
Vanity Calls and Duplicate 10-10 Numbers

There have been many discussions, on the air and on the Internet, regarding vanity call signs and their effect on 10-10. Since I am the Data Manager, the President asked me to respond. From what I hear and read the biggest concern has been duplicate calls with multiple 10-10 numbers, sometimes neither one is indicated as a SK. First lets address duplicate calls. Duplicate calls on the 10-10 database have existed since the very beginning, both with DX calls and US calls. While they have and continue to be small in number compared to the total, the perception is that every reissued call can become a duplicate on the 10-10 database. Prior to the vanity call program there were 65 known duplicates, the result of either reissued US or foreign calls. Yes, in the past the US has reissued calls, mainly 1X2 or 2X1. In addition a few duplicates happened

several years ago when some enterprising 10-10 member realized that the 10-10 definition of who or what constituted a identity, unique dreamed up the concept f a new identity and called it a club The definistation. tion was changed to prevent this in the future. But existing duplicates were not puraed. Today the number of known duplicates is 70, as of April 30, 1997.


4) Members who are not selected by the Nominating Committee will be notified, in writing, by the



This issue I would like to claim writers privilege, and feature not only a very good friend of mine, but my boss on the Board of Directors. I have the honor and privilege of serving with him on the Operations Committee. He is very dedicated to serving the membership to the



fullest extent of his abilities, which are considerable.

Ed Redwine K5ERJ #11843 was issued a Novice license in early 1956, and 10 meters was the furthest thing from his mind. That changed however, when, with General license in hand, a DX35 and a SX-99 Hallicrafters receiver, he found out just how hot ten could be when the band was open. It was late fall 1956 and Cycle 19 was going full blast. His most memorable contact was with a station in Tanganyika running 18 watts to home brew equipment, and on AM! Ed was thrilled, as his antenna was a 300 ohm dipole strung from the ceiling of his bedroom. After high school Ed worked in Washington D.C. signing K5ERJ/3 and from Indiana as K5ERJ/9. A pretty Indiana girl named Donna settled him down, and they soon married and moved back to his boyhood home of Tahoka, Texas, just south of Lubbock. Since family life now took precedence. ham radio was put on the back burner for several years.

Ed rebuilt his home station in 1976 and was back on the air with full force. No bands were spared as he relentlessly pursued propagation opportunities. This was when he was exposed to 10-10 courtesy and some mighty fine members like WB1CRR, W9MZZ, K2HLC and K1QFD. Ed soon had his own number in hand and became a bona-fide number collector. He started the "Old Plainsman Chapter" out of Lubbock. This one folded when band conditions, and deaths of several members took their toll on participation and membership.

In 1984 Ed and Donna moved to Augusta, Kansas. He quickly made friends within the local Ham community and by 1986, when cycle was on the upswing, he formed a new chapter called the "Air Capital Tentenners", after Wichita, the Air Capital. Local membership grew to over

50 and world wide, AC members numbered over 1000. Ed works almost exclusively for the past 8 years from his pick-up mobile, foregoing his basement fixed station. He has worked the world from the mobile using the Yeasu FT-757 and a Hustler coil and mount.

Ed became involved in 10-10 operations when he and the late Bob Crawshaw, W0NGV chaired the 1993 10-10 Convention in Wichita. Later, he became chairman of the Nominating Committee and was then voted to replace the ailing Peggy Pennel, G4MAE as Director. He ran for and won a full term as Director in 1995. Currently he serves as Chair of the Operations Committee. Operations is the committee responsible for Awards, Contests and the Chapter Coordinator. One of his favorite projects was getting the 10-10 mobile award added to the award lineup.

Ed's philosophy on 10-10 may be a bit different from the others. He says, "10-10 to me isn't points, or number of contacts, or even how many chapters you can join. 10-10 is people - guys and gals that are not just acquaintances, but rather are good close friends. That's what 10-10 is to me" Another one of his considerable talents is Woodcarving, and his creations are much sought after. He did a carving called "Homer The Ham" which was raffled off at the Tuscaloosa convention, and the bidding was intense. Ed is also a "Graphics Artist" and is a real professional. If you have never met Ed. he will be at the Council Bluffs convention, and you will probably find me tagging along behind him. Both Ed and I would love to see you there.

An-Ten-Ten-nas

In each issue of the *News*, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our



object is to help you make the best decisions about the antenna you buy or build with out imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

No. 15 Coax: The Short Story

One good way to think about antennas is as a system: the antenna system. The antenna system consists of all components that get power from the rig (or, on reception, to the rig) into the transducer (that is the antenna proper) that converts the electrical energy (the energy that shocks) into electro-magnetic radiation (the energy form that lets your signal bounce off the ionosphere to all that good DX). Some of those components are inside your rig: the filtering and impedance matching components that establish a 50-ohm impedance at the coax connector.

