10-10 International Net, Inc. 1998 Board Meeting Minutes June 13, 1998 Houston, Texas

President Torn Henderson, K4CIH, called the meeting, at the Ramada Inn in Houston, Texas, to order at 8:35 AM. Present were President K4CIH, Vice President W6YLJ, Secretary KA5OVO, Directors K5ERJ, NOMT, KJ4FM, K6YVG, VK4WBH, WA9TSG, KF7ZQ, K6SSD, and WA2SUH. Also present were Treasurer, K17RK and Data Manager, WA6POZ, as guests of the Board. Director KC1CP was absent from the meeting, due to health reasons.

A Moment of silence was observed in remembrance of all 10-10 silent keys, and the agenda was distributed. President Henderson moved that we deviate from the agenda as needed. Motion was seconded and

President Henderson moved to accept the minutes of the 1997 Board of Directors, as written. Motion was seconded and passed.

The President's report was presented, with discussion of the new awards we offer. Thanks were offered to KI6OY and G4BLH for their work on the CW Award and the Great Britain Counties Award, as well as to the Operations Committee for its work. With the assistance of KF7ZQ and the Contest Committee, the QSO Party Brochure has been updated to include the new rules in an effort to make them more enjoyable for everyone.

The duplication of information was discussed, along with the ways to prevent this from happening. We are working to be sure that members do not receive duplicate information and work sheets from multiple managers. The Operations Committee will work on minimizing this in the future.

With the implementation of formal guidelines by Coordinator W4RNL, the TenTen-L Internet discussion group has become a more pleasant and enjoyable site. A special thanks to W4RNL and N3VXI for their continued work on the web site and TenTen-L.

The Operations Manual was discussed, along with the changes that have been added, including the new awards now available. Copies of the Operations Manual are available from K4CIH for \$8.00.

After five years as Editor of the 10-10 INTERNATIONAL NEWS, Vice President W6YLJ, has resigned and turned over the publication to the new editor, KJ4FM. Special thanks are given to W6YLJ for his excellent work on the NEWS.

The Vice President's report was presented. The current dues structure was discussed. The need for donations for the Scholarship Fund, and the efforts to obtain them, was discussed. The agreement with Jim Hardy, K4HAV, as the official supplier of the 10-10 contest program, our Corporation forms, and the Corporation insurance, were discussed. The annual reports of the Scholarship Manager, Historian, and club station trustee, W6EHM, was also presented at this time.

The Secretary's report was given, with a special thanks to KF7ZQ, for his filling in for the secretary at the last Board meeting. The reduction in paperwork and postage, due to the use of e-mail, was discussed.

The report of the Treasurer and annual finance report were presented to the board by Treasurer, KI7RK. Our Treasurer reported that we are financially stable, and went into detail of the investment program he has set up for 10-10. Motion was made and seconded that 10-10 retain its present investment policy, motion passed. Motion was made and seconded that the proposed budget be accepted as read, motion passed.

The Membership Committee report was presented by KJ4FM. The committee has been busy recruiting new members and assuring the membership gets good value for its dues.

The Operations Committee report was presented by K5ERJ. Two appointments were required this year. K7QXG resigned as manager of the 100-900 Bar Award, and KZ3T has taken the job, and is doing a good job. The other appointment was for Net Manager. With 8P6SA becoming a silent key, AA6ZW was appointed as the Net Manager, and has done an excellent job. It was moved and seconded that these two volunteers be appointed without prejudice, motion passed. The position of Worked All Continents award has been assumed by K4CIH until an acceptable replacement can be located. Also reported was the creation of two new awards, the Great Britain Counties award and the CW award.

The Planning Committee report was presented by K4CIH due to the

absence of KC1CP. Reported were the details of the 1998 Board meeting in Houston, with arrangement made by N5MT, the selection of Oak Ridge, TN. As the site of the 1999 10-10 Convention, with KC4RHW serving as convention chairman. A manual is being edited for convention procedures, and there is a need for a convention manager.

The Communications Committee report was presented by KF7ZQ. After almost 6 years as Information Manager, KF7ZQ resigned and N5VAV, assistant Information Manager, was appointed as the new Information Manager. The Information brochure, QSO party brochure, and Awards brochure have been updated, and all information is now available from a single source. A committee composed of K5ERJ and KF7ZQ was formed to investigate and correct any discrepancies in our award programs information and application sheets. A lengthy discussion was held on upgrading the 10-10 INTERNATIONAL NEWS, and Data Manager, WA6POZ, was asked to check into upgrading the quality of paper used to print the NEWS, and adding color to the masthead, and a better grade of paper.

