Feature StoryThe S.S. Lane Victory 10-10 Rides Along With History

The S.S. Lane Victory is a veteran of World War II, the Korean, and the Vietnam wars, and is dedicated to the many Merchant Marine sailors who lost their lives at sea while serving their country. It is owned and operated by U.S. Merchant Marine Veterans World War II, U.S. Navy Armed Guard Veterans and associate members.

Built in 1945 at the Cal Shipyard at Los Angeles and armed with anti-aircraft and surface warfare, the S.S. Lane Victory employed a crew of 46 and 26 Navy Guards and was designed to deliver war materials to the Pacific Theater. At the end of WWII, the Lane Victory carried general cargo for the American President Lines and was called back to service for the Korean and Vietnam conflicts. At one point during the Korean War, the Lane Victory, under covering fire from a cruiser and two destroyers, rescued 7009 Koreans from a beach at Wonsan and transported them to safety.

In 1996, through the efforts of Glenn M. Anderson, California chairman of the Merchant Marine Committee of Congress, a bill was introduced which would provide for the acquisition of a merchant cargo ship to serve as a living memorial, which was signed by President Reagan on October 18, 1988, in March of 1989, a work party of Merchant Marine Veterans volunteers went to Suisum Bay to begin to acquire spare parts for the ship, and in June of 1989, the S.S. Lane Victory was towed to Los Angeles Harbor. In December of 1991, the ship was formally recognized as a National Historic Landmark. The total cost of the restoration was estimated at 2.5 million dollars if hired contractors instead of volunteers were used.

The S.S. Lane Victory was named after Isaac Lane who was born into slavery in 1834. Isaac Lane had been denied the right of schooling, but

How to Submit a 10-10 QSO Party Log

"I'll be working the Ten Ten Contest this weekend" your friend tells you. "I know you aren't a Contester, but I'd really appreciate it if you'd get on and give me a contact. I'll be calling CQ on 28.555". You tell him "Sure, I can do that".

So on Saturday morning you tune up to 28.555, & there he is. You quickly work him, and immediately a loud voice asks you to QSY to another frequency. You do, and when you get there, find several people calling you. You work through the list, and before you know it, you have a dozen contacts in your log. "This is fun!" you think. You tune up and down, answering CQs and having a great time. You notice that there is no contest activity between 28.490 and 28.510, but plenty both above and below those frequencies. By the time the band dies out, you have a surprising number of contacts in the log.

Sunday, you jump in again and have a ball, making contacts all over the place. By the time the Contest ends, you have a pretty respectable score for your first contest. Several locals congratulate you on a fine first effort. Then someone asks "You ARE going to submit your log aren't you?" Your throat goes dry. "Ugh, Sure," you mumble, despite the fact that you have no idea what is required.

Fear not! Simply follow the steps below.

FIRST: Carefully read New Contest Rules in the January 1997 issue of the *News*.

SECOND: Carefully read my article *The Dupe* Sheet in the same issue. Now you are ready to

prepare your log for submission.

If you use computer logging: (1) Print your log. (2) Print your Dupe Sheet. Depending on your software, this will be either a numerical listing of 10-10 numbers, or an alphanumeric listing of callsigns, or both. If it prints 10-10 numbers only, you will have to add an alphanumeric listing of calls without 10-10 numbers worked. (3) If your software does not automatically indicate prefixes for multipliers, go over your log and mark each new prefix, then total them up.

NOTE: If your software interfaces with a







This issue, we will honor one of our old time members who has contributed so much to the history of the 10-10 Net.

Dick Rauscher, W6ANK#1931 and his XYL May (deceased) celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary



in September 1976. Some 125 friends and family ioined in the festivities in Haywood, Calif. Dick has lived in Fremont for 36 years and retired after 26 years with an automotive company. He was licensed in 1946 and holds an advanced license. He has been the Chapter Head of the Bay Area Chapter, one of the earliest chapters established by 10-10. In 1973 W6ANK became the desig-Northern California 10-10 Net Control Station (NCS) on 28.775 MHz at 1800Z on Mondays and Wednesdays, At the same time, Larry Dundon, K6PNQ #1181 was the Southern California NCS on 28,000MHz. Jim Paine (SK) W6OI #109 was the NCS on Saturdays. The NCS at 28,775 MHz was relinquished and W6ANK became the NC on 28,800 MHz in 1981. Dick operated the NCS for at least 17 years when in July of 1990, Dusty Doster (SK) K6MPN #45795 became the NCS on Mondays and Louise Chapman. N6ELK # 36654 became the NCS on Wednesdays.

