in UTC.
8. A Dupe sheet is required of all participants. Computer duping is OK. (Send SASE to me for copy of typical dupe sheet.)
9. Chapter assignment of scores may be only by a paid-up member belonging to that chapter as a local member, and be able to work that chapter net via groundwave from the location of the station working the contest.

11. Failure to comply with any of these rules or their intent may result in disqualification.

SCORING

1. Two points for each contact WITH a Ten-Ten number exchange.
2. One point for each contact WITHOUT a Ten-Ten number exchange.

AWARDS


