



# **EDITORIAL**

unfavorable. There were a few mistakes in the issue for a variety of reasons. I would like to take just a little space to help those who supply copy to understand how errors will happen, and also let you understand why things are like what they are.

Some photographs appear very dark. In some cases that is because the photograph is a color print. We really need black and white if possible. The type of paper we print on also is a problem in getting good photographs. And in some cases the photographs are dark to start with. Send us whatever you have but keep in mind we need light photos and black and white if possible. We will work it out eventually.

Send in good copy. In one case, Hugh's copy was so light, and on a dot matrix printer, even with a magnifying glass I had messed it up. Another reason for that is I wasn't familiar with some of his abbreviations. We will retype here. The chances of errors increase but the result is a uniform, nice looking copy. At least that's the plan.

Get your copy in by the deadline. I'm not going to chase you for copy. The next issue is already being laid out. The last issue was totally finished and ready for printing when about eight pages of late copy came in. We got most of it in but it had to be done in just a few days and the cost was a lot of mistakes and contents not set up very well. Ah the joys of being an editor. Incidently, it got so bad I figured I didn't need this pressure and quit as editor after the first issue was done, but Norm and Hugh and others ganged up on me so here I am again.

Your letters are really important, they help me understand where you want YOUR publication to go. Its because of Tom Butler, John Miller, Don Ramras, Ken Covey, and others who took the time to write and give words of encouragement that I felt obligated to push a little further.

This issue moves a little further along the directions I hope we can take the magazine. The print is now the size of most magazines (although some of you expressed a liking to the larger type) and in the three column format. I hope to be able to use this column to address more important issues and get some of you thinking and working out there but for now I need to explain what is happening and why. And to solicit your input so that this magazine will eventually be the voice of ten meters.

There are just two issues I'd like to address. One is that 10-10 members, and that means anyone with a 10-10 number whether active or not, are viewed as a group. In the DX section we address a problem of responding to DX contacts and in particular QSL Managers. Dave Miller, QSL Manager for Pitcaim Island, has been kind enough to share the problems of such a position and allow us to reflect on how well we as a group stack up to others. We don't stack up well. This may be because of less experienced amateurs on ten meter phone bands then on other bands.

Which also brings up the issue of novices and newer members to ham radio. Your input is important too. Send in your thoughts and ideas, and complaints.

The other issue I'd like to address is that of having an emergency frequency for mobile operation. That will be addressed in the news section. There is such a frequency on 20 meters and maybe ten should have such a frequency which would help organize and use the ten meter band. Read the item and give it some thought.

With that I'd once more like to thank all those who have helped and encouraged. I would also like to thank all those who struggled with errors and gave me the benefit of the doubt. Your courtesy and understanding are appreciated.

Please bear with me and help. Hopefully the errors will be less in this issue and better over time.

# 10 METER NEWS \*\*\*\*

MOBILE CALLING FREQUENCY: it h a s b e e n suggested by Chuck imsande, W6YLJ, that ten meters needs a Mobile Calling Frequency. 20 Meters has such a calling frequency at 14.336 used by



the emergency and country hunter group. Chuck suggests that "Since the county hunters are now offering a five-band certificate, they have been using 28.336 as a 10 meter frequency. I would like to propose that 10 meter mobiles monitor 28.336 and after contact move to another frequency for rag-chews. It could be used as an 'emergency frequency' for road problems or disasters. This is the way the 20 Meter Emergency and County Hunters Net operates."

Chuck does a 10-10 column for WorldRadio. In September he talks about Andy Anderson, the 1000 Bars Manager. Chuck has a very interesting suggestion. Ten meter mobile is a great way to get more use on ten meters. Lets hear your comments. Better yet, lets start using 28.336 as a mobile frequency.

FCC NABS NY TAXI CABS: Thanks to all of you who were willing to get involved in the taxi cab issue, where taxi cabs in New York were using ten meter transceivers for commercial applications, the results were great. Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, received the following letter from Richard M. Smith, Chief, Fleid Operations Bureau of the FCC.