The Data Manager report was presented by WA6POZ. Discussed were the problem of members moving and not turning in a change of address, problems with the mistakes with the first election ballot for the current election. It was decided that the 10 members that sign the application of member number 70,000, will each receive a 10-10 International hat.

K4CIH reported on the work going on for the 1999 convention in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and the possible site of the 2000 board meeting. Many sites were discussed and a discussion will be made at a later date. Also mentioned was a proposal for the 2001 convention by the Bay Area Chapter in the San Francisco area.

Under old business, discussion was held on the donation of \$2000 to the 10-10 Scholarship Fund by the defunct IAU organization. A special thanks was given for this special gift.

There was also a motion that was tabled at the last board meeting, to limit the number of directors to eight (8), down from the current ten (10). W6YLJ asked that the motion be reopened to change the wording in the by-laws, to limit the number of directors to eight (8). Motion was made and seconded to change the wording of the by-laws, article 5, section 3, to read, Effective January 1, 2003, the board of directors shall consist of the President, Vice President, Secretary, and no more than eight (8) directors. Motion passed. The following procedure shall be used to implement procedure for reducing from 10 to 8 directors:

1998-Elect 5 Directors

2000-Elect 4 Directors

2002-Elect 4 Directors

Under new business, discussion was held on 10-10 International, Net. Inc, become affiliated with ARRL. Motion was made and seconded that 10-10 become affiliated with ARRL. Motion was made and seconded to table the motion until after the election. Motion passed.

It was moved and seconded that a Convention Manager be appointed by the President to establish biennial conventions. This manager shall report to the Board of Directors via the Planning Committee. The responsibilities shall be to secure a convention site and to arrange details with the convention site. He/she shall have direct contact with the hotel, and make all arrangements and handle the contracts. Motion passed. Due to the creation of this position, the Operations Manual shall be changed to reflect the position and it's responsibilities.

Motion was made to change the by-laws, Article IX, Section 2, to read, "No member may qualify for nomination to be an Officer or Director of 10-10 unless they meet the following two conditions; 1) He or she has been a full member for more than two years immediately preceding his or her nomination, and 2) He or she can show that their membership status will remain current during the period of the office they are seeking." Motion was seconded and motion passed.

There was a proposal to change the by-laws, Article IX, Election Procedure, Section 3, to read, "The President shall appoint a chairman of the nominations committee no later than 1 June, of the year preceding the election year. A call for nominations will be issued in the second and third issues of the 10-10 NEWS. Information regarding eligibility and information to send the nominating committee will be included. The nominating committee shall develop a slate of eligible qualified candidates by 30 November in the year preceding the election. Members

wishing to be selected must have their information in to the nominating committee prior to 15 November in the year preceding the election. Members who are not selected by the nominating committee will be informed by 15 December by the chairman of the nominating committee, in writing, of the proper method of petition. Nominations of the nominating committee will be announced in the second issue of the 10-10 NEWS of the election year. The Chairman of the nominations committee will, by the first week in January of the election year, send the official state of candidates to the President, Secretary, Data Manager, and Editor of the 10-10 NEWS. The Data Manager will prepare ballots after 15 March of the election year. Should there be any changes in the official slate due to petitions, the Secretary will notify the President, Data Manager, and the Editor of the 10-10 NEWS prior to 1 March of the election year." Motion was made and seconded, motion passed.

A proposal was made to changes in the wording of Sections 10 and 11 of the Operations Manual.

Section 10.2.1, Discharge of the Committee: would be changed to read, "Once the nominating committee has completed its work as outlined in the procedures below, it will notify the President, Data Manager, Secr tary, and the Editor, in writing, of its selections. It will forward to the Editor the biographical information forms and sketches of candidates for use in the 10-10 NEWS. The President will then discharge the committee from further duty, with the thanks of 10-10."

Motion was made and seconded, to accept the change, motion passed. It was proposed to change the wording of Section 10.3.5.

Section 10.3.5 Notification of the President, Secretary, Data Manager, and Editor: "The chairman of the nominating committee will notify in writing the President, Data Manager, Secretary, and Editor of the 10-10 NEWS, by the first week in January of the election year, of the final slate of candidates, and forward biographical information on the selected candidates, to the Editor. In accord with Section 3, nominations of the nominating committee will be announced in the second issue of the 10-10 NEWS of the election year."

