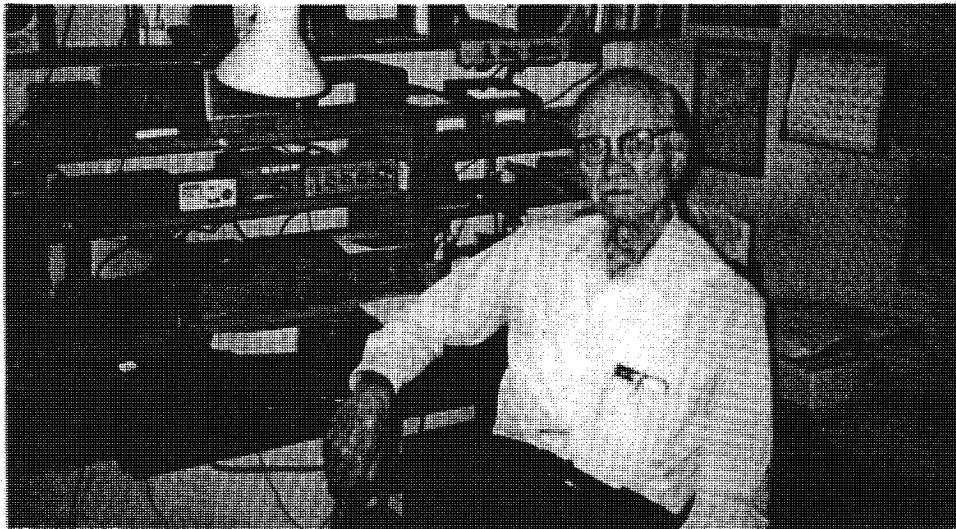

A New Year, A New Beginning . . . . 1991 is here. As I write this in the opening days of January 1991 thoughts of the past year are fresh in my mind.

Not so long ago I took on the task of editor of the News. Thanks for all of your comments, many great, a very few not so great. All are encouraged and eagerly sought. I hope to serve as editor for a long time to come, health, economics and world politics permitting!

Changes have rocked the foundations of Amateur Radio worldwide. The emerging democratic movement in eastern Europe has done much to foster international good will among amateurs with increased communications and easing the tension of government officials towards Amateur Radio. This is especially so in the USSR with the ability of Soviet hams to finally have QSL cards sent directly to their home address. No more year plus delays via Box 88, Moscow for most hams there.

The situation in the Middle East is by now well known to nearly every ham around the globe. Tensions are very high and I'll not take sides on the issues. It is this humble editor's hope that the conflict can be resolved via peaceful means.

Major changes are coming for Amateur Radio in the USA too. The recent negative ruling by the US court of Appeals concerning the Federal Communications Commission's removal of part of the 220 to 225 Mhz amateur band (220 to 222 Mhz

was "lost" in the United States) will force many changes in repeater linking and the nationwide packet network. In December the FCC announced the revision of the Technician class license into a no-code test required ticket with full privileges above 50 Mhz. Existing Technician class license holders WILL RETAIN their HF privileges under the "grandfather clause" in the announcement. The effects of the "new" license class on Ten-Ten International are unknown at this time. The total effects on Amateur Radio in the USA are also a very large question mark.

In This Issue . . . . The last board meeting under the old slate of officers was held in early October. Minutes of that meeting as well as an extensive report from our President can be found in the next few pages. I've received some letters concerning the alleged "removal" of duplicate 10-10 numbers for club stations operated under an individual's call sign. Remember when reading Norm's report and the minutes that at one time the FCC, many years ago, issued a separate club call sign to Amateur Radio clubs with a single amateur within the club (holding his or her own separate call sign) as trustee for the club station call sign. Thus, the CLUB station actually held the call sign and NOT a single individual. Since the FCC no longer issues these types of calls many have lapsed because the trustee or club officers elected not to renew them. Many others still are in existence and are in active use.

Today, club stations are usually operated under the call sign of an individual. The recent special event station at the 1990 NY State fair is a good example. We operated under the call of KB2ERJ, that call belonging to a single individual and NOT the group that organized the event. The President's Report and board meeting minutes are quite clear in their content and should serve to clarify the matter. Those having additional questions or comments should address them directly to the individuals involved. A list of the New board of directors and the new committees is also included in the President's Report.

Out with the old . . . . Thanks to the retiring slate of officers for their years of service to Ten-Ten International. Their untiring efforts moved the organization to the point that it has achieved today.

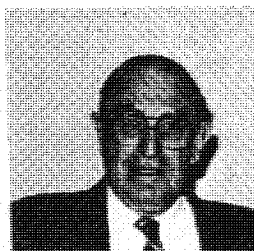

#### SOON: OM XYL AWARD

I understand that our Director, N8CBE Elaine, is working on the rules, etc., for an Official OM-XYL AWARD.

Morrie, W6EHM, and Jim, W6PGM outgoing Directors, were requested by the Board of Directors, to continue to help 10-10 within their expertise. They both responded affirmatively Morrie, W6EHM will be our connection with F.A.R. and the membership with reference to the annual 10-10 scholarships. Jim, W6PGM will continue to gather information and stay on as Historian.