The remainder of the components are external: the antenna proper, the transmission line, the transmatch or antenna tuning unit (2 names for the same item, and it may also be in your rig's case), and any matching components at the antenna terminals (such as a beta or gamma match for a Yagi). All of these have to be working well to ensure maximum efficiency of energy conversion into RF radiation.

The weak link in the system is often the transmission line, and just because it is a simple, no-adjustment component. It does not start off as the weak link: it just gets that way because we ignore it. Most 10-10ers use coax to feed their antennas, so let's confine our discussion to coaxial cables as transmission lines.

Some Coax Basics

Everyone knows what coax looks like. There

A REMINDER

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is a center wire, which may be solid or stranded. Surrounding the center wire is some insulating material: it may be a solid, translucent plastic or a white softer foam. Around the insulation is a layer of conductors: these may be a mesh or braid of copper, or in recent cables, the conductor may consist of a foil with a mesh around it. Over these layers is a coating--usually a black jacket on ham wires, but sometimes gray or even white for special purpose cables.

For the moment, forget the outer cover. The center wire, the insulating material, and the wire mesh that determine the characteristics of the cable as a transmission line. We can be a little more precise by remembering that alternating currents at HF frequencies travel at the surface of the wires. Hence, we are concerned with the outer surface of the center wire and the inner surface of the wire mesh: these two surfaces determine what the characteristic impedance of the cable will be. Of course, most of us use Since getting a 50-ohm 50-ohm cables. impedance depends on the ratio of the diameter of the center wire and the circle made by the wire mesh, we can make many different sizes of

What can we learn from the table? Actually, several things.

- 1. The fatter the cable, the lower the losses in the cable. So, use the fattest cable you can afford and handle in your situation.
- 2. The fatter the cable, the higher the power handling capability (as roughly indicated by the operating voltage). So if you use an amplifier, use RG-213 or better.
- 3. The outer diameter of the cable determines what coax connectors to use. RG-213 requires regular PL-259 plugs. RG-8X, being the same size as RG-59 (a 70-ohm cable) requires

UG-176 adapters. RG-58 requires a UG-175 adaptor. Do NOT forget the adapters for the smaller cables: they relieve stress on the wires

for longer-lasting connections.

4. The velocity factors tell us how long a cable wavelength is relative to that same wavelength in free space. The cables with solid insulation will be an electrical wavelength long at only 2/3rds the length of the wave in free space. Notice that the foam insulations have higher velocity factors than the solid insulation types. For all foam and for cables with new numbers, be sure to check the velocity factor just in case you have to make up a cable that is a specific fraction of a wavelength long.

In addition to these basic cables, there are a number of new cables. Beldon and others make a very low-loss version of RG-213 under company stock numbers. It is for VHF or for very long (100' +) runs of coax. And it costs more. There are also marine cables with jackets that resist sun, salt water, acids in the air, and almost any

other contaminant. They also cost more.

What Cable to Use

Determining the best cable for an application is a combination of cable characteristics and practical realities. While no absolute rules are possible, here are some scenarios and recommendations.

1. Mobile or portable: Since power with likely be no more than 100 watts and cable runs will be under 35' in most cases, RG-58 should do the

iob.

2. High power contesting: Use RG-213 or better cable to handle the power and the longer cable runs to permanent antennas. One of the low loss cables may be in order if you use very high

towers or antenna supports.

3. Moderate power, but over 65 years old: Consider RG-8X. It is lighter and easier to handle than RG-213, but has more power handling ability and lower loss than RG-58. (For every tens years of age over 40, also consider lowering your tower by 10' to a height you can climb.)

4. Coast-line or industrial area installations: consider some of the marine cables with their ex-

tra protection.

5. Buried cable installation: RG-213 (an improved version of the old RG-8) should work fine, but for minimum maintenance, consider one of the cables with greater resistance to chemical and abrasive wear.

Check at hamfests: sometimes a dealer will run a special on one of the marine or low-loss cables, bringing the price down to nearly the same as RG-213. I tend to avoid preassembled cables, since the crimped connectors are not as well-connected to the cables as carefully assembled regular connectors. However, I do use them for quick tests and for portable work. After a while, I end up replacing the connectors with soldered versions.

The UG series of connectors was made to be taken on and off with ease, and to some degree, they depend on the abrasive effects of connecting and disconnecting to keep the center pin and the threads clean. If you use them at the antenna terminals, be prepared to disassemble and clean the connectors at least once a year, even if you use plenty of coax sealant to weather protect the connection.

Coax Problem

There are two types of coax problems: mechanical and electrical.