Milt Camp, K6OYX #13 piloted Dick and his XYL to the 10-10 Quarterly Meeting of January 1978 aboard the S.S. Princess Louise. The highlight of this meeting was the special recognition of our 10-10 old timers.

Dick succeeded Bob Hartley (SK) W6WPY #14949 as Manager of the 6th Call Area

in January 1979, following the election of Bob Hartley as 10-10 President. He served in this capacity until the end of 1996, when all new memberships and renewals are now processed at the 10-10 QTH in Omaha.

10-10 owes Dick Rauscher a great deal of gratitude for his dedicated service; OVER 17 years as NCS and 17 years as Manager of the 6th Call Area. In commemoration of his long and dedicated service, Dick recently received a plaque from 10-10.

An-Ten-Ten-nas

By L.B. Cebik W4RNL, 41159

In each issue of the **News**, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our



object is to help you make the best decisions about the antenna you buy or build with out imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

No. 14 EDZs: Stacked and Unstacked

After an article on EDZs (extended double Zepps) appeared in *Communications Quarterly* in Fall, 1995, I received some mail and phone calls on a version of the antenna I had not covered. So I thought I would bring it to your attention. The EDZ is a good fixed wire antenna for those who do not wish to fool with towers and rotators, but do wish to work some DX when the band fully reopens. It helps to have high trees or other tall poles to support the ends, and you have to like ATUs (antenna tuning units or transmatches). Even if you do not like these things, read on—they can grow on you.

The Basic EDZ

The basic EDZ is a 1½-wavelength wire antenna fed at the center. Unlike a dipole, precision wire cutting is not required. A 10-meter EDZ needs about 44 feet of copper wire. The feedpoint impedance will be about 130 ohms with about 680 ohms of capacitive reactance. I recommend you use 450-ohm parallel feedline to an ATU. Although you can match the EDZ to 50-ohm coax at the antenna feedpoint, you would lose the ability to use the antenna on other bands. For every band 20-meters and up, the antenna is longer than a dipole and thus shows a little gain above a dipole.

At 10-meters, an EDZ up 40' in the air shows about 3.5 dB gain over a dipole. Of course, both antennas are bidirectional. The EDZ gets its gain by shrinking the side-to-side beamwidth of its two



main lobes. The dipole has a half-power beamwidth of about 78° while the EDZ cuts that to about 30° with two small side lobes in each direction. See Figure 1

Some folks view the sidelobes as QRM producers. If you agree, see the ARRL Antenna Compendium, Vol. 4 for an EDZ with capacitors in the elements to eliminate them. However, you may lose some performance of the antenna on other bands.

Almost any wire antenna for 10 up in the air 40' has a take-off angle of 12° above the horizon. Take-off angle means the elevation of the lobe with the most power in it. The half-power points are ±6° around that angle, so there is plenty of power in the low angles needed for efficient



DXing. But perhaps we can do a little better.
Stacked EDZs

Stacking any two antennas will do two important things for you

1. It will increase the system gain a bit and 2. It will lower the take-off angle a bit. Both those advantages are DXer delights. So let's get crackin' and stackin'. The system I shall show you comes to me indirectly from either a Bill Orr (W6SAI) book or some other article by him or another ham. In fact, if you have an article about stacked 44' dipoles and care to send me a copy, I'd appreciate it. I like to give proper credit whenever it is due.


A vertical spacing of 5/8ths of a wavelength is about the most efficient gain producer when stacking antennas. This applies to Yagis and other arrays as well as EDZs. At 10 meters, this means a spacing of about 22' or so. Again, this number is not critical ±a foot. Figure 2 shows the general scheme. Assuming you have the side supports, there are only a few questions to ask about stacked EDZs.



