





FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT NORM LEFCOURT, W6IIRT

Fellow Amateur Radio Operators and 10-10 members:

I take great pleasure in announcing that at the annual meeting of 10-10 International on Dec. 4, 1988 those members present elected me president. The election was held in accordance with the existing 1988 bylaws; therefore, the term of office for the elected officers will be two years.

I should start out by telling you something about me and my amateur radio background. I was born in New York and in 1941 moved to Atlanta. (I was a damn Yankee carpetbagger.) I took RADIO courses under Charlie Kruger at Tech High School and in 1947, passed the FCC test. I received license W4IERT. Under the watchful eye of Charlie, trustee of W4YC, the school station, we got W4YC back on the air at war's end. We were on 20 meters with a Lazy H antenna fed with 600-ohm open wire line.

My first receiver was a home-brew super-regen with plug-in coils. My first transmitter had a 6L6 final and 6V6 high-level AM modulator. The antenna was a dipole with a stub as a match--10 meters, naturally.

When I moved to California in 1948, the call was changed to W6IIRT (the FCC accommodated hams in those days). I hold an advanced class license. The present rig is a TS 820S, four element tri-band Wilson System One mounted on a 60-ft. tower. Also, I converted an 11-meter rig for mobile use. The antenna is a modified 11-meter fiberglass whip 5'6" long.

10-10 INTERNATIONAL:

As you probably know, during the past 18 months I was chairman of the planning committee along with Morrie W6EHM and Gerry WA6POZ. We feel the committee was successful since our complete revision of the bylaws was approved effective Jan. 1, 1989. The new provisions will enable 10-10 to move forward as an international amateur radio organization.

MILWAUKEE, WI:

The board of directors will be asked to designate Milwaukee as the site for our first annual general

membership meeting (Art. VII, Sec. 1) Aug. 11-13, 1989. The XYL and I are planning to be there; how about YOU?

ELECTION OF OFFICERS:

We must put together an election of officers and directors by mail ballot to be sent to all full members (Art. IX, Sec. 1-9). A nominating committee must be selected no later than this coming July. We need several members to serve on the nominating committee. Don't let me down; please volunteer to help. This is your organization!

COMPLAINT DEPARTMENT:

GENERAL MANAGER:

All officers and directors agree that 10-10 needs a General Manager. The position will enable our organization to have a person specifically charged to carry out the day-to-day business of 10-10, such as overseeing, preparing, and mailing of ballots; public relations and membership contact; etc. This will be a position of great importance. Report on Ten-Ten International Net, Inc. Quarterly Meeting

The quarterly Ten-Ten luncheon meeting was held on Sunday December 4, 1988 at Sir George's Restaurant in Long Beach, CA. There was a sizeable crowd in attendance and the meeting was conducted by Howard Bowman, W6QIR, President. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, and a Minute of Silence for the Silent Keys, Howard made some opening remarks, then called on each of the officials of Ten-Ten for any comments or reports. Our Treasurer, Gerry Gross, WA6POZ, gave a summary of revenue and expenses for the current quarter and for the year to date. He also mentioned that as of November 1st, 1988 the 10-10 Scholarship Fund had a balance of \$1897.74 not including some last minute club and individual donations he had received. Gerry indicated that 12,096 copies of the latest issue of Ten-Ten International News were mailed to members in the US, 154 to Canada, and 643 to other foreign locations.


Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, reported there has been a lot of interest lately in the WAC Award. He has sent out 33 certificates in the last three months. Also, a lot of interest shown in the 10-10 Information Packages requested from him by readers of World Radio News, at the rate of 25-30 requests per week.

Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, reviewed the establishment of the scholarship fund, that we had awarded two scholarships in 1988 and would be awarding two more in 1989. He indicated a check for \$1500.00 would be forwarded shortly to fund the 1989 scholarships.