Mechanical problems and maintenance: Nothing lasts forever (except love). Inspect your coax and connectors at least once per year or whenever you have any signal strength problems. Clean the connections and reseal them, if outdoors. Wipe down the coax to remove dirt and chemical build-up. Try to install your coax as much in the shade as possible to reduce the rate of sun deterioration of the outer jacket. buried installations, check for standing water around the cable and improve drainage if necessary. Be certain that you use plenty of support on vertical runs (for example, up the leg of a tower). Avoid long, unsupported horizontal runs: use a support rope to which the coax is taped at small intervals. Coax was not made even to support its own weight. Avoid tight corners: the fatter the coax, the larger the radius of a comer. (This also prevents deformation of the cable, which can change its electrical characteristics.)

After five years of outdoor use, replace your coax. It may have some good life in it, but the odds are that your signal strength on both transmission and reception have dropped as the aging cable ate more of the signal power. If you want to use the old cable, cut away and discard a few feet from each end, along with any segments with visible jacket damage. Then use the remaining cable for those shorter noncritical indoor runs of a few feet each. Or remove the jacket and extract the braid as a grounding strap. But keep your outdoor coax fresh.

Electrical problems and maintenance: Remember that the transmission line characteristics of the coax involved only the outer surface of the center wire and the inner surface of the wire mesh. The wire mesh also has an outer surface perfectly capable of conducting HF electrical energy. In fact, it can act just like an antenna in

Jim Hardy, K4HAV, maintains a downloadable FCC database and a subset of that database with just 10-10 members at the Lehigh site. You can use FTP to download, or download from the Web. Complete instructions are linked from the 10-10 main page and are also in the archives.

To review what is in the archives, send a message to LISTSERV@LEHIGH.EDU with just the text INDEX TENTEN-L -ALL. The filenames have explanatory notes attached. Review your welcome message for the ways to access files in the archives via e-mail or via ftp.

Russ, N5EJS, also maintains a beacon search program, which can be downloaded via FTP or from the Web. With recent band openings, beacon listening will become more important.

At my own site, which is just one of many member links (http://funnelweb.utcc.utk.edu/~cebik/radio.html), I have placed all of the past Ant-Ten-Ten-nas columns on their own pages. Look at the bottom of the page, near the end of the listing called "Tales and Technicals," to find the master index to the columns. I am also doing a series for the QRP journal, Low Down, with an emphasis on wire antennas and related topics.

Many chapters have started their own pages rather than just sending me chapter information to add to the site. Check out their links in the Chapters on Line section of the site.

We have added a direct link to the Badgeman of Baton Rouge, who handles official 10-10 badges. I think you can order directly on line: but check the spelling and call twice before sending the message. Jean and I once sent to another place for address labels: they came back as WARNL & NATZP, which is, of course, the name of a Martian vaudeville team.

I receive many messages of inquiry about 10-10 matters and refer the party to the

(hopefully) correct person to answer the question with authority. In the archives and on line, there is a list of 10-10 officers, directors, and volunteer managers. You might want to check there and see if you can go directly to someone with the right answer. But, if in doubt, no problem asking the local traffic cop.

Are we done? Is the present web site the limit of 10-10 member services on-line? Not by a long shot, although new ideas are likely to arise more slowly now that we have gotten the system organized. Vanity Calls and Duplicate 10-10 Numbers

Silent Keys, expired licenses and call changes. Silent Keys are identified when someone notifies the SK Manager, K5MRU, a 10-10 Officer or Director or me, or lists compiled by the ARRL or QCWA. These are edited by the SK Manager to determine if they contain 10-10 members. If we are not notified the individual's 10-10 number remains active. While some of us feel that our calls and our hobby will be part of us for life, others don't share that view and drop out and let their license expire. Others change or upgrade their call and just never notify 10-10. A review of the 10-10 database when compared against the FCC database revealed that there were over 6700 10-10 members with calls that did not match.

What can or should 10-10 do about this is somewhat nebulous. Is it 10-10's responsibility to keep the calls or other data current? They have assumed that responsibility with mailings, i.e., NEWS and other mailings from Omaha. A service which cost 10-10 over \$200 per year, (check your mailings from Omaha, all mail state that mail forwarding and address correction requested"), yet this effort is not 100% successful. Some members move and leave no forwarding address and for a very small percentage the Postal Service does not follow through with the requested service. On a different note, in order for 10-10 to take advantage of postage discounts and maintain a high degree accuracy with addresses, CASS certification as required by the Postal Services is done on all addresses. This service also costs several hundreds of dollars each year.