Gerry, led a discussion regarding the upcoming WARC meeting. We all agreed that Amateur Radio is more than just 10 meters. ARRL is representing us and Amateur Radio in general and the U.S.A. amateur community in particular. Our interests are the same. Therefore the board voted to make a donation to the ARRL WARC-92 fund.

#### Mail:

I have received many pieces of mail congratulating me on being elected as

your President. I thank you all for the good wishes. I especially want to thank Mel, KD5DE, who ran against me for President. His letter and offer to aid me and 10-10 in any way possible was appreciated.

After the Board meeting some misinformation was passed by a Director. It seems that the withdrawal of a motion was not remembered. He Director really thought that item # 14 was passed. Well, word went out like you would not believe. The issuance of TWO numbers to one station call has been a sore point for a while. Previous President Howard Bowman, W6QIR addressed the problem in his NEWS FROM THE DIRECTORS column. See the 10-10 NEWS, Winter 1984 edition. He said that 10-10 simply does not honor such (c/s) applications. It seems that several Area Managers not having received a specific order to stop, went on and issued 2nd numbers to some calls with suffix club station (c/s). If anyone has anything from Howard that said differently I would like a copy of it. It's a real records problem as well as, I believe, an ego booster for someone having 2 numbers with one call, (I only have 1 #). The question Gerry posed at the meeting was whether there was any compelling reason for someone to need a 2nd number. Also, a scan of the records, indicates that there are only 76 Calls holding 2 numbers. Of the 76 about 50 are errors such as K7YY is listed with both 6969 and 29007, a check shows that K7YY ex WA7NUY holds 6969 but 29007 should be WB7OGT, W6LT (SK) is listed with both 6418 and 13358 a check shows that 6418 should be K6YE. These will be corrected. The other 20 or so seem to be intentional 2nd number issue's. A committee of new Board members will be asked to approve direct communications with all double number CALLS to find out exactly what the second number is being used for. The Board will then discuss and decide whether any action is needed. I would like to know how the General population of members feel about this. Is it OK for one call to have 2 numbers? Maybe you don't care? Should they be Grandfathered or revoked? A postcard would be enough.



10-10 International Net, Inc. Board Meeting  
October 20, 1990, Long Beach, California

Board Meeting Minutes

1. The Board Meeting of 10-10 International Net, Inc. was convened on October 20, 1990 in Long Beach, California at 0900 hours. A minute of silence was observed in recognition of those 10-10 members who had become silent keys.

2. In attendance were six of the seven members of the Board of Directors. (President Norm Lefcourt, W6IRF; Vice President Morrie Goldman, W6EHN; Secretary Don Hirst, W6AGP; Treasurer Gerry Gross, WA6POZ; and Directors Hugh Sullivan, WA4QZU; and Jim Michaels, W6PGM.) Director Jim Beswick, W4YHF, was unable to attend because he had injured his back. Several local 10-10 members were also present.

3. Discussion of the net frequency of 28.8 MHz: Many licensee's are restricted to operations in the 28.3 to 28.5 MHz range. What considerations are being given to the ability of these people to check in to 10-10 nets? Jim, W6PGM, reviewed nets that meet in the 28.3 to 28.5 MHz range and there are numerous nets to check in to and to qualify for 10-10 membership. It was noted that there was a net held for several years at 28.350. We do have an alternate net on Mondays at 28.775. Perhaps we should have an alternate net one day per week in the 28.3 to 28.5 frequency range. Norm, W6IRF, recommended we change our alternate Monday net from 28.775 MHz to 28.385 at 1800Z.

MOTION: That W6OI be authorized for use at 28.8 MHz, 28.775 and 28.380. (Motion by Morrie, W6EHN, and seconded by Hugh, WA4QZU.) Motion passed unanimously.

MOTION: That the 10-10 alternate Monday net be conducted on 28.380 MHz rather than at 28.775, at 1800Z. That Sherm Sherman, K6PTT, International Net Manager, be notified of the Board's decision and that Levergne, KD6JC or Duety, K6MFM be net control on the new frequency.

4. Report by Chuck Insaude, W6YLJ:

A. There is a monthly 10-10 column written by Chuck in World Radio News. Chuck has been given total freedom in writing these columns and 10-10 has received a great deal of favorable publicity as a result. It was recommended that a 10-10 letter of appreciation be sent to the owner of World Radio News from the President of 10-10. Chuck and Norm will prepare the letter of thanks.

B. A public relations brochure "10-10 Information Manual" was reviewed by the Board. Approval to have Chuck update this manual was granted.

C. Awards Program:

(1) The Worked all Continents (WAC) 10-10 award program is going well, with about 300 certificates awarded to date.

(2) A 10-10 County Hunters Award was proposed and recommended as an official 10-10 award. It was recommended that it operate like the bar award program, with a bar for every 100 stations worked not confirmed that seals be issued for each 100, numbered 100, 200, 300, etc. The Chattanooga Choo Choo Chapter already has some type of county hunters chapter award, it was requested that Hugh Sullivan contact the Chattanooga Choo Choo Chapter about the possibility of them administering this new 10-10 county hunters award. Hugh agreed to do this.

(3) Hugh Sullivan suggested a "Worked All 10 US Call Areas Award".

(4) An "ON-XYL Award" was discussed and the Board felt favorably inclined towards this. It will be approved when rules are written and approved by the Board. This should be done as soon as possible. Elaine Nickoloff will be asked to take the action to accomplish this.