"The FCC shares your concern about illegal radio transmissions among taxi cab and for-hire vehicle drivers in New York City. The New York office staff has received approximately 500 complaints alleging illegal radio operation by area for-hire operators. In response to these complaints, that office initiated a cooperative project with the City of New

York Taxi and Limousine Commission to reduce illegal operations on the airways. Staff conducted remote and on-site monitoring to locate and shut down illegal operations.

On-site investigations and inspections have also been conducted at John F. Kennedy and Laguardia Airports. A recent effort with Yellow Medallion Taxi Company resulted in the shut-down of 15 illegal stations. The New York staff will continue an ongoing program to reduce the number of illegal operations in the for-hire service.

Any specific information that you may have about identity of illegal operators should be forwarded to our office which is located at FCC, 201 Varick St, NY, NY 10014-4870, Tel. (212) 620-3437."

NARTE CERTS AVAILABLE TO HAMS: Class IV certifications will be granted by NARTE to Advanced and Extra Class Amateurs. This is a means to be recognized in the commercial field as a result of your amateur training. Contact NARTE at P.O. Box 15029, Salem, OR 97309.

NO CODE LICENSE: ARRL Board of Directors have approved recommendation of No Code License. Privileges will be 220 MHz and up. The suggested title for this new class of license is Communicator. It is interesting that this is the same name used for the 1974 FCC proposal for a codeless license.

KENWOOD CUSTOMER HOT LINE: Kenwood is trying an electronic builetin board. It is mainly for new product announcements and Kenwood customer support, not just ham line gear but other product lines as well. Call at (213) 761-8284, 300/1200/2400-8 bits, 1 stop bit, no parity. Comments heard so far is that only the 300 was working and the best time to call was after normal hours. Kenwood is just testing this approach and had not dedicated a line at time of

writing. During the day you could find it busy or it could pickup but the BBS won't answer, resulting in a long distance call without getting through. Some of that may be resolved by the time you read this.

FCC FINES IN NY: FCC in NY has other problems besides NY taxis cabs. They issued a fine to K2LPK for allegedly broadcasting music illegally.

10 METERS SOUNDS LIKE CB: In the opinion of at least some people the "Roger Beep" of the Uniden HR2510's makes the 10 meter band sound more like CB than ham radio. According to one source it only adds QRM to the band. The source suggest it be turned off. Comments???

USSR LAUNCH DELAY: So much for reliable Russian sources. If you have been listening for the RS 12/13 satellites you can relax. Although the units are ready for launch it has been delayed until 1990, it seems the main payload is not needed in space yet. That main payload is a civilian navigational satellite on which these will ride piggy-back.

HAM SATELLITES: There are five ham satellites due to be launched in November. PACSAT, LUSAT, DOVE, UoSAT D, and E. JAS-2 is due to go up in January.

UoSATs D and E, which after launch and separation from the launcher will probably become UoSAT-OSCAR 14 and 15, both have the same mechanical structure, weight and dimensions. They will be the first microsatellites separated from the ASAP - followed by the four Microsats, which from then on will be known as OSCARs 16, 17, 18, and 19.

HAM LICENSE FEES MAY GO UP: It has been recommended that new, renewal, and modified amateur licenses carry a \$30 price tag. This would also be

true for DX stations looking for a reciprocal permit.

PIRATES ON TEN METERS: Some sources feel the unlicensed activity on ten meters has increased as a result of the Uniden's and Radio Shacks sale of relatively cheap SSB rigs. Although most feel that there are no more bootleggers today than there ever were most agree that 10 meter CW has a lot of Spanish speaking pirates in the southern California area.