1. What do I get for my trouble? First, you get 3 to 4 dB additional gain in both directions, depending upon which wire you set at the 40' level, where we placed our one-wire EDZ. If you can put the second wire at about 60' or so, you will get the higher gain, plus a lower take-off



angle of 9°. That puts the bulk of your power in the 10-meter far-DX zone. Figure 3 also shows a secondary lobe at about 28° for shorter paths. If you place the lower wire at about 20' up, you will get the lower gain and a basic take-off angle of 14°. That is still worth while.

2. How do I aim single and stacked EDZs? With care, since they are fixed. In much of the US, the NE-SW corridor gets you both Europe and VK-ZL-land. Or you can broadside N-S for



South America and over-the-pole and back scatter. Or, you can broadside to Asia. Finally, if you have lots of trees or poles, you can build 3 EDZ stacks and switch among them (a nice wiry dream).

3. How do I feed the beast? The easiest feed system is to run 450-ohm parallel feeders from each feedpoint to a common center. At that point, you will see something like 75 ohms resistive and about 460 ohms inductive impedance. This situation gives us a choice.

a. If you wish to use the antenna on 10


meters only, you can insert on each side of the line junction a 24 pF capacitor. This is a series connection on each side, with the ends then connected to each side of a coax connector. The capacitors cancel out the inductive reactance, leaving only about the same mismatch you would get with a dipole--and that's manageable.

b. If you wish to use the antenna on all bands from 20 meters on up, just connect more 450-ohm parallel feeder and bring it to the shack and ATU. On 20 you will get dipole gain or better, with more gain on the other bands between 20

and 10.

4. What does it cost? Well, #14 wire runs about 7 to 12 cents a foot, depending on its nature, and 88' of wire is in the \$8.00 range. Add some insulators and rope for supports. Then add the 450-ohm parallel feeder, which is cheaper than coax. Even if you have to erect some supports (4 sections of 10' TV mast per side, plus rope guys and tie-down ring-screws in the ground), you might run the bill to \$75 to \$100. That will barely buy the TV rotator, let along the tower and very light beam that go with it.

Note that, as in all antenna work, we must compromise. The stacked EDZ requires supports and fixes your general directions to two, but saves you many dollars, pounds, yen, francs, marks, or lire. The long Yagi with the same gain gives you freedom of direction, but empties your pockets and requires constant maintenance. (Remember, Murphy's law says that when the rotator goes bad, it is always stuck in a direction with no hams in sight.) So the EDZ and the stacked EDZ array are suitable only for some people. But perhaps you are one of them.

One of the recurring problems users of the email list have is how to append or transfer files from one e-mail address to another. Many come out as unreadable codes; others contain a few codes that prevent printing and other processing. some have even appeared in HTML codes. How can we be sure that our files will be usable by the person to whom we send them?

These notes do not apply to regular messages, but only to appended files.

FROM ASCII TO ANSI TO PROBLEMS: The one text character set that every system and program can handle is the ASCII character set. This limited collection of letters, numbers, and punctuation covers 95% of everything you would ever want to say in plain language. It is also called DOS-Text.

Windows uses an augmented character set referred to as ANSI: it contains all the ASCII characters plus others. ASCII text will print on an ANSI system, but not always the other way around.

Most word processors, spread sheets, and databases use character sets and text encoding systems that can only be read by the program from which they emerge--plus a few others in the same family. Most word processors have conversion modules to accept most schemes and translate them into their own scheme. In general, e-mail hates all of these schemes and makes hash of them.

So, to be sure that your text can be read, downloaded, or printed at the other end of the line, the only safe route is to send "pure ASCII."

APPENDING OR INCLUDING: Many e-mail systems have ways of appending documents in their native formats. IF your recipient has the ability to handle appended files and IF that recipient also has the program for reading the file in its native scheme, then it is ok to use appended files in their native format. But, not everyone has the ability to meet both these demands.

To overcome the demand for a program to read an appended file in its native encoding scheme, it is safest to convert the text into pure ASCII before appending it.

To overcome the demand on the recipient to handle appended files, try to include the material in the body of the message itself.

ASCII plus INCLUSION = success every time.

GETTING TO ASCII: One of the most difficult tasks for users of Word, one of the Microsoft text editors attached to Windows (either 3.1 or 95), or one of the editors based on MS Word is getting a pure ASCII text. Here are a few hints.