5. Report by Gerry Gross, WA6POZ:

The Treasurer reported that no dues increase will be needed for the upcoming year, 1991. Three pages of financial data were presented to the Board members and discussed.

MOTION: That we accept the Financial Report as presented. (Motion by Jim Michaels and seconded by Hugh Sullivan.) Motion approved unanimously.

C. Gerry indicated a need to have the commercial magnetic tape of 10-10 data transferred to floppies, for his analysis. He estimated this could cost up to \$1,000.00 to have a specialty equipped company with the appropriate equipment handle this. The Board felt favorably disposed to approve this action.

MOTION: That Gerry Gross be authorized to obtain the services of a computer specialist company to transfer and convert the 10-10 International Net data base from a 2400 foot magnetic tape to 1.2 megabyte "floppy" disks, for data base analysis and other purposes, for a cost not to exceed \$1,000. (Motion by Morrie Goldman seconded by Hugh Sullivan.) Motion approved unanimously

D. There was a discussion about providing Lee Pasewalk, WB6MGM, Records Manager, with a computer system so the 10-10 records could be handled on this computer system.

MOTION: That the Board appoint a committee (Norm Lefcourt and Morrie Goldman) to approach Lee Pasewalk with a proposal to have him accept a 10-10 computer system, of value up to \$2,500, for use in maintaining the records for 10-10 International Net. (Motion by Gerry Gross, seconded by Jim Michaels.) Approved by unanimous vote.

6. There was a discussion on the need for new Rosters. It was indicated by Norm Lefcourt that this will be an item of discussion by a new committee. No action taken

7. There was some discussion of the 10-10 Certificate Guide. No action was taken.

8. Name Badges: The need for 10-10 Name Badges for Officers and Directors was discussed.

**MOTION:** That 10-10 International Net Inc. authorize the purchase of same badges to be provided to officers, directors and managers at 10-10 expense. (Motion by Jim Michaels, seconded by Gerry Gross.) Approved by unanimous vote.

9. Report by Hugh Sullivan (as Chapter Coordinator):

A. 10-10 International Net currently has about 150 10-10 active Chapters (including three new chapters).

B. Hugh indicated he had created a sheet with an explanation of 10-10 International, chapters and their purposes, the rules for chapters, and an application for submission to authorize creation of a new chapter. Each inquiry concerning creation of a new Chapter that is sent to Hugh as Chapter Coordinator, is sent one of these new packages of information.

C. Hugh noted that there is a requirement for each Chapter to submit at least one quarterly report each year.

D. Hugh Sullivan will remain as Chapter Coordinator in 1991 and onward, after he becomes Vice President of 10-10 International Net.

10. Norm Lefcourt requested that Morrie Goldman continue to hold the responsibility as head of the 10-10 Scholarship Program, under the Finance Committee. Morrie agreed to continue in this assignment. Also, Jim Michaels W6PGM was asked to continue as 10-10 Historian. Jim agreed to stay on.

11. Discussion of information mailed to new 10-10 members: It was discussed whether to continue to mail the most recent 10-10 News to all new members, as some Area Managers have been doing. **MOTION:** That all new 10-10 Members be sent one of the new Information packets in the future, Not a past issue of 10-10 News. (Motion by Hugh Sullivan, seconded by Jim Michaels.) Motion was approved unanimously.

12. Norm Lefcourt informed the board that he had been sending out (by first class mail) a copy of the 10-10 News,

to all Officers, Directors and those listed on page 42 of the 10-10 News. This was to insure they received the latest information without having to wait for the 10-10 News to come by bulk mail. Everyone felt this was an excellent idea.

**Note:** After a break for lunch, the meeting reconvened at 1:40 PM.

13. Lucky 13 Award: It was stated that the Lucky 13 Award is only given for contacts with VP Award holders on each 100 KHz from 28.5 to 29.2 MHz.

14. Discussion of issuing dual 10-10 numbers to the same station: A motion was made by Gerry to kill club station numbers for c/s. There was no second. The motion was withdrawn. After much discussion it was agreed that the Area Managers would be notified not to issue any additional dual 10-10 numbers while this whole matter will be investigated by a new committee to determine if there is a compelling reason for having dual numbers.

15. Norm indicated that he is investigating the feasibility of a Voice Mail System with a 800 phone number to receive and send messages between Officers, Directors, Area Managers, etc.

16. Discussion of Committee Chairmanships and assignments:

**MOTION:** by Jim Michaels and seconded by Gerry Gross That the Committee Chairman and Committee Vice Chairman assignments be made by the President and Vice President, and be approved by the Board. That the President and Vice President of 10-10 International Net be "ex-officio" members of all Committees that are established. Approved by unanimous vote. That initially all Committee assignments be made by the Board of Directors. Approved by unanimous vote.

17. **MOTION:** That we adopt the proposed Committee structure as outlined.

(See attachment listing committees and their functions.) (Motion made by Hugh Sullivan, seconded by Morrie Goldman) This motion was approved unanimously.

**MOTION:** That Committee Chairman and Vice Chairman assignments be made based on the votes received in the election for Board of Directors. (Motion by Hugh Sullivan and seconded by Morrie Goldman.) Motion was passed unanimously.

