10-10 Internet Update

The 10-10 World Wide Web site at Lehigh (http://www.lehigh.edu/lists/tenten-l/) is becoming quite popular. In fact, most members on Internet are using that site in preference to the e-mail retrievable files. Remember, though, the archive of files is larger, since not all the information of use to members is equally apt to members and nonmembers alike. The WWW site is for everyone; the e-mail site is for subscribers (and others with FTP capabilities).

We Need You! I am still looking for basic Chapter information to add to both sites. Write-ups can be long or short, but they should contain long-term information about the Chapter (and its certificate rules, if it offers awards), but not short-term specials. So far, we have listings for about 14 chapters. If you are the manager for a 10-10 award, we would also like to have your basic information and rules on-line as a service to 10-10 members and other browsers.

How To Send Info: If you would like to have information on your award or chapter on-line, you can send me an e-mail message with the text as part of the message (easiest to handle). I can also work with appended text in Word Perfect or Word (tell me which in the main message). Of course, I can also handle info on a disk mailed to me.

What I Do With Your Info: I reformat the material to fit the differing requirements of ftp and www files. For ftp files, I fit the material to a standard DOS-type screen (meaning, that I set it in Courier 10 pitch/12 point with preset margins). For WWW, I litter the text with HTML codes. To keep the task simple, I use a minimum of codes—aiming to keep the information neat, but not exactly like the text sent. Columns are a bear to encode, so heavily columned text is set in what is

Approval for the Board of Directors to vote an "Honorary Membership" to those 10-10 members who the Board feels are deserving of such an honor.

Establish a committee to investigate the possibility of awarding those members who become long term members with membership in excess of




Chuck's voice has probably been heard all over the far east at one time or another

called <PRE></PRE>, which means that it will show up in Courier rather than the prettier fonts on Windows. HTML compresses all spaces to one space and does not recognize Tabs—hence, I have to do the best I can to keep the info sorted while not spending a lifetime dithering the text.

Why mention all this? Well, when you see your text on WWW (or even in ftp) form, it will not look exactly like what you submitted. I do not want you to be surprised or think that I intentionally messed up your work. Unlike commercial WWW system composers, your tenten-I coordinator does not get paid and has to work elsewhere to pay the bills. So the aim is neatness and accuracy rather than beauty for all files on line.

Pictures: So far, the addition of pictures to the WWW site is going slowly, since the system will not yet recognize uploaded .GIF files or UUencoded versions. I have a .GIF version of the 10-10 logo and will be trying to get it on line indirectly to replace the Courier "10-10" at the beginning of the WWW encounter. Stay tuned.

Revised Information: If you spot errors or information that needs updating, here is what to do. 1. If the file is yours, send me a new file (or a message telling me exactly where and how to make the change). 2. If the information is in a file coming from another source, notify that source of the needed change. Many lists (nets, chapters, and chapters accepting e-mail upgrades) come from our Chapter Coordinator, WD4EWB McCardell. Dave (WD4EWB@aol.com). Be sure to first notify Dave of changes so that he can keep his records current; he will supply me with periodic updates of those files.

I'll be happy to forward information I receive to the right 10-10 volunteer and even to try to make small revisions in files. But please think first of the volunteer manager who must have the information for accurate records.

Links: If you are a 10-10 member and have a home page, please let me know. This summer, I plan to revise the linkage files to include a page of 10-10ers with home pages on WWW. Even if you have mentioned your page to me in the past, please let me know again. Include your name,

call, 10-10 #, and the URL of your home page.

The E-Mail List: This column has devoted itself mostly to WWW, but the e-mail subscription list continues to grow, both in numbers of subscribers and in uses.

Band openings have been regularly mentioned in real time to help members grab a few QSOs. Procedure discussions have been prominent. The uses are endless—and are likely to increase as the band begins to open again. (The band will begin to open again, won't it?) To subscribe, send a message to:

with no subject (or only a single letter, if your system demands a subject) and this text: SUBSCRIBE TENTEN-L <1stname> <lastname> <call> If you change servers, be sure to UNSUBSCRIBE via your old server before it dies and then SUBSCRIBE anew from your new server. If you have any difficulties, please let me know, and either I or our congenial Lehigh host, Jim Eshleman, N3VXI, will try our best to solve them.