Find a copy of Word Perfect for DOS 5.0 or 5.1: the DOS-text conversion in this program is complete. All encoded spacing, like TABS and INDENTS are converted into groups of hard spaces. Only ASCII text remains. Xywrite is another word processor for DOS that leaves ASCII texts in good order.

In Word or its derivatives, save the file in DOS- text with no formatting preserved. Word itself gives you more than one DOS-text option: choose the most crude and fundamental one.

Before doing the conversion, get rid of a few troublesome items. Foremost among them are text indentations used to line up text after an entry number or bullet. Set the text in left justification and let every line reach the left margin

Set the entire text in a monospaced typeface, such as Courier 12 point (= 10 pitch). This ensures that line lengths are accurately revealed in WYSIWYG. Limit line lengths to about 64 characters. This is less than your screen will show on most e-mail systems, but your printer may default to 10-pitch Courier and characters beyond the margins may disappear.

There are a number of ASCII text editors floating among the shareware and freeware of the world. TED (Tiny EDitor) is one. Compose your text for transmission on one of these programs (which are amazingly compact--under 100 kB, compared to the 223 MB for my recently installed Corel Suite 7 for Windows 95). The result is pure ASCII.

WHY ALL THIS CONCERN FOR ASCII? It is easy to deceive ourselves into a funny way of thinking. We work hard mastering a program so that it produces beautiful screen and paper products. We have put so much effort into mastering this much of the program that we take offense and become stiff necked when some folks tell us they are having trouble with the file we sent. We think that maybe they should do some work on their end of the line.

What we have forgotten is that communications, whether on the air or on-line, places great responsibilities on the sender of information. If we really want to communicate effectively, we

have to make it as easy as possible for the receiving station or computer to understand what we have transmitted. We carefully adjust our SSB signal for maximum clarity. We practice CW until the code is as perfect as we can make it. We adjust our transmitters for clean signals of high technical quality.

Similar thinking applies to e-mail messages and text transfers. Even if it means more work. we need to go the extra mile to ensure that the recipient can read and process our transmissions. For example, there are somewhere over 150 revisable files at Lehigh in the combined archives and web site. The processing time for a revision or replacement file literally doubles-and sometimes triples--if the file does not arrive in pure ASCII, preformatted in monospaced typeface with all TABs converted to hard spaces. At the rate folks change their texts, that means a lot of hours of excess work.

Now multiply that work by the number of people to whom you might send a piece of text in a year's time. For every extra unit of work we make for the recipient, we lose a unit of effective communication.

So ask around and be on the lookout for ways to preconvert your texts for e-mail transmission into pure ASCII. Local resources are usually available if we ask the right questions and if we are not afraid to ask. If we had not asked the right questions about radio, we would never have become hams. The same applies to e-mail. If the person you ask says you gotta have Browser 3.0 or only the latest version of complex software, ask another person. (Yes, some hams only do AMSAT, etc.) The answers are available, and usually easier than you think.

Remember: the sunspots never set on the internet.



The greatest DXpedition of 1997 and possibly of all time happened during January on Heard Island. The VKOIR DXpedition was a huge success in many areas, well organized by many dedicated individuals like Ralph KOIR #2629 and other members, and it was expensive \$300K! They made 80,673 contacts, a world record that will go down in the history of amateur radio! They began operating on January 14 and worked nonstop until the 27th when bad weather conditions forced them to prepare to leave early. They departed the island by helicopter two days later with 30 tons of equipment. In spite of poor propagation conditions, many stations worked them in Europe, the eastern US and Japan. Twenty meters was the most productive band where I worked them both modes.

What happened to VK0IR on ten meters? The MUF between the US and VK0 never made it to 28Mhz. My friend Bruce WD4NGB called them with his big yagi and thought he had worked them! But, NO stateside contacts made the log on ten! They tried the band often and only worked about 200 Japanese and a few Europeans. Can anyone confirm a 1010 number swap for a new one?