18. There was a discussion of official 10-10 representation at fairs (such as Dayton Hamvention) and other Conventions. This was deferred for discussion by the new Operations Committee.

19. There was a discussion of the deadlines established for publication of the 10-10 News. This discussion brought to light many factors, some of which are beyond our control, that result in the deadlines as currently established.

20. There was a general discussion of cross-band contacts and a decision was made by the Board that no 10-10 contact credit can be given for any cross-band contacts of any kind.

21. There was some discussion of the importance of the WARC-92 and a motion made to provide some 10-10 monetary support.

**MOTION:** That 10-10 International Net make a donation in the amount of \$1,000.00 to the ARRL WARC-92 Fund. (Motion made by Gerry Gross and seconded by Jim Michaels.) Motion was passed unanimously.

22. Having covered all the business on the agenda and other matters as brought before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 3:32 PM.

Set up most efficient and uniform procedures for Area Manager duties. Define area manager duties. Interface with Area, Records, Silent Key and Supply Managers. Report to Board.
3. **Finance, Committee:** Help Treasurer with budget and dues forecasting. Oversee pricing of awards, etc. Contact chapters and members to help promote scholarship donations. Interface with scholarship manager. Also, promote Estate, Trust and Will beneficiary donations for and to 10-10. Specific contact with Life members. Report to Board.

Work directly with 10-10 Contest, Awards managers. Also, the Net and Chapter Coordinator to help increase member enjoyment and participation. Specific liaison between chapter and member in attempt to increase on air contacts and suggest possible ways to simplify paperwork, if appropriate. Report to Board.
5. **Communications Committee:** Consult with members, Public Relations Manager and News Editor, to increase 10-10's public and amateur radio exposure at conventions, fairs, etc. Investigate the possibility of paid advertising in the 10-10 News. Peruse Official and proposed 10-10 publications, suggest and submit changes. Report to Board.

10-10 QSO Parties are open to all amateurs, but only paid-up members are eligible for awards and chapter assignment of scores. They are conducted to encourage 10 meter operation and interest in the Net. Non-members may use numbers collected to qualify for membership; members may use them for awards.

### RULES:

1. PHONE. Contacts must be in the Ten meter Phone band, on SSB, AM, or FM.  
CW. Contacts must be in the Ten meter band on CW or RTTY.
2. Exchange: Callsign, name, state, and 10-10 number.
3. A station may be counted only once.
4. Single operator stations only are acceptable.
5. All contacts must take place within the 48 hour contest period.
6. Logs must be kept in Universal Coordinated Time.
7. A DUPE SHEET IS REQUIRED OF ALL PARTICIPANTS. Computer duping is OK. SASE to me for dupe sheet sample.
8. Chapter assignment of scores may be made only by a paid-up member belonging to that chapter as a local member and able to work its Net via groundwave from the contest station.
9. Illegible or improperly submitted logs will be rejected. See below for log requirements.
10. Failure to comply with these rules or their intent may result in disqualification.
11. SCORING: Two points per contact WITH a 10-10 number exchange; One point per contact WITHOUT a 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS: First Place certificate to each U.S. Call Area (Area 7 includes KL7); also Canada, South America, Central America, Caribbean (incl. Bermuda), Europe, Africa, Asia, and the Pacific (incl. Australia, New Zealand, KH6, and all Pacific islands). Also top ten finishers in the contest overall will receive a certificate. Paid-up individual and chapter scores are listed in the NEWS.

LOGS: Logs are accepted from 10-10 members only, and must be complete, legible, and in UTC. Each line entry must show Callsign, time, state, name, and 10-10 number, if any. A cover sheet is required showing your name, callsign, QTH, 10-10 number, membership expiration date, chapter assignment, if any, total contacts and total points. A cover sheet may be found on the back cover of the NEWS. A DUPE SHEET MUST ACCOMPANY ALL LOGS.

## New 10-10 Counties Award

Here is a new 10-10 award for you ambitious 10-10'ers. It is the new 10-10 Counties Award.

County Hunting is a fascinating part of Ham Radio and has been around for a quite some time. CQ Magazine offers a County Award and the Mobile Amateur Radio Awards Club (MARAC) also offers a number of County Hunting Awards. 10-10 decided to offer their own County Hunting Award to supplement the other 10-10 Awards.

Any contact made on 10-meters with the exchange of 10-10 numbers and the county from which each station is transmitting from counts for a county "worked". QSL card confirmation for the contact is not required for the 10-10 Counties Award. However, a QSL card that confirms the contact, even if the county did not exchange during the QSO, is considered a valid contact and the County listed on the QSL card can count for the 10-10 Counties Award.

The 10-10 Counties Award is based on the "honor" system, the same as the 10-10 Bars Award, wherein QSL confirmation of the contact is not required. The CQ Magazine County Hunter Award does require QSL confirmation of each contact in order to count for their award. If you would be interested in the CQ Award, it would be desirable for you to have your counties confirmed by QSL card at the time of working them.

In order for you to maintain a record of the counties you work, 10-10 is making available a 10-10 County Hunter Record Book. This spiral bound 8 1/2" x 11" book lists the all of the 3076 counties in each state, alphabetically, first by state and then the county within the state. Space is provided to enter the Call of the station worked, the 10-10 # the date and the award. Also enclosed are the rules for 10-10 County Hunting and an application form for submitting your counties to the Award Manager.