An-Ten-Ten-nas

In each issue of the **News**, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our



object is to help you make the best decisions about the antenna you buy or build with out imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand the better your choices will be.


No. 10 Notes on 10-Meter Antenna Tuners

There are many excellent antenna tuners (ATUs) on the market that will match at 80 or 160 meters. On 10, the match may be more of an illusion than an effective reality with some designs. If you are a dyed-in-the-wool 10-meter operator and use an antenna system that calls for an antenna tuner, you may be better off building your own.

So what is wrong with the commercial tuners? (Remember, not all of them are wrong. Compare the points made here with the features you see when you think about buying one.) A number of things go wrong in designs aimed at covering 160-10 meters.

1. The basic design: Most ATUs use a T-network with series capacitors and a shunt inductor, as schematically shown in Figure 1.

Figure 1. Typical Series-C T circuit.



This design is a high-pass filter and provides little, if any, suppression of harmonic energy. One can argue that we should not rely on the ATU to

do the job our rig's output circuitry should be doing. That argument is sound, but if there is a design that will also provide some harmonic energy suppression, it may be preferable. Two designs fill the bill.




Figure 2. Typical Pl network.

Figure 2 shows a PI network with shunt capacitors and a series inductor. It is inherently a low-pass filter.




Figure 3. Typical Series-L T circuit.

The circuit in Figure 3 is also a high-pass filter: it is a T-circuit with series inductors and a shunt capacitor.

The reasons for using a series-C T are cost and size. The components for it are smaller for a given power level, since we can fit a 20+ mH coil (rotary or tapped) alongside a pair of 250 pF variable capacitors in a compact case. By contrast, the inductors for the other circuits may require up to and over 30 mH, and the capacitor for the series-L T may need values up to 1000 pF. That is, if you want to tune 80 or 160.

If you only want 10 meters, then the values drop. A 5mH inductor (or 2) and a 250 pF air variable (or 2) give all the range anyone should need for 10

2. Tapped inductors: A tapped inductor may do the job you require, but for some antenna

situations, you may not be able to find the 1:1 SWR point. That is not fatal if you can find a point under 2:1. However, a good rotary inductor (or 2 in the series-L T circuit) is superior, since there is no required setting that is unavailable to you. You can find some good near bargains in rotary inductors at hamfests. The same applies to capacitors.

- 3. High-value components: The higher the highest value of a capacitor or coil, the higher the lowest value. The large frames of high-value rotary inductors may limit the lowest value to well over 1 mH. Capacitors are even worse, because the high maximum value does not tell the whole story. Usually, capacitors follow the rule, but you also have to watch out for construction. I have an old military capacitor with a maximum value of 35 pF. Unfortunately, its lowest value is 17 pF. It is built within a set of frame plates that surround the stators and limit how low it can go. By contrast, a 100 pF old E. F. Johnson capacitor in one of my units has a minimum value of about 10 pF. Its supporting metal work consists of two small plates on either end of the unit. If you roll your own, look for the capacitor's minimum value as well as its maximum value.
- 4. Closed tight cases: On ten meters, some commercial ATUs achieve a match more with stray capacitance and inductance than with the higher Q variable components that are supposed to do the work. Steel cases that cut the inductive fields of coils and provide several pF of shunt capacitance to the other components complicate and usually hinder the basic work of the matching network. A spacious case, however much against the grain of today's stylistic fetish of ultacompactness, is a plus for an ATU.
- 5. Poor ground paths: Ideally, there should be one good ground point for the ATU network. With large components, this condition is often impossible to attain. However, grounding should be as direct and compact as possible—and as near to the ground lugs of the coax sockets as possible. It should not rely on the bite of a lockwasher through a painted surface. A rivet used as a ground connector is a prelude to malfunction. There are no shortcuts to good, short, wide ground paths and good mechanical and electrical connections. They are not

expensive, but they do take care.