Motion was made and seconded to accept the change, motion passed. It was proposed to change the wording of Section 11.2.1.

Section 11.2.1 Production of Ballots: "Upon receiving from the chairman of the nominating committee and the Secretary all nominations for elected positions, the Data Manager shall cause to have printed, ballots for mailing to each full (paid-up) member. All candidates shall be placed on the ballot, whether or not opposed. The return will be addressed to the tellers for the election, and the Data Manager should consult with the tellers to ensure that the form of the ballot is such as can be counted appropriately." Motion was made and seconded to accept the new wording, motion passed.

Section 11.2.2 Distribution of Ballots: "Using lists and labels made available by the Data Manager or through the services of the Data Manager, the Data Manager shall cause to be mailed a ballot to each full member. DX ballots, except Canada, will be air mailed." Motion was made and seconded to accept the changes, motion passed.

It was proposed to change the wording of the Policies and Procedures manual Section 11.

Section 11.1: In accord with Article IX, Section 1, the election of officers and one half directors shall take place each even numbered year. The President, Secretary, and one half of the directors (4) shall take place in one even numbered year and the Vice-President and one half of the directors (4) shall take place in the following even numbered year. Motion was made and seconded to accept the changes, motion passed.

It was moved and seconded the following procedure be used to implement Section 11.1: Election of Officers and Directors shall be as follows: The President will be elected to a 4-year term, in 1998, as in previous elections. The Vice President will be elected to a 4-year term in 1998, a 2-year term in the 2002 election, and back to a 4-year term the 2004 election, thus causing the President and Vice President to be elected in alternate elections. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded to change the wording of the By-laws, Section 3c:

1. Family membership consists of a primary member (U.S., Interna-

tional, or Life Member) and one or more relatives who qualify as a 10-10 member and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family membership for relatives of like members may be for any number of years. If a life member family membership runs past the expiration of the life member, that family membership must be converted to a full membership within 90 days or it will be cancelled. Conversion will be on the basis of the difference between the cost of family membership and full membership.

2. Family membership shall run concurrently with that of the primary member. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded to change the wording of the Policies and Procedure Manual, Section 13.4.2:

7. Meals: Each Officer, Director Treasurer, Data Manager, and invited members shall be allowed \$25.00 per day for food and other expenses during board meetings. The expense shall be limited to a maximum of two days. Motion passed. A motion was made and seconded to change the wording of section 5, Net Official: In addition to elected Officers and Directors, 10-10 requires the volunteer services of numerous members to sustain its many operations. No person shall be eligible for a position as a net official who has not been a full member of 10-10 for at least two contunuous years, immediately preceding their appointment as a net official. All net officials shall maintain paid up status through their term. Current net officials are listed in section 15 of this manual. Motion passed.

Motion made and seconded to add a new class of membership under bylaws Article 3, Section 3, to: Full membership in 10-10 shall be cancelled upon: Motion passed.

A motion was made and seconded to add a new class of membership under nylaws article 3, section 5, to:

(g) Associated Membership: Members who have lost their full membership because of section 5 (a). Motion was made to table until further study could be made. Motion to table passed.

Motion was made and seconded to authorize an expenditure of up to \$2500.00 to support the 1999 10-10 convention. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded to extend the Treasurer's agreement for another year. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded to increase the Treasurer's fee to \$150.00/month, effective July 1, 1998. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded to increase the Data manager's fee from 32 cents per entry, to 34 cents per entry, an increase from 14 to 16 cents per change in the data base, and an increase from 1 cent/label to 5 cents/label. Motion passed.

The Policies and Procedure manual was gone over page by page, with final corrections, deletions, and additions made where applicable. A final vote will be taken on the acceptance of the changes made, after the manual has been revised. Copies of the Manual are available from the President for \$8.00.

Motion was made and seconded to add the words "or e-mail", to Article VI, Section 6, of the bylaws. Motion passed.

Motion was made and seconded that the revised bylaws be adopted by the Board of Directors on June 13 1998, and are currently effective. Motion passed

All business being conducted, the meeting was adjourned at 5:20 PM, June 13 1998.