I have begun a review of those members whose membership expiration dates are 1996 and greater. In that group there are 470 members whose calls no longer match in the FCC database. Manual review has thus far shown that over 95 percent are upgrades, and/or the results of the vanity call program. The remaining 5 % are no longer listed. I should point out that I don't access the actual FCC database but use one that is commercially available. The particular one that I use, allows for name/address lookups and will search on partial calls. Also if the immediate previously issued call is entered, the new call will be displayed. When a call is not found, then a second search by name and/or address is started. The use of these call databases and the knowledge of the forthcoming vanity call program prompted 10-10, in the beginning of 1996, to begin using the name as

recorded in the call database for all 10-10 record keeping. Addresses are a separate problem. Many members have mailing addresses different than wat is shown on the database. Many more have moved, sometimes several times, and have never submitted a Form 610 to the FCC. The address from the call databases is never used except on rare occasions.

10-10 is on top of the duplicate number problem, to the extent possible. It would make the job of data processing much easier if everyone would notify not only the FCC but also 10-10 when a change occurs in your name, address, or call. In most cases, due to our quarterly mailing of the NEWS, and address corrections received from the post office, the 10-10 database is, inmost cases, more current than any other of the many amateur radio data bases. Your cooperation in helping us keep your records current is appreciated.



TenX DX News

A unfortunate DXpedition to BS7H Scarborough Reef by Jim Duffy W6EU (ex WA6AUE #4722), along with a group of Japanese, American and Chinese, began on April 30. Using two Chinese Research ships for transport, the BS7H operation was suppose to last until May 6, but they left unexpectedly after three days of operating. The ten-mile long reef located in the South China Sea just west of the Philippines and is claimed by China but the reef is in an Exclusive Economic Zone owned by the Philippines. The Chinese can pass through this part of the South China Sea but China can not receive any economic benefits from the area due to treaty. At the time the DXpedition was starting, three Chinese warships were operating 200 miles south of the reef near the Spratley Islands. The Spratley area is a heavily disputed area and the Philippine government was concerned about this activity. Philippine Air Force jets flew low over Scarborough and two military ships arrived to investigate the activity. This caused the Chinese to terminate the ham radio operation and to leave the

This was the third time Scarborough has been activated and many hams need it for **DXCC**. The operators left the reef just before the weekend and many people were upset since they had been promised seven days of activity! Several news services carried stories of the incident since Philippine President Ramos made comments that they had a claim to the area and that they had placed their flag on the reef. Well, enough said for now, but this is developing into another disputed DXCC country. To read more on this subject, the BS7H 97 Home Page at http://www.iglou.com/n4qn/sr/.

DL7FT Frank Does Not Have A 1010 Number. Back in September 1991, Frank applied for his 1010 number and got #54238 issued by Lee Pasewalk. Frank did not like the number and returned it, 10-10 then reissued it to GM4BKR Bob #54238. I talked with Frank over the air several years ago and he told me he wanted #77777 or #67777. I have started an inquiry with my 10-10 source in Germany to find out what

actually happened and why Frank is giving out 54238 as his number. Maybe he did not understand but more likely he is upset with 10-10 and has decided to cause problems by using #54238. As of this writing, QSL's for the following have NOT BEEN allowed: D68FT 4-10-91, HU1FT 4-3-92 & 3-7-92, 5R8DJ 3-15-93. So, nothing official has been decreed about Frank but I know one official has agreed with possibly of banning him from being a future member because of his present actions. There is nothing we can do about him giving out a bogus number except to tell you he is NOT VALID FOR 10-10 DXCC.

NEW HF BEACON. Martin, G3USF, IARU Region 1 HF Beacon Coordinator, reports another of the five-band HF beacon network stations is now operational. The VK6RBP beacon, sited near Perth, is like all the other IBP beacons where the power steps down from 100 watts to 0.1 watt in four stages, transmitting 10 seconds on the IBP frequencies on the 14, 18, 21, 24 and 28.2 MHz. Also, the JA2IGY beacon, which operated on the 14100 kHz frequency only, is now understood to be operational on all five bands. According to Martin, this leaves BY, UA, OA and ZL beacons not as yet operational. There are 14 beacons now on the air, and all these beacons are sponsored by NCDXF.

N5EJS Russ, the 10-10 Countries Manager, continues to enter applications into the 10-10 DXCC Database. He now has 528 members entered, which represents 22000 contacts or 41 countries per application. We now have 30 members with over 100 countries! Russ hopes to finish before the 10*10 Convention this summer. Russ has identified another new 10-10 country:



Propagation: Solar flux will range from 71-85 during the Summer of 1997. As I write this, the Solar flux is 71, the A index 4 and K index 1, with the Solar flux staying in a very narrow range, the same conditions as my last article. The transition into Cycle 23 is taking much longer than past history. Expect large, swings of flux as new spots appear on the sun for the first time. For stations in the Eastern US, expect a 8% chance of DX propagation to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. For stations in the Western US, expect no chance of DX into Europe. All of the US will get a 20% chance into S. America. Expect increased Sporadic E Layer conditions during the summer to be short skip that will travel 300 to 1500 miles. F Layer skip will return as Cycle 23 gets more active. Remember to listen for the beacons (28.175-28.300) to check conditions.