Jim Michaelis, W6PGM, served as Chairman of the Nominating Committee, and commented that Irv Hunter, K6PWO, didn't have any idea how 10-10 would grow to about 50,000 members back in the earliest days of 10-10. Jim indicated that in accordance with Articles 11 A and 12 A,B,E, and F, the following slate of candidates was presented. For President, Norm Lefcourt, W6IRT, for Vice President, Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, for Secretary, Don Hirst, W6AGP, and for Treasurer, Gerry Gross, WA6POZ. Gerry Gross then requested that his name be withdrawn from nomination for Treasurer, due to personal circumstances. He agreed to continue to serve until April 1, 1989 until another Treasurer can be found. A motion was made and seconded that the offices as nominated, be elected to serve for a term of two years, and it was voted unanimously.

Howard Bowman, who has been dedicated to 10-10 and served as President for some years now, thanked all the officers and managers of 10-10 for their support over the past few years. He indicated that the new offices will have their work cut out for them with the new By-Laws and new elections that will be required (all the members worldwide voting for the Officers) as 10-10 moves into this new format for elections. Norm asked for a round of applause by way of Thanks and Appreciation for all Howard's efforts as President, and for the great job he did in this office. Norm pointed out there is far more work involved than most members of 10-10 are aware of. Under the new By-Laws, the Board of Directors will run 10-10 but keep the membership informed. After April 1, 1989 a nominating committee will be established to nominate and receive nominations for new officials of 10-10. It was also decided to continue the holding of quarterly 10-10 luncheons, though they are not mentioned in the new By-Laws. The meeting was then adjourned.

WORDS FROM THE PAST PRESIDENT HOWARD BOWMAN, W6QIR

HISTORY

A few years back, I began bugging you in these pages for copies of old issues of the News. I was especially interested in issue of the Sixties and early Seventies - I already had most issues of later dates, and even some of the earlier ones.

Anyhow, the response was wonderful. I had located an old German bookbinder, whose shop was not too far from home. From a casual inspection of his shop, it was evident that most of his work was theses and dissertations, which tend to be one- or two-copy jobs, making my order a natural for him. As it turned out, the first volume of 10-10's material was not easy, since paper sizes tended to be erratic.

I found that some materials were on 8½" x 14" paper, some on 6" x 8½", and some on sizes in between. This meant trimming of the larger sheets, and placement of the smaller so they wouldn't get lost. He did it, and the result is a three-volume set of 10-10 publications which is almost complete. The 'almost' arises because there is one issue of the News that we never did find - the fall issue of 1976. Indeed, no one knows whether that issue was ever published.

The first of the bound volumes covers the years 1969 - 1979, and is slightly taller than the other two, because of the 14" issues. The second volume covers 1980 - 1983, and the third 1984 - 1987. All are handsomely bound in red.

It is especially instructive to go back and look at those who were mentioned as officers or managers, or who held other responsible positions in 10-10 back in the early days -- and who are still at it! I saw especially the names of Lee Pasewalk, WB6MMB, Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, Grace Dunlap, K5MRU. All of them came aboard in 1973, Lee as manager for areas 1, 2, and 3, Grace for areas 4 and 5, and Morrie for 6 and 7. By December of 1975 10-10 had a manager in each call area, and Lee had taken over as Records Manager - a job he holds to this day.

There are a couple of other names that appeared in the early days and who I hear regularly - Fran Levy, W6MXT, and Joe Plumb, K6CQN. No longer officers or managers, both check in regularly on the daily net. They, with the others listed, have made their contributions to 10-10, and should be honored for them.

ENVOI

I first became a member of 10-10 in May of 1972. About three years later, Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, who was then 10-10's President, conned me into becoming Roster Manager. That was back in the days when the Roster had been produced by typing it up on adding-machine tape, and pasting those tapes so as to make it possible to photograph and print them. The Roster ran 32 pages or so.

Since that time, in one way or another, I have been involved in 10-10's affairs, and now it's time for me to leave.

Before I fold up my typewriter and steal quietly away, however, there are some people I want to thank.

Most of all, I want to thank the many managers, all of whom go quietly about their tasks, solving their own problems, giving of their time, and getting precious little from the members in return except for complaints. By and large, over the years our managers have performed nobly, and I cannot thank them enough. And that goes for the managers of past years, too. In almost every instance, when a manager had to leave his post, for one reason or another, he (or she) found a replacement. Volunteers are not easy to come by, and that one act of assistance is a great big plus.