HAM ASTRONAUT TO TALK FROM SPACE: Although not 10 meter news. note that Ron Parise, WA4SIR, ASTRO-1 crew, will be carrying an SAREX-2 on the Columbia Astro-1 mission due to lift off on April 26, 1990. It will be the same Motorola HT used in the past but this time with the inclusion of a packet radio TNC with some interesting features. He will be engaging in normal FM voice operation as well as packet QSO's with hams on the ground. Some other interestino modes includes a metabeacon which will allow loading text messages of up to 1800 characters. This will allow the crew to compose mission status or SAREX scheduling messages for repeated downlink. A robot mode will also be available so that ground stations may connect with and receive a reply from the SAREX even when the crew is not available to engage in realtime OSO's.

Times and frequencies should be available soon. As a quick look of the past, the first amateur radio activity from the Space Shuttle was in 1981 by Owen Garriott (W5LFL). He carried a Motorola 2 meter HT aboard the Columbia on the Spacelab 1 flight (STS-9). He worked only FM voice.

Next was 1985, Tony England (WOORE) carried SAREX (Shuttle Amateur Radio Experiment) on the Spacelab 2 flight. SAREX consisted of that same HT but this time with a Robot SSTV converter. Tony engaged in 2-way slow scan TV QSO's with people on the ground in addition to voice of course. There were actually two hams on that flight. John Bartoe, W4NYZ was also a

10 METER QSO PARTY: Calumet Area Radio Enthusiasts ran a single op contest on September 23-24. Ten Ten numbers were worth a point for each contact with Steel City numbers being a multiplier. HANDI-HAM CALLING FREQUENCIES: Handi-Hams, an organization that helps people with handi-caps or problems of various sorts to get their Ham ticket and get on and stay on the air. The following two frequencies have been established on the ten meter band as calling frequencies for handi-hams. CW frequency is 28112 and SSB frequency is 28390.

Of course these are suggested calling frequencies and anyone can use them but it is a chance for all of us to work with the handi-hams. Maybe you should send out a CQ on one of these frequencies for "CQ HANDI-HAMS".

MORSE CODE OUT ON SHIPS: With all the talk about codeless ham licenses it might be worth while to note that the Maritime Services international is planning the demise of morse code on ships. By 1999 ships worldwide will not require a shipboard morse code radio operator for safety and distress signals. With satellites and maritime telex morse code operators will be eliminated entirely. Morse code is dying.

BALLOON LAUNCH: A 12 foot weather balloon was scheduled for launch with burst at about 100,000 feet. A ten meter transmitter operating at 28.866 MHz at 0.25 watts will provide identification and telemetry data on CW at 7 wpm. Transmissions will be repeated at 2 minute intervals.

SOFTWARE FOR SATELLITES: John M. Logajan; has source code for use on Atari ST computer. It reads the element

file, as is, and simultaneously tracks all the satellites on a world map. It is a very pretty display. It can update the positions of 100 satellites in about 6 seconds.

The program is in GFA basic (2.0). Program should be available real soon in comp.sources.atari.st or he will provide the sources for the asking (7600 Boone Ave, Brooklyn Park, MN 55428.

HPM MEMORIAL AWARD TO 10-10 MEMBER:

Kevin D. Biekert, KB5AQV, 10X #43107, of Clear Lake City, Texas, won the highest award given by the ARRL to a young person for participation in Amateur Radio, the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Award

The Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Award is given annually by the American Radio Relay League to the person under the age of 21 who best exemplifies the ideals of Amateur Radio: service, communication, and experimentation. First licensed in 1987, Kevin is now 17 years old and holds an Amateur Extra Class ticket.

Kevin's role in founding the Clear Lake Amateur Radio Club (CLARC) is just part of his accomplishments that caught ARRL's attention.

FREE RUSSIAN PHRASES BOOKLET NOT FREE:

Be aware that although a 20-page syllabus has been offered "free" it is not! Len Traubman, W6HJK compiled this syllabus to help amateurs communicate with Russian speaking amateurs. The booklet is said to provide English words and phrases for QSOs, accompanied by the Russian translation and the English transliteration. The problem is that when you write in for the "free" copy they are out and there is a charge now for the free copy. Buyer beware.

