Well, we have tried to remedy that situation by presenting each Net Control Station with a certificate of appreciation. On top of that we will be presenting an award to the Net Control Station of the year. This will be an annual award and more will be coming concerning this. Next time you check into the net take a second to say thanks to those folks for being there.

I wish to send personal thanks to Sam, GM2AOL for the nice comments you sent to me, and at 82 years young, keep Scotland coming through. Next in line are L. B. Cebik W4RNL and Jim Eshleman, N3VXI, what a job these two do to keep our web site growing and getting better with each entry. Where would we be without you?

Hats off to all the award managers for the work they are doing. With the increase in membership and fairly good band openings they have been working hard to keep up. To those I may have missed, it is not intended, but our new Editor may start editing my prose if I get too long in my praise to our great volunteers.

Yesterday I exchanged a number with 70303. That is 37000+ numbers since I received mine in 1981. That means an average of 2055 members have joined each year since then. We continue to grow and progress. Many thanks to Mel, KE5DE, who started us on the convention trail with the first one being held in Shreveport LA. Conventions are getting better and attendance is increasing.

Now, to change gears and add a little seriousness. QSO Parties! We have had a good increase in participation during the last year or so, and this can be expected with fairly good band openings. However, once again, and not unexpected, we are hearing some dissention regarding scoring

There have been two changes in the past regarding scoring, both suggested by members and committees. Both these changes have been tried as promised and appear to have failed. First there was extra credit for prefixes, then extra

points for working DX with at 10-10 number. This has fostered a number of complaints as to the fairness in the scoring. So, where are we? Although the suggested scoring changes have been made and tested as suggested, we find ourselves still not satisfied. Just like each member of the board, I would be quite happy if we could satisfy each member with our administration of 10-10. This would certainly be meritorious, but in reality, impossible.

Now, what is the best thing to do becomes the question, and a return to basics usually helps with the "fix". It seems that the founding Fathers of 10-10 were intent on the necessity of making contacts. All award programs are based on making contacts and the importance of doing just that, making contacts. Therefore, I will recommend to the Board of Directors at the June meeting that we revert back to the old way of scoring. Members with at 10-10 number will count two points and without a number will count one. Plain and simple and you must make contacts to win. This is fair to all thus allowing all to have an equal chance depending on band conditions. As always we take our chances on the shape of the band. I will recommend this to be implemented with the first QSO Party in 2000. This will allow for sufficient notification, changes in brochures cover sheets and information sheets. This will depend on the Board of Directors agreeing to the recommendation. I sincerely hope this will deter some of the dissention concerning scoring and bring us back to equality for all members.

Referring to the June Board meeting, by no means is this a secret meeting. It is your organization; your elected board and you do have say if desired. I have received a number of suggestions, as I am sure other board members do. Here is a good way to go about having your say – I have replied to members making suggestions to me by asking them to think about what they are asking, put it in writing, listing the advantages versus the disadvantages and what they hope to accomplish. Any help needed doing this is readily available from any board member. When satisfied that you have put forth what you desire, send to me and I will see that it is included in the agenda of the meeting. Any decision by the board will be referred to you in writing.

One point I would like to make about suggestions is simply think about it first. I recently received a suggestion (in all seriousness) that we hold our QSO Parties only when the band conditions are good. My answer was simply, how do you propose we do that? No further was offered, but I am open to suggestions.

Enough for the soap box. As Dayton and Convention are drawing nigh, I hope to see a good number of you at Dayton and many more at the Convention. We have taken a page of the News for a sample convention pre-registration form. (See page 4 – editor) You can tear it out, photocopy or just copy onto a piece of paper. For those of you with Internet capabilities all this information is on the web pages at (http://www.ten-ten. org) or you can send a SASE to me for the form. I can't begin to tell you how important it is to pre-register if at all possible. This really helps us folks so please, pre-register.

That's it, I'm done. Hope to see you in Dayton and if not, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, home of the "BIG ORANGE".