Its been a year since I picked May 28, 1996 as the start of Cycle 23. The slow increase in solar flux levels and the data by NOAA, indicates we have started the next cycle. Why haven't we seen much activity yet from the new cycle? The NOAA projection based upon past cycles indi-





Items of Interest for 10-10 Members

INDONESIAN PIRATES ON 10: On the International scene, what appear to be unlicensed stations operating from Indonesia continue to be a big problem for users of the ten-meter band in Australia and New Zealand. Over the last few years the pirates have moved onto the 28 and 29 MHz bands in large numbers. Often they are the only signals that can be heard on 10 meters in Australia and New Zealand.

The unlicensed operators are believed to be the equivalent of Indonesian CB'ers who are trying to escape the chaos of 11 meters. They can be found every 10 kHz or so right up into the 29 MHz satellite band. Most operate using high power FM or AM with directional antennas.

Australian hams say that the Indonesian pirates have no regard for amateur operators, in fact they now play a new game of jamming ham radio transmissions as a new kind of sport. Complaints to the Indonesian government are being ignored.

SHIPDISTRESS CALLS: THE TRUTH ABOUT SOS AND CQD – The SS Titanic wasn't the first ship to send an SOS, as is widely believed; this distinction belongs to the American steamer Azaohoe, which used the signal when disabled with a broken propeller shaft in August 1909. The internationally agreed-upon wireless distress call had recently come into force and did not stand for "Save Our Souls"; the letters SOS were chosen simply because the Morse code for them (three dots, three dashes, three dots) was easy to remember and transmit.

Before the SOS was used as a distress call the CQD was in wide use. The first ship to send out a CQD was the White Star Liner Republic, which sank in a collision with liner Florida off Nantucket on January 23, 1909. The Republic's English radio operator, Jack, became an international hero for sending out, with emergency power, this first ship-radio distress call. "CQ" stands for "Calling all station in the vicinity" and "D" is for distress.

VOLUNTEER PROTECTION LEGISLATION PASSED BY CONGRESS: After more than ten years of trying, the 105th Congress has finally agreed on the wording of a law to free individual volunteers from most liability actions (such as a simple accident, oversight or omission) related to their unpaid service to any not-for-profit or governmental organization. The bill was signed into



Here are some highlights of the Spring and Summer 1977 Quarterly Bulletins as reported by then-Editor Chuck Albrecht, WA0YNQ (now N0CKW) #8105.

10-10 activities at the 26th Annual Dayton Hamvention in May 1977 were sponsored by the Cincinnati Area Ten Tuners (CATT). The CATT 10-10 Forum was moderated by Del, WB8EDG #2978 and Gale, WA8RLY gave a talk on OS-CAR's impact on the upper part of 10 meters.

There was a fine turnout for the 10-10 Booth and Forum at the May 1977 12th Annual L.A. Amateur Radio Convention in Burbank. 10-10 members who attended ranged from Jim, K6PJO #9, to Jeff, WA6TKN #15008. Many local chapters are following the fine example set by Rich (SK), WB0FQD #10488, C/H of the Colorado Chapter; Steve, WB0LFY, C/H of the M0-Kan Chapter; Del, WB8EDG #2978, C/H of CATT; and Sally, WB4NDX #2984, C/H of the North Georgia Chapter--all have sponsored a 10-10 Booth and Forum in 1977.

The headline in the Summer 10-10 Bulletin reads, "WB0QHV wins the Winter 1977 QSO Party with 710 QSO's/1029 Points."

Bob, WA5JDU #3017, was second with 560/1029, and Grace, K5MRU #218, was third with 492/931. Grace, K5MRU, Contest Manager. reports that this was 10-10's biggest QSO party yet with 626 logs received. Some members complain about the scoring without multipliers for DX. Of the logs received, 12 say they would prefer multipliers. However, for the Summer QSO Party, the scoring will be the same: 1 point per contact, an extra point for a 10-10 member.

It was announced that the annual dues in 1978 will be increased from \$2.00 to \$3.00 to cover the increased costs of postage, printing

and distribution.

Mary (SK), WA6MOF #11900, Treasurer, reports that year-to-date revenue for the second quarter of 1977 was \$7938, expenses \$5243, with revenues over expenses at \$2695. [For the same period in 1996, Treasurer Keith, K17RK #63324. reported \$26,615; \$15,632; and \$10,983, respectively.