The basic Certificate is issued for submitting your first 100 counties. Each 100 counties worked after the first 100 may also be submitted. A colored seal will be issued for the following levels of achievement:

RED seal for 500 Counties  
BLUE seal for 1000 Counties  
YELLOW seal for 1500 Counties  
GREEN seal for 2000 Counties  
SILVER seal for 2500 Counties  
GOLD seal for 3000 Counties

A Plaque will be awarded for working all 3076 Counties.

The best way to begin your 10-10 County Hunting is to go through all of your QSL cards and list all of the counties you have made contact with so far. Remember the 10-10 number and the county must be listed on the card. The 10-10 Counties Award Manager has the new 10-10 County Hunter Record Book. The cost is \$5.00 US postpaid and \$7.00 US Airmail to DX Members. Send for your Record Book to:

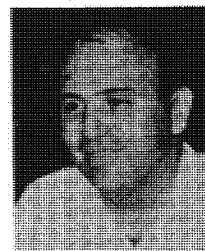

# TenX DX News

The 1990 DX season closed with a very good year and completion of my dream of working 200 TenX countries. The 200th came when I worked VP2V/WD0ENG in the British Virgin Isl. on Dec. 6th. Tim was with a group sailing in the Caribbean and he would operate from his land QTH when time permitted. By the time you read this Tim will be back in the states but keep looking for others to stop off at VP2V as there is no active TenX member on the island.

November and December have been the best conditions we have had during Solar cycle 22. As I begin this article the Ten Meter contest is in the log and I worked all the states but two and found 60 countries. TenX members were not very active as expected but I have listed several in the QSN reports at the end. I operated SSB and CW ending up with 1050 contacts. One large station here in Houston worked 3260 SSB contacts and 110 countries!

The band now opens just after sunrise to Asia and Europe during the winter months for us in Texas. The afternoon path is into the Pacific and the band closes about two hours after sundown. Sporadic E layer skip may occur for short skip contacts after the DX is gone and will last for 2 to 3 hours. Those looking for WAS will find TenX nets active at night with the Sporadic E skip. Checking the solar flux at 18 minutes after the hour will continue to give you a good idea of what conditions are expected. When they announce the A index above 30 it usually means a flare has occurred and the band will most likely be poor. Best conditions need the A less than 10.

I have received some good letters the past few months and I want to encourage more of you to write me with DX info. Remember that this article is being written only about TenX members unless I mention differently. Several people have asked what is my station. I use a TS830 with a KW amp running into a 4 el. yagi at 75 ft or a 3 el. yagi at 40 ft fixed on Europe. I have a 15 & 20 Mtr 4 el. yagi on the same tower with slopers for 40 & 80 for the primary bands. Two VHF antenna for the DX Packet cluster completes the antenna farm.

Whats new? I want to welcome our 60 new DX members that have joined this fall: Europe 37, Asia 4, N & S America 4, Pacific 5, Canada 6 & Africa 3. Sorry but I do not get DX info from the VK & ZL new members. The most sought after will be the following: UD6DFA, UW0SR, C21JM, OH3MKL, H44AP, YC9VGB, ZD8EB, V51BG, T77V, and the rare FT5XH.

Here is DX info collected over the air.

TG9NR is Tony from Guatemala. This is one I had been looking for info on in past issues of the News. I found TG9NT (no number) and asked Renie to call Tony on the telephone. He did and Tony and I talked about radio & computers for 30 min. Tony runs a TS140 into a vertical. His YL is TG9AMS but she is not a member. I sent him some Packet radio software and still waiting on his QSL for a new country.

T77C as reported last issue operates CW & SSB. Tony has returned his QSL within just a few weeks of sending my card. QSL to Tony Ceccoli, Via Delle Oarrare, 67, 47031 Murata, Rep. San Marino (Via Italy). Watch 28455 at 1500 & 28021 about 1400 for Tony on the weekends.

SP8ARY is Ron the Only member in Poland. Received a quick QSL from Ron Rydzewski, P.O. Box 79, 23-210 Kasnik, Poland. Ron is 48 years old runs low power into dipoles so you need a big antenna to hear his, hi. We will make a schedule to meet you if you write him. He request a green stamp for the QSL postage return. Thanks to Bob Leaver W1ZGP from CT who sponsored Roman's membership for 2 years. Ron asked that I thank Bob and help him find a VFO RV-4 for his TR4C to work split. Anyone willing to help Ron please write as there is no equipment in Poland. He talks about his primitive English but don't let that fool you, he gave me country 188, wrote me a nice letter and I expect we will hear from Ron for many years with his new number. Thanks for a new one Ron.

LZ1KVZ by Stan and others at the Technical Schools Radio Club in Sopot Bulgaria, continues to be very active. They were in the Ten Mtr contest and on weekends at 28505 at 1500. Remember to put the operators name on the QSL and please include a green stamp for postage to Vladimar Zaimov, Technical Schools Radio Club, P.O.Box 8, 4300 Sopot, Bulgaria.