An-Ten-Ten-nas

In each issue of the *News*, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antenna you buy or build with out imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

No. 21: A Simple 2-Element 10-Meter Quad

Quads are popular with many folks, and sometimes for good reasons. So let's see what a dedicated 10-meter 2-element quad might look like after some work in the home shop. We shall use only materials available locally: wire, PVC, and some hardware.

Why a Quad? Quads beams consist of 2 1 wavelength (approximately) loops, ordinarily arranged so that one is the driven element and the other is the reflector. Since the elements are double the size of the half-wavelength elements in a 2-element Yagi, we expect more gain-and we get it. In fact, a 2-element quad has almost as much gain as the 8'-boom Yagi or the wide-band Yagi we discussed in recent columns. However, the 2-element quad does not have as much gain as a fully optimized long-boom 3-element Yagi. Also, the front-to-back ratio of a quad fluctuates around the 20 dB figure, more like a 3-element Yagi than a 2-element Yagi.


Physically, a quad beam--when compared to a Yagi--trades volume for horizontal area. Horizontally, even the 8'-boom Yagi requires a rectangle about 8' long by 16.5' wide. A quad of similar performance has a footprint only 5' long by 9.5' wide, or about 1/3 the area. However, the Yagi is flat, while the quad occupies a 450 cubic foot volume. (That just means that it is as high as it is wide.)

If you decide that you want a quad for most of the HF bands, I recommend that you obtain one of the commercial models. These fairly

complex structures are engineered for maximum strength and durability. However, if you need only a 10-meter model (and later want to tuck 6-meter or 2-meter quads within the same framework), then you can build one yourself with simple tools and materials.

The Quad Beam Structure. As shown in Figure 1, a good 10-meter quad can be built from two wire loops. If the wire you use is #14 bare copper (stranded or solid), the driven element loop is 105.3" per side or 421.2" overall. The reflector loop is placed 60" behind the driven element and is 110.3" per side or 441.2" overall. If you decrease the wire size of a loop antenna, the total length becomes smaller as well (and not longer, as with a linear wire antenna element). For #18 bare copper wire, the dimensions per side drop to 105" and 110" respectively—not a big drop, but a noticeable one.

These dimensions are for bare wire. Insulated wire has a 2-5% velocity factor, depending on the type and thickness of the insulation. It will require different dimensions that I have not modeled and tested.



If we could just starch the wires and toss them in the air, the quad would be a very simple antenna. However, we need a supporting structure, shown by the dotted boom and arms in Figure 1. The support structure should be non-conductive, although a metal boom usually does not affect antenna tuning. For 10-meters, the

arms can be strong fiberglass, quality bamboo (with lighter wire elements), or thin-wall PVC.

The sketch shows what one might do with an all-PVC structure. The boom can be about 4-5' 1" or 1.25" nominal Schedule 40 PVC. (1" nominal PVC is closer to 1.25" in diameter, while 1.25" nominal PVC is closer to 1.5" in diameter.) The arms can be thinner-wall SDR-135 PVC, 0.5" diameter nominal. Each of the 4 arms per element should be just about 6.5' long, but lets add another half foot to each.

Since PVC comes in standard 10' lengths, we shall need 8 pieces of the half-inch diameter stock, along with 4 end-to-end couplers (plus a 5' piece of fatter Schedule 40 for the boom). You can either drill the ends of the arms for the wires or use half-inch Tee fittings--although the smoother fittings add weight to the assembly.

Assuming a 5' boom, use a 1 1/8" drill-mounted hole cutter to cut two pair of aligned holes in each end of the boom. The outer pair at each end should be about 6-9" in from the end, and the inner set another 1.5" further in. The hole-pairs should be at right angles to each other at each end, and the hole sets at each end should be very closely aligned with each other.

Now we can make the wire supports. First, place an end-to-end coupler in each hole and run a stainless steel nut and bolt through the boom and coupler to fasten the assembly. Using PVC cement, add 7' lengths of the half-inch thin-wall PVC to each coupler end. Add Tees to the ends, or drill out and deburr generous holes for the wire about 1/2" in from each arm end.

Use a length of cord marked the same length as the wire that will replace it—with some excess. Run the cord through the holes and stress the arms outward toward the boom end until the cord matches the element size. Tie it off. If you use fresh nylon cord, you can leave it in place even after you add the wire—it will not hurt anything. Since cord stretches, you may experience some flex reversals, but after a few of these, you will learn how to keep the arms flexed in the correct direction.