And that's the way it was in the good old 10-10 summertime, twenty years ago.



Rules - 10-10 DAY Sprint

The following rules apply only to the 24-hour 10-10 DAY Sprint QSO Party which is held annually on October 10th.

- 1. ALL contacts must be made in the 10 meter amateur band on AM, FM, CW, RTTY, or SSB.
- 2. Exchange call sign, name, state or country, and 10-10 number. Some stations may request your county or Local Chapter numbers.
- 3. A Station may be counted only once, regardless of mode used.
- 4. ANY mode of operation may be used during the SPRINT, provided that RULE #3 is adhered to. Mode of operation need NOT be claimed on your log.
- 5. Multiple station, single operator (Club Stations) or Single Station, multiple operator (OM/ XYL, Family Stations) along with the normal Single operator, Single Station logs will be accepted.
- 6. All contacts must take place during the 24 hour SPRINT period.
- 7. Logs must be kept in UTC (Universal Coordinated Time, Greenwich, Zulu etc.)
- 8. A "DUPE" sheet is required of ALL participants regardless of the number of contacts made. Computer duping is acceptable. A manual dupe sheet sample is included in this

brochure.

- 9. Affiliated Chapter Assignment Scores are NOT applicable for this contest. All competition will be on a one on one basis.
- 10. Illegible or improperly submitted logs WILL be disqualified.
- 11. Point to Point contacts only will be accepted. NO repeater or Satellite contacts allowed.
- 12. Failure to comply with these RULES or their INTENT will result in disqualification.
- 13. SCORING: Two (2) points per contact with 10-10 number exchange and One (1) point per exchange without 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS: A First place certificate will be awarded for each: US Call area (area 7 includes Alaska), Canada, South America, Caribbean (including Bermuda), Europe, Africa, Asia and the Pacific (which includes VK, ZL, KH6, and ALL other PACIFIC islands). The top ten finishers in the Contest overall will receive a certificate. Paid-up (full) 10-10 member scores will be listed in the 10-10 News.

LOGS: Logs are accepted from paid-up 10-10 members only, and must be complete, legible, and in UTC. Each line entry must show Time, Call sign of station worked, Name, QTH (state if US or country) and 10-10 number if any. A cover (summary) sheet is required and must show entrants FULL Name, Call, QTH, 10-10 number, Address, membership expiration date (either by the NEWS address label or COPY of membership card) total number of contacts with and without 10-10 numbers and total claimed score.





Mobile Notes By Gene Tyree N4ANV #18712

Well time again to say hello to all my 10-10er friends. Its always great to pay attention to the people you first had a QSO with on the 10 Meter band. I remember very well receiving my new 10-10 number and the pressing urge to get on the air and pass out my new 18712, for the first time. Boy that was a long time ago. I believe it was the spring of 1978. I was the only guy in town who was spending time swapping those numbers, and collecting all that paper. Then came along my good friend Dick Stutts, KB4MJ, #18758, now a silent key, and together we would chase paper. Its great to chase memories, and I guess the longer you are here the more you This was the beginning of the 1010 chase. chapter of Possum Trotters on 10, as Dick and I were joined by our friend Bill. KU4W, # 20986. Bill is still the chapter head of the Possum Trot-

ters on 10. As many of you know we still operate as a group for all 10-10 QSO parties, and do our best to be on the top of the list. 10-10 is fully a club activity in our local club. Enough of this as I almost got nostalgic on you. H!! H!!

Well let me tell you about how I install my mobile radio to get rid of as much noise as I can. You see much of the noise in your radio does not come through the antenna,

but enters the radio by way of the electrical system. Think about this, in the old days they used spark gap transmitters to send signals over the airways. Well just think of the number of spark transmitters that just happened to be under


your hood. Each spark plug (every time it fires), the alternator, the radiator fan motor, the heaterair conditioning, fan, the wiper motor. All of these can and sometimes do cause noise in your receiver. Other things which cause problems are electric fuel pumps, torque converters, and commuter modules. Therefore as we begin to talk about installation of a radio we must remember what we are trying to remove from the radio. A great deal of the noise in our receivers comes as a result of the power cable becoming a pickup device for the RF sparks produced by the various items producing these sparks under the hood. So if this be the case we must take steps to remove the pick up device, the power cable. Since we know we can't completely get rid of the cable, then we must make it as invisible as possible. First, we always need to go right from the battery to the radio for our power source. The battery acts as a filter to the radio from other electric components, so we need to use this as opposed to going through the fuse box, and hooking directly into all the noise of the automobile.