CANADA AND USA CALL FOR HAM DAY: Most of the USA had hams in mails, parks, and anywhere else that they could expose what ham radio was all about to the public. Canada did much the same. In the Toronto area VE3CNE was on ten meters demonstrating what it was all about. They were transmitting from an exhibit in the Arts and Crafts building of the Canadian National Exhibition.


Each recipient received a check for \$750 towards their college expenses.


1990 ELECTIONS: The nominating committee for the 1990 election of officers and board of director members has been appointed.



NEW PACIFC PREFIX:

The ITU has allocated the call sign prefix V6 to the Federated States of Micronesia, formally one of



the users of the KC6 prefix. Amateur stations will use call signs V63AA through V63ZZ.

The call sign prefix V7 has been allocated to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, formerly KX6. Amateur stations will use call signs V73AA through

V7377

CONFESSIONS OF A QSL MANAGER: I've been QSL manager for Meralda Warren VR6MW (#50434) for 1 1/2 years. A very satisfying experience. Many folks write very nice notes and really seem to appreciate the efforts of volunteer QSL managers (which is very time consuming).

it's important for some areas of the world to have a QSL manager, Pitcaim being one of those, because they are NOT serviced by any QSL Bureau. Additionally, Pitcaim Island is quite remote and receives mail delivery only two or three times each YEARI

We clear Meralda's QSL cards over the radio 2 to 3 times each week, so the turn-around time is very fast when compared to any other route. All we ask, in fact, all that any QSL manager asks, is that those stations wanting a QSL card from Pitcaim, please enclose a SASE (self-addressed stamped-envelope). On a day-to-day basis, 99 out of 100 QSL cards that we receive for Meralda will have a SASE enclosed (I was surprised at the high percentage when I first began).

When Meralda operates the 10-10 OSO Party, however, the rate drops to 50/50. Half the cards have no return postage with them. When one figures that we handle HUNDREDS of cards each year, imagine the postage costs to the manager if you were to expect HIM

to pay for postage on a card that he is sending as a favor to YOU!

We don't ask for "green stamps", only the return postage for YOUR card from the DX station. Please, always remember to include a SASE when QSL'ing via a manager. We perform a voluntary service for your convenience.

you DXers with packet radio, a "server" is online at the W1NY PBBS. This server keeps a database of stations, their QSL managers Information requests. You can submit a request to the server for a particular station's QSL manager. If the server has the information, you will get the information right away. If the server does not have the information you request, it will store your request and send you a message when the information becomes available.

You can also use the server to find out what QSL routes are being requested and you may update the database.

To get help on the server, send a message to QSLMGR @ W1NY. The subject of your message will be ignored by the server. Put the word help as the only word in the body of your message. If you would like to see a few samples of input to the server, send a message to the server with the word sample as the only word in the body of the message.

Now, about Sandy. He is an international Master of Sport in Romania and an Extra Class License holder. Sandy has 5BDXCC. He has 225 countries for DXCC. Memberships include

10 METER HF PACKET RADIO: According to the HF band plan for IARU Region 1 (Africa, Europe, the Middle East, Mongolia and the USSR), the ten meter will have a subband of 28.120-28.150 for packet radio.

V31EY IN BELIZE: Byron Blake, V31EY (KA1ILI/8 10X #50008) operated in Belize from 16 July to 6 August. "The experience was most rewarding, in fact, over 1000 contacts. While in Belize I became a member of the Belize Amateur Radio Club.

Belize are interested in DX only and are not interested in 10-10 numbers nor in becoming 10-10 members. In fact, they ask us not to give or ask for 10-10 numbers unless they ask or give such a number. Bands change too quickly and they don't want to waste time. 10-10 numbers are not wanted by them in most cases, be considerate.

Belize is a relatively difficult place to live in, even if for only a week or so. There are dangerous snakes, malaria, and many places have little or no water.

QSL information is as follows: The V31 bureau in Belize is out of order, BARC looks forward to reinstating it but it will be awhile.