This list of difficulties is not an indictment of all ATUs. Many units have taken the trouble to be the best they can be as 80 or 160 through 10 meter units. However, you can probably do better yourself. For 10 (or realistically, 10-20 meters), a PI or series-L T circuit is achievable with parts you can obtain from hamfests. A PI might use a 5 to 10 mH rotary inductor with a pair of 250 pF variable capacitors of good power rating. A series-L T circuit might use a pair of 5 or 10 mH rotary inductors and a couple of 250 or 300 pF variable capacitors, with a switch to bring them into play either one or both at a time. A surplus or home brew case with plenty of room helps ensure that strays are minimized, as do well-planned ground paths. Consider a plexiglass case for the ultimate in avoidance of strays.

Remember, multiband is not always the most efficient, even if it is the most compact. The bands that take the beating are the ones at the high and low ends of the multiband range. Ten meters, unfortunately, is one of those ends. Hence, if you use a 10-meter antenna system calling for an ATU, consider building yourself a customized unit with all the advantages and none of the difficulties.

TenX DX News

Skip on Ten for the past 16 DAYS IN A ROW. The most interesting thing that has happened since last time we talked has been the return of short skip on Ten. The openings started Saturday May 18 and have continued at least until June 2 when I finished this article. Everyday during that time, I worked or heard stateside or DX from: Malta, Portugal, Hawaii, Canada, Bermuda, and South America, plus ten over nine signals stateside here in Texas.

I have gone through two Solar Cycles now and remember eleven years ago at the bottom of cycle 21 when I was in a DX contest on Ten. I heard a weak Japanese station calling CQ but could not work him until I turned the beam to the southeast and worked three JA's...LONG PATH.

Long path on Ten is rare for Texas and to find it during the bottom of a cycle is the RAREST of conditions. So you tend to remember contacts like that and I had another one of those moments on Tuesday May 28.

Lets see May 28? That day, I turned on the radio about one hour early to get ready for the Houston SHOT Net on 28488. I tuned to 28480 and heard CT1EHI Marcos #62280 in Portugal saying that he had been on frequency all day, it was then about 1 am, he must QRT and go to bed. OH, well, I just missed the first 10-10 DX from Europe since the Ten Meter contest last December.

Marcos worked KB9N Cliff as his last contact and then I talked with Cliff to get some info on Marcos, as they are friends. Marcos signal was 52 and easily workable had I been a few minutes earlier. I know several of you worked him over the next few days as he has had a good signal into the USA. See Jeremy's KB1AWE story later.

This DX opening was a GOOD sign and thirty minutes later I talked with my friend WD4NGB Bruce out of Tennessee who has 308 countries worked on Ten, great count for a Technician


class. Bruce stayed home to work DX, with his 7 element yagi at 90 feet, he racked up 15 European countries, 2 Africans and missed Libya 5A1A, o 10-10, for what would have been country 309. Bruce had a weaker signal than the closer Europeans and the US East coast stations that were stronger before 5A1A went QRT. When I looked over the DX packet cluster reports for May 28, you see a lot of DX from all over the world, many Europeans working into Africa. We see these DX reports through a gateway that comes into Houston, so I know when the band is open in Europe. I think that May 28 should be classified as the RAREST day of the bottom of cycle 22, and now we could be just beginning cycle 23.

In my mind May 28 starts cycle 23, but the rocket scientist will disagree since they use numerical figures and graphs, which have not been published yet, to tell us when Solar Cycle 23 actually starts. I like to think, DX IS.