When I begin to install the rig in the car, I plan the route which I must take to reach the

place where the radio will be. I like to get the cable out of the engine compartment as quick as possible. Many times drilling into the fender well just behind the battery, then comina back into the car around the door, or drilling a hole somewhere in the floor board, to get into the car. The reason for this is to let the car body act as a physical shield to all the noise created in the engine compartment.

After planning the path, determine the

length of power cable you need to make the run. You need to plan to run both + and - to the battery. After determining the length, get a

10-10 DX Countries Award Update

For anyone interested in the 10-10 DX Countries Award, there are new items you should be aware of:

Data for the Countries Awards is being entered & kept by a computer tracking program (thanks to K4HAV). As a result, dupes and a few other problems have appeared in some of the records. I will be reporting these to the affected members who are paid up on their dues. Dupes in the Basic 25 or following endorsements will have to be filled in before credit for further endorsements can be issued.

Some of those affected may not have enough replacements on hand to fill in the slots. Replace what you can and send the others when you have them. But please let me know about it one way or the other so I can make a note about it in your file.

If you still have some of the older application forms and rule sheets you can still use them to make a submission, but you need to take notice of the following points:

#1. Confirmation by the "Verifying Signatures of 2 other members" method is no longer accepted for the 10-10 DX Countries Award. You need to send either the QSLs or copies of the QSLs along with your application. Copies of QSLs will not be returned.

#2. On some of the older forms the Application Sheet and the sheet used to list contacts are on two separate pieces of paper. Others are on a single sheet, front and back. For the ones on separate sheets of paper, please remember to put your Call, 10-10 number, and date of submission at the top of the form. Some of them didn't have a place to put this information and if the contact sheet becomes separated from the application sheet later on, I have no way of knowing which application it belongs to.

For DX stations outside USA: I can exchange IRC's for return postage but not for the \$5 first time award fee. Also, the PostMaster warned me that IRCs stamped in the right-hand box are invalid and can't be redeemed. A letter weighing 1/2 ounce or fewer (14.1 grams) takes 1 IRC. And for each additional 1/2-ounce add 1 IRC. On average, 25 QSLs will weigh somewhere around 3 to ounces (85 to 114 grams) with envelope & returning paperwork. This works out to around 6 to 8 IRC's for return by airmail. (Canada & Mexico would take a few less then other countries).

If you want to check on the status of your award, send a SASE and I'll send you back a

printout of the credits in your file plus a set of the updated Rules & Forms. If you have e-mail, I can send the printout and Rules by that means but not the forms. Send e-mail to: n5ejs@linknet.net or tenten-dx@juno.co.

10-10 Numbers

The question has come up recently as to why several members have received their new 10-10 numbers not in sequence. That is one new member may receive a number in the 687XX series and another new member may receive a number in the 676XX series. Of course there is a reason for this. When 10-10 had Area Managers, who issued 10-10 numbers to new members, they were issued numbers by the Data Manager in blocks of 100. During that time, numbers issued to new members, were not issued in sequence, but issued from the blocks assigned to Area Managers. Numbers being issued from one area to another area could be up to a couple of thousand apart.

When 10-10 went centralized, and Area Managers were abolished, those blocks of numbers not assigned by area managers, were returned to the data bank. Those numbers are now being assigned and therefore numbers will vary from sequential issue until all of the old area manager blocks are used up. Based on 60-70 new members joining 10-10 currently per month, the Data Manager estimates that all of those old blocks of numbers will be used up in the next few months. When all of the old blocks of numbers have been assigned, the Data Manager will begin issuing new numbers in sequence in the block beginning with 69000.

There still are a few open numbers in some of the lower blocks, which have been assigned to the DX Manager to issue to new DX members.

Amateur Radio Then and Now

Well, let's shift gears a little bit and gaze at the digital Amateur station of ten years ago. It's now 1987 – most of us can still remember back that far. You had an 8088 or 80286. 1987 – OK, maybe you had a Mac as well. You had a megabyte of DRAM, or you had a forty megabyte hard drive, you had an EGA monitor (how many remember EGA monitors?). You had a Z80 TNC with a 1200 baud modem plugged into the audio jacks of your two meter radio, and you had a 1200, or if you were rich, a 2400 bit per second connection to The Source, or maybe CompuServe.

Lets look at that same digital Amateur station today. It's now 1997. You've got a high speed 486 or Pentium, it's got at least eight megabytes of RAM, you've got a one-gigabyte hard drive and a SuperVGA monitor. You've got a 28.8 kilobit modem that cost \$99 connected up to your \$20 per month internet connection. And you've got a Z80 TNC running at 1200 bits per second connected to your two-meter radio

What's wrong with this picture? Advancing the radio art is how we're going to retain what we have. Lets look at something else. Pretend it's 1944 now (I think most of us will have to pretend). If you ran into QRM on the frequency, well, what would you do? You'd QSY, change frequency, you'd QRZ, be sure the frequency was clear, and then you'd call CQ.