### The International Morse Code

### A SERIES BY MARTIN REID NGQU

"Taking the Plunge - Part I"

Are you a newly licensed ham considering "getting your feet wet" in operating the International Morse Code? Thinking about upgrading and wonder about the best way to learn CW? Or, maybe you're just wondering what all the fuss over the code is about. Well, if so, this article is intended for you.....

Out discussion of learning the International Morse Code continues, with this, our sixth in a series; some specific information for those "taking the plunge."

In our last installment, we offered a "tongue-in-cheek" warning about beginning operation on the U.S. Novice bands for the student of CW. The truth is that hams you'll run across on the U.S. Novice bands are among the friendliest you will meet in Ham Radio. There is no shortage of other hams looking for a QSO and you'll find hams from a variety of backgrounds, interests and experiences.

We'll assume you've picked out the transceiver of your dreams and have your station set up. All that's left is to operate, so let's get started.

First, make sure your operating position is free from distractions. In my shack, a pair of headphones are available in case someone comes into the room to ask to borrow some money or something else unpleasant. Headphones designed specifically with ham stations will make copying CW easier and less tiring. Have plenty of pens and paper available at your well-lit operating position. You may wish to prepare a typewritten list of phrases to refer to until you become comfortable with your sending and spelling (like walking and chewing gum), or you may refer to the list of CW phrases at the end of this installment.

The choice available is whether to call "CQ" (a general call to any radio amateur) or listen for another station calling. My policy, while probably not the best one, is to listen across the band for a few minutes. If no calls are heard, I'll jump in and start calling. Inevitably, half way through my call (and I'm not saying this just to add a little humor to this article), I'll hear another station, up the band a bit, busy calling CQ. It never fails.

Before we venture on to the air, we must first review a few points about receivers. The selectivity of receivers to-

day is enhanced through the use of filters. These filters are usually crystal, ceramic or mechanical and operate at one of the transceiver's intermediate frequencies or IF's. These filters are like a gate which control the number of signals which you are hearing from the receiver. These filters come in variety of bandwidths. Standard bandwidths for SSB operation are 2100 to 2700 Hz. (2.1 – 2.7 kHz) wide. CW filters are generally about 500 hz wide, or narrower and are optional features on many new radios. A bandwidth of 500 Hz means your transceiver will respond most strongly to signals spread over this 500 Hz frequency range. This range of best response is also referred to as the transceiver passband – the band of frequencies the transceiver IF passes.

Many transceivers allow you to select between at least two IF filter bandwidths. It may seem obvious, but the wider the filter, the more signals you will hear (provided there are stations on the air for you to hear). By the same token, the narrower a filter is, the fewer stations you will hear (greater selectivity). So, under crowded band conditions, a CW filter is more desirable than a SSB filter which permits a greater number of CW signals to be heard.

Many new transceivers also offer digital signal processing, or DSP. This is an advanced means of eliminating unwanted noise and interference.

Some radios lack provisions for use of IF filters, but instead provide additional selectivity through use of audio-frequency filters or AF's. This is a less expensive and less effective means of filtering, but for casual CW operation, AF filtering may do just fine for you.

Now, let's assume your transceiver had filtering capability. We will use this capability in our first venture on to the airwaves. With your receiver set to the "wide" position, or "SSB", you will be hearing signals from cross 2 to 3 kilohertz of bandwidth. Since CW signals are only 250 50 500 hertz wide, you may be able to hear several stations in your receiver's passband. If so, select one signal you wish to focus on.

Now, tune your receiver so that the other signals sound higher or lower than the signal you have selected. The tone of this signal, at the center of your receiver's passband, will vary depending on the radio you are using. But when the station you wish to copy is in the middle of your receivers passband, the signal should have a characteristic sounding tone. By switching from the wide to the narrow filter, you can determine when a particular station is in the center of your receiver's passband. This will also tell you what a station should sound like when it is in the center of the receiver's passband.

You will want to adjust your receiver so that it is in the "wide" setting, when you begin calling other stations. By doing so, you will be able to hear stations who may be slightly off your frequency, but are calling you. More on switching from wide to narrow filtering in our next installment. But first, a word about courtesy....