The ARRL Ten Meter Contest was a great loy for one local member, KE5Fi Chuck #7412. Operating from super station, K5XI, Chuck may have won it by working 1300 contacts that weekend. This station located about 90 miles north of Houston, had a 200-foot tower with many elements on ten! I was in Louisiana during the contest, visiting N5EJS Russ at his station, when I worked Chuck about 200 miles away on backscatter. Chuck is a first class contest op, a good lawyer and the past president of the Texas DX Society. During the contest, Chuck was called by ZS8IR (same as ZS8MI #64647) operated by Chris from Marion Is. Happy to get the new multiplier for the contest. Chuck forgot that he needed Marion Island for a new country for himself. I congratulated him on missing a new country, as I paid for ZS8MI membership but. I have not worked the station ... yet.

Don ZS6AQS #61510 Chapter Head Springbok Chapter Int. from South Africa, wishes all members a happy birthday March 1, the 5th Anniversary of the Springbok Chapter. They must bring everything needed for survival and operate the DXpedition, and be sure there is a boat available to pick them up! The island is seismically active. with many tremors felt each trip. Karl has done a good job of giving out contacts from this island on four trips. The small fishing boat they ride on is very low budget, the boat goes to fish, the hams get a 1500 mile ride. When the fishing is done, the hams go home to fill out QSL cards and rest up for next year, hi.

Here are some comments by Karl: "I tried to work 28Mhz several times but the band was dead. On 09 Feb., around 2000Z, my friend PY5EG told me how 10 was starting to open. Immediately, I went there. I worked 77 stations,




The Alli Chapter

build your own point value in any given Chapter. database to fill in names, etc., you should disable this feature for the contest. If you don't your log will contain numerous errors. For example many people give a different name out over the air, than shows in the database. Also someone who has recently moved or changed calls will not show correctly in the database.

If you log by hand: (1) Using a Grid-style 10-10 Number Dupe Sheet, go over your log contact by contact. Cross out any dupes you find. (2) Dupe contacts without a 10-10 number by callsign. Attach either a Grid-style Alphanumeric Dupe Sheet, or a list of non-member calls in alphanumeric order to the 10-10 number Dupe Sheet. (3) Neatly rewrite (or type) your log, leaving out the dupes you crossed out. Here is a sample line of what your log should look like:

DATE UTC CALL NAME QTH 10-10 PTS MULT 2/1/97 0130 VK2ACM CLINTON NSW 38951 2 Y

A sample log, showing a number of contacts with and without 10-10 numbers, points, multipliers, etc. is available for an SASE or SAE and IRC from VE7ACM (Canada), G4BLH (UK) or KK5DO (USA).

(4) Cut out, or photocopy, the Cover Sheet from the back page of your News. For US members, this will automatically provide Proof of Paid-Up Dues thanks to the mailing label. DX members will have to either cut off and attach the mailing label from the envelope the News came in, or attach a photocopy of your membership card. NOTE: If you have renewed but your mailing label still shows your old renewal date, attach a photocopy of your canceled check or money order receipt. Remember, you must provide proof of paid-up dues.

(5) Fill out the Cover Sheet. Chapter Assignment is optional. If you are a member of a Chapter in your area, you can assign your log to it. Your score will still appear in the individual results for your area, but it will also be added to the total Chapter score. If there is no Chapter in your area, or you don't want to assign your log, fill in NONE here.

Make sure you fill in the Cover Sheet <u>completely</u>. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to fill in the Cover Sheet, not that of the scoring Chapter. Area From Which You Operated is very important, especially if the number in your call does not match that of the call area from which you operated. For example KB6UPG, operating from Minnesota, would fill in a 0 (zero) here. Otherwise, his score might appear in Area 6.

(6) Place your completed Cover Sheet on top

of your log sheet(s) and dupe sheet(s). Staple or paper clip together, give or mail to the Contest Manager of your local chapter if you have one, or place in an envelope addressed to the scoring Chapter, and add sufficient postage. (You may have to take it to the Post Office to be weighed). That's all there is to it. Good luck in the next QSO Party.