1996 Board of Directors Meeting

(Condensed Version for Publication in the 10-10 NEWS)

The Board of Directors of 10-10 International Net, Inc. convened at 8 A.M., June 8, 1996, at the Marriott Hotel, in Oakbrook, Illinois. Present were President Tom Henderson, K4CIH, Vice President Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, Secretary David Prichard, KA5OVO, and Directors Linda Barnes, KJ4FM, L.B. Cebik, W4RNL, Jack Miller, W9WYN, Pete Matson, KC1CP, Ed Redwine, K5ERJ, Joe Williams, WA9TSG, Bill Howe, VK4WBH, John Ellison, W0ERZ, Bob Ryan, K6YVG, and Dave McCardell, WD4EWB. Also present as a non-voting member was Treasurer Keith Schlottman, K17RK. The Board observed a moment of silence in memory of our silent keys. The agenda and orders of the day were approved, and the minutes of the June, 1996, meeting of the Board were approved.

The President presented his report to the Board, stating that the Board approved experiment of providing access to 10-10 information on the World Wide Web has been a great success and sending his personal thanks to Director Cebik who has given much of his time and effort to achieving the goals desired. The President also reported on the success of the delinquent dues letters, the resignation of Al Sherman as the DX Countries Award Manager, and the complete restructuring of the entire program, the Scholarship Fund letters, the mailing of the 10-10 NEWS as first class mail, the appointment of K0PVI as Contest Committee Chairman, the resignation of WB2SJQ from the board and his replacement of WD4EWB, and various other appointment and business done during the last year.

The Vice-President presented his report to the Board, including his activities as Chairman of the Finance Committee, and also presented the reports from Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, as Historian, Trustee of W6OI, the 10-10 club station, and Scholarship Manager.

The Secretary presented his report to the Board, covering the various votes taken by the Board members during the last year, and the positive effect of E-mail on his postage expense.

The Treasurer presented his detailed report to the Board, including the proposed budget for 1997. In an effort to streamline the meeting, several votes on budget items were voted on at this time, including the acceptance of the proposed 1997 budget.

Director Barnes reported as Chairperson of the Communications Committee, including the publicizing of 10-10 at various hamfests around the country, the publication of the Official Ten Ten Certificate and Awards Guide, materials available from the Information Manager, the monthly updates, and the request of the editor of the 10-10 NEWS to be relieved of his job.

Director Williams reported as Chairman of the Membership Committee, including the new membership applications and the Operating Guide for Managers.

Director Redwine reported as Chairman of the Operations Committee, including retiring managers and their replacements, and their acceptance of the replacements as permanent, the need to be sure the membership is aware that only legitimate contacts, the exchange of complete information on the air, are acceptable for awards, and the results of the certificate managers survey.

Director Ellison reported as Chairman of the Planning Committee, including the hard work of Director Miller on the arrangements for the 1996 Board meeting, and the need to find a chapter to sponsor the 1997, 10-10 Convention by October 1st, and the publishing of a set of guidelines for 10-10 Conventions.

The position of tenten-I Coordinator was created as a long term activity of 10-10 International Net, with the volunteer manager being recognized as a volunteer official of 10-10.

President Henderson moved that Director Cebik be named the tenten-I coordinator, continuing the fine work he has already done on the project, motion was seconded and motion passed.

A proposal by Director Ryan to present award certificates to members for continuous membership of 10 and 15 years and a plaque for 25 years of continuous membership was tabled until further information could be obtained and details worked out.

A proposal by Director Williams to revise wording in several places in the Policies and Procedures Manuel to bring it up to date was discussed and each proposal was approved after discussion and or revision. (Details are in final version of the minutes which will be available from the Information Manager.)

A proposal by Director Williams to revise membership application forms and the Managers Guide to bring them up to date. Proposals were discussed and, or revised.

Director Barnes made the motion, "As a vacancy occurs in the position of Area Manager ,that Area Manager's duties shall be assumed by the Data Manager." Motion was seconded by President Henderson, motion passed.

President Henderson moved, "In future elections, if there are no contested positions, the Secretary will cast one vote for the slate of candidates, hence saving the cost of an uncontested election." Motion was seconded, motion passed.

Consideration to and the need of a 1997, 10-10 Conventions site was discussed. At this time no 10-10 chapter has proposed to sponsor such a convention, and the time frame for doing so is nearing an end.