Consideration of other operators, even on bands plagued by horrible interference form international broadcasting and natural noise, should <u>always</u> be utmost in every operators mind. With this in mind, one of the first things a new operator should learn is how to judge is a frequency is occupied or if it is clear for a call.

Sending "QRL?" (is this frequency in use?) is the first step in beginning any transmitting activity on the air, including a "CQ" call. The operator mnay send it again after a short listen, just to be sure the question was heard.

If a frequency is occupied and another station has responded, you can expect to hear on of several replies. These might include: "QRL TU" translated as :yes, this frequency is in use, thank you for asking"; a simple "QRL" (yes, this frequency is in use}; the letter "C"; or just a couple of dits to indicate another station is present. Most stations will send the first reply, including the "TU". No response to this is required on your part, as there is a QSO in progress and you would be interrupting if you sent additional comments.

If no response is heard, the frequency is likely clear. If you have some minor tuning adjustments to make to your rig, don't forget to identify your station after this sending is completed. Doing so is a mark of a good operator and may result in a station calling you, shortly after you have identified.

I like to tell my two children that calling "CQ" is much like fishing. For success, you must have, of course, a fishing license. You must also have an attractive bait and finally, you must be patient. And so it is with CW calls. Stations hearing your call will decide whether or not to answer your call, based on how your sending sounds. Your sending is your "bait". Your objective should be to make your call, and your sending in general, as easy to copy for the other operator as possible and therefore, an attractive "bait". So here are a few pointers for presenting your "bait":

1.) If you've never sent before, make sure you keep your transmitter off until you have obtained at least a little off-the-air practice. This will help reduce the instance of mental illness among hams you are sending to. Suggest you

tune in to W1AW broadcasts to hear some well spaced, easy to copy CW characters. W1AW is the official station of the American Radio Relay League in Newington, CT. You can find a schedule of W1AW broadcasts (times, frequencies) in the pages of "QST" magazine. Practicing a bit will help you get off to a good start. Your "fist" doesn't have to be perfect for your first QSO, but a little practice will go a long way. You may wish to give some consideration to the type of key you are going to use. For the newcomer to CW, the choice is clear — a straight key. Using the straight key will give you needed practice in the proper spacing between dits and dashes, allowing you to properly form words with the needed longer pauses between them. Once your code speed increases to around 10 WPM, you may think about using an electronic "keyer". A "keyer" electronically forms dits and dashes.

- 2.) On the bands, listen first for an indication of what condition the band is in and where the band is open to.
- 3.) Brief calls are best. Send "CQ" three of four times, followed by your call sign two or three times. You may lengthen your calls, but based on my experience, there are many times when operators hear your call immediately after you begin calling. Excessively long calls will discourage operators from answering you. It's true! Beginning operators are strongly cautioned when sending "CQ". To keep their sending speed slow and steady, at a speed they can copy comfortably. Sure, it's east to let 'er rip when repeating this short repetitive phrase. But your answer will come back to you at the speed you're sending at!
- 4.) If no one answers after a couple of calls, take a break. Listen around a bit on the frequency you are using. You'll probably hear someone else calling that YOU can answer. If no one happens along, just take a break. After a few short minutes, other stations may appear on frequency and your luck will change.

In each issue of the *News*, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

#### No. 23: Some Notes on Antenna Safety

What would you like to protect from harm? Yourself? Your family? Your home? Your station? Your neighbors and their property? I guess that is enough to start a column on safety. Obviously, we can never finish it, but perhaps a few ideas might help you fill some gaps in the safety net around all you wish to protect and preserve.

Static Build-Up: As the wind and weather pass over the antenna elements, a charge builds up. On long wire antennas, it can generate enough of a charge to draw a visible spark across a gap to ground. On smaller antennas it can create unnecessary static. The best way to avoid problems here is to be sure that the antenna is at DC ground. Some antennas are designed with a DC ground; others are not. For low impedance antennas (<150 ohms feedpoint impedance) fed with coax, the simplest way to insure a DC ground is to place an RF choke across the antenna terminals. This gives you a DC ground path but leaves the antenna RF-hot. At 10meters, a 100 micro-H RF choke provides about 1800 ohms of reactive isolation, but a low resistance to charge build-up. Just be sure your coax braid is grounded somewhere along the line so that the charge has somewhere to go other than to your equipment.