Then I want to thank the hundreds who have written me over the years, commenting on what I have written, offering suggestions, commenting usefully and giving me added information. Believe me, every word was read. If you enclosed an SASE, you got a reply, and sometimes you got one even if you didn't. I'll even thank the carpers, who usually didn't have their facts straight, but were good for a laugh anyhow.

Lastly, I want to thank the Planning Committee - Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, Gerry Gross, WA6POZ, and Norm Lefcourt, W6IRT. They have set a course for 10-10 to follow which certainly has laudable objectives, even though it may not be easy to achieve.

175TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

Place: On board an American boat anchored in the Patapsco, down river from the British fleet. Date: September 13 and 14, 1814. Who: Francis Scott Key. Why: The boat and its occupants were being detained while the British bombarded the city of Baltimore, and Fort McHenry.

With these pieces of history, can you name the most significant event that occurred during that time? If you guessed it was the writing of the words which were destined to become our National Anthem, you are correct. It was while he was aboard that boat that Francis Scott Key expressed his emotions of the siege which he had witnessed.

During 25 hours of brutal pounding by the bombs and rockets fired at Fort McHenry from the British ships, Key and his fellow Americans watched with great anxiety. As dawn crept across the eastern sky, it was evident that the defenders had survived, and with it, the red, white, and blue of the Star Spangled Banner, tattered, but ever so proud, waving over the Fort.

As he stood watching the flag wave in its triumph and defiance, Key wrote his emotions in verse on the back of an old letter. After his release and return to Baltimore later that day, Key revised and expanded the poem in the quiet of a room at the Indian Queen Hotel. Originally distributed to Baltimoreans on September 17th, under the title, "Defense Of Fort McHenry," it subsequently became "The Star Spangled Banner" shortly after publication in the Baltimore Patriot on September 20th.

Set to the music of 'To Anacreon in Heav'n,' it became an immediate "hit" in Baltimore, and the surrounding areas of Maryland. However the song was to encounter much opposition over many decades before finally becoming our official National Anthem on March 3, 1931. To commemorate the 175th anniversary of that historic event, the 175th Anniversary Commission was established by the Patriots of Fort McHenry (a private sector initiat-

ive) on May 2, 1988, to arrange and coordinate the national celebration in September 1989. CHAPTER COORDINATOR'S DESK..... By Hugh WA4QZU

One of my announced first objectives was to determine the status of all chapters. Based on responses to my first two Quarterly Reports - or lack of same - the following chapters are:
ORT-THEIR REQUEST: Flagstaff, Hoot Owls, Minn-Dak Sunflower, Oklahoma 89er, Treasure Coast

ORT-NO REPORTS FOR YEARS: Australian Capital, Birdwing, Buzzard's Roost, City of Five Flags, City of Oakland Park, City of Oaks, Cradle of the Confederacy, Earl of Granville, Festival City, Golden Triangle, Great Valley, Independence Day, Kentucky Cardinal, Lobster Trap, Mother of the West, Parnaiba City, Salt Stone, Sara's Box, Tast, Tidewater

The following Chapters, still presumed active, have not returned either of my two report requests (did I forget to say please?): Earthquake Country, God's Country, Hungarian Landscape, Lake Simcoe, Mason Dixon, N.I.T.T., Nutmeg, Prince of Pork, S.M.O.G., Tulip, Twin Tiers.

The following offer a certificate but, by their choice, are not considered Chapters: Bluebird(MO), Busy Bee, Dad & Lad, European Award, Grt. St. Of Wisconsin, Orange Co.(El Camino Real), Over 55, PA Dutch Country, Procrastinator, Raggedy Ann & Andy, Santa Fe Trail, S.C.C.A.R.A., Truth or Consequencies, Yoder Krutch.

A second objective was to establish an accurate frequency listing. The listing cannot be published every quarter and the changes are too lengthy to list here so, I will attempt to have an updated listing printed next quarter.

A third objective was to prepare a set of guidelines and hints to be sent to potential new chapters in addition to the requirements for establishing a chapter. They are prepared and fifteen have been sent

already.

SOAP BOX.....