OM6AJN by Ivan OK1AJN from Czechoslovakia and also club station OK1KJA. Ivan has a special call sign that will end at year end 90. His son is OK1FGC Stan also a member in Prague. Please QSL to OK1KJA Club Station, Ivan Matejicek, Lipova 4-3523, CS-46600 Jablonac nad Nisou, Czechoslovakia. Ivan is a paper chaser and has good antennas so watch for him on or around the back scatter net 28825 at 1600.

YL2AG is Sandy in Riga Latvia using the new YL prefix. The original call was UQ2GAG and Sandy was issued 18387 in Dec 89, so you want to watch out for DX stations with these lower numbers. The DX manager has been using blocks of older numbers that were never issued. We worked Oct 4 on 28520 at 1445 so look for him about this part of the band. HI0URA is John from Paris France. He was on 28500 at 1530 and I do not know how long the special prefix is valid. He gave as his QSL route F1HWD. Note: the roster list his call as F1HWB which is wrong.

VU2GI is Goul from Bombay India. I worked him one morning on 28343 at 1545 with a 55 signal. Goul has been a member several years and has operated from the rare VU islands off India. This morning opening is not to common but the band was open short path to India. They normally operate very low in the band. QSL to his callbook address.

HB0/DL1ECU is Hel operating portable in Lichenstein.

Hel has operated from here before and has given out many new countries to people looking for HB0. Listed in the roster is HB0LL as the only member from Lichenstein so the visitors are much sought after when active. QSL to Helmut Enger, Kottsiepen 78, D-5600 Wuppertal 21, Germany.

TI75S by Jose TI4SU from Costa Rica. Another special callsign from a TenX member. Unknown how long the 75 will be used in their calls. He was on 28495 at 1500 and QSL to Bengt Hirche, Box 9, San Joaquin de Flores 3007, Heredia, Costa Rica and include an IRC for QSL return.

9M600 was Bob N200 on a trip to E. Malaysia during early November. Bob was in Brunei V85 before he traveled to 9M6. I worked him for a new country on Nov 23 and he told me I was the first person to ask him for his number. I guess not too many people collect TenX DX except me, hi.

4U1UN operated from the United Nations in NY city, has been active on 28011 at 2100 and they were in the Ten Mtr contest. The UN in Switzerland 4U1ITU also has a number watch 28433 at 1215. Most of the operators of ITU are guest ops so get the QSL info over the air. QSL 4U1UN to NA2K Harry Westervelt, 72 Kuhlthau Ave., Milltown NJ 08850. Enclose a stamped SASE.

C9QL operated by Lloyd & Iris Colvin were active from Mozambique from Oct 16 to Nov 5. The east coast had the best skip and reports of working them are numerous but I missed them. I heard Iris on SSB but could not break the pileup. Comments about their operating technique have been growing and I agree with some of the comments. But remember this is just a hobby even though I take my DX seriously, hi. QSL to YASME, P.O.Box 2025, Castro Valley, CA 94546.

Many hams have tried to obtain permission to operate in this country since a war with insurgent forces started some 15 years ago. Fighting has not yet stopped and they were lucky to obtain official written permission for their operation. They made 5000 QSOs with 131 countries on 10-40M. Reports of numerous foreign amateurs who have applied for permission to operate from C9 are surfacing since the C9QL operation. Lloyd & Iris may have helped open the door for others to operate from this rare country.

ZS9/W6KG operated by Lloyd & Iris were active the last week of Nov and into Dec from Walvis Bay. Reported 28021 at 1945 and 28434 at 1700. QSL to YASME.

KD7P/NH7 is Bob on Kure Isl. Bob travels to many islands in the Pacific so watch for him on 28495 or 28025 at 0000 possibly split. QSL to Bob Winters, PO Box 8265, NCWP, MOU 3 GWAM, Dededo, GU 96912.

UA0FDX is Victor on Sackaline Isl. from Asiatic Russia. Victor operates around 28505 at 0100. QSL to callbook.

SM5BFC is Ken who is very active from Sweden. He gets a lot of callers on 28480 at 1500-1600. Ken collects US counties and will QSL for a new county. QSL to callbook.

I3UEL is Ulisse from Padova, Italy. He uses a FT101ZD with his TH6DXX at 90 ft. He complained that he had sent for his VP number and some bar awards and had not received anything back by mail. He talked about the Russians AM causing QRM on the band, hi. He has worked UH8ABD on Oct 21st who is Alex who got his number in July.

G4OJH is Andy in England. We were talking DX on 28414 at 1600 for an hour. HP6AYV Victor in Panama broke in to swap numbers along with several US stations. Andy just completed TenX WAS and is starting on countries. He was in the Ten Mtr contest with 1975 QSO and 131 mults. Andy, 57, has a crank up tower to 60 ft and runs a KW amp to his home brew antennas. Andy received his News Dec 8th posted in Oct which shows us how slow the mail goes. He told me that state-side opens at 1130 and closes at 1900 so check 28370-410 at 1600-1830 daily except Sunday. Andy is serious about winning the Winter SSB QSO Party so watch out for G4OJH.

#### Letters to the DX Editor:

K4HAV has just sent me his latest TenX Contest Program for the IBM PC and also a copy of his new DX 10-10 List. The contest program was introduced last issue by the editor and since then Jim has added the Master TenX roster from WA6POZ which is a major feature where you can look up TenX info various ways. I have used the program and it operates just like those written by K8CC & K1EA which are used by a growing number of hams. A demo disk limited to 25 QSOs is available on diskettes for \$5 (refundable on purchase) from Hardy Data Systems, 306 Frances, Sylvester, GA. 31791. Jim's phone 912-776-3583.