Parallel feedline systems, such as all-band doublets require a different treatment, since the impedances they may see can range up to 5000 ohms and more. Here we can use high value resistors where the feedline enters the house. Run a 1 Mohm resistor from each line to a ground rod where the line meets the shack. It is also useful to add a knife switch or other disconnector (with the

alternate contacts directly grounded) to remove the connection to the equipment when the antenna is not in use.

Station Grounding: Everyone is familiar with the need for a common ground bus for all station equipment with as short a lead as possible to a ground rod outdoors. If you have a tower, it should also be ground rodded. All ground rods (including the house ground at the electrical service entry) should be connected together by the largest copper wire you can obtain. Some folks use copper flashing cut into long strips. These days, braid is not recommended because its very large surface area open to weather deteriorates it quickly. Use solid mechanical connections, not solder (which melts in the presence of lightning like a teenager in the presence of a rock star: instantly).

If ground rods are widely separated, add ground rods in a row from end to end, spaced about the length of each ground rod apart. This is not over-kill--just the opposite. It is over-safe by holding the resistance between everything in your house and shack at the absolute minimum. Even a slight resistance may give a lightning surge an alternative path to ground through your "stuff."

Towers and Coax: Some studies have shown that the bulk of lightning current travels in the shield of the coax. A considerable voltage difference can exist between a tower leg and the coax braid if the first connection between the two is at the bottom of the tower. You may want to consider breaking your coax near the top of the tower, having one section to the antenna with the flex loop to accommodate rotation and another section down the leg of the tower. Securely fasten a plat to a tower leg and use a double female connector with chassis nuts (often called a bulkhead connector) to join the two coax lengths. This gives you a connection between the coax braid and the tower leg. This is not the only ground you should use, but an extra one.

Total Disconnection: During violent electrical storms, surges can enter the station equipment from several sources: the antenna lines, the AC power lines, and ground. When dealing with surges, do not think in terms of complete electrical paths. A surge can charge components, cases, and chassis, and create high voltages across components that are designed for low voltages. Hence, during violent storms, do a complete disconnect.

Outdoors, disconnect all antenna feed lines and reconnect them to a ground rod in the station ground system. Indoors, disconnect antenna feedlines from the station equipment. Unplug all equipment--or that power strip you use as a master switch. Most power switches

are single pole, so one must unplug in order to break the neutral and ground line paths along which surges can travel. Also disconnect the station equipment from the master ground lead to the outdoor ground rod system. If you do some careful planning, you can make all these moves in under a minute. Just be sure that all connections are accessible and require no tools to connection and disconnection.

While it may be true that a direct strike is rare, most damage occurs from nearby strikes that place heavy voltage surges on power lines, antennas, and the ground. You can do a lot to keep them outdoors, where they belong.

Towers: Towers, whether free standing or on the roof top, require some special thought. Too few hams actually study tower installation before putting up the first one. Here are some things to think about:

- 1. What are the requirements for the tower base, including the concrete, rebar, excavation, etc. Never undersupport a tower at its base.
- 2. What, if any, are the guying requirements? If a tower is a guyed model, install the guying system to at least the manufacturer's standards. Be certain that guys are correctly and adequately anchored--and that they do not present a hazard to those who use your yard. If the tower can use a building support, be sure the building is up to the job. Most roof-line facia boards on a house are not.
- 3. Where does the tower go. Place it where it cannot hurt neighboring property (or people) if the tower and antenna fall under the worst conditions imaginable. Also try to place it where it will not hurt your own home and family if it falls.
- 4. Where do the feedlines go? Be sure that feedlines do not create either an electrical or a physical hazard for family members or visitors.
- 5. What are the codes? The more urban your setting, the more you may be subject to codes and ordinances that require permits, special requirements (for example, conduit for control voltages over a certain value), inspections, and, in some cases, licensed installers. Do not under any conditions bypass these requirements. Investigate in advance to know what you have to do and what it will add to the cost of the installation.
- 6. What about intruders? Towers are in some places classified as attractive dangers, which is what they might be to a neighborhood child with an urge to climb. Hol-

lering is a deterrent, but not protection. Consider fencing in or cladding the lower tower sections so that the tower cannot be climbed.