Now add the wires. Make the reflector loop solid by twisting the ends of the wire together and soldering. The driven element requires a small

insulated plate and a coax connector.

Assuming you have or can build a boom-tomast mounting plate and have the U-bolts to mount the structure, you are almost ready to go. But let's not hurry.

Performance. The 2-element quad we have just built was designed for best front-to-back ratio from about 28.25 through 28.75 MHz. Below 28.25 MHz, the front-to-back ratio decreases rapidly to a little over 10 dB. Above the target frequency range, the front-to-back ratio decreases more slowly so that the 10 dB figure is not reached until about 29.4 MHz.

Forward gain of this antenna is maximum at the low end of the band and decreases about 0.1 dB per 100 kHz. Gain is best in the first half MHz of 10 meters, rivaling the gain of the 8'-boom Yagi. It remains as good as any 2-element Yagi all the way to the top end of 10 meters.



Since I am not trying to sell you anything, notice that I have told a story about what happens to the gain and front-to-back ratio rather than citing peak figures for each. Figure 2 shows the azimuth pattern at the elevation angle of maximum radiation when the antenna is modeled at 1 wavelength up (about 35' high).

Figure 2 shows not only the variation in front-to-back ratio and the rear pattern, but also the gradual reduction in gain with increasing frequency.

Feeding the antenna. The feedpoint impedance of the antenna alone varies from about 70 to 150 ohms across 10 meters. since we anticipate feeding the antenna with standard 50-ohm coaxial cable, we need to add one more component: a matching system.



The simplest and most effective matching system for this antenna is a 1/4-wavelength section of 75-ohm coaxial cable, such as RG-11 (for higher power) or RG-59 (for lower power levels). Both cables have a velocity factor of 0.66, which means that a full wavelength of cable is 0.66 of the wavelength in free space. Let's use 28.5 MHz as our design frequency. A wavelength at this frequency is just about 34.5' long. A quarter wavelength is a little over 8.6' or 103.5" long. The quarter-wave matching section is 0.66 of this or 68.3" long.

A perfect quarter wavelength will transform an impedance higher than 75 ohms to a lower impedance, which is just what we need. In fact, when fed with a 50-ohm cable to the shack, the quarter-wave section shows under 2:1 SWR all across the 10-meter band. Figure 3 shows anticipated SWR curve.



Do not operate this antenna without the quarter-wave 75-ohm matching section or an equivalent matching circuit.

If a 2-element quad meets your space and operating needs, this one will do the job about as well as it can be done. Feel free to alter the support structure using materials with which you are comfortable in your shop. (For me, PVC is tinker toys for adults.) A TV rotator will easily turn this light antenna. For best results, be sure the bottom wire is at least 20' up, and a tower or mast height of 35' is a good minimum target height for excellent Dxing.

TenX DX News

There has been a significant upsurge in Ten meter activities the past few weeks as the solar flux has run up to a record high of 179! These improved conditions have helped put a few new contacts in my logbook, but I missed a new country this past weekend. My last new country was Temotu Island back in May. It is known that Jim Smith, VK9NS and Tim Totten, N4GN both swapped numbers from Temotu, so when cards are submitted for Temotu DXCC credit on 1 October, the number of 10-10 countries will increase to 290!

Propagation: Solar flux will range from 125-175 during the fourth quarter of 1998. On September 11 the solar flux was 145, the A index 7, and the K index 1. Now that Cycle 23 is rolling along, the flux has started a steady long climb upwards. As you can see from my prediction of flux range, there will be a fifty point swing in the flux numbers during the next three months as new spots appear on the sun, and we continue to move up the first phase of Cycle 23 which will last for 2 years. Expect the best conditions on September 27-29, October 25-27, November 22-24, and December 21-23! For stations in the Eastern U.S. expect a 60% chance of DX propagation to the East-West path into Europe and Africa. For stations in the Western U.S. expect a 40% chance of DX into Europe. All of the U.S. will get a 35% chance into Central and S. America. Sporadic E Layer conditions will diminish during the Winter as F Layer skip returns. Remember the beacons (28.175-28.300) will tell you

what is open, especially 28.200.

Operating On 10 Meters by Mike Crawshaw, G4BLH

For the last few years, the ten-meter band has been pretty quiet. Band conditions have been such that the only openings have usually been short Skip and these have occurred very infrequently. The reason for the poor band conditions was, of course, because we were at the low point of the 11-year Sunspot cycle. However, as the new sunspot cycle gets under way and the band begins to climb out of the doldrums, we will find that, over the next few years, conditions on the ten-meter band, particularly in winter, will get better and better.