The DX 10-10 List is just like the one I printed two years ago using a PC database. Jim takes the DX calls, including the silent keys changed to lower case, sorts them and prints them in neat columns. The 6,800 calls are on 14 pages in a spiral binder and printed on a laser printer. The serious DX country hunter needs this reference which is updated monthly and cost \$5 postpaid (\$8 DX Air Mail).

#### Feature DX Station:

I have chosen Jim Smith VK9NS to be the Feature TenX DX Station. Jim lives on Norfolk Isl. with his wife Kirstie, VK9NL (not member) where he is in business for himself when he is not out on a DXpedition. Jim operated from Bhutan as A51JS last April and made 15,000 contacts. This was the first activity from A5 in many years. Jim left a complete station in Bhutan with the expectation that A51PN (not member) might be allowed back on the air. Jim also had permission to operate from Bangladesh but he changed his plans when several Japanese ops put on S2. The ARRL has accepted the documentation for A51JS and the cards count for DXCC. Jim operated from Banaba Isl as T33JS the previous year. This was a new country for everyone because of the change in DXCC rules about 2 yrs ago. QSL to Box 90, Norfolk Isl. 2899 Australia.

Jim recently completed a tour in the USA

where he spoke with several DX groups. While on this trip he passed his FCC test all the way to Extra Class and is waiting on a call sign. He stopped in Houston and some of the Texas DX Society group treated him to lunch. The photo below is (l-r) K5XI Sid, KC5CI myself, and VK9NS Jim.

SUBJ: Getting Your First Antenna Up

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The following was originally posted as a series of messages to a new ham who lived in an urban setting. The same questions seem to keep coming up, however, so I thought I would load it in the data library for anyone who might find it handy.

There are several possibilities for getting you on the air from an urban rooftop.

The easiest would be to get a Cushcraft R-4. This works on 10, 12, 15, and 20 meters, and since it is a half-wave vertical which requires no ground plane you can just put it up on a short pole and expect it to work pretty well. I haven't used one but it has a very fine reputation. The trouble is it costs \$250.

Next easiest is a commercial quarter-wave multiband vertical, of which there are a number on the market for around \$100. They are available in 3 band models for 10, 15, and 20 meters, and 5 band models which add 40 and 80 meters. The 5 band models are considerably more expensive and performance on the lower bands is a bit dubious. They do work however. These antennas require a ground plane extending about a quarter wavelength from the base of the antenna. If you have a metal roof you might have it made, but most people have to run radials. These are horizontal wires running out from the base of the antenna. There need to be at least three wires for each band and more is better. The length in feet is 240 divided by the frequency in MHz. That's about 63 feet on 80 meters. You can cheat in various ways, but anything less than 3 wires running straight and horizontal at equal angles will degrade performance.

Ground plane verticals have a reputation for picking up local electrical noise which might be a serious problem in your area. I don't know how a half-wave like the R-4 would compare in this respect.

The next possibility would be a commercial multi-band trap dipole. These are wire antennas that run from about 50 to 100 feet in length, work on all bands, and cost from \$50 to \$100. The trouble with these is that they have to be kept away from obstructions, especially anything that acts like a ground plane. If you do NOT have a metal roof, you might be able to string one from a couple of short poles. A metal roof would be a problem.

Dipoles are somewhat directional. They have a four-leaf-clover pattern which is strongest about 30 degrees off the ends of the wire. They have a strong null along the line of the wire and a less pronounced null broadside to the wire. This means you may be able to reduce your noise level by orienting the antenna in a particular direction.

Finally, you can build an antenna. A single band vertical is not difficult, but much more trouble than a dipole or one of its variants (which are also the cheapest of all antennas). Antennas for the high bands are likely to be more practical in your location. A 10 meter dipole is only about 16 feet long and needs to be 8 to 16 feet above the ground or ground plane. Such an antenna can be built in rigid form out of something like wiring conduit if desired. Then it can be stuck up on a single pole and it is easy to experiment with

rotating it for optimum results. Or it can be of extremely simple wire construction.

If you can put up a single fairly tall pole or have something like a chimney to work from you can put up a dipole variant such as the "Inverted Vee". This is just a dipole with the wires drooped down from the center at about 45 degrees. The ends can come right down to the ground or roof. It is less directional than a horizontal dipole, but many people think it works better, especially for DX.

A dipole is just a more or less straight conductor, a half wavelength long at the desired frequency, broken at the center to attach a feedline. The length in feet of the conductor is usually given as 468 divided by the desired frequency in megahertz. When the antenna is made of wire, the ends will probably be looped or twisted around an insulator for support, and it is important to understand that the formula gives the maximum extent of the conductor in space, not the amount of wire used. The parts which are doubled back to form attachments don't count.

The formula is also an idealized approximation. The correct length of the antenna will be somewhat different depending on the type of wire used, the method of attaching the ends, the height above ground, and the presence of obstructions in the area. Therefore the thing should be cut to come out at least a few inches longer than the formula specifies so that it can be trimmed experimentally. The correct length is quite critical. Non-insulated wire should be used where practical.

