

1991 MAD A GOOD IDAK!


Maybe 1991 was not a good year for some things, but it was a another good year for 10-10. In addition to completing our first year with our new Officers and Directors elected by a general election by the membership, we were successful in increasing our membership by 3339 new members. The largest gain was in the 4th district with 573 new members and the smallest gain was in the 3rd district with 181 new members.

1991, with 3339 new members was not quite as good as 1990 when the new membership total was 3358. But 10-10 keeps growing!

The DX membership grew by 295 new members. In addition to all of the paper work associated with processing new memberships, the District Managers and our hard working Records Manager, Lee Pasewalk WB6MGM, processed over 1500 changes to the membership records. These changes include call upgrades, call area changes and SK's. In addition there were countless address changes which are not included in the above total of over 1500 changes.

It is sad to report that 309 known members became SK's in the 1991 records. There are an additional number of SK's that do not get reported.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE de W6IRT

Fellow 10-10 Members; I do hope that all of you have come through to 1992 healthy and with a very minimum of difficulties from 1991.

There is no earth shaking news regarding the operation of 10-10. There are several items that the board is currently kicking around, such as a means of promoting better operating procedure and ethics. See Linda Barnes, "open letter" in this issue, about a special on-air operation of a group of fellow amateur radio operators. I firmly believe that it would be wrong and impractical for 10-10 to get involved in a moral or ethical issue such as this. But maybe we can ask some member to submit an article or articles regarding 10 meters specifically, and especially giving comprehensive information about band openings and geographic shifting of signals.

There are many members that do not understand the propagation possibilities of the 10 meter band. In fact I have heard arguments regarding intentional interference, when it was nothing more than the shift of a geographic opening. The stations were arguing that the frequency was busy and someone should move. They were not aware that everyone was already there on that frequency and that the band had shifted.

In my opinion 10 meters is the greatest amateur frequency segment we have. It's a FUN band! Lots of DX with a minimal amount of interference; simple antennas and low power work well. A large amount of financial expenditure is not absolutely necessary. Let's ease up a little and enjoy ourselves. Taking everything too seriously will defeat the basic reason why we are all amateur radio operators.

To all Ten-Ten Members:

During the past two weeks, I as a director of Ten-Ten-International have been appalled at the conduct of some of our members on the air. This was never more graphically illustrated than during the Albania DX-pedition. It had been announced weeks ago that there would be a dx-pedition from the country of Albania. For those of you who chase dx, this was truly an historic occasion. Albania has not been on the air for at least thirty (30) years, and the radio world eagerly awaited the chance to make contact with this small country. It was also announced that the operating frequency on 10 meters would be 28.345 and listening up. The band was not open each day of the expedition. so on those days that 10 meters cooperated it was doubly important to "make hay while the sun shines". Some helping hands tried to keep the frequency clear for the dx, but some of our fellow Ten-Ten members left the impression that this frequency was owned lock, stock and barrel by Ten-Ten International. The point that I am trying to make is this: We do not own any frequency on any band. This is made abundantly clear in the rules and regulations set by the FCC. We yield the frequency to the operator/s presently using the frequency. I happened to be on 28.345 and heard some of our members chastising those operators who were already on that frequency by telling them that this particular frequency was for exchanging chapter numbers and Ten-Ten numbers. I as an elected official came on the air at that time and strongly suggested that for the next 3-4 hours. that Ten-Ten could move down to 28.335. I made this effort as a gesture of good-will and cooperation among fellow amateurs. After all if 10 meters is open on 28.345 then it stands to reason that 20.335 will also be open. I must point out that although we are a large organization, we are but a small part of the amateur population of the world. We should be willing to take that extra step to promote good-will and operating practice. We do not need the negative press that incidents such as this promote. frequencies and times that are published in the guide were assigned for one reason - to create order from chaos. Can you imagine what would happen if two or more nets chose the same frequency and time? Please take the time to think before you speak. We as an organization do not wish to alienate anyone in the amateur community. We are a select group and have worked hard to get to our present standing. We want to promote amateur radio in a positive fashion not degrade.





Rather than take contest time to ask for 10-10 numbers, it is suggested that a QSL card be sent to the station worked requesting the station to list his 10-10 number, if he has one. You will be surprised how many MARAC members are also 10-10 members.

PCC NEWS

Call Signs - H.R. 1674, the Federal Communications Commission Authorization Act of 1991, contains a proviso, recommended in different forms by the ARRL and W5YI, that: "The Commission, for purposes of providing specialized, radio club and military-recreation call signs, may utilize the voluntary and uncompensated services of Amateur Radio organizations as determined by the FCC". The House passed the bill on September 24, 1991. The Senate has not yet acted. The Senate bill is S1132. (W5YI Report)

The FCC has indicated that it probably will no longer go after a ham for talking dirty on the air. That is, if he operates in a place where other hams find his language acceptable.

As quoted in a Los Angeles Times article, Dan Emrick, Chief of Investigations for the FCC, said that community standards make obscenity very hard to prove. This was a discussion of the 147.435 MHz repeater in Los Angeles - a repeater plagued for years with this problem.