1. Chapters have the right to administer their program as they see fit so long as there is no conflict with 10-10 regulations or good amateur practice.

Awarding First State Designation -

Partly because of the proliferation of Cs, HDs, HMs, CLs, etc. a FS designation is unique and therefore coveted. In my opinion, the FS suffix should, in the future, be awarded to the first application received from a RESIDENT of a state who qualified while in that state. I will not attempt to define RESIDENT but my point is that FS should not be awarded to an individual based on qualification during a short trip or visit to a state. I probably could have picked up a few more FS this year (Harborites would have been one) if I felt differently; K7CZD could have MT and WY both if she wanted (Would K7CZD share with K7BND? - tune in next quarter for the exciting conclusion). In answer to your next question, I think WB1DBZ and K9EHP (and probably some others) are residents of two states (brief pause for attorneys to shudder). What's your opinion?

Earning WAS - I have transmitted from about 15-20 states during the past 15 months. A couple of those states have very few paperchasers. In my opinion, if a person contacted me in all 15 states, he or she should be entitled to use my number for all 15 states on the WAS endorsement to a certificate. Again, my point is that I don't think contacts should be required with a resident of a state while he is in that state. However, if I contact 10-10ers from 50 states while in the parking lot at Dayton, I didn't get any states because I was not in my home state (but I can use the numbers otherwise). I know at least two CHs will disagree with me. (For CHs and CMs who do not agree please reread

number 1 under this heading-hi!)
What's your opinion?

COMPLAINT DEPARTMENT.....
I have received a number of (20 or more) complaints about the Backscatter Net. Most comments are that there is too much idle chatter, people have to repeat info time after time, no net discipline, specific relay stations are not assigned, too many checkins are taken at a time, favoritism, occupied frequencies are usurped, etc. A couple of months ago I got to make 4 calls in 2 hours, didn't get to give out any numbers and didn't get any (except 10-10). When we point the finger at someone, we must realize that three fingers point at us and I acknowledge personal guilt on some of the charges. If only 1 or 2 relay stations are named, only 10-20 checkins taken at a time with no additions to the bottom of the list, no more than 2 or 3 numbers announced, numbers are copied when announced and no more than 1 or 2 asked for when calling, the Backscatter Net would be enjoyed by more people. I must admit that, when I used to be NC at times, my methods were copied to some degree from W4KN(sk), W4YHF and WD4MPG to mention a few and they were strict and business-like. On the other hand, no frequencies may be reserved for the exclusive use of a person or group and NCs are not obliged to observe a set of established regulations; they are free to use an unoccupied frequency in any legal manner. Others are free to establish nets on other frequencies or get on 28.825 first. One problem with being somewhat specific, as I have done here, is that everything can't be covered in a few words. Disagree if you will but let's not engage in semantics. (This paragraph was not one of the fun parts of this job!) P.S. Dec has been much better in my opinion.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?.....
Associate, AUTH OR UNAUTHORIZED

Chapters - Separate classes of Chapters would require unnecessary paper work but recognition should be given to Chapters requesting authorization - if they have nets as required but don't have 7 members in ground wave distance - is the way I read my mail. This appears sensible as we don't un-authorize Chapters whose membership has decreased below the required number. I propose the following: A chapter failing to meet the requirements for authorization for lack of the required members within ground wave distance may, after a six-month probationary period, apply for authorization. Authorization will be at the discretion of the Chapter Coordinator. The proposal will be effective March 1, 1989 unless I receive sufficient comments to the contrary. Absent such comments, the Queens and Kings and Paper Dolls will be automatically authorized as of that date. The Doll Chasers may also be authorized if they choose. Dancing Dolls and Kangaroo Kourt may apply after the six-month period expires.


Six Month Solar Activity Outlook
January 1989 - June 1989

The rise of the of cycle 22 appears to be falling behind that of cycle 19, although it remains one of the strongest on record (see page 20). By the end of the outlook period the smoothed sunspot number is projected to be 173 (plus or minus 20) and the 10.7 cm flux 203 (plus or minus 20).

The number of proton events and X-level X-ray flares for cycle 22 is lagging slightly behind the corresponding values for cycle 21 (see page 19).