It was proposed by Director Redwine that for awards requiring QSL cards as proof of contact, the members be allowed to send photocopies, (both sides if needed), of said





KA1TXF, #53363, was operating under the call 1ATG from Fairfield CT (he now lives a few miles away in Stratford). For international contacts, he added the informally agreed upon prefix NU. He was in contact with 8AKL, that is, F8AKL (the "F" was also informal then) in the Paris area. The wavelength was 42 meters with minimum QRM and no QRN. The French operator sends QRX, please wait. He steps outside his shack to investigate a noise overhead. He returns to the air with the report that Lindbergh has passed overhead on his way to Le Bourget airport. Jim is quite possibly the first American on this side of the Atlantic to know that Lindbergh has made it.

F8AKL's name is illegible on the QSL card he sent. Detailed name and mailing address (not to mention county, 10-10 number, grid square, etc.) had not yet become standard parts of the card's format. Nevertheless, he confirmed passing on the information with this comment at the bottom of his card: "TNX for QSO OM--gld to kan give u news fm Lindbergh just wen is coming to Paris--PSE QSL." For both operators, the QSO was as exciting as the news of Lindbergh.

For those curious about the date and time, Lindbergh took off from the US (Roosevelt Field) at 7:52 AM EST, May 20, 1927. He flew for 33 hours and 32 minutes. In terms of Eastern time in the US, it was May 21, about half-past 5 in the early evening. In Paris, it was nearly 2 AM,


the next day, give or take some looseness in log keeping in those days. (Another 1927 QSL card just lists the time as "night.")

Jim is 90 this year, still licensed, but not as active as he once was on the air. Off the air, his schedule makes me look feeble by compari-

son. And, yes, he clearly remembers this 1927 QSO--and many others, such as working Admiral Byrd's supply ship in the Arctic, a ship he finally set eyes on at Old Mystic Seaport in the 1950s during a family outing there.

I wonder what other historically interesting

facts lie buried in the QSL cards of our members.

Announcing.....

Rules for the 1996 10-10 Day Sprint

By Don Zielinski, K0PVI #9902 Contest Manager

Before getting into the RULES, let us make it very clear that they will apply to the October 10, 1996 contest ONLY! A complete set of RULES for all future 10-10 QSO Party functions starting in 1997 will be available from the Contest Manager after November 15, 1996.

Basically, the RULES for the "Sprint" will be the same as the normal QSO Parties except as noted.

RULES

- ALL contacts must be made in the 10 meter amateur band on AM, FM, CW, RTTY, or SSB.
- Exchange call sign, name, state or country, and 10-10 number. Some stations may request your county or Local Chapter numbers.
- 3. A Station may be counted only once, regardless of mode used.
- 4. ANY mode of operation may be used during the SPRINT, provided that RULE #3 is adhered to. Mode of operation need NOT be claimed on your log.
- 5. Multiple station, single operator (Club Stations) or Single Station, multiple operator (OM/XYL, Family Stations) along with the normal Single operator, Single Station logs will be accepted.
- 6. All contacts must take place during the 24 hour contest period.
- 7. Logs must be kept in UTC (Universal Coordinated Time, Greenwich, Zulu etc.)
- 8. A "DUPE" sheet is required of ALL participants regardless of the number of contacts made. Computer duping is acceptable. A manual dupe sheet sample is available from the Contest Manager with a # 10 SASE.
- 9. Affiliated Chapter Assignment Scores are NOT applicable for this contest. All competition will be on a one on one basis.
- 10. Illegible or improperly submitted logs WILL be disqualified.
- 11, Point to Point contacts only will be accepted. NO repeater or Satellite contacts allowed.
 - 12. Failure to comply with these RULES or

their INTENT will result in disqualification.


13. SCORING: Two (2) points per contact with 10-10 number exchange and One (1) point per exchange without 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS: A First place certificate will be awarded for each: US Call area (area 7 includes Alaska), Canada, South America, Caribbean (including Bermuda), Europe, Africa, Asia and the Pacific (which includes VK, ZL, KH6, and ALL other PACIFIC islands). The top ten finishers in the Contest overall will receive a certificate. Paid-up (full) 10-10 member scores will be listed in the 10-10 News.