The simplest insulator for the ends of the wire is just a small rectangle of flat plastic with a hole drilled near each end. The wire is passed through one hole and twisted back on itself. A cord or rope is tied through the other and led off to the supporting structure. The wire is also cut at the center and a similar insulator used to tie the two halves together. Some details are shown on pages 8-22 to 8-24 of the ARRL Antenna Book (14th edition).

The feed should be 50 to 55 ohm coaxial (shielded) line. The type designated RG-58 is the nicest to use since it is small, flexible, and relatively cheap. If you have a run of more than 100 feet or so, it may be worth considering the larger RG-8 or RG-213, but they are much more expensive and much more trouble to work with. They have lower losses for long runs and will handle high power levels.

Don't confuse RF coax with audio cable; it aint the same thing. Also, the coax used for cable TV is 75 ohm and will not work as well although it is not out of the question to use it.

The best way to connect a dipole like this is to use a commercial 1:1 balun transformer at the center of the dipole. "Balun" is short for "Balanced to Unbalanced" and this device serves to match the symmetrical antenna to the coax which is considered "unbalanced" because one side (the shield) is grounded. Without the balun, RF current may flow down the outside shield of the coax which can cause all kinds of problems (including angry neighbors when you wipe out the Saturday cartoons). The commercial units are waterproof and sturdy enough to support the tension on the two halves of the dipole. They cost \$15 to \$20.

The center of the dipole can also be supported by an insulator and the coax connected directly to it. The shield goes to one side of the dipole and the center conductor to the other. In this case, roll up about 8 turns of the coax into a coil about 6" in diameter, as close to the dipole center as practical. Tape or tie the coil and let it dangle. This forms a "choke" which

discourages the RF from running down the outside of the coax but does not affect the flow on the center conductor. This trick is shown on page 5-9 (figure 14) of the Antenna Book.

The outer ends of a dipole can be bent off at an angle if there is not enough room for the full half-wave length in a straight line. The more of the antenna which is bent out of plane, the more degraded the performance will be.

In a pinch, dipoles can be mounted indoors, either strung in an attic or stapled to a wall or ceiling. This only works on wood buildings without metallized insulation in the walls. Wiring, pipes and gutters can also cause trouble. Indoor antennas never work as well as outdoor ones.

Page 3-22 (figure 37) of the Antenna Book shows how to connect the standard PL-259 plug to RG-58 line with a little adaptor. This stuff is all available from Radio Shack, although their hardware is not of the highest quality.

To do the final tuning of an antenna requires an SWR meter, also known as a reflected power meter. Radio Shack sells one that will work for \$20. It is nice to have a good one like the cross-needle meters sold by MFJ and Daiwa for about \$70. If you are getting an antenna tuner anyway, get one with the meter built in.

The trick to tuning an antenna with an SWR meter is to take readings at opposite ends of the band, plus a couple of points in between to make sure you know what is happening. If the lowest reading is at the bottom (low frequency end) of the band, the antenna is tuned too low and therefore is too long. Snip about an inch off each end and repeat the measurements. At some point the reading will drop abruptly at the bottom of the band. Then take measurements every 50 KHz or so to determine where the minimum is. Snip half an inch at a time off each end and recheck until the minimum SWR occurs in the band segment you want to use most of the time.

To minimize interference, use the lowest power level which will register on the SWR meter, don't transmit any longer than you absolutely have to, and never, never turn the frequency knob while you are actually transmitting. If you have the type of meter with a "sensitivity" control, set the control in its maximum position. Put the meter in "forward" mode and increase transmitter power until the meter reads full scale. Flip the meter to "reflected" mode and read the SWR.

It helps a lot to have a helper and some means of communication between the shack and the roof. It could be simplest to set up the transmitter on the roof.

An SWR of less than 2 will be fine as far as the antenna goes, but many of the newer solid-state rigs won't put out full power at more than about 1.25. If the antenna doesn't come out that good, an antenna tuner may be needed at the transmitter.

should be good for 10 meters unless major solar flares kick up and spoil things for a few days at a time. Listen to WWV on 5, 10, 15 and 20 Mhz at 10 minutes past each hour for solar activity information. The solar flux, A index, and K index are available. If you let me know if anyone's interested I'll try to prepare a short course on using those numbers for the next issue.

Wanted - ARTICLES . . . . On my Editor's WISH LIST for 1991 are the following articles -

There HAS to be someone in the 10-10 family of hams that is presently running a beacon on 10 meters. With the decrease coming in band conditions (maybe we should start a pool or something as to when the bottom will drop out) beacons become essential tools for determining band openings such as they'll be. 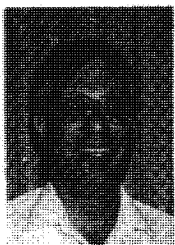

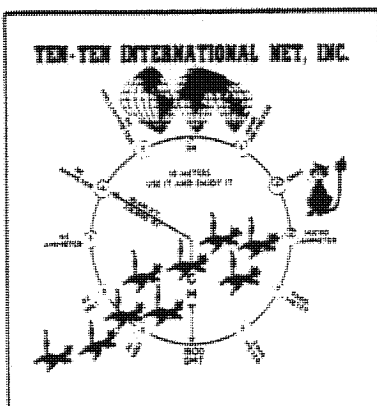