In 1954, you know, 10 years later, Single Sideband was starting to come on. You cut your spectrum in half so you could put twice as many people in the same amount of spectrum. In 1997, we're using what? Single Sideband. Same as we were using in 1954. It's nearly fifty years later and we're still using the SAME techniques.

length of RG8 coax, and it should be about 25% longer than the power cable. Strip the black cover off the coax, very carefully, trying not to cut the braid. Once you have the cover off, the shield then acts just like an old Chinese finger cuff. Just slide it back on itself and it will come right off the dielectric insulator. You now have a nice braided shield to use. Try not to crimp the shield. Very carefully begin to feed your power cable into the shield, being very careful to not crimp because it makes it more difficult to feed into the shield. Once you have the cable in the shield, cut excess cable and run the cable on the planned path.

Place the proper connectors on both ends of the + and - wires. These will be determined by the type of battery and radio you have. Don't forget to put a fuse in line to protect your radio.

Now if you have shield left over then don't waste it. Put terminal lugs on the ends of pieces cut to the right length. Place these as grounding straps between engine and chassis, and between the tailpipe and the chassis. One from each side of the motor and from each end of the tail pipe will help lower the noise to the radio.

Does all this work, well? It has worked for me, and I know it has worked for others. I can operate from my mobile while driving 70 to 75 mph down the interstate, and exchange 3/3 reports. Now if I had a lot of noise I sure couldn't do that. If you are having trouble with all that noise then give this a try. It may work for you.

Well I am still listening for all of you on 10 meters mobile, and haven't heard many, but you wait and see. During the summer we will be able to find a few openings on 10, and I sure look forward to that. If you have an interesting story about mobiling on 10 meters, jot it down and send it to me. parallel with your "real" antenna. That phenomenon can ruin the performance of your system (unless it is designed into the system, as in some wire antenna schemes). Hence, you need something to isolate the outer surface of the coax from the antenna currents. Many beam manufacturers already provide a "balun" or "line isolator" to take care of that potential problem. If your

system does not have one, consider purchasing a 1:1 current balun or W2DU-type choke balun to install between the antenna terminals and the

coax run.

I also take one other precaution. Instead of running one piece of coax from the antenna terminals to the rig, I use several. The first goes from the beam terminals (actually, the choke balun) to the mast, around the rotator with a large strain-relief loop, and down abut 8 feet along a tower leg. I have grounded my tower legs as best I can, and I have a plate on the leg with a bulkhead (double female) coax connector. The first length of coax ends here and the second begins. Electrically, the tower and the outer coax braid surface are at the same potential. second coax length goes to another plate installed where the coax enters my home. At this weather protected point, when weather threatens. I can move the coax from the house run to a plate with coax connectors and a long pipe into the soil. Keeping heavy charges outdoors is my goal, especially when I am on vacation. This measure protects my home. A third run goes from the home-entry plate to a plate at the edge of my operating table. Routinely, whenever I am not on the air, the coax, ground strap, computer connector, and AC cord to the station are all completely disconnected, so that the station is isolated from any electrical dangers. This measure protects my rig. Finally, short lengths from the plate to my antenna tuners and rigs complete the connections.

Do I get some losses from having so many coax connectors? Probably a little. But so far, in 40+ years of operating, I have had no problem with static charge build-up on the antenna, power line surges, ground surges, or other weather- and thunderstorm-related problems.

Coax makes a very effective transmission line, but its effectiveness depends on sensible selection, thoughtful installation, regular maintenance, and timely replacement. You might want to check out your transmission lines before the sunspots numbers take your mind off everything except operating.

The complete 10-10 membership list is available in hard copy or on computer disk.

Hard Copy Roster - The hard copy is printed on both sides of 8-1/2" x 11" paper 3-hole punched. The roster lists 10-10 number and call. SK's are identified. It is issued once each year in January. Cost of the printed roster is \$11.00 US and \$14.00 DX postpaid. Only a limited number of copies are printed and are sold on a first come, first serve basis. Advance orders are accepted.

Roster on Disk - 10-10 offers two different Rosterson-Disk. One, known as XXIQ will search for call if 10-10 number is known and for 10-10 number if call is known. XXIQ is available on 3.5" (1.44MB) disk. It will run on IBM compatible computers. The other 10-10 Roster-on-Disk is known as XXIP and is available only on 3.5" (1.44MB) disks. It is contained on 3 disks and requires DOS 3.3 or later and 16 MB of hard disk. This program will locate 10-10 number, call and will display Name, Address, City, State (or Country), membership status, expiration date, SK status and will print address labels. Rosters on DISK are published each quarter, in January, April, July and October.