For V31EY (Byron) send QSLs direct to KA1ILI, 1690 Saunders Drive, Wooster, Ohio 44691, or via callbook address in CT. It would be appropriate to include SASE or IRCs as applicable.

For all other V31s you must QSL direct or to the stations secondary call. Do not use the V31 Bureau.

Byron is planning a spring trip to FP St. Pierre, so listen for him.

UK CALL SIGNS: The lastest call signs

issued in UK land are G0MH and G7FR.

G PREFIX NUMBER INFORMATION: Many are confused by the British prefix call signs. GD/GJ/GU are not part of UK.

There are two classes of British amateur licenses. The class "A" is a full license, and requires written exam and 12 wpm code test. The class "B" requires only a written exam, no code, but operation only above 30 MHz.

All UK call signs with G1/G6/G7/G\* plus 3 letters are class "B". All others are Class "A". G0 is issued with three letters. G2/G3/G4 can have both two and three letters. G5/G6/G8 use two letters. G5 with three letters have always been for reciprocal licenses. G6 with three letters and a /T are ATV licenses. G9 are not amatuer licenses. GB are used for b e a c o n s , r e p e a t e r s e t c . GD/GI/GJ/GM/GU/GW prefixes apply the same rules (GC was split into GJ and GU some time ago.


If you have got use to the G prefix be prepared for an M. When the G's are gone British Amateurs will have a prefix of M.

CONVENTION '89 IS HISTORY: by Joe Williams, WA9TSG.



United Nations station 4U1UN, in New York, has been issued a special 10-10 number of 55,555 by the board.


Both the UN and W1AW will be placed in the paid up status and will receive the News in the future.

An open Board of Directors forum was held Sunday morning. A number of members questioned the procedures regarding the election, etc.








# **FEATURE ARTICLE \*\*\*\*\***

VOICE POLARIZER FOR AM: by Eric Nichoals, KL7AJ.

in a prior article i stressed the importance of voice polarity for efficient, clean AM operation. I also promised to give you a schematic for a device which will automatically assure correct voice polarity, regardless of your particular voice pattern. Here is just such a device.

Actually, this is a "Graham-Rudman" version of the circuitry used in most AM broadcast facilities. None of the components are critical, and I certainly encourage you to experiment with it to give just the performance you like. The only precaution I offer is that, if at all possible, the components shown in the dotted lines should be in a separate metal enclosure, especially in QRO stations. The rest can be breadboarded or Vector assembled.

The circuit works as follows: T1 splits the incoming audio into a normal and reversed polarity signal. The correct polarity signal is selected by double-throw relay K1 which then sends the audio to the mike input of the

transmitter.

The rest of the circuitry is the "brains" which determines just which polarity signal should be fed to the microphone input. The brains work as follows: Line sampler LS1 extracts a signal from the antenna feedline. LS1 can be any old sampling loop such as is used in "MONIMATCH" devices. D3 detects the signal and charges C3 to a DC voltage proportional to carrier voltages. Any variations in this voltage are coupled through C5 to the audio detection diodes D4 and D5. Positive peaks are coupled through D4 and negative audio peaks pass through D5.

Under conditions of symmetrical modulation e.g. sine wave modulation, the voltages at the outputs of the detectors will cancel. If the negative audio peaks should be greater than the positive peaks, the junction of R9 and R10 will decrease. If this voltage decreases below the voltage threshold set by R7 and R8, the op-amp comparator 741 device suddenly shifts output voltage, sending a spike through C4 and changing the state of the flip-flop comprised of Q2 and Q3.


The output of the flip-flop drive Q1, the relay driver and selects the opposite polarity signal from transformer T1. The positive peaks will now be greater than the negative peaks. The circuit continues in this state until the input signal changes symmetry, then the process is repeated.

You will find that K1 will be quite active with some voices and almost dormant with others. Female voices tend to be more symmetrical, and the circuit is very active trying to decide which peaks are larger.

Most male voices are decidedly "lopsided" and after the first syllable the relay will flop to its preferred position and stay there.