10-10 NewsLine

Items of Interest for 10-10 Members

RFI PROBLEMS: Whether you are having problems with interference from or to electrical/ electronic devices, the Technical Coordinator in your section or one of his assistants (technical Specialists) may be able to help. Remember if you are dealing with a neighbor, tact and understanding will go a long way in getting cooperation. In addition, you may find it helpful to purchase the ARRL book, Radio Frequency interference: How To Find It And Fix It. Also a free pamphlet for the consumer is available from ARRL HQ, "What to do if you have an electronic interference problem"

ONE-BY-ONE SPECIAL CALL SIGNS: After an eighteen year lapse, one-by-one special event amateur station call signs are once again available, the program was originally requested by the ARRL as part of the "Vanity" call sign program. Although final action on the Notice of Proposal Rule Making has not yet been approved, the FCC has gone ahead and implemented the program

on a temporary basis.

Special event call signs consist of a single prefix letter (K, N, or W), the region number (0 to 9) and a single suffix letter (A-Z, except the letter X). There are 750 such call signs, there is no charge to obtain the call sign.

You must indicate the nature of the event and certify that the event is of special significance to the amateur community. The special event call sign can be used for a period not to exceed that of the special event, or for 15 days, whichever is less



10-10 Reflections

10-10 Historian



I recently received a letter from Clay Conard, W0FS #2144, which certainly is a fitting tribute to the memory of Irving F. Hunter (SK), K6PWO #97, the founder and first president of 10-10 in 1962. It is also a tribute to Charles "Newt" Fisher (SK), W6FFN #98, who also served as 10-10 president in 1967.

"Dear Morrie.

I was digging through a drawer in my workshop today and came upon some QSL cards that had been there a long time. I thought you, as 10-x historian, might be interested in one of them. I have a duplicate, so please keep this for the club records...

I was in the Navy in the '60s and stationed at Port Hueneme [CA]. My aunt and uncle lived (and still live) in Glendora [CA] within walking distance of Irv, K6PWO's shack. I would sometimes get out the DX-60 and HR-10 Heathkits stored for me in my relative's garage and check into the net on AM on Saturday morning. If I zero-beat close enough, they tolerated me on AM.

If I didn't get to drag out the gear and set it up, I would walk to Irv's shack and sit behind him while he ran the net. I really got a kick out of Irv and was really impressed with his shack-Hallicrafters gear built into the wall, and particularly the polished piece of driftwood his straight key was mounted on. Irv had a lot of stories from his radio officer days in the maritime, and I've forgotten all of them except for how he got the idea for the phonetics for his call, Pushing Women Overboard. After 20-plus years I still miss him.

When they drew numbers to start numbering memberships, they forgot me. I was on Midway Island and couldn't check in at 10 a.m. in California, since I believe it was four hours earlier there and too early for the band to open up. I had no idea what was going on. Later, in lowa in 1971, when I could go home for lunch and check into the net, Irv of course wanted my number. He wouldn't believe that I didn't have one; he said something about how they reserved a few for things like this. I think there was still a number below 200 left, but Irv couldn't get enought sup-

port to let me have it.

He was very apologetic, and I soon had #2144. I think irv felt I had worked enough people to join when I checked in from Glendora, but I think he also forgot that I was running AM when I checked in and many on SSB would not acknowledge me. Mainly just Irv and Newt, W6FFN.

Irv gave me the MM cards during my visits to his shack. If I had realized I had two of them, I would have sent them in long ago. 73, Clay Conard, W0FS (ex-WA0GFS) #2144"

taught himself to read and write, and in 1882 founded a high school in Jackson, Tennessee, which eventually grew into a Senior Liberal Arts college named in his honor, Lane College. Isaac Lane died in 1937 and on May 12, 1942, the U.S. government chose to name a victory ship in his honor. The S.S. Lane Victory was christened by his granddaughter, Florence Cleaves Evans.

In addition to serving as a memorial, the S.S. Lane Victory compliments the Los Angeles Maritime Museum as a place of interest to the public, serves as a setting for film companies and provides a meeting place for conventions and community clubs. The ship is open to the public daily.