LOGS: Logs are accepted from paid-up 10-10 members only, and must be complete, legible, and in UTC. Each line entry must show Time, Call sign of station worked, Name, QTH (state if US or country) and 10-10 number if any. A cover (summary) sheet is required and must show entrants FULL Name, Call, QTH, 10-10 number, Address, membership expiration date (either by the NEWS address label or COPY of membership card, total number of contacts with and without 10-10 numbers and total claimed score.

QUIET ZONE: It is requested that 10-10 members have the courtesy to observe a "Quiet Zone" between 28.490 and 28.510 Mhz for the use of non-contesters.

LOG SUBMISSION Logs will be scored by the Contest Manager (address found in the 10-10 NEWS). Cut-off date for receipt of logs will be 15, November 1996. Again, keep in mind that these RULES apply to the 10/10/96 contest ONLY. Keep tuned in for details on the new and exciting rules to go into effect in 1997!



10-10 Historian



The activities of the Colorado Ten-Ten Chapter at the ARRL National Convention in Denver 16-18 July 1976 were a sensational success. The attendance at the 10-10 Forum was the largest gathering of members to date. I had the distinct honor and pleasure to share the podium with V.P. Grace Dunlap, K5MRU #218, District Ø Manager Rollie Hall (SK), WØLST #1545, Asst. Editor Chuck Albrecht, NØCKW #8105, and Rich Richardson (SK), WBØFQD #10488, C.H. of the Colorado Ten-Ten Chapter, who conducted the proceedings in a very professional manner.

Unfortunately my remarks could not be heard beyond the first row because of a severe case of laryngitis!

It was also a very memorable occasion when NCØARL QSY'd to 28.8MHz at 1800Z Sat. 17 July 1976 to participate in the roll call of the Southern California Net with Joe Plumb (SK), K6CQN #7999, as net control and Mary Grancell (SK), WA6MOF #11900 as alternate. The FCC assigned the special call NCØARL to the ARRL for the 1976 National Convention and the 10-10 Net assigned the special 10-10 number 1776/Ø to NCØARL for this special event. I am very grateful to those members of the Colorado Ten-Ten Chapter whose diligent effort and warm hospitality contributed so much to the success of this most significant event in the history of the 10-10 Net.

The Bicentennial Summer isssue of the 1976 Bulletin was entirely due to the effort of Asst. Editor Chuck Albrecht, NØCKW #8105, who assumed the duties of 10-10 Editor in January 1977. He was responsible for establishing the 10-10 Bulletin and then the 10-10 News as a quarterly publication. A special tribute is also offered to those who served as 10-10 Editors:

QRM From The Treasurer

Ten-Ten's fiscal year ended March 31, 1996. I am pleased to report that we closed out the year without a deficit, even with poor band conditions on ten meters.

Several cost-cutting measures implemented by the organization's volunteers during the year. Your Board of Directors reduced postage and telephone costs significantly by turning to e-mail for much of their correspondance. Over \$5,000 was saved by printing election ballots in the News instead of making a separate mailing. These measures helped offset the increases in paper costs that affected many ham radio publications.

At the same time, efforts were made to increase our renewal rate by sending reminder cards which turned out to be very successful. A campaign to increase participation in the scholarship program also proved to be

successful. However, total revenues decreased by 18%. The decline in 10 meter activity has certainly affected Ten-Ten's membership.

Large membership numbers allow us to take advantage of certain quantity discounts, especially with respect to publishing the News. This helps us keep our annual dues so low. As we head into the summer sporadic E season, I would like to encourage you to help us increase our membership by spreading the word about Ten-Ten. Consider putting on a Ten-Ten forum at your local club meetings. Talk about Ten-Ten on the air. Help no-coders pass the test so they can get on ten meters. And don't forget to send your own renewal in early!

A full financial report was presented to the Board of Directors during their meeting in Chicago in June. Copies of the report are available free of charge to any member of Ten-Ten and may be requested by sending an e-mail to ki7rk@aol.com or by regular mail at my address as listed in the News.