I strongly recommend operating your AM rig with and without this circuit in line to fully appreciate the difference it can make. If you have a scope with which to monitor your transmitter output, so much the better. The action of the polarizer will be immediate and quite graphic.

Let me know if you plan on using this circuit. If there is enough demand I'll put together some etching templates, so we can do some mass production.



# WORLD OF PROPAGATION

SPORADIC E SKIP: Sporadic E Skip has been good during the summer but has now fallen off. It was mostly in the lower latitudes. E Skip will be rare except for short winter season in December and January.

One great way to detect E skip openings is by listening for certain CW Beacons between 28.2 and 28.3. See the information below.

BEACONS ON TEN: Propagation trends can be observed by frequent monitoring of the continuously operating beacons on ten meters. They will be found between 28.1 and 28.3 MHz. All operate with low power and with omnidirectional antennas, so their signals tend to be very weak, especially with some of the higher powered stations around them. Try to stay clear of the beacon frequencies so the service can be used by all radio amateurs.

Joe, K2OLG, has a list of approximately 75 ten meter beacons around the world which we will include in the 10-10 News at first opportunity. In the meanwhile you might want to listen for a very consistent and useful 10 meter beacon VK2RSY on 28.26 MHz.

PROPAGATION PC PROGRAM: MINIPROP from W6EL, a welknown DXer and propagation expert, will help you follow the propagation spectrum. You may find an earlier public domain version free on some BBS. Otherwise the current version v3 is available from Sheldon for \$50. You may need a floating point chip (coprocessor) or lots of patience. A typical full run (7 Freqs) takes 2200 seconds on a base PC-XT, 90 seconds on the same machine with a 8087, and about 15 seconds on a top-end PS2-70. This is not a toy but the real thing.

## SOLAR ACTIVITY:

There has been a steady increase in solar activity through the first part of September. Many flares up to X2 2B and ten flares of up to 5,000 flux units were recorded. A magnetic storm at the end of

August reached 34 units. There were a number of ionospheric disturbances, and a proton flare alert and mag alert were issued on the 4th of September.

The sun spot count varied from 97 on the 29th of August to 294 on the 3rd of September. Solar flux levels have increased steadily reaching 242 units on the third. The geomagnetic A index was mainly unsettled and averaged 12.7 units with it hitting 34 on the 29th which is storm level.


The radio quality indices fell to a very low level on the 29th and have been recovering only very slowly.

Sunspot mean for August was RI 166.8, with a maximum of 227 on the 5th and minimum of 50 on the 28th. The forecast for August 1990 is 138.

ENGLAND & WALES IONOSPHERIC DATA: The daytime F2 averaged 8.4MHz Only good days were 25th and 2nd.

SCOTLAND & IRELAND DATA: Daytime F2 averaged 8.1MHz. Darkness hours were 3.8MHz.There were some spread F.

SOLAR FORECAST: The more active side of the sun will be facing the earth the end of September which should raise flux to 250. Auroras may also occur. MUFs at equal latitude in daytime could be about 27MHz for south and 24MHz in North. Evening hours will drop it to about 10MHz.



# THE EQUIPMENT CORNER \*\*\*\*

NEW SECTION: This section has been added to help you share among lellow members of 10-10 what experience you have had with equipment, modifications you have made, etc. We will also include some product reviews and comments heard from various sources. New product announcements and comments from suppliers will also be included as space allows. So lets hear from you. Share your experiences with others on new, old and home brew rigs and modifications. Just keep in mind it must be ten meter related although it can be general in regard to software etc.

DX HANDY; PRODUCT REVIEW: Advanced Electronics Applications, Inc P.O. Box C-2160, Lynnwood, WA 98036-0918 offers the ten meter handheld called the DX Handy MX-28S. We did a short product review to see how this would fit into the Ham world.

The DX Handy is a battery powered (six AA batteries) SSB, CW transceiver with two watts output. CW operation can be by either built-in push button or external key or keyer. It has an Smeter/output power meter and an effective noise blanker. It looks similar to a VHF Handheld.