The article noted that the FCC has a new monetary forfeiture system that gives them the right to impose fines of up to \$250,000 for some violations. But don't hold your breath waiting for them to use this tool to get the potty mouths off our bands. (Westlink Report)

THE EARLY DAYS.....

It was during cycle 20 that the 10-10 organization saw monstrous growth. It had changed from a California Net created during the 60's to an international fellowship.

The end of the AM (Amplitude Modulation for your newcomers) days was drawing near an 10 was the last stronghold. It was a haven for converted DB sets and older ham AM equipment. Remember the DX100 and the Viking Ranger? several were transceivers made during this period, such as the Lafayette HA410. Ten watts of AM it put out and contained both AC and DC power supplies. All of this for only \$109.00!

In those days of the 10-10 certificate had crossed US and California flags at the top instead of today's globe. The official name was "The Ten-Ten International Net of Southern California".


As cycle 20 faded out, 10 meters dropped out for a couple of years and as cycle 21 came up, AM was all but gone marking the end of an era. Names such as Hallicrafter, Hammarlund, Johnson and National had ben replaced by names such as ICOM, Kenwood, Yaesu and Ten-Tec.

The 1000 or so 10% numbers of 1970 were now in the 10's of thousands and now total over 60,000!





Turin North-Western DX Club Chapter



Notes from the Editor's Desk -

Things finally seem to have slowed down a bit with this issue of the News. It's time to get a few things cleared up and make a few more facts known.

Snails and the Pony
Express....I've been taking a
LOT of flack for the News being
late in delivery. A small part of
the delays for the past two or
three issues (detailed elsewhere)
have been caused by problems in
producing the News, including late
columns and several illnesses on my
part.

The BIG PROBLEM has been the speed the US Post Office delivers the News. If you look at the inside front cover you'll notice a boxed-in area in the upper right column. It now says that a SECOND CLASS MAIL PERMIT is pending.

What does it all mean? We used to have the News delivered by third class postage. It was cheap and way back then the News was delivered on a timely basis. Since then though, it seems as though the Post Office has fallen on hard times and has taken its own cost cutting measures. Some of them have included the reduction in delivery speed of third class mail.

Since third class mail is delivered on a "space available" basis, fewer trucks running means less space available to carry the third class mail. Second class mail is similar to third class mail with several important differences. Second class mail is delivered on a guaranteed basis. In other words, space is made for the mail and will bump any other third class mail waiting to go.

The change in mail class will mean faster delivery but exactly how much faster we'll just have to see. Since it wasn't certain at press time if all of the volumes of paperwork that have to be filled out are correct, the change in postal class may not hit in time for this mailing. The next issue

should carry the second class postage change (check the postage notice on the back cover to be sure).

There has been a letters to the editor column in place for a while now (this column!) but the press of information in the past few issues forced me to delete it to fit other things in. 

Meet Dave Bendt TL8IM, 10-10 #24392



TenX DX News

Mike Davidson KC5CP

The most significant activity during the past quarter was ALBANIA! There were several different groups active in Sept-Oct and each provided many thousands of contacts to the deserving. I counted three ZA stations on at one time on Ten and one of them was a TenX member from Hungary who operated ZA1QA from the Quick Aid Foundation.

The DXCC Country count is still 323. The most recent new countries, Penguin Isl, was effective Sept 1st and North Korea effective after the first accredited operation. ZS9A/1 Ian or DK9KX/ZS1 Hans on Penguin was a new one in July 1990. Penguin is located 1 mile off the coast of Namibia, Africa.

The Ten Meter ARRL Contest has just ended and the DX was all over the band. I love this contest as it was the first contest I ever entered in 1978. This year I did not find a new TenX country but I heard many of our DX members. I operated mixed mode with 200 CW & 330 SSB contacts using a computer logging program that logged up 185 countries/states. I never called CQ in one spot but kept looking for new contacts, so I was able to hear about 100 TenX members. There is no doubt that this contest had the big guns running up the points as I worked one of our members on Aruba with 3000 contacts! During the contest, a DX- Pedition from YA Afghanistan was starting on 20. None of the YA ops are TenX members.

Thanks to all the stations that sent me info and photos. I get my info from working members on the air, from DX bulletins and a DX Packet Cluster that saves info on a computer. I use this computer to check for known TenX stations that may have been logged on the cluster while I am not at home. This info gets transfered into this article.

Propagation for the next four months will be average conditions for N. America. Solar flux levels will be 15 points less than last year. Today the Solar Flux is 200 & the Sun is unsettled to active which can result in a flare and disturbed band conditions. For N. America you will be able to work into Europe & Asia with S8-9 signals. So lets crank up the tower and see what's new for TenX.

Feature DX Station Dec. 1991

AD1S/KH9 is George Adkins on Wake Isl. He sent me a message on the DX Packet cluster about his trip to Wake. He and a friend WE5I (nonmem) operated the CQ WW SSB contest from Wake. I worked George to complete my last US DX island country and now waiting on a card. QSL George Adkins, PO Box 88, Wellston, OK 74881 and include an SASE for postage.

ZA1QA was Gyozo HA0MM operating from Albania. The inauguration of Albania and the DX-Peditions that were active from Albania in Sept were a great step for Amateur Radio! 