The ship is also a 10-10 member, holding number 67981, and call W6LV. Bill Marple, AA6ZW #62075, is the president of the Lane Victory Amateur Radio Club. The ship will have six cruises in 1997, and will operate as a special event station during the cruises. These one day cruises are scheduled or July 12, 13, August 16, 17 and September 13, 14. 





the transition into Cycle 23, expect large swings of flux as new spots appear above the equator on the sun. For stations in the Eastern US, expect a 12% chance of DX propagation to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. For stations in the Western US, expect no chance of DX into Europe. All of the US will get a 25% chance a path into S.America. Expect reduced Sporadic E Layer conditions during the spring to be short skip that will travel 300 to 2500 miles. F Layer skip will begin to return as Cycle 23 gets more active. Remember to listen for the beacons (28.175-28.3) to check conditions.

I am sticking to my comments about May 28, 1996 being the start of Cycle 23. With the slow increase in solar flux levels and the predictions by NOAA, we have started the next cycle. Why haven't we seen much activity yet from the new cycle? The NOAA projection is based upon past cycles and indicates an average sunspot number of 19 for January and 22 for February—with the number doubling to 44 by July. It also shows solar flux of 77 for January, 80 for February, 84 for March, and 100 by July. Currently, actual conditions are behind these projections. The upswing of the new cycle is going to be slower than the previous but I expect the flux to be over 110 by 1998.

ence. I am not sure whether it was this little ole southern boy going to the big city or what, but those big trucks kept getting right on my bumper, and they would just blow their horns at me. At first I thought they were being friendly, yelling howdy or something over all that noise, waving their hands, and then I discovered they were waving their fist not their hands, and were probably not yelling things fit for this publication. What has that got to do with this column, and operating mobile, well we were unable to make a contact from the streets of Manhattan. We just could not get people to hear us trying to call. What is this telling us, don't try to operate from heavily congested areas. Try to get into the open, clear of those 300 story buildings, with wall to wall concrete. If you must operate from congested areas then try to find the shortest buildings, or a vacant lot, any way to get into the clear.

When you are out in the wide open country, and are not near water or buildings, then what can you expect. Even though our HF signals are sky wave signals which must go to the ionosphere and back to be heard, we still feel that altitude makes for the best operating spot. and most of the time this would be so. What you must be aware of is take of angle of your signal. An example of this was experienced last year while operating from the Yukon Territory., driving toward the 1 st District of Alaska. I had 40 to 50 people just waiting for me to get into Alaska so they could work me. In the Little strip of British Columbia that is above Skagway you are at 6 to 7 thousand feet, and when you cross the border to Alaska, you enter Whitehorse Pass, and in 15 to 18 miles you go from that altitude to see level, with these high mountains on both sides. soon as I cleared customs in to the country, and started down the hill the 40 to 50 people waiting just disappeared, they went from 5/9 to 3/3, and no one could even hear me transmit. The only station I could hear was my friend G4KHG in England. Now think about the reasons for this. For me to work England the signal went up over the North Pole, back up the mountain, and those guys in the states I had to make it through all those rocks. You see down in the town of Skagway, you are surrounded by mountains, and there is hardly any place where there is any take of angle for you to transmit. When you transmit into the rocks that's where it will stay.

Last week I was driving along Interstate 64 in Eastern Kentucky talking to a friend in Texas, and he was at least 5/9. Well I pulled off the Interstate to gas up and as I did this I turned the QSO back to my friend. Meanwhile I had to stop at a red light, which was bordered by this steep cut of rock,. Now while I sat there my friend ask me something, and when I replied his response was "boy you sure have dropped down, I can't hardly hear you." The reason was the cut of Rock was between he and I and the signal had no place to take off. As soon as I moved from the light my signal went right back up.

At another time I was traveling up the California coast on that beautiful highway one, and there is no more scenic road in the country, but don't try to transmit from there. The views are just breath taking but it does not allow you to talk to people very well while traveling. You see the road is right along the base of the mountains which run up and down the coastline, carved out of the rock, leaving an extremely high take off angle for your RF signal, and most of them don't make it over the mountain. I could hear people talking but they could not hear me transmit. One time I called and a KH6 station answered and we talked with no difficulty, and no one in the states even knew we were on the band.

What am I trying to say to you about all of this. If you will pay attention to where you are when you are transmitting you will have a much better chance of making a good contact. Stay in the clear, and give your signal a chance to get out of your antenna, and on the way to the ionosphere. Good mobiling and look for me on 28,336.