7. Are any of the tower conveniences dangerous? Crank-up and tilt-over towers are convenient, but usually rely on cables, pulleys, and gearing to go up, come down, and stay in position. Analyze the stresses on these auxiliary parts to ensure that they can safely handle the loads. Develop a maintenance schedule for inspecting and for replacing cables before their lifetime is ended. If they die on the job, disaster often results.

RF Safety: RF hazards come in two varieties. One is radiation. Current FCC regulations provide standards for safe amounts. Use the worksheets and analyze your station, even if you think you may be exempt by virtue of power levels and spacings. Be sure.

A second hazard comes from direct contact with antenna elements carrying RF currents. Ground mounted verticals and inverted Vee ends provide the greatest hazards, since both children and adults can come into contact with them--either directly or with some implement having a long metal handle.

Isolate ground-mounted verticals with fencing or other barriers which are effective especially in preventing children from touching a potentially active antenna. A vertical in or adjacent to a children's play area may mean station silence during periods when children are present: if contact is not a danger, radiation may be.

Elevate and insulate horizontal antenna ends above the level where anyone can touch them with a metal rod. Never underestimate the ingenuity of a child with a small mean streak or a large curiosity.

Insurance: Carry all you can afford that may be relevant to hazards that antennas may present. However, never let the existence of insurance be a substitute for the best possible practice in the installation and maintenance of antennas and their supports. The lives you preserve may include your own and those of your loved ones.

This is not a complete look at all the facets of antenna safety. We have not even reminded you to keep your antennas and supports well away from power lines. But perhaps we have said enough to prompt you to do a periodic inspection of your own safety measures—and perhaps some reading into the handbooks and other literature. The three key words are these: protect, divert, and prevent. They are three ways of saying that you care enough to do the very best.

Any transaction with the CM which requires that a certificate be issued, and most worksheet specials should still be handled via US Mail. Also to be on the safe side, a detailed listing of the upgrade should be kept in the event that the CM should require verification. Requirements peculiar to a particular chapter are noted below. To be added to, deleted from, or make changes to the following list of e-mail upgraders must be made in writing or e-mail communication between the Certificate Manager and the Chapter Coordinator.

February has been very interesting with the return of daily skip from Europe and Africa into Houston, Texas. The solar flux peaked on February 15<sup>th</sup> at a new cycle high of 205 but the low for the month was 99 on the 7<sup>th</sup>. The winter months in N.America are always the best for DX and with the solar flux rising, much DX was heard.

News: Palestine is a new DXCC entity with a E4 prefix! The ARRL will start accepting E4 cards in October for contacts after February 1, 1999. One of our members, Bernie W3UR, (ex.WR3E) was in the first group to be active as E44DX. Operating from Gaza City, most of the contacts were very fast signal exchanges, I doubt that any 10-10 activity took place. Two groups, one Japanese the other Hungarian, have come into Palestine and they have put many thousands of contacts into their logs. (Editor: I would appreciate confirmation of 10-10 activity from E4!)

ZL9CI, Campbell Island. Possibly the best DXpedition of the decade took place from Campbell Island in January 1999. Ken ZL2HU #37889 and Trey N5KO #26780 (ex.WN4KKN) were the only members on the trip. Why? Because they made 96,000 contacts, which is a new record! Postage is now 33 cents per ounce in the US. International rates will go up later in 1999.