Conditions have not been great from Utah for the past couple of months on ten. But with improved conditions in the past couple of weeks we tried the DX Handy.

The receiver is very good. Sensitivity of less than 0.5 uV for 15 dB S/N utilizing an IF of 11.2735. During receive the current drain is only about 70 mA. Within a short time we had heard Bolivia, Florida, Texas, Mexico, Maryland, Kentucky, Europe, etc. These signals where all solid 5-9 signals. It did as good a job as my TS520 would do as far as picking up the stations, however there is very little volume with the DX Handy. It is almost a must that you have earphones.

The 2 watt transmitter was another issue. I could not make any contacts. Stations that appeared to hear me stated



that I was off frequency or muffled. I worked AA4QI, Harold, 10X 42550 and AA4QZ, Wayne, 10X 39780, with my standard rig and then had them listen for the DX Handy. I was a 5-1 to 5-2 on the standard rig. They never heard the DX Handy. However they did say that they had worked one from California a few weeks before and it was doing a good job. In their opinion my normal signal would have to be 5-9 to have the handheld heard.

I used the DX Handy just as received from the factory. I was therefore limited to the 28.300 to 28.350 portion of the SSB portion of the band. Had I had higher segments of the band I believe I could have made some contacts. We did check it against a nearby receiver and It came in fine. Had we more time to work with it the outcome would have been different, I believe, but we had to return the unit to the factory.

The DX Handy is more rugged than the VHF handheld, with a metal case. The nearly 5 foot telescoping antenna is a little tough to handle and I'm concerned about the eventual breaking of the connector at the frame. The antenna is a

50 ohms unbalanced antenna connecting to a BNC connector on the top of the unit.

The DX Handy doesn't have a battery pack. You must replace batteries which are internal, but easy to get at. Or you can use an external 9 volt supply. There is no easy way to carry the unit, no clip or carrying case for your belt. And with that 50" telescoping antenna it isn't that easy to fit in your shirt pocket!

The unit would be great with a head set such as Icom supplies, except that the microphone and speaker receptacles, on the DX Handy, are reversed from the normal size. The mike receptacle is the size used for external speakers and the speaker is the size used for the microphone. Without ear phones we found ourselves with the DX Handy's speaker pressed against our ear all the time, even with good solid signals.

If you operate it from an external power supply you cannot stand it upright since the power supply connects to the bottom of the DX Handy. The result is you end up holding the unit in order to keep the antenna upright. Of course with that long an antenna it isn't all that stable

It is capable of sending CW without a key but it would take a lot of practice to become good at it. The built in key is simply a button on the top of the DX Handy. And you cannot monitor your sending. But it is a nice feature to have if you're on a mountain top. And since the unit only weighs 710 grams (1 lb 9 oz) even with the antenna and batteries it is ideal for lugging along on climbs and bikes.

The tuner is almost too sensitive but not a big problem. However changing crystals is not all that easy. It only covers 100kcs at a time and it is not easy enough to change and retune to think you can just switch them when you want to. You need to pick the 100kcs you will be operating from and figure you are restricted to that range.

is the DX Handy worth the price? A price of \$255? I think the answer is yes.

for the right application. It is not a radio for the operator who has only one radio. It is great for taking on a hike or even putting in your suitcase when traveling. For you business travelers it would be neat to take along with you to the hotel room and try a little DXing while stuck in the room.

It is great for listening in on the band from anywhere, but the chances of being able to transmit is marginal. It is a QRP unit, low QRP at that. Your mode of operation would have to change from the normal 100 watt rig, and even the lower power ten meter rigs on the market today.

I think the DX Handy would be a great challenge for the "NONE" QRP individual to try QRP. If conditions are just right you'll be able to work the world, but don't count on it, it is a radio for a special application. It is not a general purpose radio. I loved playing with it and would enjoy spending more time with it. It will challenge the best of you. Editor.