Older radio amateurs like myself (no!!, I am not THAT old) will have experienced this change in 10m band conditions before. For the newcomers amongst us however, the ever-improving conditions will bring a complete change in what we have been used to. Instead of listening to the sound of static, TV time-base or next doors thermostat 'firing up', with only the occasional CQ call resulting in a contact (usually with someone within ground wave distance), we will find ever stronger signals from all parts of the world 'littering' the band. This is, of course, a very desirable state of affairs, because unlike the other HF bands, on ten meters it is possible to 'work the world' using relatively low power levels and simple antennae (not everybody, me included, has access to a 60ft tower, 4 element cubical quad and 400w linear however desirable that might be).

However, it also can result in problems. When the band is wide open, it is all to easy to get caught up in the excitement of hearing new countries and wanting to work those stations, or of wanting to pick up a few new TenTen numbers, or maybe, for the Paperchasers amongst us (including me), wanting to pick up a few more points for a particular TenTen Chapter Award.

Now there is nothing wrong with any of that, except that in our enthusiasm to do some or all of these things, good operating practice may, inadvertently, go 'out of the window', whereas in truth, it should be beyond reproach.

'What do I mean by good operating practice?' you may well ask.

Well, that is not a question that can be answered in one sentence. There are so many aspects to 'good operating practice'. Perhaps the best way of considering the answer to the question is to look at some specific situations.

1. Calling CQ

Before making a CQ call on any frequency, it is surely common sense to LISTEN to see if the frequency is already in use. If it appears to be clear, then a short transmission should be made to verify that this is indeed the case e.g. this is G4BLH; is the frequency in use please?' If there is no reply, double check, e.g., this is G4BLH asking again is the frequency in use please?' If there is still no reply, it is safe to assume that the frequency is clear and that you may go ahead with your CQ call. If you do get a response indicating that the frequency is in use, try the same technique on another frequency

2. Calling another station (not in a net)

If you hear a station (station A) already in a QSO (with station B) and you particularly want to contact station A, DO NOT try to break into the QSO. Wait until the QSO is over and the stations sign, then LISTEN to establish which station is staying on the frequency? If it is station A then call that Station.

If it is station B that you wish to contact, DO NOT start a QSO with that Station on the frequency. This is not a way to win friends or influence people and will most certainly miff station whose 'frequency' you have just commandeered. Instead, put out ONE short call on the frequency asking station B to QSY preferably to a specific frequency that you know is clear. Wherever you ask the station to QSY to (e.g. up/down 10kz), check the frequency is clear BEFORE starting a QSO.

Under no circumstances (except an emergency) should you try to contact stations on a frequency that is clearly already in use. Note only is this not good practice, it contravenes license regulations (it amounts to deliberate interference)

3. Whose frequency is it anyway?

Nobody, no person, no organization (including TenTen) has any exclusive rights to a particular frequency in amateur band, but protocol intimates that whoever started the QSO on a particular frequency usually stays on that





frequency and the other station QSYs at the end of the QSO. This means that 'nets' may not be able to use their nominal operating frequency if that frequency is already in use. Net control stations should if necessary move up/down a few kHz to a clear frequency. (More about operating in Nets next time)

Please remember that conditions can change very quickly on ten meters, and you can suddenly find several QSOs taking place on one frequency. This does NOT necessarily mean that all these stations are deliberately talking on top

stations are deliberately talking on top of one another, you may be hearing several QSOs but the other stations involved may not. That said, certain frequencies do tend to be monitored by stations wanting TenTen contacts. That itself is not a problem, but it is good operating practice, when a net is not organized on such frequencies, to move off those frequencies for QSO's after the initial contact has been made. One of the objectives of TenTen is to promote activity on the ten meter band, not just one or two selected frequencies.

10-10 Software Update by Chuck Imsande

K4HAV's new Win 10-10 Contest Program for Windows 95/98 was first used during the recent August Phone Contest. Many nice comments and suggestions for additions were received. An update (Version 1.1) has been posted on the hds.net web page that incorporates all these user-suggested ideas plus more features added by the author, Jim Hardy, K4HAV #17605. Updates for the K4HAV 10-10 software can be freely downloaded from his web site.