Propagation: Solar flux will range from 105-210 during the second quarter of 1999. On March 1st, the Solar flux was 123 the A index 10 and K index 3, now that Cycle 23 is about 18 months old, the flux is on a steady climb upwards. Solar flux is expected to bottom out around 105 from March 3-5, then rise to 130 by March 8, 160 by March 10, and peak around 200 on March 13. After that it is expected to decline to 120 around March 22. This is all based on the previous solar rotation, so new activity could increase these numbers with little warning. There will be a forty point swing in the flux numbers during the next three months as more new spots appear on the sun and the first phase of Cycle 23 will last two more years. Expect the best conditions on March 12-14, April 10-12, May 9-11 and June 11-14! For stations in the Eastern US, expect a 80% chance of DX propagation to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. For stations in the Western US, expect 50% chance of DX into Europe and a 80% chance into Asia. All of the US will get a 60% chance into Central & S.America in the mid afternoon. Long haul F Layer skip is now the dominant mode of skip. Expect a 5% chance of Long Path into Asia. Remember the beacons (28.175-28.300) will tell you what is open, especially 28.200.



### 10-10 Reflections

In July 1998, I received an e-mail from John Miller, W0IKT #37983, asking if I had received any response from the seven early 10-10 members (Jim Melrose, K6PJO #9; Milton Camp, K6OYX #13; Lee Sackett, KD6XT #30; Franklin J. Hammerlein, W6CYW #47; E. B. Corliss, K5DIT #50; Joseph P. Poges, W1EED #70; and Harold Scott, WA6TQC #71) mentioned in this column in the Octuber 1996 News. I had made an appeal to these early members to serve as "Reflections" guest writers to fill in the gaps in 10-10's early history. Unfortunately, I received no response, and E. B. Corliss, K5DIT #50 subsequently became an SK.

Last December, in a letter to 10-10 President Tom Henderson, K4CIH #33233, I informed him that the only records available to me as Historian are bound in four volumes dating from 1969 through the Fall 1993 10-10 News. There is also a two-year gap in Volume I, from October 1969 to the Fall 1971 10-10 Bulletin.

In January 1999, President Tom Henderson sent letters and a 10-10 History Questionnaire to Joan McDonnell, WA6QKC #14, 10-10's first Secretary in 1962; Robert C. Steinbach, W6TCH #11, 10-10 President in 1966; and Edwin A. Steinbach, W6VEE #34, President in 1965. These letters expressed an urgent need to retrieve the history of the first nine years of the 10-10 Net. In response to the questionnaire, we received the following information from the first 10-10 Secretary, Joan McDonnell, WA6QKC #14:

"Duncan, K6LHA #114 and I were friends of Irv Hunter, K6PWO living in Glendora, California when Irv decided that a group should be formed to meet on 10 meters with the theme of '10 meters—Use it or lose it!' He approached us (Duncan, now an SK, was my OM) about a meeting with other local hams to discuss his idea in early 1962. I wish I knew what became of the minutes of the early meetings, which I turned over (I don't remember to whom) when we moved from Glendora to Thousand Oaks in June 1964."

[W6EHM comment: It seems that the early historical documents were passed on from one past President to the next successor, and somehow they got lost in the transition.]

#### **LOW BAND NOISE REDUCTION PROCEDURE**

by Stan Wernick - W5ZF #27550

The low band portion of the radio spectrum (27 to 50 MHz) carries with it characteristics that do not fit the mold of the higher frequencies (136 to 512 MHz) and therefore require a different approach in dealing with some of the problems associated with utilization of this band. On low band, for example, the phenomenon known as skip occurs, and stations from a thousand or more miles away can be contacted. It is very difficult to prevent this but a possible solution is to add P.

termine if it is originating in the alternator (D.C. circuitry) or being picked up by the antenna.

First, remove the antenna and turn up the volume on the radio. If there is a noise, which usually resembles a whining noise, and if the accelerator pedal is pressed, it changes pitch, this must be addressed first. If, however, there is no noise with the antenna removed, then a procedure of grounding and bonding must begin. In either case, the subsequent procedures.

radiate the ignition noise. The exhaust pipe is the worst of all because it is mounted on insulated standoffs and becomes a quarter wave antenna on the low band frequencies. Every time the sniffer picks up a big noise burst, that place must be bonded. This will continue until all the noise is tamed.