THE RANGER LINE: Comments on the Ranger heard recently are as follows: Locals have mixed reports regarding the Ranger Line; some like it, some detest it. "Real" hams don't like the fact that it doesn't have a real tuning knob.

One comment was the this ham preferred the Kantronics 10M monobander. It's more expansive than the Uniden and the Radio Shack clone (about \$330 from AES vs \$240-\$260 for the Uniden) and has no FM capability, but as an SSB rig is far superior regarding receiver quality, lower noise and better selectivity. And a much better "knob".

UNIDEN HR-2510 AT 75 WATTS: Word is that there is a modification for the HR-2510 which will allow you to transmit and receive from 26 Mhz to 30Mhz inclusive. This is for the pre 1989 models. Has anyone tried it? 75 watts inside of 25 could help those using it in mobile applications.

August 1989 of '73 Magazine offers a modification for the HR-2510. Has anyone tried it?

At least one user of the HR-2510

says he is "very pleased with its performance and has made hundreds of contacts with it.

RADIO SHACK 10M RIG: According to one source, the Radio Shack 10 meter rig is the Uniden chassis with a lot of the parts missing, which makes it cost less to purchase.

KENWOOD 950: According to one QSO from Japan, Japan is using a new Kenwood 950. He described it as a 940 with a band pass monitoring capability built in. You hook up a monitor to view the band. Anyone with information on this new rig?

TEN-TEC SIMPLICITY: With today's push for more complexity at least one ham says the Ten Tec "feature" of simplicity sold him. The rig has a simple design and spacious cabinet interior. The Paragon is a radio, NOT an antenna tuner, a keyer, a capacitance meter or a floor wax!!! There is the feeling one could actually get inside it and fix it if it breaks, although the Ten Tec service is said to be very good.

But there are some problems. Spurious noise is one complaint. There are only a few spurs above S1, but the noises are very irritating on 10 meters where band noise is often low enough to allow the internal noise to be heard. I believe that much of the noise is generated by the multiplexing of the display, some of it is harmonics.

HIGH PERFORMANCE 10 METER WIRE ANTENNA: Zack Schindler, N8FPA, 413 Vester, Ferndale, MI 48220-1955 is offering an Extended Double Zepp Antenna with a 3DB gain over dipoles. He tunes the antenna for the novice portion of ten meters with low SWR over the 28.000Mhz to 28.800Mhz portion of

the band. No tuner is necessary. Claimed to be good for low power ten meter rigs. Price is \$75.00. We may test this product in the future and let you know what we find out.

SPARKY J-10B 10 METER ANTENNA: Antenna's West, 2996 Cherokee Lane, Provo, UT 84604, offers a J-Pole type antenna for ten meters. It is tuned for the novice section of the band but performs well on other portions. You can just hang it out of a window, the ten meter sky hook. Price is \$39.95.

PRO 67 ANTENNA: For those of you who like a LARGE and HEAVY antenna maybe you have some interest in this Moseley antenna. It has double wall tubing in the middle to reduce sag. At nearly 100 lbs it is the ham that sags when putting it up. You need a heavy duty rotator or they will burn up in short order.

Reports are that the performance is very good. Front-to-back and front-to-side ratios are excellent. As one ham said, it is so good if you are not pointing in the direction of the opening you might think the band is dead. Gain is also very good in this antenna.

There seems to be a down side to it however. SWR curves show the antenna to be 1.5:1 SWR on ten meters. It is claimed to be a broadband antenna. However some individuals have found measurements of 2.5:1 in some portions of the band, which means, if you have a 440 or similar transceiver, will reduce power to 65-70 watts.

I understand that Moseley will come out with a modification for this antenna to improve the SWR, however that may only be on the WARC bands.

MU-64 MORSE UNIVERSITY: AEA, who also gives us the DX Handy talked about earlier, offers an "easier" way to learn morse code if you have a Commodore 64 computer.

And according to AEA, "You can even use your new skills to play a Receiving Game. A video game that shoots the antenna off your house with lightning bolts if you don't type in the characters sent.