Before we start, it may be prudent to re-visit the alternator once again. If, when we removed the antenna, there was alternator whine, this must be addressed first. There are a wide variety of alternator filters on the market, and you must ensure that which you buy is of high enough current for the radio. This usually cures the alternator hash. If not, it might be necessary to run coax cable from the radio DC input directly through the firewall and to the battery terminal, grounded at both ends. This generally takes care of it. Now that we have gotten rid of this little pest, let's get to the hard part – **bonding**.

When the sniffer has picked up a noise source, such as the exhaust pipe, you must bond the end of the pipe to the car chassis using as short a piece of shield braid as possible, being careful not to drill though fenders or the gas tank. The inside of the fender well works great. The technique illustrated in figure 2 must be used for optimum results. This procedure must be continued until the noise is significantly reduced. Past experience has shown that after bonding the exhaust pipe, hood, and trunk, the noise is all but gone. If some noise remains, lift the hood and begin an inspection of electrical connections around the engine. You will find that there are ground wires coming from various wire bundles and connected to the chassis. These may look like ground connections, but they're not. The manufacturer is in a hurry and mounted the ground on painted surfaces and didn't use lock washers.

All of these must be reworked, especially the one which goes from negative side of the battery to the chassis. This one is critical! Remove each ground wire. Brush the chassis around the screw hole down to bare metal, add a star washer next to the chassis side of the screw and then re-install it, sealling the contact afterwards. You will find that there are usually five or six of these in the engine compartment. Sometimes, there are real stubborn cases where the ignition wires have to be shielded, but the approach to these is essentially the same. This procedure should get you off to a good start in the mystery world of noise reduction.

Last, but not least, is the antenna. The placement of the low band antenna is very important. A rule of thumb is, as far from the engine as possible, to the rear of the car, preferably the trunk lid. The type of antenna is also very important. An antenna which is operated at DC ground is best because of static build up. A 1/4 wave whip is worst of all. The test vehicle

used for the de-noise was a 1992 Ford Taurus. Several antennas were tested for noise susceptibility. They were the Larsen NMO-27, the Motorola Specturm, and the Childs Corp Model LBS25 Viking. The LBS Viking outperformed them all, not only on receive, but on transmit by at least 6 dB, on received noise. In speaking to the manufacturer, their engineer said it was because of their feeding technique. Their base loading coil is grounded and tapped at the 50 ohm point to feed it which means much less noise. The results were remarkable. If needed, Childs can be reached at 1 (800) 533-0998. The receiver used for testing was the Radio Shack model HTX-100 on a frequency of 28.470 MHz.

At the time it began, it was an Ad Hoc group, and the officers and control of 10-10 were vested in California where 10-10 began. When it was seen to be a good thing for 10-10, it became a part of the organization, with the VP title remaining. So, all of we who are VP members, unite, rejoice, and celebrate! We are (honorary) Vice Presidents!

From the very beginning, the VP corps is the select few of the dedicated people of 10-10. We are all aware of the response often heard, "I don't do anything with it, but so many asked for one, I got it to hand out." We welcome their participation at any level, and certainly the Worked all Counties, 10-10 bars awards, and others would not be possible without that reserve of semi attached people.

It does take dedication and yes, time and money, to log each of the 1010 OSOs, and to send them in for the bar awards. Of the over 70,000 people with 10-10 numbers, only a few over 3000 of us have sent in the 500 numbers required. sending donations for stamps. They covered subjects like propagation, the AMSAT Oscar-7, new members, solar activity etc.

When Frank became a Silent Key, I suggested that the Net take over the program, which it did. I am not sure of the date but believe it was in 1974, after which certificates were issued and members could work for additional credit by applying to the 500 CLUB certificate manager.

Oh, about calling ourselves VPs - yes we are all vice presidents of the 500 CLUB.

#### Spotlight of a Paperchaser

This Spotlight is about the person who spearheaded one of the most popular 10-10 chapters on the air today. The person is Phil Harich, W3CBC, #68111. The chapter is the Chesapeake Bay Chapter (CBC). Notice the similarity in his callsign and the chapter name?

First off, Phil was licensed in 1995 as N3UNF as a tech plus licensee. He joined 10-10 in March, 1996 and has been a paperchaser for just about as long. In this short span of time, he has managed to garner a few awards. Like his 800 bar and 10-10 VP award #2921. For his participation in the February 1997 winter phone contest, he placed 9<sup>th</sup> in the world, and first place for the third call area during the October 1997 Sprint and February 1998 contests.

Phil lives in Annapolis, MD. and is married to Roxanne, who is also a ham, N3UUB. They have been married for 19 years now, and she is a strong supporter of what he has done with 10-10, and particularly CBC.

Phil was a tractor-trailer driver for about 22 years and an owner/operator for the last ten. It ended after an accident that injured his back. He has had to have numerous surgeries and has become very thankful for his hobby of ham radio and Ten-Ten. He sent me the following story of how the Chesapeake Bay Chapter came about and I thought it would be appropriate that he tell it

The Chesapeake Bay Chapter was a chapter conceived by Chris Woosley, KD4IBI, and myself. I wanted to do something just a little different but with the same flavor as other chapters, only with more pizzazz. A job I first thought would be easy. Just add all the things I thought would raise some real activity for all, something simple but challenging, and at the same time let everyone know what Chesapeake Bay life was like. Boy was I wrong about the part of being easy!

The first part was not hard at all. I knew it had to be a daily contact chapter. This would give everyone a reason to get on the air everyday. Even if there was no propagation, you could still contact locals in your area and get points each day. Then came the research. Still not hard but time consuming; calling Chris and telling him what I had, and we would discuss how to fit it into a Ten-Ten format. After 5 months and several meetings with Chris, we finally had our first certificate plan. I had taken a picture facing from the Eastern Shore of Maryland, to the western shore at the Bay Bridge. Chris had sketched a Sea Monster which we

called Chessie.

Now we began to recruit people for support. We had an open meeting and all that were interested would show up and we would show them what we had written and a rough draft of the certificates. This meeting was to get a feel for paperchasers' opinions, plus to recruit a supporting cast. Well 5 people came. My wife Roxanne made Lasagna and Charlie, W3TXF brought the dessert. It was a first time meeting for just about all who came. We all had had QSOs on ten meters before. Roxanne knew how important this was to me, so she went all out to make the meeting as hospitable as possible, with food first, business second. You'd be surprised how much easier it is to communicate with good food and a warm atmosphere. Chris, Chas Moody, W3TXF, Al Brown, KZ3AB, Dean, KB8YUX. Doris Slye, N3TGB and me. We soon cleared the table, and the presentation began. Well right away, you could see we had something. Everyone was interested. This was just what we needed or I guess what I needed. Just to know that all the work so far was well received, but also showed there was more work to do. Now we all knew this was going to be a chapter of Ten-Ten. I asked if all would like to represent the Chesapeake Bay Chapter as "Founding Members". All agreed.

The next few months was spent color correcting certificates, meeting with several printing companies. WK3P Herman Turner and his wife KA3VVQ Lois Turner, gave up many hours devoted to helping me out with computer time and paperchasing expertise. Just as Chris was helping with some writing, Herman helped me find programs to do the jobs, creating seals, adapting them to the certificate with color correction, creating worksheets, and all the bonus programs. When all this was complete it was time for a second meeting.

This meeting had a larger turnout then before. Chris, Chaz, Al, Doris, Herman, W3VQY Skip, WA3YLO Tony, K3TUJ Bill, Roxanne and myself. The unvailing of the finished basic certificate, and seals and all were in awe. This made me so proud and relieved all the hours put in was worth it .Now we reworded the instruction sheet over and over to make sure that all would understand, even a non-paper chaser. Herman volunteered to create and control our web page. We were given donations from the Founding Members to get started, which was the next hurdle.

Now CBC has 3 upgradeable certificates, the Basic, Lighthouse, and Fish of the Bay, which has 3 boat certificates to choose from each is a 2 part certificate, bonus award certificates Chessie, Big 4, QSO Party and our new annual special, Fishing Tournament. CBC is constantly expanding on development. Soon to add another special starting some time in the near future. The rest is history, CBC is 2 yrs old with a membership of about 755 members at the time of this writing.
